



So stupendous in size and so magnificent in setting are the two new bridges that, especially for the traveler whose home is in the interior of the country, they in themselves are worthy of a visit to the

One of them, the San Francisco-Oakland bridge, is already carrying its burden of traffic across the bay, having been opened last November. Built at a cost of \$77,000,-000, this gigantic structure is eight and one-fourth miles long. In reality it is a series of bridges from 'Frisco to Yerba Buena island and thence across to Oakland. Its doubledecked six-lane highway takes care of automobile as well as interurban train traffic. It may be said to go far under the earth and far above it, for the bridge, by means of the world's largest vehicular bore, tunnels through Yerba Buena, and the towers over the bay are 520 feet above the water, higher than the city's skyscrapers. Some of the foundations lie more than 200 feet below the level of the bay, and required construction engineering arising from Exposition island. 

Stomach Ulcer Causes.

Despite the fact that ulcer of the stomach and of the first part of the small intestine is quite common, the exact cause or causes is always a matter of close search on the part of the physician who notes certain points about the majority of ulcer

First the ulcer patient is usually of the nervous type, usually high strung and apt to be irritable or 'jumpy." This is the "nervous" cause. Second, there is often something wrong or rather "different" about the position of the stomach so that there is some interference with its action. This is the "mechanical" cause.

Third, there is something different about the lining of the stomach something different about the juices and their action. This might be called the chemical, the infective, or by some other name.

In considering the mechanical cause of ulcer Dr. I. Pines in Medical Clinic, Berlin, directs attention to curvatures of the spine which cause pressure on certain parts of the stomach and thereby lead to the development of ulcers.

To make lace look new, squeeze in hot, soapy water, then in cold water, and then in milk to stiffen it. Press on the wrong side with a fairly hot iron.

Cox, State Health 250 billion cubic feet a year-almost as much as the nation's total household consumption of natural gas, which is spread over 35 states. Vigorous conservation efforts in the last few years have resulted in greatly curtailing gas wastage in the several processes for recovering this paradoxically precious "soot", and state university chemists are working on further refinements, the Council's report said.

Expansion of the carbon black industry in the Lone Star state, aided by technical improvements in packaging and handling, and making of specialized types of black for specific uses, is expected to continue augmentating the states growing industrial payroll. Popular recognition that such expansion and improvements depend largely on an aggressively friendly state attitude toward industries is becoming widely manifest, the report said.

Although in a sense carbon black is "just soot" chemical science has been unable to produce anything that will do the job it does in a number of industrial operations, most importantly that of rubber compounding. To a large extent the discoverey after the World war, of its unique qualities is making rubber hard and wear-resistant, has been responsible for the phenomenally greater milage modern auto tires yield compared to those of 20 years ago.

Inks and paints, stove and shoe polishes, phonographs records, insulators, buttons, mortars, crayons and plastics use virtually all the carbon black not taken by the rub ber industry. It is believed its cheap availability will induce development of many of these industries in Tex

Texas has risen rapidly in its dom inance in carbon black manufacture, since the Lone Star state did not figure at all in production of this commodity until 1923. The Panhandle district-Carson, Gray, Hutchinson and Wheeler counties produces 95 percent of the state's annual total of 275 million pounds the rest being made in the Breckenridge district Eastland and Breck enridge counties. Louisjana accounts for nearly all if the rest of the United States production, Ok lahoma and Wyoming having a neg ligible share.

Most of the world's requirements of this "intentional soot" which now can be had in tiny pellets that won't even soil one's hands-are supplied by the United States, with exports running around 37 percent of the national production total. The Galveston port clears 50 per cent of these exports, New Orleans about 31 percent. England, France Germany, Canada and Austtralia ire the leading foreign customers.

Houston, Texas, March 11 The Texas Highway Department is awaiting rules and regulations from the Federal Bureau of Public Roads that will serve as feeders to the primary highway system, according to Charles E. Simmons, associate editor of the Texas Parade, official organ of the Texas Good Roads Association. Mr Simmons' article which is entitled, "State - Federal Projects to improve Lateral roads", appears in the March issue of the magazine, just from the press.

"Under the terms of the last Hayden-Cartwright federal highway appropriation bill, the national government has granted Texas \$1,591,552 for expenditure during eahc of the next two years on roads that are not on the state highway system." writes Mr. Simmons. "To take advantage of this extraordinary appropriation, however, Texas must put up a similar amount making a grand total that will be expended, if Highway Department finances are left undis turbed, of \$6,366,088 that will be used in improvement of the lateral road system.

"In Addition to the amount speifically allocated to lateral road betterment the counties may also share in -2,724,825 appropriated to Texas by the federal government for the elimination of dangerous railroad grade crossings."

Mr. Simmons believes that a dis cussion of the lateral road program is especially appropriate at this time in view of the fact that many bills are pending in the legislature, which, if enacted, might jeaporize the special feeder road program and in addition prevent Texas from taking full advantage of the regular federal aid of \$7,957,610 that has been granted during each

"Untimely legislation now pending in Texas, if passed, would work an irreparable hardship on the Texas motorist. One example of this type of legislation is seen in House Bill 363 which would divert \$4,180,000 annually from the highway fund to a county lateral

Officially certified figures show that this diversion would make it impossible for Texas to carry on its maintenance operations, finance the highway patrol, meet overhead expenses and match regular and emergency federal aid. The calculation discloses that by March 10, 1939, if this bill were passed, the highway fund would be in the red -3,050,000, while by the



"Other nations should not take it lightly that we stretch out our hands n conciliation," says the war minister in an address quite patently intended for foreign ears.

Dispatches hint that before long Der Fuehrer will be transported to a mystic valhalla in a chariot of fire, there to remain as a symbol while some less febrile citizen takes care of mundane affairs. That will be the intellectual, cultured, but not monocled, General von Blomberg, according to news from the watch towers over seas.

In the endlessly repeated story of the praetorian aftermath of war and revolution, he and his allies have the army. Furthermore, he is more capable of rationalizing Germany and her needs in foreign relationships than the Gilbert and Sullivan Goering, the inept von Ribbentrop or the intellectual rubberman Ros-

This writer has a friend, a former American journalist once stationed at Berlin and now engaged in commercial enterprise in Europe, who sees in the German junkers, to which class General von Blomberg belongs, the only hope Germany has for rehabilitation without war. FATS' RELATION TO DAILY DIET

They Supply Fuel Needed for Our Body Activities.

By EDITH M. BARBER

A MONG the foods which supply us with fuel for our body activities are fats which are known as concentrated foods. Although fats contain the same elements, carbon, hydrogen and oxygen, that are found in starches and sugars, the proportion of the first two is much larger. When they are burned by the body they produce two and a quarter times as much heat as do the other so-called fuel foods.

Fats differ in degrees of hardness. Liquid fats, such as olive, cottonseed, coconut and corn, are known as vegetable oils. From animal sources are produced fats from the livers such as cod and haliver oil. Besides these we have milk fat which is known as cream and which in its solidified form is called butter. From the adipose tissue of animals hard fats are obtained. The one most used in cooking and which is obtained from hogs is known as lard. Vegetable oils are often solidified by being treated with hydrogen in order to produce products which are known as hardened shortenings under various commercial trade names.

All of these fats and oils supply the same food value. Their digestibility, however, varies. The lower the melting point the less loss there is in digestion. Fats play an important part in the well-rounded diet, as they seem to act as regulators for the passage of food through the stomach. Contrary to the general opinion, there is no advantage in having food pass too quickly through the stomach. It should stay there long enough to be acted upon by the digestive juices in this portion of the alimentary canal. When, however, other foods are fried in fat, especially to the saturation point, digestion may be delayed too long on account of the coating of fat. For this reason fried foods should not have too large a place in the diet.



According to C. J. Sweeney, Administrator for the Texas Relief Commission in Abilene, word has been received that there will be an enrollment the first part of April for youths for CCC camps.

"The same requirements for eligibility as formerly are in force, i e., the applicant must be from a family receiving assistance form the government agency, and between the ages of 17 and 29, and able to pass a physical examination". Mr. Sweeny further stated. "Actual quotas have not been established, and will not be until an accurate estimate can be made of the number of boys available. Con sequently all those who desire to go at the next enrollment should immediately call at their county welfare office and make applica-

Those boys who apply themselves will receive promotions and increase in pay that will be more than they would be able to earn in private employment.
