Santa Anna Will Vote On City Manager

An election is to be held in Santa Anna the first Tuesday in April, same being the 6th day of April, 1920, for the purpose of determining whether Santa Anna shall adopt the commission form of government.

On the 16th day of February, a petition was presented to the Mayor of Santa Anna, signed by Dr. L. O. Garrett and forty-two other persons requesting that an election be ordered to determine whether said city shall adopt this plan.

S. J. Pierratt is appointed as presiding judge and G. Braly, is appointed additional judge and I. O. Shield and A. M. Brown are appointed clerks.

At the same election a mayor and two commissioners shall be elected to serve as provided by law.

Brownwood and San Angelo and many other towns, have adopted this plan and it has proved successful in most every place it has been tried. There is no reason why it should not be profitable for Santa Anna.

A TRIBUTE TO T. E. GARRETT
 The high esteem in which Mr. T. E. Garrett, deceased, was held by friends who knew him intimately is shown by a letter from Venice Henderson of Cleburne, a former employe of Mr. Garrett, to his father, T. J. Henderson of Coleman. The letter says in part:

"Cleburne, Texas, March 7.
 "My Dear Father:
 "Your card bearing the sad news of Tom Garrett's death was quite a shock to me; I know that Coleman has lost a good man and a worthy citizen, and I feel that I have personally lost a good friend, for he was always a friend to me, and I have always numbered him among my best friends in Coleman. He was always ready and willing to help the younger fellows like myself in so far as he could, and I believe he had as many or more friends among the younger men than any man that ever lived in

Coleman. It could be truly said of him, 'He lived in a house by the side of the road, and was a friend to every man.' I know that he will be missed most by his wife, though we know that God only lends us a few years upon this earth in which to prepare ourselves for the world beyond, and though Tom was not a member of any church as I recall, still he has lived a good life and it rests with God in His infinite wisdom and mercy to deal with all those who fail to obey the command, 'I believe that there are many who will receive mercy at His hands, for the life that they lived on this earth, the example they have set before their younger associates. It is not for us to judge, let us hope and pray that our friend who has been called beyond may reach a happier and brighter home beyond where trials are no more, and where sorrow is unknown. To his family and those of his friends, I offer my heart felt sympathy and consolation, as far as words can go, and it is left for us to live so that we may all meet again in that Great Unknown.—Democrat-Voice.

Having made the race for tax assessor four years ago and having made a race of which I feel justly proud, I shall again offer myself as a candidate for the same place.

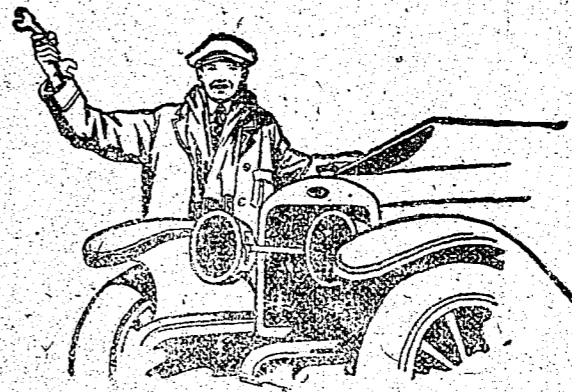

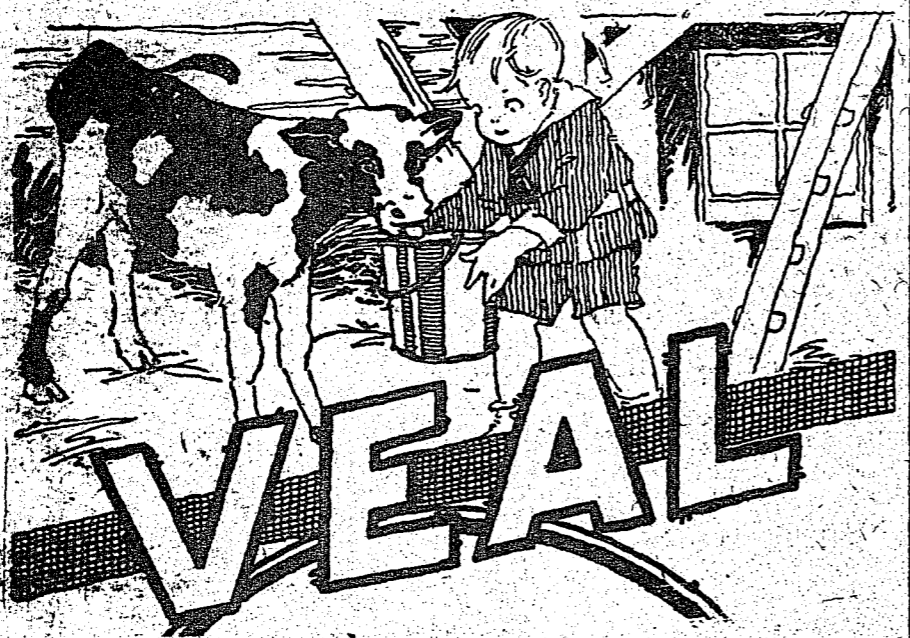

The State of Texas, County of Coleman.
 Whereas heretofore, to-wit: On the 16th day of February, 1920, a petition was presented to me as Mayor of the City of Santa Anna, signed by L. O. Garrett and 42 other persons, all qualified voters of and resident citizens in the said City of Santa Anna, Coleman County, Texas, requesting that an election be ordered to determine whether said city of Santa Anna shall adopt the commission form of Government; and it appearing that said petition is in due form as required by law and that same is duly signed by more than ten percent of the qualified voters of said city and that said city of Santa Anna is a city duly incorporated under the general laws of the State of Texas, having a population of more than one thousand inhabitants and of less than five thousand inhabitants; and it further appearing that said petition should be granted. It is therefore ordered that an election be held within and for the City of Santa Anna in Coleman County, Texas, on the first Tuesday in April, same being the 6th day of April, 1920, to determine whether or not the Commission form of Government shall be adopted for said City. It is further ordered that every person entitled to vote at any general election under the laws of the State of Texas, shall be a qualified voter at said election. Those voting at said election in favor of the adoption of the Commission form of Government shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For Commission." Those voting at said election against the adoption of the Commission form of Government shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against Commission." S. J. Pieratt is hereby appointed presiding judge of said election, and J. G. Bailey is hereby appointed additional judge of said election, and H. O. Shield and A. R. Brown are hereby appointed clerks to hold said election. Said election shall be held and governed by the general laws of the State of Texas, except as otherwise provided by law, and returns of said election shall be made to the undersigned, Mayor of said City, within five days after said election. It is further ordered that at said election there shall be elected at the same time, a Mayor of said City and two Commissioners who shall serve thereafter, as provided by law. 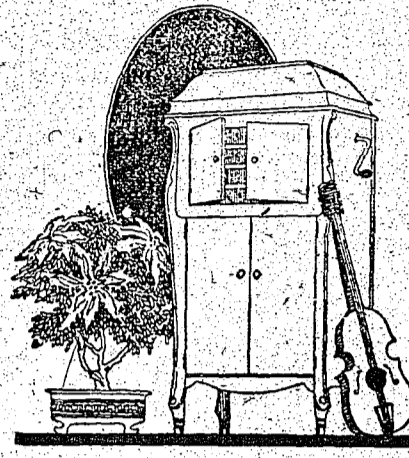

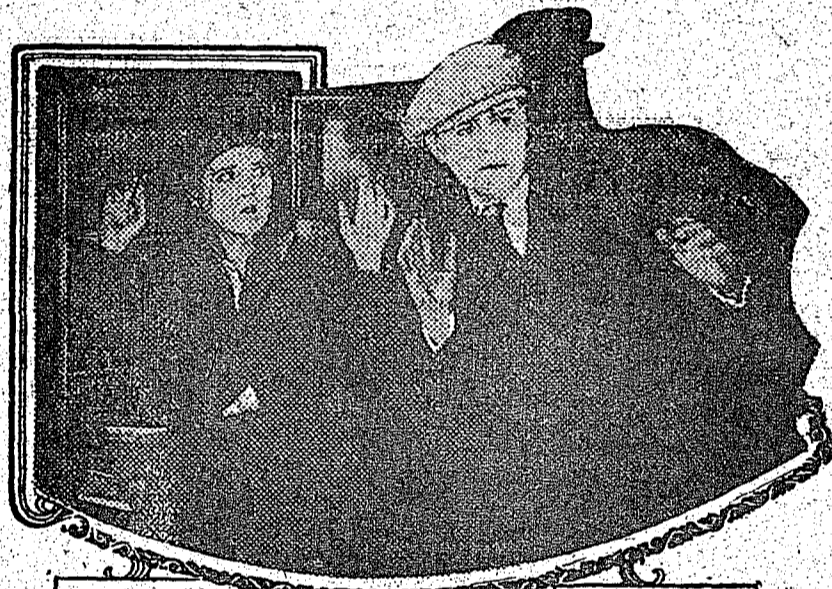

PLANTING GOOD SEEDS.

A good seed must have enough food in it so that the young plant may get enough sustenance to develop the tiny roots and embryo of leaves; so that the young plant may take its nourishment from the soil and the air. Unless the seed is matured, well developed and properly formed it cannot start the young plant so it may reproduce its species.

Then the seed must have a well prepared seedbed, mellow, moist, aerated soil. Unless this is available, a large per-cent of seed may not germinate and a still larger per cent may start very weak, unpromising plants. This is a great handicap, for every practical farmer is anxious to have a good stand.

As a matter of economy in time and expense good seeds should be planted and well-made seedbeds provided. Wise plans and diligent work will be justified in these matters.—Farm & Ranch.

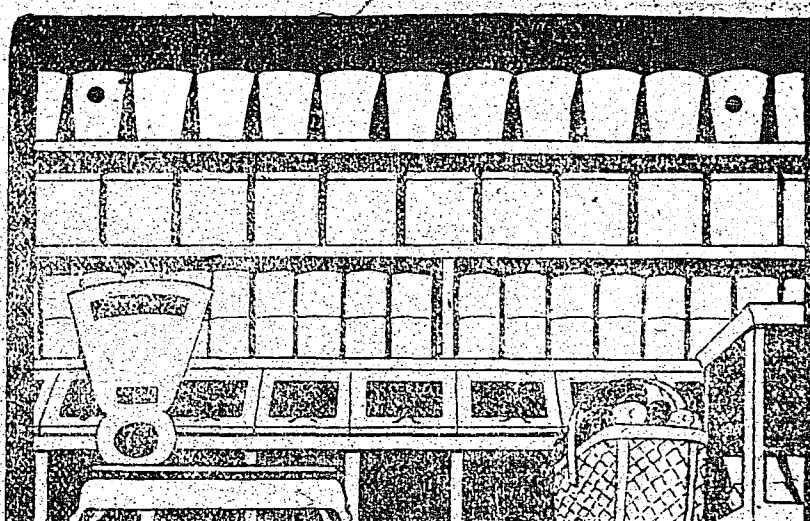
