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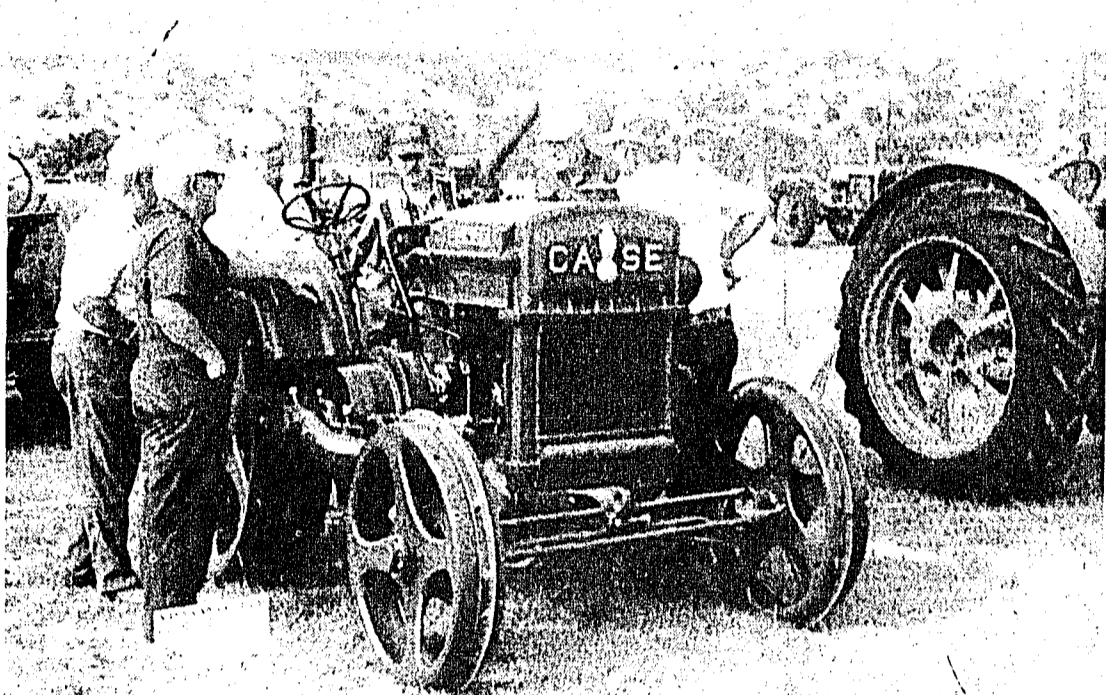

JoAnn Hale Wins Clerk Post, Ragsdale Will Face Rankin For County Judge

Coleman County Democrats nominated Sherrill Ragsdale as their candidate for County Judge in Tuesday's runoff election. Although

only 20 votes separated them in the March Primary, Ragsdale was able to outpoll Baker Rudolph 969 to 882 in the runoff. Ragsdale will

face Republican Kay Taylor Rankin in the fall general election for an opportunity to replace retiring County Judge Pete Skelton.

In the other runoff race in the county, JoAnn Hale pulled out a win over Ralph Terry for the County Clerk spot, despite having come in second to him in the primary.

Hale, who has been a deputy clerk for the past seven years, received 1,042 votes while Terry got 834. There is no Republican challenger for the post.

Coleman County voters followed the statewide trend in favoring Richard Fisher over Jim Mattox for the U.S. Senate seat nomination and a chance to try to unseat Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison in the fall. The Coleman County vote was 1,156 for Fisher and 625 for Mattox.

For Supreme Court candidates, Raul Gonzales received 916 votes in Coleman County while Rene Hass had 812. Gonzales was also favored by the voters statewide in a close fought battle.

In Coleman County Gene Kelly barely outpolls Betty Marshall for

Special music will be featured at each service. Don and Betty Roath of Cross Plains are music ministers for the revival.

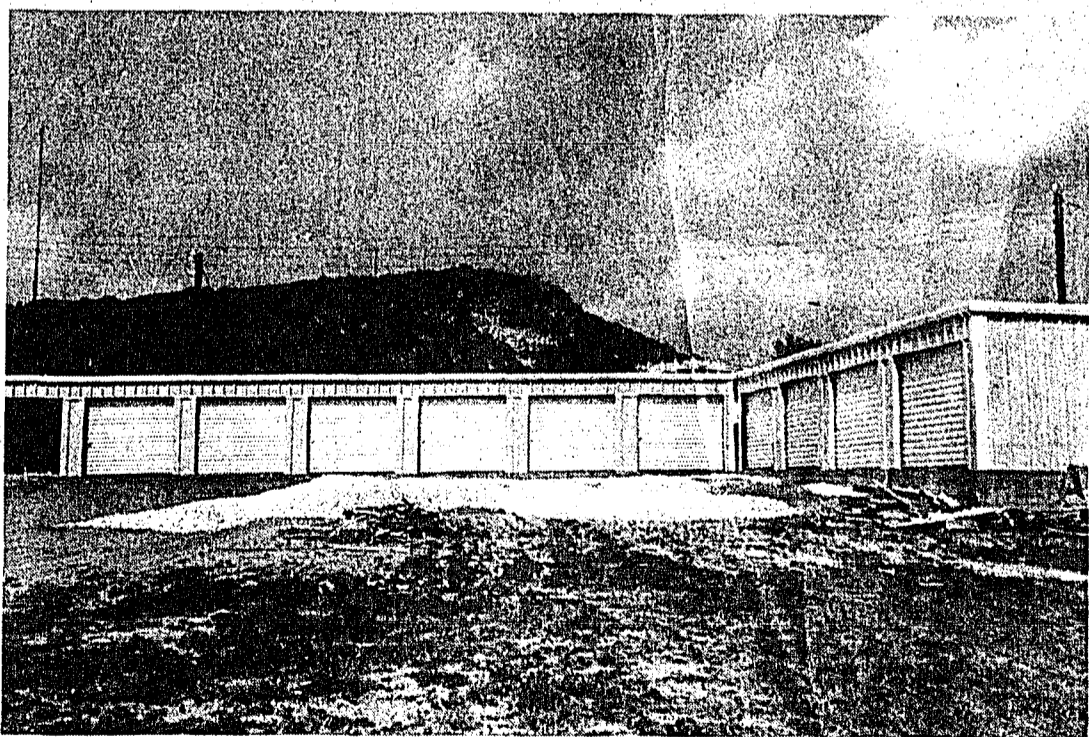

Jill Hosch, a senior at Tullia High School recently received notice that she has been selected as a President's Endowed Scholar.

The President's Endowed Scholarship is the most prestigious academic and leadership award given by the university.

The scholarship selection committee also nominated Hosch to the Terry Foundation of Houston that will consider her for a further award.

The total awards available as a result of this selection exceed \$21,000. Opportunities for study abroad and other non-monetary benefits are also available. Recipients must have a 1250 SAT or 30 ACT and be in the top 10% of their class.

The daughter of Pascal and Joyce Hosch of Tullia has also been invited to participate in the Honors Program at Texas A&M University. The Honors Program brings together small numbers of outstanding students with leading professors in an atmosphere especially conducive to advanced learning. Participants also receive special academic and career counseling, special leadership opportunities, contacts with graduate schools and a chance to undertake Honors independent research.

She will begin her studies in the College of Engineering at Texas A&M University with a major in Computer Science. This will be blended with the department of Business Analysis to enable Jill to pursue a specialty in Management Information Systems. MIS is a relatively new degree program that evolved as a result of the need of individuals to design and build systems to keep up with the rapid growth of computer technology.

In recent U.L.L. participation, Jill placed first in chemistry and second overall in science. In addition, she placed second individually in both calculator applications and mathematics, was third in number sense and was a member of the winning mathematics, number sense and science teams.

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Library Notes
Check It Out

This last week was a landmark for the library. Some of the most valuable materials came to this city. It will take time to organize and store these but feel free to come in for a preview. Every item could not be replaced. Many are extremely fragile and can hardly be handled.

M. L. Guthrie, Jr. has helped secure the materials from Nancy Holt Hughes-Mr. Roy D. Holt's library. Earlier we listed some of the materials but M. L. was still looking at others. There is a box of annuals 1906 and 1923 and pictures from Liberty and Santa Anna. These were identified by Mr. Roy and will be an excellent source for the community. Three additional books are *A Century of Cow Business* Mary Whatley Clarke; *Texian Stomping Grounds* J. Frank Dobie, Boatright and Ransom; and *The American Cowboy* Joe B. Frantz and J. Choate, Jr. If you want to know the facts about early Texas ranches, cattle and cowboys. These probably can answer the questions.

Mr. and Mrs. Gary Fleeman have spent many hours and days organizing materials left by the late Mrs. Ione Caton. Ione began these scrapbooks the year she married in 1919 and continued until her death. Everyone who has had a chance to see these is impressed. Where else can you find birth announcements, funeral notices, private and community entertainment and how these have changed in about 70 years! In the last years of Ione's life we sometimes talked as she worked. She wondered if anyone would ever be interested in these memories. She could never realize what a wonderful record she had made. In 25 more years there will be few alive who remember and few records will be around.

One other valuable record came in. It is a collection of news stories about those who were in World War II from this area. As you know it has been our plan (dream) to build an honor area for veterans of all wars. How grateful we are for these records that are no longer available.

The library must now take steps to protect these records. We must purchase acid free folders and boxes and consult with those trained in protecting such wonderful records. These friends have placed the records in our care. They trust that we and future generations will appreciate and protect it.

Back to the present. Mr. Fred Strange donated 9 paperbacks from the story of Marilyn Monroe to *Fine Things* by Danielle Steel. Thanks.

The library received a third edition of a paper called *Searches*. This is a private, free service for finding people. There are sections for reunions, individuals, military, heirs and beneficiaries, adoptees and birth parents, as well as genealogy. The paper goes to all libraries in the United States so would have excellent distribution. You may get further information at the library. We have no information other than the bulletin, but will look into this if you wish to use the service.

Read a good book soon. It will give you pleasure for a long time after you return it to the library shelves.

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County Receives 9-1-1 Addressing Funds

COLEMAN — When Coleman county commissioners met Monday morning, they had good news from Sue Smith, 9-1-1 coordinator with the West Central Texas Council of Governments.

In a March 29 letter addressed to the court, Smith said a check for \$5,000 has been sent as reimbursement for expenses submitted to the Texas Department of Transportation under the local EMS project grant program for rural addressing.

In other business, the commissioners approved the quarterly

report which showed cash on hand as of March 31, 1994, to be \$328,559.

Billy Don McCrary with Precinct 2 reported needing two motor graders and said that which his trade-ins he would still owe approximately \$26,000. Advertisement for bids will begin immediately and plans are to approach the local depository bank for funding of the equipment.

Bills totaling \$23,715 were approved.

Reporting bills individually, Shirley Sansing, county auditor,

reported road and bridge bills totaling \$427; Precinct 1, \$2,847; Precinct 2, \$3,469; Precinct 3, \$2,389; and Precinct 4, \$13,251.

Ralph Terry with the Historical Commission of Coleman reported that since the Historical Society group was under the county that there was a total of \$2,966 in the account. He requested commissioners grant the expenditure of \$634 from the account to cover expenses for four individuals to attend the Historical Commission convention to be held in San Angelo April 28-30. The court granted the request.

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District Court Handles Numerous Cases

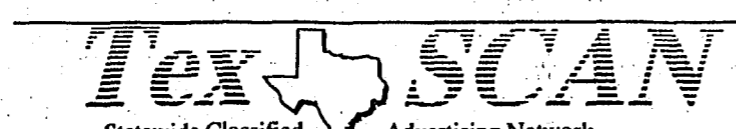

He will also be required, as a condition of his probation, to serve not less than 160 hours of community service under the supervision of the Adult Probation Office of Coleman County. He will also be required to report to a substance abuse felony punishment facility, to remain until discharged by the Court. Cause No. 638 was dismissed as a part of this plea bargain. He was

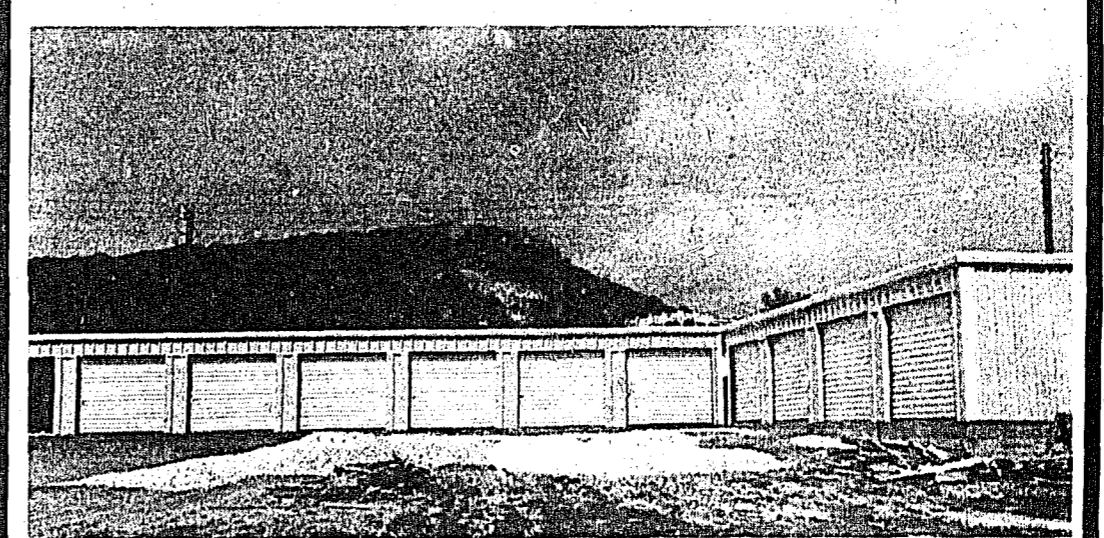
