W. F. Garner manager of the Santa Anna Oil & Gas Association, came in Tuesday morning from Houston and Humble, where he was successful in buying a complete pumping equipment, and 1000 bbl. tankage to put Kingsberry No. 1 on the pump.

He also bought a car of casing for their new location on the Henderson tract. Mr. Garner stated that he remained on the job until the cars were loaded, and are now in transit, and should reach here next week.

Tubing and casing are very scarce, but if you pay the price they can always get it Mr. Garner states.

They are now pulling outside casing on the Kingsberry well and will move at once to new location.

## THE CAMPAIGN FOR BETTER SCHOOLS

Pordunk school district has issued bonds to build a school house and it requires twenty cents of the constitutional limit of fifty cents to take care of the bonds. This is about the average rate for bonds where bonds have been issued and very few districts can have decent school houses without issuing bonds. Then, Pordunk is levying the remaining thirty cents of the constitutional limit for maintenance, which provides \$725 per year.

The district has about 120 scholastics and for these it receives from the state and county net about \$960. It can reasonably expect \$500 State aid. Therefore, the total funds of the district amount to \$2,185.

The school needs four teachers and it is ambitious to have at least an eight months term. To allow \$1000 for a principal and an average of \$640 for each of the other three teachers, which would certainly not be very high salaries, would require \$2920 for teachers and other expenses would easily require \$180. So the total needed for next year is \$3,100 or \$915 more than the school will have.

Pordunk is anxious to raise its local tax rate sufficient to provide the \$915, but the State of Texas says to Pordunk, no, you shall not vote your own money to educate your own children.

Pordunk is only one of hundreds of districts in Texas in this condition, and when the above facts are called to the attention of any fair minded man who believes in a democratic government he agrees that the constitution should be so changed that Pordunk can vote of its own money any amount it needs and wants to vote to provide the kind of school it wants.

Well, we are now in a campaign to raise funds for the purpose of bringing these and other facts to the attention of every voter in the state with the hope that the constitution may be so changed next November.

## DEMOCRATS MEET IN CONVNTION; ELECT STATE DELEGATES

The Coleman County Democratic convention met at the Courthouse in Coleman Tuesday afternoon and adopted a resolution endorsing the Wilson administration in war and in piece, and recommended the nomination of a candidate for president at San Francisco who also unqualifiedly endorses the Wilson administration.

Those elected to the State Convention from Santa Anna were S. W. Childers, W. H. Garrett, Mrs. S. H. Phillips, delegates, G. W. Faulkner, J. D. Simpson and H. W. Kingsberry as alternates.

Various ones made speeches and a big time was had.

## GOULDBUSK-FISK ROAD DIS. VOTES \$120,000 ROAD BONDS—93 to 8

Road District No. 2 of Coleman county, which embraces Fisk, Gouldbusk and Hardin voting precincts, voted \$120,000 road bonds almost unanimously. Only 8 votes were cast against the issue, 93 for it. The vote by precincts was as follows:

Gouldbusk, for 56; against 3. Fisk, for 21; against 5. Hardin, for 16, against 0.

## Hard Surface Road Assured.

The Gouldbusk to Coleman road carries more traffic, perhaps, than any other intra-county road; the Gouldbusk-Fisk country is one of the richest farming districts of the county and during the last year it was almost impossible to get the farm products from that section to market over the dirt roads. With hardsurfaced roads, which the road bond issue will assure, it will be an easy matter to get to market in any kind of weather.

Coleman Precinct No. 1 will build a hard-surfaced road south from Coleman to connect up with the road in district 3 and, when completed, traffic can come and go uninterrupted from Coleman to the McCulloch county line.

It is only a matter of time now till all sections of Coleman county will be served by hard-surfaced cardinal roads.—Democrat-Voice.

## MORE OIL GOES FROM SANTA ANNA

The Gladys Belle Oil Company shipped six more cars of liquid gold from the Santa Anna field this week. There is eight more cars on the loading rack to be loaded. The wells are holding out fine, and with their huge engine and splendid equipment they will soon put Santa Anna on the oil map to stay.

## COLEMAN COUNTY OIL NEWS; MANY EYES WATCHING

The showing of oil in Pippin-Burk well at 2337 feet practically proves up the eastern part of Coleman County, which, if all geological calculations are not upset will some day develop the big pay that has made other sections of Texas rich overnight.

The Pippin-Burk is making a beautiful green oil from the gray lime and in the same formation as the Jim Ned well several miles north and several hundred feet deeper. The Pippin-Burk is showing from 2337 to 2360 and the well is drilling.

## Kingsbury Wells Looks Good.

The Kingsbury well of the Santa Anna Oil & Gas Co., is shut down for pump with 500 feet of oil in the hole, according to scout report. It is said a test early in the week showed the well would make 10 barrels an hour.

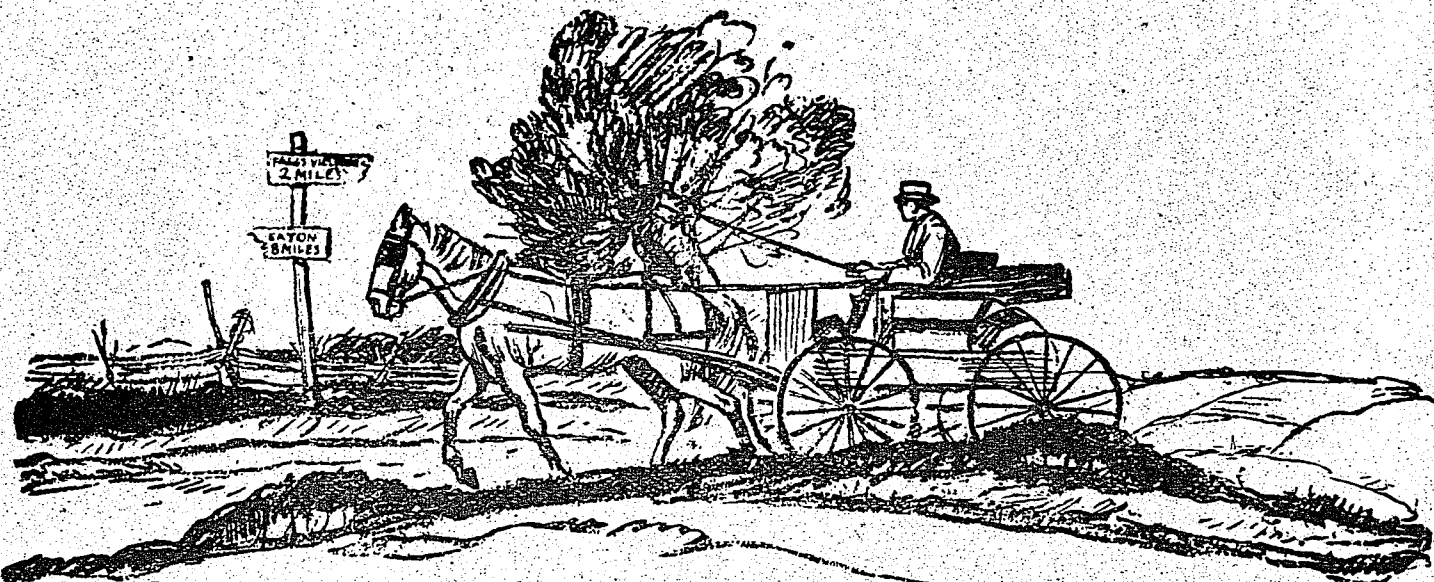

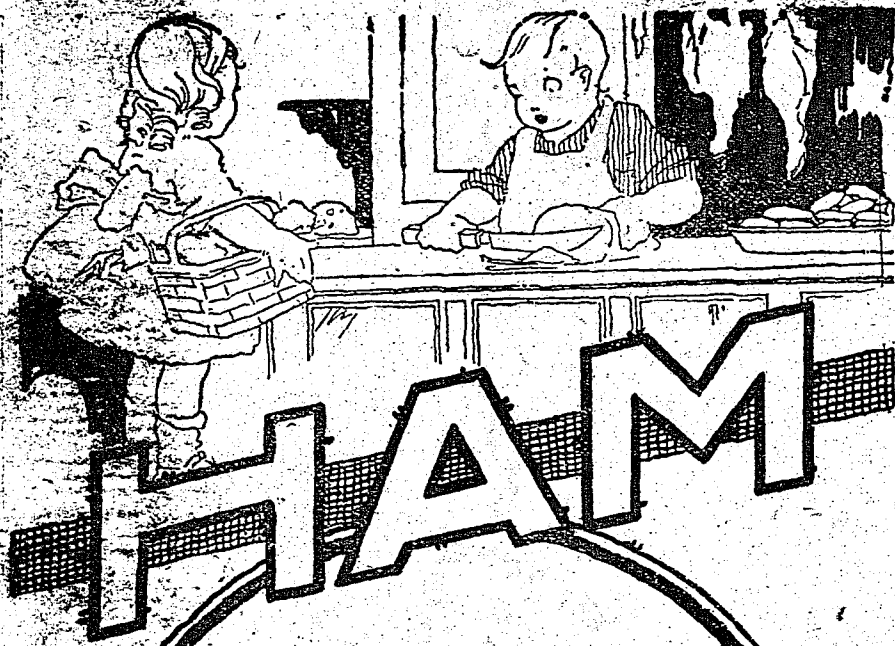

### OLD TIMERS REMEMBER KILLING FROST CAME IN JUNE AND SNOW IN MARCH

The cold wave of the past two or three days has, as usual, set folks to talking about the various times in the past when weather changes of an unusual nature came to break the round of the seasons. Two old timers living in Brownwood were talking about the weather today. Both remembered that on the 9th day of June, 1876, a killing frost was one of the features of the season in this part of the country and that in Brown county practically all corn was either killed or badly injured by the frost. One of the men lived in Lampasas County at that time

and stated that his corn was in silk and tassel and while it was not killed it was badly injured, and when the sun came out the next day the corn looked as if somebody had gone thru the field and scorched each blade with a blaze of fire. People got very blue over the situation, but immediately following this cold snap good rains fell throughout the west and that year was a splendid crop year in all this section. The crops were late but very abundant and brought good prices. People raised plenty of various kinds of grain and plenty of meat of different kinds.

One of the old timers went on to state that on the 13th day of March, 1866, he and several others, he being only eighteen years

old at that time followed some Indians from Comanche county to Brownwood which was no town at all at that time, but just a store and postoffice. The Indians had stolen some horses and the men were trying to get the horses back, intending to do so or kill every Indian in the bunch. The Indians finding that they were being followed, left several of the horses along the route and made a get-away into the country to the north, which was at that time unsettled. The pursuing party stopped at Brownwood and turned back towards home. England Ahead of This Country in Development of Planes for Commercial Purposes.

England is far ahead of America in the development of the airplane for commercial purposes and flying as a popular pastime. The big dailies now publish as part of their regular weather report a chart showing the direction and velocity of the wind at 1,000, 2,000, 3,000, 5,000 and 10,000 feet in the most important centers. Passenger airplanes are being built to carry a pilot and two passengers. The body of the machine is an inclosed saloon-cabin with windows, built like a limousine motorcar. When the windows are closed there is no more noise than there would be in an express train. There are well-padded leather seats, electric lighting and heating, and a table for the use of the two passengers as they sit facing each other. And there is a special cabin for baggage. The machines are expected to make 125 miles an hour.

**WORLD'S SHIPBUILDING.**

The total number of merchant vessels under construction throughout the world, excluding the central powers, on December 31, 1918, according to Lloyd's Register shipbuilding returns, was 2,189 ships, of 6,921,989 gross tons, or double the largest corresponding tonnage under construction by the world before the war, which was 3,446,890 gross tons in June, 1913.



**PLAN TO GET FEDERAL HELP**

Positive Obligation Should Be Placed Upon States to Give Aid to County Units.

That federal aid funds should hereafter be expended only upon roads which are included in an intercounty system of main highways, is becoming a fixed policy in many states, despite the fact that the present road act does not require such use of the money.

Pennsylvania, Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wyoming and Washington recently have practically decided to confine the federal money to roads that count in well-defined state systems.

"If the national government is to continue the policy of appropriating federal funds to the 48 states for highway improvement, a positive obligation should be placed upon the states to give aid to their county units," asserts President David Jameson of the American Automobile association, which organization devoted its country-wide energies to the passage of the federal aid road act and urged such legislation at a time when it was far from popular.

"If it is the correct thing—and we believe that it is—for the wealthier and more settled states to give assistance through the federal treasury to the less populated and undeveloped parts of the country, this national co-operation carries with it an obligation to the state to function as a commonwealth in the form of intercounty roads built and maintained entirely at state expense.

"While it has been found necessary in some states to employ automobile registration money in floating state bond issues, this should not be done except as a last resort, simply because there is need of yearly maintenance funds and these are best supplied by the registration and other taxes collected from motorcar owners. The total of this money for the whole country now exceeds \$50,000,000."

**DANGER SIGNAL AT CROSSING**

Startling Automatic Device Gives Warning of Approaching Trolley Car at Crowded Corner.

Where three streets come together at one place the crossing is sure to be dangerous, particularly if traffic is heavy and there is a trolley line.

A startling danger signal has been invented for such a crossing. It stands on a corner that the cars pass, and is so connected with the track that when
