Stenholm **Announces 1997 Academy Cycle**

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Charles W. Stenholm is pleased to announce the beginning of the 1997 United States Service Academy cycle. At this time, information is being forwarded to all area high schools and those individuals who have expressed interest in applying for a nomination to the U.S. Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, the U. S. Military Academy at West Post, the Naval Academy at Annapolis, or the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point.

Congressman Stenholm, along with Congressman Lamar Smith, will again sponsor an Academy Day orientation for high school students, their parents and friends on Sunday, April 21, from 2-4 p.m. at the Youth Center Gym at Breakfast: Oatmeal, toast, fruit, Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo. The Academy Day program will include an introduction of Congressional students and academy representatives who will be working with the students during the nomination process, an explanation of nomination procedures, and videotapes of life at each academy. There will also be opportunities for students and parents to visit with academy and ROTC representatives.

Evaluations by school officials and other individuals who are familiar with the candidate are also used in the decisionmaking process.
