## OIL REPORT FOR COLEMAN COUNTY, GOOD

Arthur E. Tonn et al of Tucson, Arizona, are under contract to drill the E. N. May Heirs tract north of Coleman. The contract which was filed with the county clerk this week calls for drilling operations to begin on or before June 1, 1920, depth specified as 3,000 feet, and well to be completed not later than one year from date on which drilling is started. The May tract is included in G. H. and H. survey 12. The Dragoon Oil and Gas Company, of which O. T. Smith of Courtney, Arizona, is president, has acquired for development purposes the W. C. Casey tract contained in E. T. R. R. Survey No. 87, east of Coleman and south of the Jim Ned Company's Dibrell well.

**Gulf States Co. Makes Location**  
The Gulf States Company Babington tract, has made location approximately 400 feet northwest of the producing well on the Babington tract. Water line has been laid and slush pit excavated. The company is preparing to swab the producing well on the tract.

## WILLIAMSON WELL DRILLING IN BLUE SHALE

The Williamson well drilling on the Cox tract in northern Brown county, midway between the Bailey Gilliam No. 1 and the Gaines Sinclair No. 1 producers, is seven hundred feet deep and drilling rapidly in a blue shale, carrying a twelve and one-half inch hole. The well is running a double tower, and more than a hundred feet daily is being drilled in the soft formation.

Two good gas showings have been found in the shallow sands in this well, further proving the theory of a shallow sand of probably considerable value somewhere in the northern part of the county. The Williamson well is in a producing area, a mile and a half from a producing well to the east and another to the west, and is regarded as one of the best bets in northern part of the county.—Bulletin.

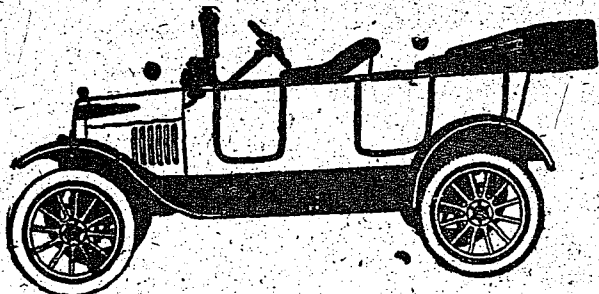

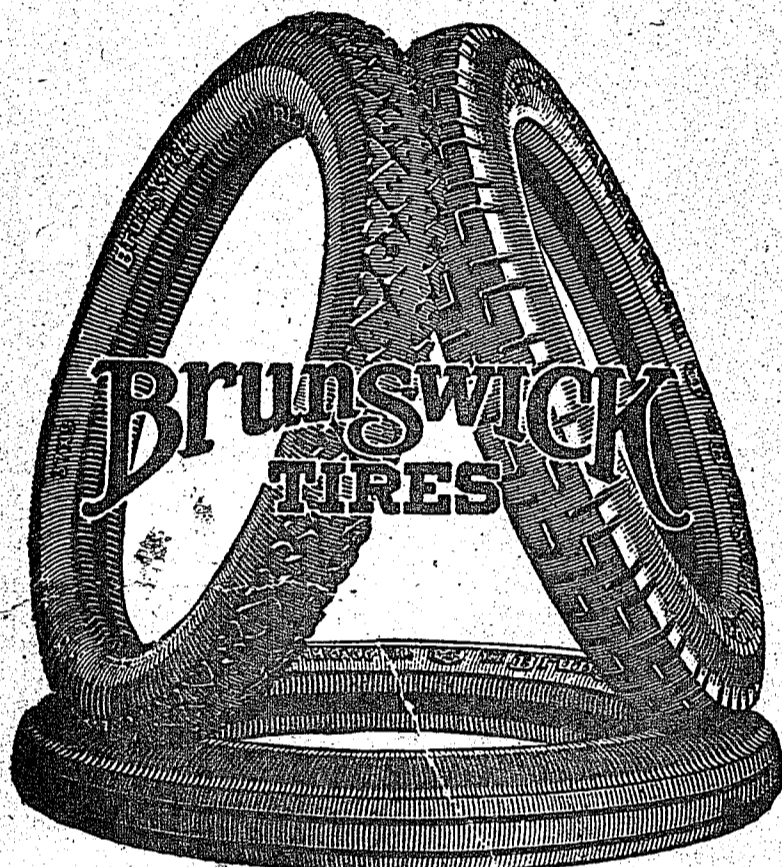
