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

# Decline In Local Sales Tax Rebate

AUSTIN-"Texas consumers are remaining cautious with their pocketbooks," State Comptroller John Sharp said last week, as he delivered a total of \$138.1 million in January sales tax rebates to 1,072 cities and 115 counties.

Mrs. Lee says it is suspected Sheron was murdered in the office of a mini storage unit which she managed and her body dragged into the living room of the couple's living quarters which are connected to the office of the business.

According to Mrs. Lee, although Mrs. Van Huss had apparently already made her deposit for the day it is believed robbery was the motive of her assailant.

The Santa Anna City Council met for its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, January 9 with all members present. Others attending the meeting were Paul Newton with BNSF, formerly Santa Fe Railway, Chief of Police Carlos Torres, Acting Superintendent Rusty Wells, and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

Councilman Spillman gave the invocation. Minutes were approved as presented.

Mr. Newton explained he would be presenting an "Operation Lifesaver" program in Santa Anna on February 29th. One program on railroad safety has been scheduled to be presented at the school and an evening program for the general public. Mr. Newton asked Mayor Kellar if February 29th could be declared as Operation Lifesaver Day in Santa Anna. AUSTIN — After spending \$1.5 billion to increase prison capacity from 48,000 inmates to 146,000 over the last five years, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice is now launching a first-ever project to pin down what works and what doesn't work in reducing

recidivism. Soon after he took office Jan. 1, TDCJ's new executive director Wayne Scott promoted division director Dimitria Pope to a new position as his executive assistant with a high priority mission of designing a statistical analysis program to track ex-offenders to discern which prison rehabilitation

# **PUBLIC NOTICE Customer Notice of New Optional Services**

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. (CCTC) has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) seeking approval to implement rates, terms and conditions for new Optional Caller ID Service offerings, including Caller Number Delivery Service and Anonymous Call Rejection. This request has been assigned Tariff Control Number 15146. Caller ID Service will be offered in connection with residence and business one-party service where available. This service is not provided in connection with Public, Semi-Public and Private Pay Telephone Services, and trunk side PBX Service.

Both of the proposed features are optional. Calling Number Delivery Service is a service which allows subscribers to see the phone number of most local calls and some types of long distance calls on a display unit, before they answer the phone. The display unit must be provided separately by the subscriber. Anonymous Call Rejection is a service which permits subscribers to automatically reject calls from callers who have blocked the delivery of their number.

In connection with the provision of Caller ID Services, CCTC will also offer per-call and per-line blocking to callers, free of charge. "Blocking" prevents the caller's number from appearing on the Caller ID display unit. Per-call and per-line blocking will be available when the service is deployed. CCTC will automatically establish per-call blocking free of charge to all customers when Caller ID is offered in their area. Any customer who wishes to block his or her number on a per-call basis simply needs to press \*67 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1167 on his or her rotary phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking automatically block's the customer's number on every call without the need to press \*67 or dial 1167. If a customer selects per-line blocking, he or she can unblock their number free of charge on a single call by dialing \*82 or 1182 on their phone before dialing the telephone number. This feature turns off per-line blocking for only the call placed after \*82 or 1182 is dialed and will result in your number being received by subscribers of Caller ID. Once the call is ended, per-lone blocking will be restored. Per-line blocking will be offered at no charge to anyone, upon receipt by the PUC written certification by the customer of a compelling need for per-line blocking. CCTC will be sending each customer a postage prepaid per-line blocking request before Caller ID will be offered. All requests for per-line blocking will automatically be granted free of charge. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID to have per-call or per-line blocking. Per-call or per-line blocking will display a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on the Caller ID display unit. Blocking will not be provided on calls from payphones. Detailed information on these services will be sent each customer during the next few weeks.

The following rates have been proposed for these new optional services. The proposed effective date for the tariff is March 15, 1996. The estimated revenue impact to the Cooperative is an increase of \$2,538.00 for the first year of service.

•Threatening violence or other criminal acts;

•Falsely accusing the consumer of fraud or other crimes;

 Sending documents to a debtor that falsely appear to be from a court or other official

•Making collect telephone calls without disclosing the true name of the caller before the charges are accepted;

•Using the telephone to harass debtors by calling anonymously or by making repeated or continuous calls.

In addition, federal law prohibits debt collectors from harassing debtors at work. For example, debt collectors and their attorneys may not contact a debtor at work if the debtor has notified the collector in writing that calls at work are unacceptable. Also, collectors may not call debtors at home before 8 a.m. or after 9 p.m., unless the collector knows such times are more convenient for the debtor.

If you owe money to a creditor, you may be liable for some charges in addition to the amount you originally agreed to pay. These extra charges include attornevs' fees, collectors' fees, interest and late penalties. However, not all extra charges that collectors seek are legitimate.

### Credit Clean-up Scams

More courteous in tone, but ultimately more damaging to consumers are some outfits that bill themselves as credit repair bureaus. In exchange for high fees, bogus credit repair outfits often tell consumers they can "erase" bad items on your credit report. The reality is that the only effective way to restore a good credit rating is to pay bills on time, and pay them in full.

The so-called credit improvement companies often promise to fix your credit and erase negative items on your credit reports. While they cannot keep their extravagant promises, they do keep your cash fee, which ranges anywhere from \$50 to

Typically, the service credit improvement companies provide is to write credit bureaus and have false items corrected. You can do the same thing yourself for free. Under the federal Fair Credit Reporting Act, consumers have the right to have inaccurate information on their credit report corrected. The credit reporting agency cannot charge you for the necessary corrections.

# What You Should Do

If you are denied credit, you have the right to get a free credit report from the credit reporting bureau that denied you. If there are erroneous entries on your credit report, write the bureau and insist that they take the mistaken
