## Mrs. J. S. Laughlin Of Trickham, Dies

Mrs. Olive Mabel Laughlin, 84, of Trickham, wife of the late J. S. Laughlin, died in a Brownwood hospital at 5.10 p. m. Monday, following an illness of 11 days.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3:30 p. m. in the Trickham Union Church with Milton Pogue, minister, officiating. Burial was in the Trickham Cemetery.

Mrs. Laughlin was born Dec. 13, 1869, in Bandera County. She moved from there to Trickham in Coleman County in 1897 and had lived there since then. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Surviving are three sons, Roy of Brooksmith, Gray and P. E. of Trickham; two daughters, Mrs. Carl Sheffield of Brooksmith and Mrs. Minnie Wilson, Trickham; a brother, Joe Clark of Trickham; a sister, Mrs. Minnie Gilbert of Dallas, four grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

## Lecture Topics At Prophecy Speaks For Next Week

Pastor Lyndon De Witt answered the question, "Where are the Dead?" Sunday afternoon and evening with many texts of scripture. Contrary to common theory, the speaker pointed out that when an individual dies, he neither goes to eternal bliss, or torment, but sleeps peacefully in the grave until the judgement and resurrection. The texts were read, telling of the utter unconsciousness of the dead that they know not anything, and they have no more a part in the affairs of men. Scriptures were read telling that there is no knowledge, thoughts, or wisdom in the grave, and that the dead praise not the Lord. David says they all go to one place, the speaker stated, and there await the resurrection. It was also brought out that the scripture stated that neither Paul or David had yet received their reward, but were dead and buried, and not ascended into the heavens.

Pastor De Witt appealed to all to accept Christ, as life is only assured by Him, and also pointed out that the wages of sin is death, and not life in some other world, or existence. It was brought out that this is the great basis of spiritualism, that the dead are still alive in some sphere, and in reality a propagation of first lie that was ever told, "Thou shalt not surely die."

Tuesday night Dr. Henner presented the topic, Dope Addiction, in the Health and Healing series. An interesting film was shown, and questions answered.

"The Sabbath Christ Made" was presented Wednesday night. The speaker pointed out that the Sabbath was made at the birthday of the world, and was a memorial of creation. It has not only been in existence in this world, but before this world was created. It was read from the Bible that many examples of Sabbath-keeping were recorded down to the time of Christ. However, Pastor De Witt pointed out that Christians today look for their example of Sabbath-keeping to Christ, whose pattern we are to follow. The speaker stated that the only day ever referred to as the Lord's Day in the Bible was the 7th day Sabbath. It was also brought out that God is particular in his requirements, and he says nothing that isn't worthwhile or important for us to obey. The speaker pointed out that the Sabbath was a sign of our relationship with God, and our willingness to follow Christ. It was also emphasized that the Sabbath is the only safeguard against evolution, since each Sabbath that is kept, tells the world that the keeper believes in the God who created heaven and earth. Hence, it is Satan's purpose to do away with this reminder of God who he hates. It was also read from the Bible that the only day the apostles ever kept was the Sabbath, 24 times mentioned in the New Testament.

## Welfare Center Makes Request For Clothing, Saturday

The Welfare Center, sponsored by Seventh-day Adventist, is slated to begin its clothing drive Saturday night, Pastor Lyndon DeWitt stated. The plans are to visit each home in the community to gather articles that might be used for those in need.

The Welfare Center stands for service, and is as great as local need. Throughout the world, welfare centers and depots are storing, preparing and releasing to the needy of the world, clothing, food and supplies. Recently, over 50,000 pounds of clothing were sent to war-torn Korea, along with several tons of food-stuff.

The local chapter, which is connected with centers over Texas, is located at 605½ Wallis Avenue, next door east of the Santa Anna News office. The center will be for stockpiling clothing and supplies for emergency, disaster, or needy people. Clothing not actually needed here in this vicinity will be prepared and processed and sent on to the state center, at Keene, Texas. Thus, clothing will be in readiness to aid any spot or disaster in the state within a very few hours. At the Waco tornado last year, tons of clothing thus stockpiled, were put into use within a few hours of the time the disaster struck. It was said by many that the Seventh-day Adventist welfare center was the most efficient in action at that time.

One outstanding example of Welfare work in the city of Waco at the time of the disaster was the building and furnishing of a \$12,000 home in one day and handing it over as a gift from the Welfare Centers of Texas, to a needy family that had lost everything as a result of the disaster.

The local Welfare Center would appreciate receiving anything in the line of clothing, food, old furniture that can be used in event a family burns out, bedding, dishes, etc. The Welfare workers of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, and the Santa Anna Community will call Saturday night, May 29, to receive anything that anyone is not using, and would like to donate, Pastor De Witt stated.

## West Texas Utilities Co. Ad Receives High National Award

Recognition of outstanding achievement in the field of utility advertising came to West Texas Utilities Company this week when it was named as winner of a first place national award in the 1954 Better Copy Contest sponsored by the Public Utilities Advertising Association.

The award was announced Friday afternoon at the annual convention of the Association in Boston, Mass.

### SECOND ACCIDENT

The accident involved a 1948 Plymouth driven by Mrs. Julian Whitley and a 1949 Oldsmobile driven by Melvin J. Mayes, (Colored) both of Santa Anna. Mrs. Whitley was apparently pulling out on the highway from the store and Mayes was driving south on the Rockwood Highway. Mayes attempted to go on the right side of the Whitley car and the left rear of his car struck the right rear of the Whitley car. This apparently caused the Mayes car to start skidding with the car facing east. The right side of the Mayes car hit a culver, and threw his car out into the road and turned it around to the west when it came to a stop.

Mayes was taken to the Santa Anna Hospital. He suffered deep facial and head cuts and bruises and other body bruises. No immediate charges were filed in this accident.

**CHICK CHATS—Pros, Cons On Laying Cages**

Use of individual laying cages for hen may boost poultry profits or may not be practical. It depends to a large extent in the kind of poultry operation you have.

The system is well adapted to the southern states and has been used extensively there. A study by the University of Illinois has brought out some of the advantages and disadvantages of the laying cage system.

With the cage system, there is

no guesswork in culling. Non-layers can be detected sooner than by most experienced poultrymen and hens are usually in a more marketable condition when culled. Culling does not disturb the rest of the flock.

**Cuts Cannibalism**

Cannibalism is virtually eliminated (there is no change for it to start) and blowouts (due largely to cannibalistic tendencies) are reduced when hens are kept in cages. By building cages two or three-decks high, it is possible to use floor space more efficiently.

Earth-born diseases such as roundworms and coccidiosis can be more easily controlled in sagged layers. However, common bacterial and virus infections still require vaccination and other recommended control measures. There is less "bossism" and competition among birds for feed and water.

Chief among the disadvantages of the laying cage system is the cost of equipment and housing. It is estimated that costs average about \$1 more per hen. Ventilation and insulation of the house are very important since hens in individual cages are more susceptible to extreme cold and extreme heat than are hens in floor pens.

**Labor Costs**

Most studies show that labor costs are higher for caged layers. Surprisingly, the dirty egg problem is often more serious in laying cages. Dust from feed settles on the wire floor and collects on the freshly laid moist egg as it rolls to the front of the cage.

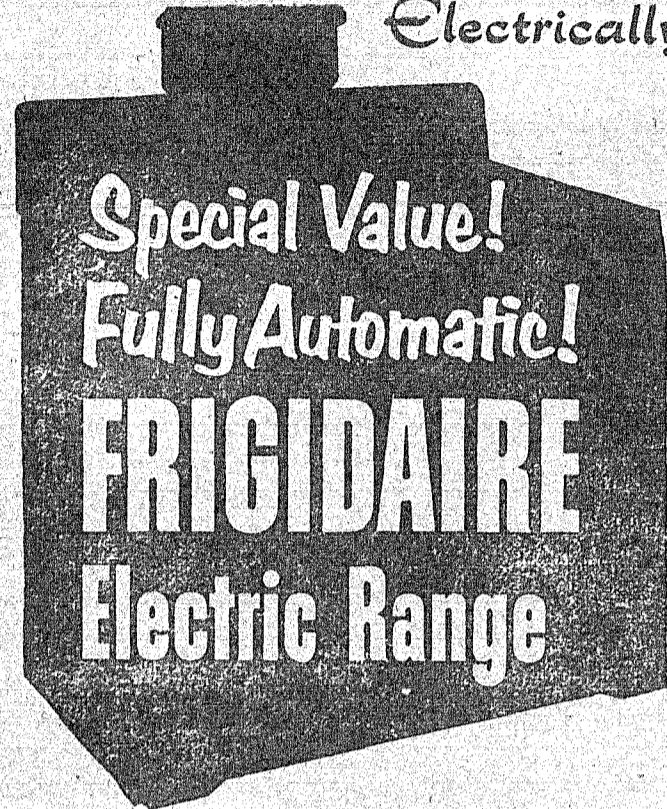
Laying cages are adapted to the all-mesh system of feeding making it difficult to utilize home-grown grains. Cage equipment is expensive and should be used at near capacity at all times for maximum efficiency. This

may require more than one replacement flock annually which may mean out-of-season brooding.

The fly problem is greater with this cage system and must be controlled to prevent spread of tapeworms and human diseases.

*A Time to Remember*

I bowed my head reverently with the rest of my classmates during the "moment of silence" in tribute to our soldier-dead, then seeing Old Glory waving from the flag pole on the lawn of our Alma Mater. I stood uptoe upon a dream and thought, "What a lucky girl you are to be born under that flag, for you can be what you will to be! You are an American."

Then a strange thing happened. The flag seemed to be a living thing with a soul. I heard the silent singing of its stars on its blue of truth, and listening, my soul caught this refrain:

"I am the symbol of America, and America is more than its hills and prairies with their herds and fields of grain; more than its pulsing cities, its mines and its mills . . . America is you and you and you . . . and God.

"I am the symbol of the homes, the churches, schools, enterprises, and the kingly commoners of America.

"I represent your heritage from the past. Look at me and hear the tramping of soldier-feet in the immortal march for freedom; feel within your hearts the 'Spirit of '76'; see the footprints in the snow at Valley Forge; the great, gaunt commoner on his knees in prayer, and the crimson stain, spreading, that meant life was ebbing from his great heart; see the crosses above our youth, martyrs to freedom in recent wars. Look again and behold lilies blooming where men gave life for man; listen and hear the joyous dancing footsteps of those yet unborn.

"Behold the Open Gate, before which stand weary pilgrims: children with eyes empty of laughter; youth burdened with the weight of dead dreams; the elder ones their eyes but burned out embers, their bone-lean hands caressing gaunt throats that too long have felt the choking leash of fear. See their eyes relight with hope as they view the green acres of democracy and reverently enter the gate of America."

Suddenly I knew: The flag is an emblem of freedom, protection, justice, honor, sacrifice, opportunity to all and love for country, fellowman and God. It is the symbol, not only of our heritage from the past but of the future. I knew that it is up to me to help America continue to mean to coming generations what it means to me today; that every right has its concomitant duty, that I must train myself to be able to choose leaders wisely and judge their performance with honesty and understanding. I must fight oppression, intolerance, injustice and keep the land free of the footprints of communism. I must guard the rights of others as jealously as I do my own, and recognize in every man a brother.

Again I looked at the flag waving serenely beneath our peaceful country sky and reverently I breathed, "How much you stand for!" Was I dreaming or did I hear, "The earth a great DEMOCRACY OF LOVE!"

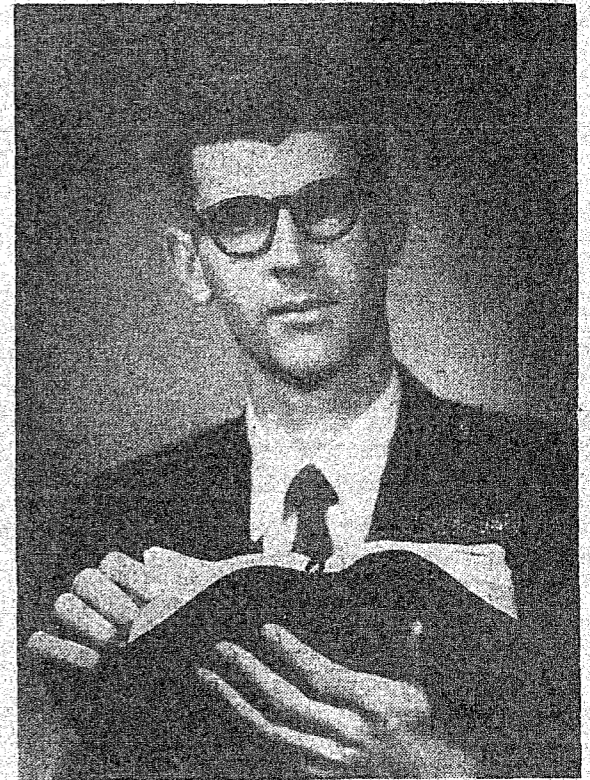

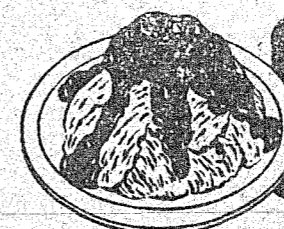

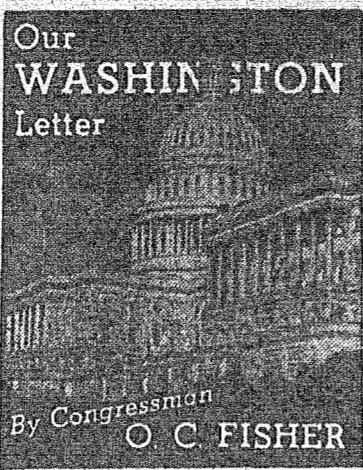

Like a death in a family which everyone knows is going to happen but no one is quite prepared for, the Supreme Court knocked out segregation in public schools in a historic decision last week.

In reversing a half dozen prior decisions of that court on the subject, the Court held for the first time in judicial history the "separate but equal" doctrine no longer obtains. The courts in the past, going back to 1896, have uniformly held that equal treatment is accorded a student when the races are accorded substantially equal facilities even though these facilities be separate. Such eminent jurists as the late Oliver Wendell Holmes and Charles Evans Hughes upheld that doctrine.

In this throwing overboard prior uniform decision on the subject, the question of further encroachment by the judicial upon the legislative prerogatives is raised, and the question, based upon "psychological" reasons, raises the inevitable question of further encroachment upon States' rights in dealing with matters pertaining to education. But the Supreme Court, the Court of last resort, has spoken, and we must now operate under what the law is and not what we may think it should be. In some Southern States public schools will be discontinued and replaced by private schools. Perhaps more generally, made easier by segregated areas of population, there will be "segregation by choice" as a practical solution.

Returned questionnaires from our district have been tabulated. Many thousands of returns give a fairly accurate barometer of public opinion on a dozen current issues before Congress and the American people. Every return has been read and all comments have been carefully considered. I wish to express my appreciation for the generous cooperation that has been accorded in this undertaking. Copies of the results are being sent to each person who returned the questionnaire and to any others who requests them.

President Eisenhower continues to command widespread confidence in our area. On the question of "Do you think that, in general, President Eisenhower is doing a good job?" 83 percent answered "Yes" and 9 percent said "No".

Sixty-three percent favor flexible as opposed to rigid 90 percent support for farm commodities, while 23 percent favor the 90-percent level. Fourteen percent either favored no supports at all or had no opinion on the subject.

**Destroy Bagworms Now Before Your Plants Are Ruined**

College Station — A cone-shaped bag hanging from your plants is the cue to destroy the bagworm — now before they ruin your plants.

Bagworms are usually found on arbovitae and cedar-like plants, but some species munch on althet, elms, roses and oaks.

At this time, a spray or dusting will kill the bagworms. Later when they are grown, the pests must be removed by hand and burned.

Two sprays of 10 percent chlordane, applied a week apart, will kill the bagworms, says Saddle Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist, for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Another effective killer is a spray of 3 tablespoons of lead arsenate to one gallon of water. Texaphene may also be applied as a spray.

Dustings of 10 percent chlordane or 10 percent texophene are good.

**380 Predicted To Die Over Weekend**

New York — Excessive speed and alcohol will be responsible for 210 of the predicted 380 highway accident deaths in the country during the three-day Memorial Day weekend starting tomorrow night, according to the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies.

The Association's figures, released today, indicate that 126 persons will die in speeding accidents and 84 more, both motorists and pedestrians, will die because of excessive use of alcohol.

Other main causes contributing to the 380-victim total are expected to include: failure to keep to the right of the centerline, 38 victims; failure to observe the right of way, 27 victims, and over-fatigue or sleeping at the wheel, 24 victims.

Accidents caused by miscellaneous factors will kill the final 81 of the predicted total. The predictions are based on "a conservative expansion of the accident rates of three-day Memorial Day holidays in the past," according to the Association's Accident Prevention Department.

**Endrin — Best-Yet Cotton Insecticide**

College Station — Endrin, a newcomer to the insecticide world, this year takes the cotton insecticide spotlight. Entomologists report that it comes as close to an all-purpose cotton insect control as anything yet tested.

A close relative to dieldrin, endrin is now widely used to control bollworms, boll weevils, thrips, cotton leafworms, cotton fleahoppers and lygus bugs.

Andrin appears for the first time this year in the official Texas Cotton Insect Control Recommendations. U. S. Department of Agriculture researchers have tried it under a wide variation of growing conditions in Texas, Louisiana, South Carolina and Mexico.

In Texas, endrin is recommended for boll weevil and cotton leafworm control at rates of one-fourth to one-third of a pound to the acre. Bollworm treatments call for application of one-third of a pound per acre. This welcome newcomer, how-

ever, does not control pink bollworms, aphids and spider mites. And like other insecticides, specialists caution users of endrin to adhere closely to the directions of the manufacturer. It is toxic not only to cotton pests, but also to man and warm-blooded animals.

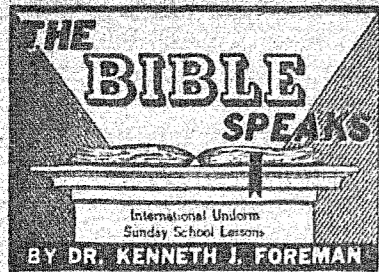

**Foxhole Religion**  
A man who has been more or less independent all his life, not feeling any special need of God, will wake up to his need of something more than he has, when he finally gets into some trouble, some situation where he can't figure out the answers and where he knows he is not equal to the demands the circumstances make on him. We have seen in our time a President who has hardly taken office before he is baptized and joins a Christian church. Is this a sudden conversion? Probably not. Brought up in a devout Christian home, this man has always been aware of religion, he never denied God. But now, with a burden of responsibility and leadership which he never had before, he becomes not merely aware but acutely aware that by himself, even with all the human help he can get, by himself he is not enough. It has been said that there are no atheists in foxholes; and fox-hole religion has been low-rated as the religion of the scared-to-death. Nevertheless many a man whose religion began in a fox-hole did not

end there.  
**A Dark Doorway to God**  
The Bible stories for this week describe several of the darker doorways to God. This is not quite the right way to put it, for God is not like a closed room. Rather, we are in closed rooms of our own, and the doors of our cells open out to the ever-present sunshine of God. Some of the doorways of life are somber enough, yet it is, through some of the most forbidding of these that men and women have come through to a living faith in the true God. For example, the story of the woman of Shunem who had everything she wanted except a child. It was in her longing for a child of her own that her faith came to a burning-point. Then when the child was born and grew into boyhood and lay at the gate of death, again her faith blazed up. She did not usually seek the prophet Elisha except on stated days (she is not alone in this), but this time she went on the day of her distress. It was so with the king of Israel. His eyes were adjusted to the ordinary lights of this world; but on one memorable occasion God let him see the army of light surrounding his prophet.

**Resources of the Spirit**  
Why is it that some people can endure what crushes others? To say it is faith that upholds the weak, is only part of the truth. The hymn says, "How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in His excellent Word!" The foundation is not faith; faith rests on the foundation, namely God and his promises. Faith alone is a poor support. It is God who is the true upholder of the weak. How shall the unseeing have their eyes opened? How shall those who never feel the nearness of God come to know him as ever present, our hope and our help? It is today as it was in the far-off days of Elisha; those who know God must make him known to others. If it had not been for Elisha, comfort and faith might never have come to the woman of Shunem. If it had not been for Elisha's prayer, the eyes of the young frightened king might never have been opened and he would have collapsed in panic. Faith, if you have it, is not something to be kept to yourself. It is something to share. Faith, if you do not have it, is something you may be helped to acquire, all the better, if you make friends with one who has faith.

able possessions of a person which are not so attached to the soil as to become real estate. Stocks, bonds, notes, livestock and household furnishings which are not firmly attached or made a part of the house itself, come within the ordinary meaning of the term.

**COMMUNITY PROPERTY.** In Texas community property includes all property acquired by husband or wife after their marriage, except such items as may be obtained by one of the parties through gift or inheritance.

**SEPARATE PROPERTY.** This phrase covers property owned by either husband or wife before their marriage, and such real or personal property as either may acquire after marriage by gift or inheritance.

**TRUST.** A trust occurs where one person holds the legal title of real or personal property for the benefit of another person. For example, a husband may direct in his will that after his death certain property shall be held and managed by some corporation or individual, with income going to his widow. In such a case the person holding legal title and control of the property is known as a trustee.

Another type of trust is sometimes called a 'spendthrift trust'. This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

This type of trust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual, but feels that the individual is not capable of properly caring for the money and that if left to them in full that the party receiving the money will spend and waste the money and not receive the maximum benefit from it.

There are certain technicalities in setting up such an arrangement, but in a proper case they will preserve to the beneficiary a definite income, and see that the principal estate left to the beneficiary is not wasted.

**EMERGENCY FUNDS AVAILABLE**

The emergency wind erosion control for Texas has been given the green light by the federal government.

Texas, still plagued by the effects of a record drought, was apportioned an initial \$2,322,000 as its share of the total fifteen million allotted for five states. Other states receiving this type of relief are Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

This first allocation was established in order to permit immediate action in controlling wind erosion in 75 counties of the state. Most of these are in West Texas and the Panhandle areas. Further allocations have been promised as they are needed.

The funds are earmarked for use to supplement work already being carried out under the Agricultural Conservation Program. The cost of emergency control measures will be shared with individual farmers and ranchers. Through a combination of emergency and ACP funds, the farmer should be spared from very much "out of pocket" costs to himself. State and local committees have been authorized to increase the share to farmers in

**unusual emergency or hardship conditions.**

The funds will apply in designated counties for such emergency tillage operations as deep plowing to bring clods up to the surface, contour listing and contour and cross-slope chiseling, and pit cultivation. Cost-sharing will also be available for emergency seedings of sweet sorghum, millet, and other locally adopted crops which provide a protective cover as soon as there is sufficient moisture.

The leveling of sand dunes of hummocks to prepare the land for seeding is also included as another emergency practice.

**LEGAL TERMS HAVE EXACT MEANINGS**

The average person seldom needs to exercise any great degree of caution in selecting the words and phrases which he uses to communicate his ideas to others. We usually give voice to the first appropriate words which come to mind, and then make use of additional explanation to clarify our expressions if necessary.

In legal documents, however, words must have exact meanings

in order that they may be uniformly interpreted by the courts. Lawyers naturally become accustomed to this situation, and frequently use terms which have a definite meaning to them, but which do not always convey the same meaning to laymen.

Below are explanations of several terms commonly used by attorneys. Exact definition has not been attempted, as this would take too much space and would involve the use of other terms having a legal meaning which might not be entirely clear. However, you will find below a general idea of the meanings involved. See how these correspond with your own definitions.

**REAL PROPERTY.** Real property consists of land and includes generally buildings, fences and other improvements erected upon or attached thereto. Also generally included within the term are trees and crops growing upon the soil.

**PERSONAL PROPERTY.** This term ordinarily includes mov-

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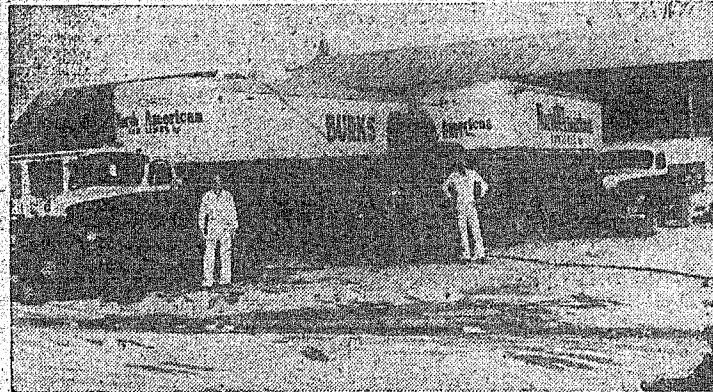
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If the stain is treated before it dries, the chances of removing it are increased. To remove ice cream stains, use cold water immediately and then wash in warm soap suds.

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# State Capital NEWS

**Austin** — Texas' fast-flying governor returned from a vacation in Alabama, spent a few days in the state, and planned off the Korea, where he and other state executives will make an inspection tour as the invitation of President Eisenhower.

While in the capital, Governor Shivers was busy doing these things:

Answering charges of disloyalty to the Democratic Party by saying that when he supported Mr. Eisenhower for president in 1952 he was really fighting to preserve the principles of the party of Jefferson and Jackson because he wants the Texas party and the national party to return to those principles in unity.

Announcing that the campaign manager in his race for reelection will be State Senator Otis Lock of Lufkin, and that campaign headquarters in Austin would be opened right away.

Answering Stephen A. Mitchell, Democratic National chairman, who said that he would deal with the Texas Democratic Advisory Council, rather than the state democratic executive committee. Shivers told Mitchell: "I strongly suspect that your statement is an announcement of your entry into the Texas governor's race. I welcome that challenge."

Saying that Texas and other states would need years to work out compliance with the non-segregation rule.

Promising that as long as he is governor, there will be no state sales tax or income tax.

Naming Weldon Hart, chairman of the Texas Employment Commission, as chairman of the newly-created Governor's Economic Advisory Commission.

Announcing that John VanCronkhite, his former aide under attack in an insurance court case, is not in his present reelection campaign.

**LLOYD'S CLOSED**

After a nine-day hearing in 98th District Court here, Judge Charles O. Betts granted a temporary injunction, asked by the attorney general's department, forbidding the Lloyd's of North American Insurance Co. from doing business in Texas.

At one time, VanCronkhite was employed as public relations counsel for the company, he testified during the hearing.

**INSURANCE MUDDLE**

There was comment from several sources on the insurance situation.

Garland A. Smith, chairman of the state insurance commission, pledged the greatest possible protection to holders of policies issued by companies doing business in Texas.

Smith emphasized that state insurance laws are sound, fundamentally, but that some changes are necessary. He said some new laws will have to be passed, and that they probably will be, at the next session of the Legislature.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd said he would appear

before an El Paso County grand jury June 4 with evidence of possible criminal violations of Texas insurance laws.

At El Paso and other Texas cities, Shepperd has filed suits against insurance companies, forcing them into receivership. Charges have been that the companies were created through fraud and were insolvent.

**FINANCIAL REPORTS**

Attorney General Shepperd advocates a law requiring publication of all financial reports on all government levels.

Shepperd also opposed secret sessions of governmental bodies, saying, "There is no place on an open door for a sign saying closed meeting or executive session."

What has happened in Duval County, Shepperd declared, "can happen anywhere, and will, unless the lesson is told and retold."

**TV IN EDUCATION**

J. W. Edgar, state commissioner of education, has appointed a 56-member group, authorized by the Legislature, to study the role of television in education. S. Mortimer Brown, El Paso school superintendent, is chairman of the body.

**ALLOWABLES UP**

Texas oil allowables for June will be 3,010,515 barrels, the Railroad Commission decided. That is an increase from the May figure.

**RESORT LODGES**

Progress was being made in plans to construct four resort lodges, each to cost about \$1 million, at Inks Lake near Burnet, Eisenhower Park on Texoma, Lake Whitney, and Texarkana Reservoir in Cass County.

This is a project of the State Parks Board. The money for building the lodges would come from revenue bonds. Private operators would lease the lodges and run them.

**WETS AND DRIES**

Texas Rangers are investigating trouble between the wets and dries at Bandera.

Rev. Joe R. Townsend, Baptist minister in that West Texas resort and ranch town, moved for a dry election after saying that he had been thrown through a plate glass window.

**REFUNDS COMING**

Employers of Texas are going to get refunds amounting to several million dollars from the Texas Employment Commission.

A decision of the Supreme Court in a case concerning Todd Shipyard Corporation is responsible for the refunds. Todd maintained that its unemployment tax rate was too high and would have been lower if the corporation had been notified by TEC of all claims made by former Todd workers.

**IN AND OUT**

About as many Texans went into the armed services as came out in April, says Brigadier Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state selective service director.

**RESERVES TO MEET**

Texas Department of the Reserve Officers Association will hold an annual convention and service conference here May 28-29, when high ranking officers of all branches of the services from Washington will attend, along with an expected 200 state reserve officers.

**NEW BUILDINGS**

Dedicated here was a new South Texas district headquarters building for the Internal Revenue Department.

Present for the ceremony was T. Coleman Andrews, commissioner of Internal Revenue.

Most of the five-story building will be occupied by the Austin district of the internal revenue department.

**MORE VEGETABLES**

There will be a 20 percent increase in acreage planted to commercial vegetables in Texas this year, according to a forecast of the Crop Reporting Board of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

**PANTHER WARNINGS ISSUED**

Sheriff T. O. Lang of Austin has issued frequent warnings to Capitol City residents that a panther large enough to leave a print like a man is roaming the rugged Bee Cave area west of the city.

One housewife in the hill section reported hearing two panthers screaming, one on each side of her home, about a mile west of the Bee Cave road. Several citizens in the area report seeing the animal.

**BURGLAR TRAP**

Austin police will be able to get the jump on burglars here, very soon now, thanks to a new piece of equipment devised by a local detective agency.

The secret is a quiet alarm that tips off the police via a panel in the Police and Courts Building. It replaces the jangling alarm bell so often found inside of buildings. The new silent alarm has no bells, switches or wires that are visible.

L. G. Phares, organizer and first director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, invented the new device. He has operated his own detective agency here since 1941.

**SHIVERS NAMES ADVISORS**

Dr. Henry Holle, state health officer, and Earl Cabell of Dallas, president of the Texas Manufacturing Association, have been added to the Governor's Advisory Commission, a recently appointed commission composed of some 25 members.

John M. Griffith, Taylor banker and president of the Texas Bankers Association, has been appointed to replace T. Neill Greer, past president.

Herschel E. Nix, San Antonio, replaces E. L. Powell, president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, on the same committee.
