## Chamber Sets Goals For 1987

Board of Directors president, Scott Patterson presided at the annual general membership meeting of the Chamber of Commerce on Thursday, January 29.

Present at the meeting were Patterson, Eddie and Susie Voss, Charles Wetsel, Rob Cheaney, M.L. Guthrie, Sr., Eddie and Mary Ann Hartman, James Pelton and Montie Guthrie.

Past-president Montie Guthrie reported on accomplishments and goals that had been set but not yet accomplished. Accomplishments included a successful city-wide clean-up day, a successful Frontier day, the acquisition of the old Santa Anna Tile Plant building and the acquisition of the old Blue Hardware building. Goals not yet reached included the refurbishment of the two buildings and most notably, the poor turnout for the various chamber

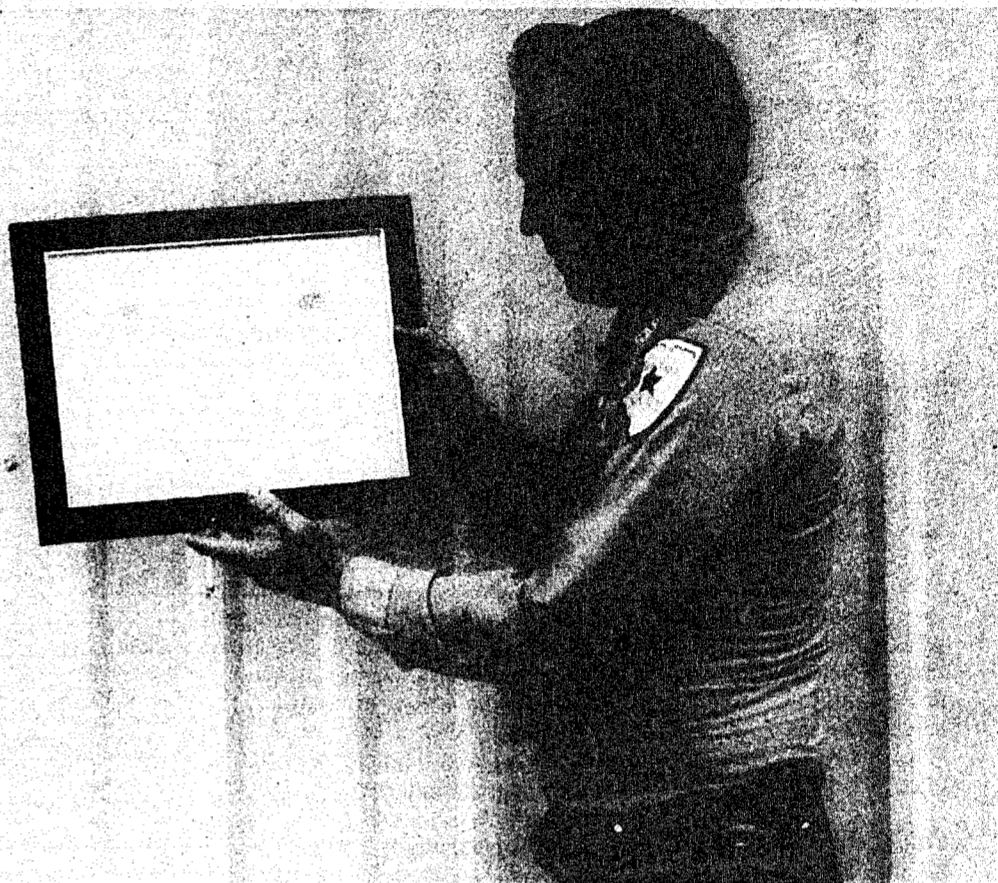
activities.

Patterson gave the president's agenda for 1987. Among goals he wants to accomplish are: refurbishment and occupation of the Tile Plant building; include in Frontier day a Fireman's Sports day; and the completion of a full-time chamber office in the old Blue building. Also the president is seeking volunteers to keep the office open during regular business hours.

The Annual Chamber Banquet was set for March 7, 1987 at the school cafeteria. Judy Hartman, Leanna Hartman and Pat Smith were appointed to carry out the Banquet. Charles Wetsel was appointed Clean-Up Day Chairman for April 25 and Frontier Day was set for May 2 with Charlotte Moseley Chairperson.

The meeting was then opened to general with several items being

discussed and presented for Chamber consideration. Old and/or dangerous buildings in the downtown area were discussed and it was concluded that the Chamber should support the City in its efforts to enforce city ordinances. Several possibilities were brought up to attract people to Santa Anna. The current annual membership drive was discussed and various possibilities were brought up to extend Chamber involvement. Finally, a campaign to educate the people of Santa Anna to the benefits of shopping at home was discussed. The consensus of the group was that people in general do not understand the benefits of buying from local businesses or the danger of losing businesses by going to other cities to buy. The Board of Directors was instructed to begin a program to encourage a shop-at-home attitude.

Officer Terry mentioned that he has completed 965 hours with the State of Texas towards his Bachelor's Degree in Law Enforcement. He stated that for every 500 hours received a certificate is issued.

## Council Has Busy Evening

The Santa Anna City Council met on Thursday, February 5th at 7:00 p.m. at the Mountain City Community Center with all members present. The minutes of the previous meetings were read and approved.

A correction was made on the minutes for the meeting of January 8, concerning the motion made concerning Mr. Floyd Gilbreath. A motion was made to rescind the motion made on January 8 concerning Mr. Gilbreath's water meter.

Mrs. Letha Martin discussed the canal and drainage on Avenue A. She stated that when it rains the water floods down Avenue A to her yard and garage. The Council decided to have the City Crew clean out the canal so that water will flow in the canal ditch as it was intended to do.

Mr. Jay Rogers talked with the Council about the purchase of an IBM computer and billing system. It was decided to talk over the matter and get back with Mr. Rogers.

The Business Water Ordinance was then read and passed on first reading.

Sealed bids on the 80 Ford LTD (police car) were then opened, with three having been received. They were (1) Patricia Musick, \$250; (2) Daniel W. Husebosch, \$200; (3) Gerald W. Lipke, \$300. It was decided to reject all bids.

The Park Board was appointed, being Thelma Brooker, Mary Garza, Susie Voss, Pearl Wilson, and Earlene Scott, with each holding a one year term.

Accounts payable were discussed and approved to be paid in the normal manner.

\$2.20 will vend one book of 22 Cent flag stamps

\$3.00 will vend one book of 22 Cent

flag stamps and 80 cents change \$5.00 will vend two books of 22 Cent flag stamps and 60 cents change.

The dollar bill changer has been replaced with a more reliable 25 cent dispenser. The new machines are state-of-the-art and have been proven practically trouble free. Please feel free to ask for assistance in using these new stamp vending machines.

## City Receives Tax Check

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$125.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax. Bullock said that the payments to date were down 5 percent as compared to payments made in the same period last year.

Santa Anna's tax check was for \$1,787.74, making the total payments to date \$4,613.91, down 13.64 percent from last year's comparable total to date payments of \$5,342.83.

Houston's check for \$30 million, brought 1987 payments to date to \$27.7 million, down 6 percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$14.5 million for a 1987 total of \$30.5 million, a 2 percent decrease.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.1 million brought the city's payments for 1987 to \$11.1 million, down 5 percent. Austin's check for \$5.4 million increased total payments this year to \$5 million, a 6 percent decrease from 1986.

Fort Worth received \$4.6 million, bringing payments to date for 1987 to \$6.7 million, down 9 percent. El Paso's payment of \$3.1 million brought this year's total to \$4.6 million, a 2 percent increase.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$57.3 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA check was for \$23.5

million, down from the \$24.9 million payment made last February. Dallas' DART received a \$21.7 million check, down from last year's \$23.2 million. Austin's Capital Metro received a payment of \$5.3 million, compared to \$5.7 million last year.

San Antonio's VIA received \$4.4 million, down from last February's figure of \$4.6 million. Fort Worth's MTA was sent a check for \$1.1 million, compared to a \$1.2 million payment in 1986. Corpus Christi's MTA received a check for \$1 million.

February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and reported to the Comptroller by January 25.

# Ambulance Firm Comes To Co.

The three funeral homes of Coleman have announced a major change to take place as of Thursday, February 12. The three funeral homes of Coleman, Stevens, Henderson and Walker, will discontinue ambulance service, but a new business will provide ambulance service. The new business, Coleman County Emergency Medical Service, will provide 24-hour emergency ambulance service and 24-hour transfer service.

It is stressed to citizens of the Santa Anna area that Henderson Funeral Home of Santa Anna will still provide ambulance service, as well as the Santa Anna Funeral Home.

Ed Freeman of Brownwood will be owner-operator of the Coleman County Emergency Medical Service. His firm will be located at the former Dr. Burke home, next door to the hospital at 311 West College Avenue. The telephone number there is 625-4283.

Freeman will bring to Coleman the latest in ambulance equipment and will have trained personnel on duty at all times. He has 11 years experience in ambulance service, the past five years with his ambulance service in Brownwood. The Freemans will be moving to Coleman this week. Mrs. Freeman is a Licensed Vocational Nurse and is due to become a Registered Nurse in May of this year. Freeman reports that he will have

five trained people other than himself on staff for the ambulance service operation in Coleman.

Donnie Henderson of Henderson Funeral Home of Santa Anna states that they will move their two ambulances that have been at home in Coleman to Santa Anna for use here. He will have trained people on staff for the ambulance service that they will provide for the Santa Anna area.

Jimmy Eisenhower of the Santa Anna Funeral Home states that they will continue with their ambulance service for the Santa Anna area and for Coleman County and will answer any call received.

She was also preceded in death by one son, one daughter and a brother.

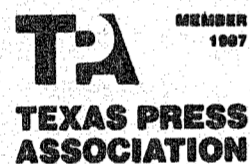

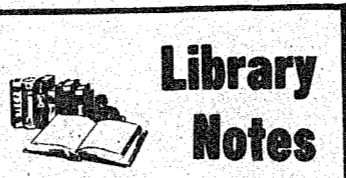

Thoughts From Our Pastors

Jesus Christ Our Lord

The Bible is God's revelation of himself and his divine will to man. All Scripture, both Old and New Testament, was given by inspiration of God, "and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness; that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works" II Timothy 3:16-17. See also II Peter 1:20-21. Many other passages might be listed on this point, but time and space will not permit and these suffice our purpose at this time.

Since all Scripture was given by inspiration of God, every thing written there is significant and has a meaning and purpose. This is especially true of names, titles, appellations and other terms used in the Bible with reference to people, places and things. Time and space permit the mention of only three of the appellations used in the Scriptures and applied to God's only begotten Son—Jesus, Christ, Lord.

1. JESUS: This was the name revealed to Joseph by an angel of God, which was to be given to the yet unborn son of the virgin Mary, who was espoused to Joseph; but before they actually "came together" Matt. 1:18-25. Now the meaning of the word or name JESUS is "Saviour." "And thou shalt call his name Jesus; for he shall save his people from their sins" (v. 21). John the Baptist introduced Jesus to his disciples as "the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." (Jn. 1:29). See also I John 4:14. Many times in the New Testament he is referred to as "Our Lord and Saviour." Cf. Titus 1:4.

2. CHRIST: This is the official title given to the often promised and long expected Saviour, denoting his kingly authority and his mediatorial position in God's plan of salvation for man. The term CHRIST simply means "One anointed", or "the anointed one." He is the one ordained and anointed of God to be, not only our Saviour, but our high priest and our king as well. Just as we cannot bypass Jesus as our Saviour and redeemer, neither can we bypass him as our high priest and mediator, also as our king and source of authority.

3. LORD: Our English word lord is derived from several different sources and has a wide variation of meaning; but for our present lesson we shall apply it to the exaltation of Jesus to a position of all power and authority—Matt. 28:18-20. Jesus came into the world as the sacrificial lamb, to die and shed his blood for the sin of the world. In order to accomplish this he had to lay his glory and divinity aside; which he willingly did. (See Phil. 2:5-11). Having accomplished this he was exalted to the position of King of kings and Lord of lords, seated at the right hand of God. (See Philippians 2:5-11; I Tim. 6:14-15; Heb. 1:1-5; Eph. 1:20-23 and Acts 2:22-42.)

Suppose a vendor from another community came to your door offering his goods for sale...goods that were available from a local business owner.

"I can save you 10 to 30 cents per pound," he would say to you.

"No you can't," I would say, at which time he might pull out an advertisement from a local merchant and compare their price to his.

"See, right her," the vendor would reply, "20 cents per pound cheaper."

"No, it's not," I would reply.

"Are you blind?" he might ask. "It's right here in black and white. I'm cheaper."

"No, you're not!"

"Yes, I am!"

"Look here," would be my reply. "You drive your truck into Santa Anna from another community. Right?"

"Right!"

"Do you pay any road use taxes to Santa Anna?"

"No."

"Do you pay any taxes at all to the City of Santa Anna or Santa Anna School District?"

"No, I live in another town."

"The sales tax you collect on what you sell from your truck...does it go to Santa Anna?"

"No, I don't live here."

"Are you a member of the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce, and do you donate to Santa Anna Little League Baseball, the Santa Anna High School Booster Club, the Santa Anna F.F.A., local civic group projects or pay tithes to local churches?"

"No, no, no, no, and no."

"How about the local Lion's Club which helps fund local boy scouts and campfire girl programs, and other local activities...do you support these with an annual contribution?"

"No."

"Do you buy anything at all in Santa Anna?"

"Not usually."

"If my cupboard is bare Monday morning, can I find you to buy something?"

"No, I'm only in town on Wednesday."

"If I'm sick and can't get out, will you bring it to me on Monday?"

"No, I'm only in town on Wednesday."

- 1/2 T. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 T. All Spice
- 2 T. butter
- 1 Cup milk
- 1 unbaked pie shell

combine all ingredients, mix well and pour into unbaked pie shell. Cook at 350 until mixture is set or knife comes out clean in center.

### Pecan Frosties

Rachel Phillips—1st Grand Champion

- 2 c. flour
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/2 t. soda
- 1 c. packed brown sugar
- 1 stick butter (1/2 c.)
- 1 egg
- 1 t. vanilla

Sift together flour, soda, and salt. Cream together brown sugar and butter. Add egg and vanilla, beat well. Gradually add dry ingredients, mixing well. Shape into 1 inch balls, set on greased cookie sheet about 2" apart.

Mix 1 cup finely chopped pecans, 1/2 cup brown sugar and 1/4 cup sour cream.

Press center of each cookie with thumb or small spoon and fill with pecan mixture. Bake at 350 for 12 to 14 minutes.

### Angel Flake Biscuits

Cheree Halmon—3rd

- 1 pkg. yeast
- 2 T. warm water
- 1 c. shortening
- 5 c. flour
- 3 t. baking powder
- 1 t. soda
- 4 T. sugar
- 1 t. salt
- 2 c. buttermilk

Mix dry ingredients and cut in shortening. Dissolve yeast in water and mix in buttermilk. Add dry ingredients. Pinch off pieces and shape into biscuits. Let rise 30 minutes. Bake at 450 until brown.

### Italian Cream Cake

Candi Daniel—2nd

- 2 c. sugar
- 1 stick oleo
- 1/2 c. Crisco
- 5 egg yolks
- 1 c. coconut
- 5 egg whites
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 c. buttermilk
- 1 t. butter flavor
- 2 c. flour
- 1 t. soda
- 1/2 t. salt

Cream sugar, oleo and Crisco. Add egg yolks one at a time.

Add flour, soda, salt, buttermilk, vanilla and butter flavor. Fold in beaten egg whites and coconut. Bake in 3 9" pans for 25 minutes for 25 minutes at 325.

### FROSTING

- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 1/2 stick oleo
- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 c. nuts

Cream together and frost in layers.

### Raisin Round

Candi Daniel—1st

- 2 pkg. yeast
- 3/4 c. warm water
- 2 2-3 c. warm water
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 3 T. shortening
- 2 c. raisins
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 4 T. cinnamon
- 1 T. salt
- 9 to 10 c. flour

Dissolve yeast in 3/4 cup warm water. Stir in 2 2-3 c. warm water, the sugar, salt, shortening and 5 cups flour; stir until mixed. Add remaining flour until dough can be handled. Turn out onto floured board and knead until smooth. Place dough in greased bowl, cover with towel and let rise until double, about 1 hour. Punch down and divide in half. Roll each half into rectangle; sprinkle with 1 Tablespoon water, add one cup raisins to each followed by 1/4 cup sugar and 2 Tablespoons cinnamon. Fold sides over, pinch ends. Wrap around in a circle. Bake at 425 for 30 minutes. Spread hot bread with soft margarine. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar mixture. Makes 2 loaves (rounds).

### Chocolate Peanut Butter Chewies

Cheree Halmon—3rd

- 12 oz. pkg. Chocolate chips
- 1 t. soda
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1 c. oleo
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 c. packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs

Melt chocolate chips. Combine flour, soda and salt. In another bowl combine butter and sugars. Add eggs and melted chocolate, add flour mixture, mix well, add peanut butter chips. Drop by teaspoons onto cookie sheet. Bake at 350, 8 to 10 minutes. Yield: 3 doz.

### Pecan Pie

Rachel Phillips, 2nd

- 1 cup white corn syrup
- 1 cup dark brown sugar
- 1-3 t. salt
- 1-3 cup melted butter
- 1 t. vanilla
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup pecans

Mix corn syrup, brown sugar, salt, butter, vanilla. Add slightly beaten eggs. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes.

### Chocolate-Mint Cookies

Jetta Rutherford—2nd

- 1 c. sugar
- 1 t. vanilla
- 2 sq. (1 oz. each) unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled
- 1/2 c. margarine, softened
- 1 egg
- 1 c. flour
- 1/2 t. salt
- Peppermint Frosting (below)
- 2 T. corn syrup
- 1 pkg. (6 oz) semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/4 c. margarine

Heat oven to 375. Mix sugar, margarine, vanilla, egg and unsweetened chocolate. Stir in flour and salt. Drop dough by round teaspoon onto ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten each cookie with greased bottom of glass dipped in sugar. Bake until set, about 8 minutes. Cool slightly.

### PEPPERMINT FROSTING

- 2 1/2 c. powdered sugar
- 3 T. milk
- 1/4 c. margarine, softened
- 1/2 t. peppermint extract

Mix all ingredients until smooth, spreading consistency.

Spread peppermint frosting over each cookie. Heat 1/4 c. margarine, corn syrup and chocolate chips, over low heat, stirring constantly until melted. Drizzle mixture over each cookie.

Makes about 3 dozen cookies at 155 calories each.

### Lemon Squares

Taffy Rutherford—4th

- 1 c. flour
- 1/4 c. powdered sugar
- 1 c. sugar
- 2 T. lemon juice
- 1/2 t. baking powder
- 1/2 c. margarine, softened
- 2 eggs
- 2 t. grated lemon peel, if desired
- 1/4 t. salt

Preheat oven to 350. Mix flour, margarine and powdered sugar. Press in ungreased square pan, 8"x8" or 9"x9", building up 1/2" edges. Bake 20 minutes.

Beat remaining ingredients until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Pour over hot crust. Bake until no indentation remains when touched lightly in center, about 25 minutes; cool. Cut into about 1 1/2" squares.

Makes about 25 squares--95 calories each.

### Molasses Ginger Drops

Carie Keeney—5th

- 3/4 c. Crisco
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/4 c. molasses
- 1 egg
- 2 c. flour
- 2 t. ginger
- 1 t. cinnamon
- 1/2 t. salt
- 2 t. soda

Cream Crisco, sugar, and egg. Mix in molasses. Blend remaining ingredients and add to first mixture. Form into small balls and roll in sugar. Place on ungreased cookie sheets, bake 8 to 10 minutes at 350.

### Whole Wheat Biscuits

Erica Pearce—3rd

- WHEAT MASTER MIX
- 4 c. flour
- 1/4 c. wheat germ
- 1/2 c. brown sugar
- 1 c. shortening
- 1 c. whole wheat flour
- 1/4 c. baking powder
- 1 1/2 t. salt

Mix dry ingredients. Cut in shortening until mixture is crumbly. WHOLE WHEAT BISCUITS

2 c. Whole Wheat Master Mix (above)

2-3 c. yogurt

Stir ingredients with a fork until dough follows fork around bowl. On floured pastry sheet, knead 10 to 12 times. Roll out 1/2" thick. Cut out and bake on cookie sheet at 450 for 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 10 to 12 biscuits.

### Friendship Cake

Ruth Garza—2nd

Begin from scratch: BASIC STARTER

In a large tightly covered jar put 1 cup maraschino cherries and 1 cup sugar. After two weeks add 1 cup drained pineapple chunks and 1 cup sugar.

After two more weeks add 1 cup drained peaches and 1 cup sugar.

After two more weeks add 1 cup drained apricot halves and 1 cup sugar.

Begin this process over again starting with cherries after two more weeks.

If you get a start from someone add the fruits and sugars as listed at 2 week intervals.

### RUTH'S RECIPE

1st Day—Begin with 1 1/2 cups starter juice and add 29 oz. sliced peaches and 2 1/2 cups sugar. Place in tightly covered gallon jar.

10 days later—add 2 1/2 cups sugar and 16 oz. crushed pineapple.

10 days later—add 16 oz. can of fruit cocktail and a 10 oz. jar of cherries plus 2 1/2 cups sugar.

At the end of 10 more days, fruit is ready to bake a cake. Using 1-3 of mix fruit (drained) mix into a box of Delux Yellow Cake Mix plus 1 8-oz. box of instant vanilla pudding mix. Add 3 eggs plus 1 1/2 cup chopped pecans and 1-3 cup of oil. Mix well and pour into a greased Bundt pan. Bake at 350 for 45 to 50 minutes.

### Mississippi Mud Cake

Lee Ann Musick—2nd

- 4 eggs, beaten well
- 2 c. sugar
- 1 1/2 c. flour
- 1 can coconut, 4 oz.
- 2 sticks margarine, melted
- 2 t. vanilla
- 2 T. cocoa
- 1 1/2 c. pecans, chopped

Mix well and place in a greased and floured 8"x13" pan. Bake 30 to 40 minutes at 350. When cake is done, spread 1 jar marshmallow cream on top while still hot. Cool cake before frosting.

### FROSTING

- 1 box powdered sugar
- 2 sticks melted margarine
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1/2 c. cocoa
- 1 c. pecans
- 1/4 to 1-3 c. canned milk

Mix all ingredients and frost cooled cake.

### Brazilian Orange Cake

- 5 eggs
- 2 c. flour
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1 c. orange juice
- 2 c. sugar
- 1/2 t. vanilla

combine egg yolks and orange juice. Mix flour, sugar and baking powder. Add to egg yolk mixture gradually. Beat for two minutes. Add vanilla, fold in beaten egg whites.

Pour into well-greased Bundt cake pan. Bake at 350 for 25 minutes.

## VA News

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

Q—My spouse and I are veterans of the armed forces and plan to use our GI Bill education benefits to attend school. May we claim each other as dependents?

A—Yes. Any veteran may claim his or her spouse as a dependent for education benefits, provided a certified copy of the marriage certificate appears in both VA files.

Q—I am a former prisoner of war, but have not been rated as service-connected disabled by the VA. Am I entitled to VA medical care?

A—Yes, a former POW who is not service-connected disabled is eligible for VA hospital and nursing home care without regard to ability to pay. You are also eligible for outpatient care on a priority basis second only to service-connected disabled veterans. While you are receiving treatment in an approved outpatient program you are eligible for needed medicine, glasses, hearing aids or prostheses. If your POW interment lasted 181 days or more, you are also eligible for all needed dental care.

Q—Must I make a downpayment when I buy a home using the Veteran's Administration's home loan guaranty program?

A—The VA seldom requires any downpayment in connection with a VA-guaranteed loan. One exception is when the veteran chooses a loan with graduated payments. The other is when the veteran pays more for a home than the amount the VA has determined to be its reasonable value. VA will not guarantee a loan larger than the reasonable value of the home. In that case the veteran must certify that the difference between the sale price and the reasonable value is being paid in cash without any borrowing.

Q—Are lenders required to notify the Veterans Administration if a veteran defaults on a VA-guaranteed loan?

A—Yes. Notice must be forwarded to VA within 45 days after an installment has been unpaid.

Q—What is the New G.I. Bill?

A—The New G.I. Bill, which went into effect July 1, 1985, established two education benefit programs, one for persons in the military service

A—As of January 19, 1987, the home loan rate is 8½ percent.

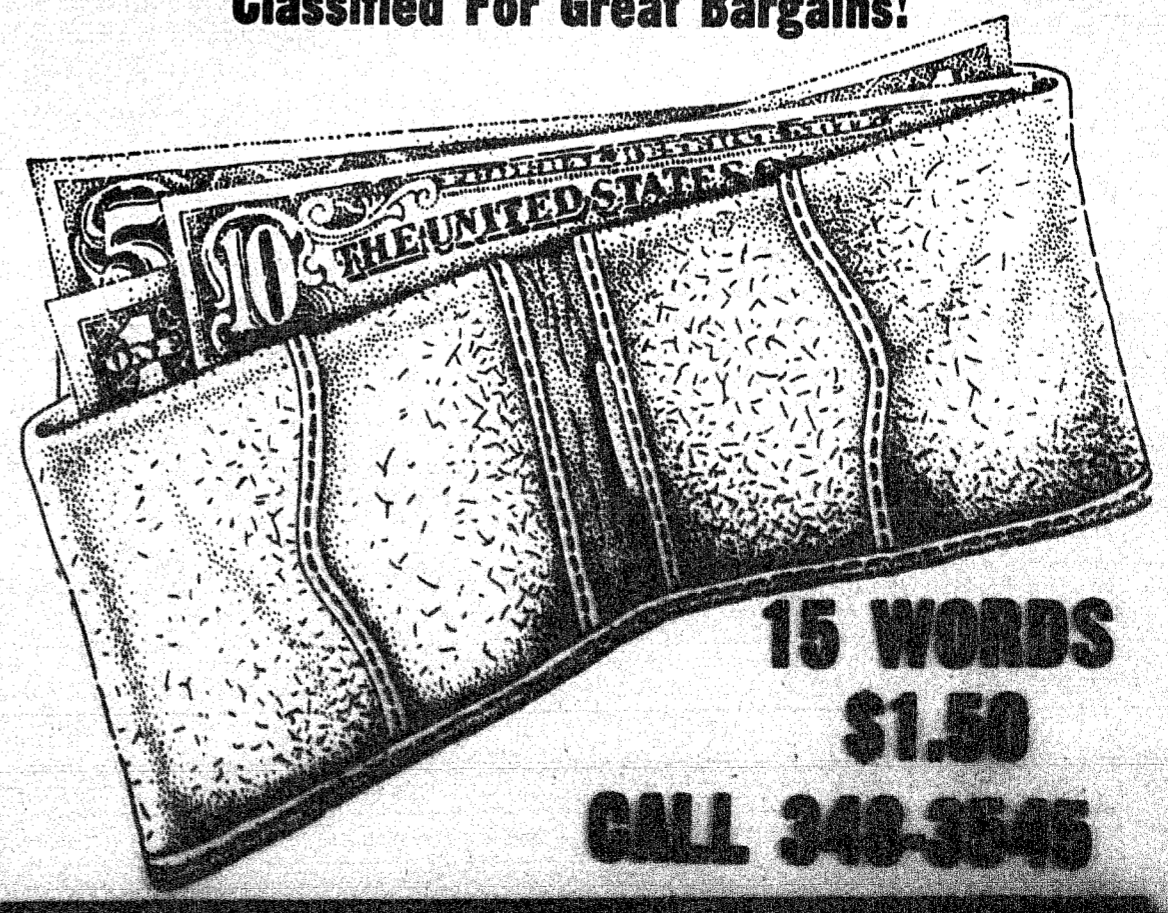

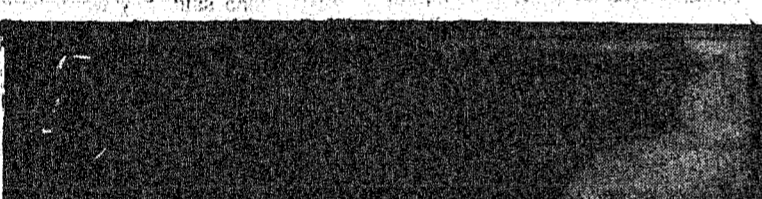
