

### F. C. Brasher **Fatally Burned**

On July 17, 1959, Mr. F. C. Brasher was fatally injured in an explosion that resulted in third degree burns to his body. He was watermaster at a pumping plant of the Tulelake Irrigation District in Klamath Falls, Oregon.

He was seriously burned about 9:00 a. m. when an electrical control panel exploded. With his clothes afire he raced out of the building and plunged into a canciation for many years. They live al. He was seen by a wife of one of the workers who summoned help. He wa staken to the Klamath Valley Hospital where he died about 11:50 p. m.

Mr. Brasher was so highly respected among his co-workers that they requested his body remain in Klamath so they might honor him with a military service. His home was just over the line at Tule Lake, Calif.

He was born in Snyder, Texas December 16, 1909, making him only 49 years old. He served his country during World War II in Jaycee Carnival Saturday night. England, France and Germany, and received several decorations.

This change was made by USDA over protest from the Southeast and Virginia Shellers.



UNDER A SUPREME COURT RULING IN 1956, should an alien be denied entry into the United States, he could file a lawsuit, claiming the privilege. No such thing was ever heard of in law until the Supreme Court made this decision. This is cured by this bill.

What was Austin and its life like when O. Henry, the future master of the short story, lived

In the issues of the Austin Statesman during January, 1887 (O. Henry was then working in the Land Office), there were such news items as an account of four runaway teams on East Pecan Street in one day with no injury; a fire in the room of a man who after, "a night around" had gone to bed at 6 a. m., cause of the fire which caused \$450 damage, being surmised as an overturned lamp or a lighted cigar; and the acquittal of a man for illing a dog.

In one issue, the reader was told of the escape of a prisoner from the chain-gang, the breaking out of a "calaboose" by another and an announcement of a meeting of the Austin Grays-(a drill unit of which O. Henry was a member).

Also the public was advised that Fritz Hartkopf of the Opera House Club will serve his customers bear meat at lunch today."

The editor indignantly commented, "So far as the Statesmen is aware, the Austin postoffice is the only one which keeps the doors of its main entrance locked more than twothirds of the time. It is an inconvenience to the people which should be remedied."

O. Henry himself gives us a glimpse of Austin's appearance in his magazine, "Rolling Stone",-August 25, 1894—(the governor at that time being James Stephen Hogg). The capitol grounds, O. Henry wrote, "are scarcely more than Hogg wallow prairie, and a wilderness of weeds, rubbish, holes, and sunflower forests."




