## Mountaineers Whip Rising Star

### An Old Newspaper

Last week Mrs. A. J. Frame loaned the Santa Anna News the oldest newspaper we have ever seen. The paper, the "Ulster County Gazette" was published at Kingston, Va., on Saturday, January 4, 1800, making the paper over 150 years old.

The newspaper has been well cared for through the ages but is now getting worn and battered edges, and is turning dark with age.

The paper carries a complete history of the burial of General George Washington, the first President of the United States, who died December 14, 1799. It also carries a copy of the message from congress to John Adams, then President of the United States, concerning the death of Washington and Adams' reply to congress. It gives a vivid description of the funeral procession and his entombment at Mt. Vernon, on the Potomac River.

Sometime in the near future, we hope to have time to copy all the articles in the paper concerning the death of General Washington, and reprint them in the Santa Anna News.

It seems that as far back as 1800 some business establishments were having trouble getting hired help. One ad reads: WANTED: As an apprentice to the Clothier's Business, an active, diligent BOY, from 14 to 18 years of age, Enquire of William Peters at Barletown.

This newspaper does not contain any pictures or any art work in the advertisements. This was long before it was possible to print pictures. None of the ads stated any prices. However, an announcement of a new dry goods and grocery store combination ad states they will dispose of their merchandise very cheap for cash or produce.

The paper is all very interesting, and we would like to be able to reproduce the entire contents, but space and time will not permit us to do so.

### Town To Close November 11

Armistice Day, Saturday, Nov. 11, is one of the five days during the year picked by the business men of Santa Anna for the stores to be closed. You are requested to keep in mind that the main part of the business section will be closed all day, and to arrange your affairs accordingly.

Friday night, November 10, Santa Anna and Bangs will participate in their annual football game on the local field. This game has been scheduled on the night before Armistice, because of the Saturday date.

There has been some discussion as to what day to observe as Thanksgiving this year. The President of the United States has proclaimed Nov. 23 as the National Holiday. The Governor of Texas has said to take either the 23rd or if you are able to buy two turkeys, take them both, the 23rd and the 30th.

So far as Santa Anna is concerned the larger part of the merchants seem to want to observe Nov. 23. There is an afternoon football game between Santa Anna and Gorman scheduled on the local field on that date, and this is the date the schools will observe, so it seems that the 23rd would be the proper day for Santa Anna. Some merchants will likely observe both of the dates, but we feel that if they are going to do so, they should notify the public before hand.

Unless otherwise notified, generally speaking, Santa Anna will observe Thursday, November 23, as Thanksgiving Day.

### Water Line To Lake Brownwood Completed Sunday

The last of the pipe was put in the ground Sunday, completing 46,200 feet of 8-inch cast iron pipe from the filtering plant northeast of town to a location on the Newton place, on Lake Brownwood. ### Final Rites For R. S. Stearns Of Trickham

Funeral services were held at the Trickham Union Church on Friday, October 27, at 3:00 p. m. for Mr. R. S. Stearns, who, after a lengthy illness, died of Pneumonia in a Brownwood hospital on Thursday at 1:42 p. m. He had undergone major surgery 8 weeks before his death.

Robert Sherman Stearns was born January 9, 1866 at Burksville, Ky. He attended Add-Ran Christian College at Thorp Springs from 1888 to 1890. The College is now known as T.C.U. He was married in Springer, Okla., to Miss Alice Estelle Willard, on December 5, 1894.

Mr. Stearns had been a resident of the Trickham community for 46 years, where he was engaged in farming and ranching until retirement. He had been a friend and neighbor to many. His hobby was reading.

Five of the thirteen children born to Mr. and Mrs. Stearns preceded him in death, and he was the last surviving member of a family of 43 children.

Those surviving are: the widow, of Trickham; six sons, Odell Gordon, Harlie, G. K. Ed and Robert all of Trickham; two daughters, Mrs. Verdie Haynes of Trickham and Mrs. Clyde Haynes of Santa Anna. Also surviving are 29 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers defeated the Rising Star Wildcats 24-14 Friday night in the top game of the week in District 12-B Conference play. This was the first time the Wildcats had gone down in conference play in over two years. Rising Star has won the last two Regional crowns without tasting defeat.

Santa Anna kicks to Wildcats 18. Wildcats return to 35; three attempts and kick puts ball on Santa Anna 25. Two plays lost Santa Anna 5 yards; Mountaineers quick-kicked to Wildcats 27. On third play Parish intercepts pass on 50 and returns to Wildcat 10; on second play Parish goes over from 8, Hartman fails to convert. Santa Anna kicks to Wildcats 30. Wildcats return to 37; three plays backs them to 40 and the Wildcats kick to Santa Anna 30. One play nets first down on 44; two plays nets first down on Wildcat 44; two plays and Parish gets bad pass from center, runs back past 50 yard line, picks ball up and throws pass to McIver on 22 and McIver goes over.



The entire Sunday school is requested to meet in the main auditorium next Sunday morning at ten o'clock.



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

Your Worst and Best Lesson for November 5, 1950

'Within my earthly temple there's a crowd. There's one of us that's humble, one that's proud. There's one that's broken-hearted for his sins. And one that, unrepentant, sits and grieves. From such perplexing doubt I could be free. If I could once be certain which is me.'

FROM some anonymous rhymester comes this complaint, which any of us might have truthfully written if we had thought about it. Which is me, anyway? I seem to have three selves. One is a good deal better than my everyday or ordinary self. On rare occasions he will do something or other so good it surprises even my best friends - it 'isn't like me.' On the other side is another self, much worse than my everyday personality. He too surprises me by acts or thoughts so dreadful I am afraid of him and ashamed too. Yet both these 'other selves' are 'me' too.

Life is a Fight THE TRUTH of the business is that life, when a man takes it seriously, is a fight. It is a war between your best and your worst self. Your two other-selves are there every moment, like ghosts, or rather like a bright angel and a dark one.

It is always possible to become a better man than you are; also, alas, it is possible to become far worse than you are. No man stays the same through life. He is continually pressing upward, or plunging downward, or varying between the two. There has been only one person, Christians believe, who actually fulfilled all the good that was possible for him. The possibilities for evil in his life remained only possibilities—he never let them come to pass.

The possibilities for good, on the other hand, became real. His dark angel remained only a ghost; his good angel was simply his real self. At no point in his life was he forced to say to himself, 'I wish I had... I wish I had not.' And yet, even for him life was a struggle. We do not believe he sinned. We do believe he was tempted; and if the temptation was real, then he could have sinned. No man can be really tempted to do what he cannot do. Yes, the Master had his fight. But the point is: he won.

The Way to Win CHRISTIANS are not exempt in this war of good against evil. We are not 'carried to the skies on flowery beds of ease' any more than Jesus was. We do not drift into the Promised Land. We have to fight our way uphill.

As Saint Paul says, with each temptation God provides a 'way of escape.' Our prayer 'Lead us not into temptation' can always be answered. Sometimes it can be answered by ourselves. That is, we cannot leave the fight to God.

But we can win as Jesus won, sometimes by standing and doing battle where we are, sometimes simply by leaving temptation behind. For often the best thing to be done is to retreat. Get as far as you can from whatever tempts your worse self. Don't stand debating between right and wrong when you know which is which. Turn your back on the wrong... run, don't walk, to the nearest exit!

Is Alcoholism a Disease?

ONE OF the common temptations of millions at all times is alcoholism. It is popular to speak of this as a 'disease,' and yet it is the only disease of which victims have actually cured themselves.

Dr. Brady, whose medical column is well known, reminds us that nobody ever got over migraine headaches, or heart disease, simply by deciding to be well. But men and women have got over alcoholism, essentially by deciding to be well, and sticking to that decision.

Alcoholics Anonymous, that well-known group of former victims, who have been very successful in helping slaves of this habit to become their best selves, use much the same methods we find in the New Testament: (1) staying out of temptation's way; (2) overcoming evil with good; and (3) laying hold of the 'Power, not ourselves, that makes for righteousness.'
