This City Confronted With Water Shortage

One of the most distressing conditions that has confronted the people of this town in years is now a problem for consideration. It was realized several years back that Santa Anna was not supplied with an adequate water supply in event of an extended drouth of long duration, and further efforts were made to overcome this condition. More bonds were voted and a new dam was built, creating a lake with sufficient capacity to impound an abundant supply of water, but unfortunately, since the dam was built we have had only limited rains, and the lake has never been more than partly filled. Evaporation, seepage and other waste have been neglected and now we are short of water and wells are being pumped to help supply the needs. Several have suggested remedies, some of which seem plausable, but none of them have, in so far as we know, been resorted to. Regardless of the cost, something must be done and the quicker the better. Several good wells drilled in the north part of town would greatly relieve the distressing situation.

Your dollar spent in Santa Anna, and its-immediate vicinity, benefits someone else in this community also, and at least indirectly benefits you, for all this money in some way goes toward building a better city, and the improvements of Coleman County.

Among the enterprises or institutions in Santa Anna that are always at, or near, the top of the list when most any of its citizens begin to catalogue in their minds the things that are important in their town, is the Sealy Hospital, a beautiful, three story, commodius and fireproof structure delightfully situated at the base of the Santa Anna Mountain on a block of ground formerly a part of the Hays Addition to Santa Anna.

This hospital is one of the real demonstrations that work and perseverance /will make dreams come true for it was the cherished dream of its founder more than twenty years ago.

The first unit of this institution was erected in 1917 by the founder with the able assistance of loyal friends and enterprising citizens, by the formation of a stock company known as the Santa Anna Hospital, the building being completed in December of that year but was not opened for patients until the return of the founder, Dr. T. Richard Sealy, from France after the close of the World War in the summer of 1919. It was opened with four beds for patients and had as its personnel a graduate nurse and a cook. From that meager beginning, the institution has risen slowly but surely and now has thirty-five beds for patients, three graduate nurses and a State Chartered Training School with ten student nurses.

The building is not only beautiful in architecture but is equipped with the most modern, all steel hospital furniture, modern operating and

sterilizing equipment and an automatic electric, full size hospital invalid elevator, electrical signal service with the same water, gas, electrical and sewer service as though it were located in the heart of the town.

We are reliably informed that very shortly there will be unveiled within the lobby of this institution a Memorial Honor Table, cast in bronze, which bears the name of the founder, together with the names of those who have substantially aided the institution in a financial way.

While the substantial growth of the institution is an undisputed evidence of its splendid success in the care of the patients who have been admitted to it, it was noted from the admission book that, it cared for 401 patients last year (1926); 320 of whom were surgical cases, with but two surgical deaths, which shows a mortality of much less than one percent, a record that no institution of like character in this state excels. 'There were 81 medical cases with only about two percent mortality.

Dr. Sealy, the founder and surgeon in charge of this institution is a graduate of the University of Texas and a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons. He entered the World War as a First Lieutenant, was promoted to Captain and later made Major in the Medical Corps of the United States Army. A distinguished judge who has known the doctor since his boyhood and who lives in a distant part of the state, said that . a fitting epitaph for him would be, "He was true to his work, his word and his friends."







RADIO TRAIN CONTROL

Radio control of train movements is described in a recent statement by the Department of Commerce giving details of a new German invention designed to prevent collisions.

Fundamentally the system involves the equipment of all trains running on a single track with receiving and sending radio apparatus tuned to a designated short wavelength. When a train reduces its speed or stops, a signal is automatically communicated to a train following on the same track behind it, to warn the enginer by a peculiar sound, or to act directly upon the brakes of the following train. Where two or more tracks run parallel, each would be governed by a different wave-length. Similar results may be obtained through operating the signals from a stationary "block house" if desired, and the system gives promise of real effectiveness in the prevention of rear-end collisions. There appears to be no reason why a modification of the method might not be adapted to avoid head-on collisions

as well although such adaption is not mentioned in the preliminary report of the new invention. •


