The unit is self contained and
will be transported by tractor trailer to Abilene from Phoenix, Arizona It arrived in Abilene on Sunda March 4 and was
by noon Monday.
Texas Forest Service personne indicated the Abilene Preparation Facility will serve as a reloading base for air tankers serving west
Texas firefighters. Forest officials are prepared for a potential increase in fire occurrence in west Texas counties due to the spotty rain occurrence over the last sev-
enty-two hours. Current weather conditions and long range simula more intensely and be more difficult to control than normally occurs. The base will shorten flying time for heavy bombers which will be ardant on wildfires to slow them down. This wil
make it safer for ground crews wh
ttack wildfires with hand tools and tractors. This should serve to re-
duce time required for crews to bring the fires under control. The aircraft, which are converted Navy reconnaissance and anti-sub marine planes, will drop a mixture
