National Honor Society Inducts Two

The Arleigh Harris Chapter of the National Honor Society recently held its 1996-97 induction ceremony in the high school auditorium. New members inducted into the NHS were sophomores Randa Watts and Maria Ellerbe. Watts is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Watts. Ellerbe is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Ellerbe, Jr. To qualify for membership a student must achieve a 90 cumulative grade average; rate 3.2 on a 4.0 scale as evaluated by teachers, based on the qualities of character, service and leadership; be approved by a five member faculty committee; and maintain an 88 average. Membership is earned by demonstrating the four qualities, scholarship, leadership, character and service qualities held in high esteem by the National Honor Society.

Be Sure You Have Your SS Card With You To Apply For Or Renew Driver License

Beginning February 3 anyone applying for a Texas driver license. will be required to show proof of his or her Social Security number before the license will be issued. Those seeking to renew their driver. license in person or requesting a duplicate license also will need proof of their SSN. The new requirement does not apply to individuals renewing by mail or applying for a DPS-issued ID card.

The DPS has been requesting the SSN on a voluntary basis since 1992. A provision in the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 405 (c)(2)(C)(i), allows a state to use the SSN for driver license identification purposes. Changes made to the Family Code, Sec. 231.302(c)(1), during the 74th Legislature require agencies issuing licenses to obtain the SSN to assist in locating persons delinquent in paying child support. The SSN will not appear on the driver license itself and will be made available only to DPS for identification purposes to the Child Support Division of the State Attorney General's Office.

"In addition to assisting in the

collection of delinquent child support, we think this new law will make it more difficult for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver license," Col. Dudley M. Thomas, Director of the DPS, said. "This will help reduce crimes that depend on fake identification, such as hot check cases, and will also make it more difficult for minors to obtain licenses with fraudulent birth

To meet the SSN requirement, an applicant may present a federal Social Security card, income tax documents, U. S. passport (if SSN is included), W-2 form, pay stub, government-issued health insurance card, pilot's license, Veteran's Administration benefit cards or employer ID card that has the SSN on it. Metal Social Security cards or types sold at flea markets will not be accepted.

Federal law has required applicants for commercial driver licenses to show proof of SSNs since 1990. Currently, 23 other states require SSNs for all driver license applicants. In October 2000 federal immigration laws will go into effect mandating that all states capture SSNs for all driver licenses and ID

To apply for an SSN or to replace a lost Social Security card, call the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. or leave a message after those hours.



On January 4th Curly and Billie had their 50th wedding anniversary celebration at Oakcliff Assembly of God Church in Dallas, a church which Curly says, has been special


to them through the years. Larry Rudy and Steve and their families, were there as was LaDonna and her family and nine of the Gatlin's grandchildren.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Kerrville, serving as treasurer in the 1930's, later being elected an Elder. He and his wife were instrumental in organizing the Memorial Presbyterian Church in Fredericksburg, where he served as treasurer and Clerk of the Session. He served as executive secretary for the Centennial Committee for the observance of the 100th anniversary of the founding of Fredericksburg held in May 1946. He had served as a director and secretary of the Gillespie County Fair Association and secretary of the Hill Country Preservation Society. He served in the U.S. Army as a Staff Sergeant in World War II.

He married Aline Harper on June 9, 1945 in Kerrville.


smells, smokes, sounds, etc. Both men and women will enjoy and learn from this book.



Cheaney Sweeps Lamb Division In Colean County Livestock Show



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The Concluding Saga Of The Whon News

By Trudi S. Rutherford It was a sad day indeed for Whon residents and the surrounding areas when our beloved Alline Rutherford felt compelled to discontinue writing her column for posterity and those interested in our tiny community. She deserves much praise and recognition for her nearly fiftyfour years of responsible reporting and dedicated single-mindedness. I'm sure there are those who will miss her column more than I could ever elaborate here. She has earned our thanks and appreciation for her faithfulness to the task.

When Alline first took on the job of correspondent, her fourth child, Loyd Earl was but a wee baby. It was nineteen forty-three while the second world war was still raging, many of our boys were across the vast expanse fighting for our allies. Whon was a thriving community with but a small trickle of melioristic families exploring the possibilities of finding a better wage in the larger cities of Texas.

Alline had an agenda of news to report from a myriad of sources in those days. Weddings, births, deaths, accidents, parties, gatherings and everyday occurrences which are commonplace to villages and towns. People in Whon were like a family, close-knit and interested in their neighbors' daily lives. And so Alline had a plethora of events to include in her weekly reports.

It must not have been facile to juggle the NEWS column with her full to overflowing agenda of rearing a family, taking care of a home, and having outside employment to supplement the sparse income of the farmer of those days.

But Alline was not dissuaded. Through the end of the war, when the small trickle became a virtual

flood of folk relocating outside Whon, children changing from the Whon school to the Santa Anna system; through the closing of Whon businesses, homes and farms being left unoccupied, the busyness of a small community eventually arrived at nearly a standstill through

Still Alline persisted. She contacted neighbors when news was not forthcoming. She called Whonites for their help so that Whon would not seem the skeletal vestige it had become. She wracked her brain and elaborated her findings to fill her pages. And she unerringly had her NEWS in the mail before the deadline. Every

There were illnesses that could have excused her from her duty. There were personal tragedies. Hospitalization and distance did overwhelm her dedication twice or thrice, but her first reaction upon her release was to return to her task

During those years of correspondence, her children grew up, married and had children of their own who in turn married and also had children. Her husband of fifty years left her one morning while they were doing chores together. She did her utmost to revive him but God wanted him more. And virtually every Sunday evening of this existence, Alline would pick up pen and paper and write her NEWS. Whether the house was full of grandchildren, whether her houseguests had chosen to spend one more night, whether the cattle needed care, or even when her favorite show was on TV, she faithfully sat and wrote her NEWS.

It doesn't seem like much to the reader who inevitably swings the pages of the newspaper to the Whon News to see what's happening in the little community that was home to so many area residents; it's always been there, like going home again. Bringing back the picture of Whon in days gone

Despite the fact that two-thirds of her entire life was lived alongside her Whon News, Alline must give it up. Whon no longer creates newsworthy events to warrant a column every week. Whon has far too few residents within its environs. Its activities could be encapsulated on a yearly basis and fond wanting. However, whenever you recall the Whon of yore, please remember Alline Rutherford who kept it alive for these fifty-four years, much longer than conceivable for any who knows the Whon of today.



AUSTIN - Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has asked lawmakers to review the state's school funding law and look for a fairer way to pay for public education.

Bullock said the so-called Robin Hood law that purported to take from rich school districts and give to the poorer districts actually takes from some relatively poor districts.

Under the law. 91 of the 1,044 school districts in Texas must share an estimated \$350 million in taxes with needy school districts. But,

according to statistics used by Bullock, 54 of those 91 school districts have per-capita personal income below the state average of \$19,716.

"This pokes a hole in the idea that many so-called rich districts are filled with rich people. Property wealth that can come from a major industry, a plant or oil wells does not always mean the people are rich.

"That is as good a reason as any to re-examine the state's Robin Hood school funding law. It's good evidence that the system is not the fairest way to fund education," Bullock said.

Lottery Profits for Education

Bullock's spokesman. Mike Hailey, said the lieutenant governor supports the idea of dedicating lottery profits to the funding of public education.

In a nutshell, Hailey said, about 60 percent of the net lottery proceeds go to education now, with about two-thirds of that going to public education and the rest to higher education.

If the projected \$2.7 billion in 1996-97 lottery profits goes to edu-

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cation in the 1998-99 biennium, the other programs currently receiving 40 percent would need another \$1.1 billion to be funded at the proposed budget bill level.

"The Legislature could just make the shift or it could come up with an additional \$1 billion to keep


