Cubs Journey To Cisco Tonight For Opening Game

The Gorman Grade School Cub football team will journey to Cisco tonight, Thursday, for a 7:30 engagement with the Cisco Jr. High School Midgets.

This Cisco Jr. High was the last team to defeat the Gorman team doing so 32-6 the second game of the 1957 season. Last year Gorman triumphed 8-0.

The Cubs have only four starters available from last season. Bobby Rodgers, a center last year, is now an end, Richard Watson, a guard last year, is playing center. Billy Welch is at tackle and Gary Overstreet is back at a halfback slot. Roger Woodall was a starter last season but is out because of illness. His place in the offensive lineup will be taken by Tommy Broom or Jim Rodgers, who is expected to show a great deal of strength on defense. Larry Newton will also join the defensive starting lineup.

The strength of the Cisco team is not known but could be trouble for the Cubs because of the shortage of experience on the Cub squad.

The Cubs will be seeking their 17th consecutive win.

Probably most of you know that their has been some street-paving done in Out Town and plans are in the making for more.

It would be nice to have them all done but that will take time and money and planning, so some of you will have to put up with a lot more dust for awhile.

The paving that has been done includes Fisher St. from Hwy. 6 to Rogan, 4 blocks; Rogan St. from FM 8 to Winkler St., 3 blocks; Hamilton St. from FM 8 to Fisher St., 1 block; Winkler St. from Hwy. 6 to Houston St., 2 blocks. 10 blocks finished plus those terrible "chug holes" at the corner just before entering the school yard.

We can be very proud of our Fire Dept. Only last year about this time a new fire truck was purchased that gave us more protection and was instrumental in lowering our insurance rates. So we are lucky in that respect.

I am going to give you a recipe that was sent in too late for publication last week. It was sent in by Mrs. L. L. Dukes, Sr., Rt. 1, Gorman. Here it is:

PEAR SWEET PICKLES

Have you misplaced your sweet pickle recipe. With pears so fine and so cheap, make pear sweet pickles. Here is the recipe.

Use 23 to 32 medium size pears. This will fill a Presto cooker. To each pear add one clove or less if you prefer. To this amount add 2 cups sugar and 1/2 cup white vinegar. Process 15 minutes at 15 pounds pressure. Can in the usual manner.

For variety select ripe pears. Cut in 1/2 in. cubes. Sweeten to taste. When almost done add red food coloring. Next batch add green coloring. These are not only taste tempting but will add color to your fruit salad and would make wonderful Christmas gifts.

Have you tried making your pear preserves by cooking in a very small amount of water until tender. Then adding sugar 1/3 at a time, boiling rapidly a few minutes after each addition. You will be surprised at how quickly they will make and what bright preserves you have.

Contract Awarded For FM Road 2563

A contract for 7.8 miles of construction on FM Road 2563 in Eastland County has been awarded to a Stephenville firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

C. C. Booth submitted the low bid of \$113,396 on the project. Construction of grading, structures, base, and surfacing, from State Highway 6 in Punkin Center, east to the road intersection is expected to take 80 working days, according to Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

Gordon L. Smith, Resident Engineer at Eastland, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

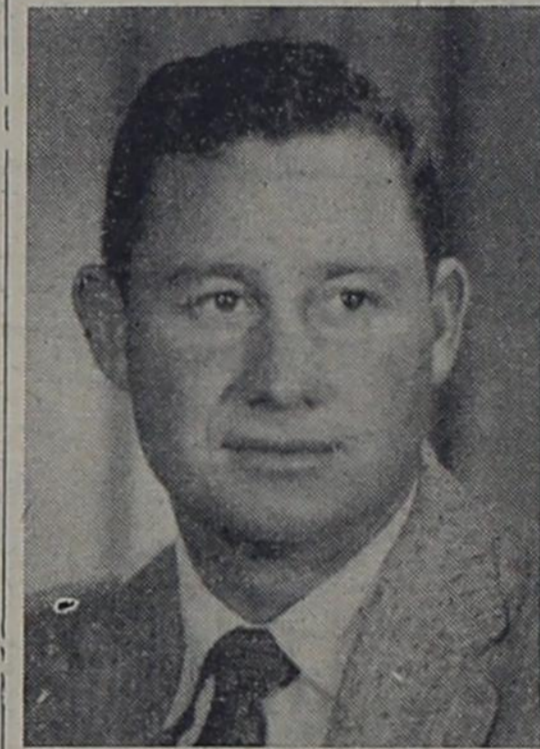

Hoegh Says Every Family Needs A Fallout Shelter

Civil and Defense Mobilization Director Leo A. Hoegh says "everyone, even those far from a likely target, would need shel-

ter from fallout" in the event of an enemy attack.

In the introduction to "The Family Fallout Shelter," a publication of the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, Mr. Hoegh says: "In an atomic war, blast, heat and initial radiation could kill millions close to ground zero of nuclear bursts. Many more millions—everybody else—could be threatened by radioactive fallout. But most of these could be saved."

Mr. Hoegh pointed out that the Federal shelter policy is based on the knowledge that most of those beyond the range of blast and heat will survive if they have adequate protection from fallout.

The OCDM booklet contains building plans for five basic fallout shelters. One is a do-it-yourself project with solid concrete blocks. Cost of the shelters ranges from \$150 to \$1500.

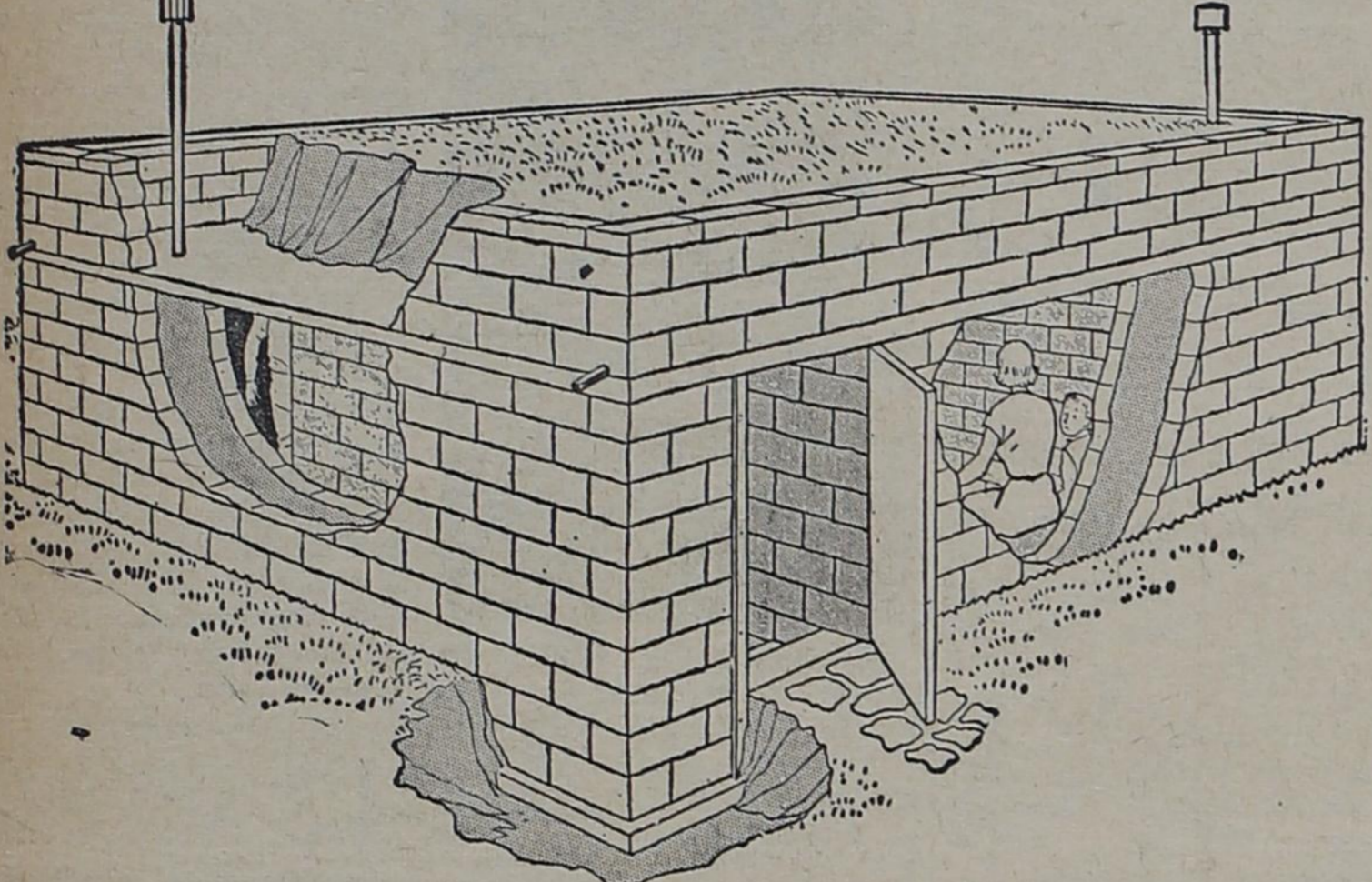

ABOVEGROUND DOUBLE-WALL SHELTER

For Family Protection From Radioactive Fallout



AN OUTDOOR aboveground fallout shelter may be built of concrete blocks. It is recommended for houses without basements or for regions where water or rock is close to the surface, making it impractical to build an underground shelter. Two walls of concrete blocks are constructed at least 20 inches apart. The space between is filled with gravel or earth. The walls are held together

with metal ties placed in wet mortar as the walls are built. The roof is a six-inch slab of reinforced concrete, covered with at least 20 inches of gravel or earth. Most people would have to hire a contractor to build this shelter. Plans appear in the OCDM 32-page booklet, "The Family Fallout Shelter." 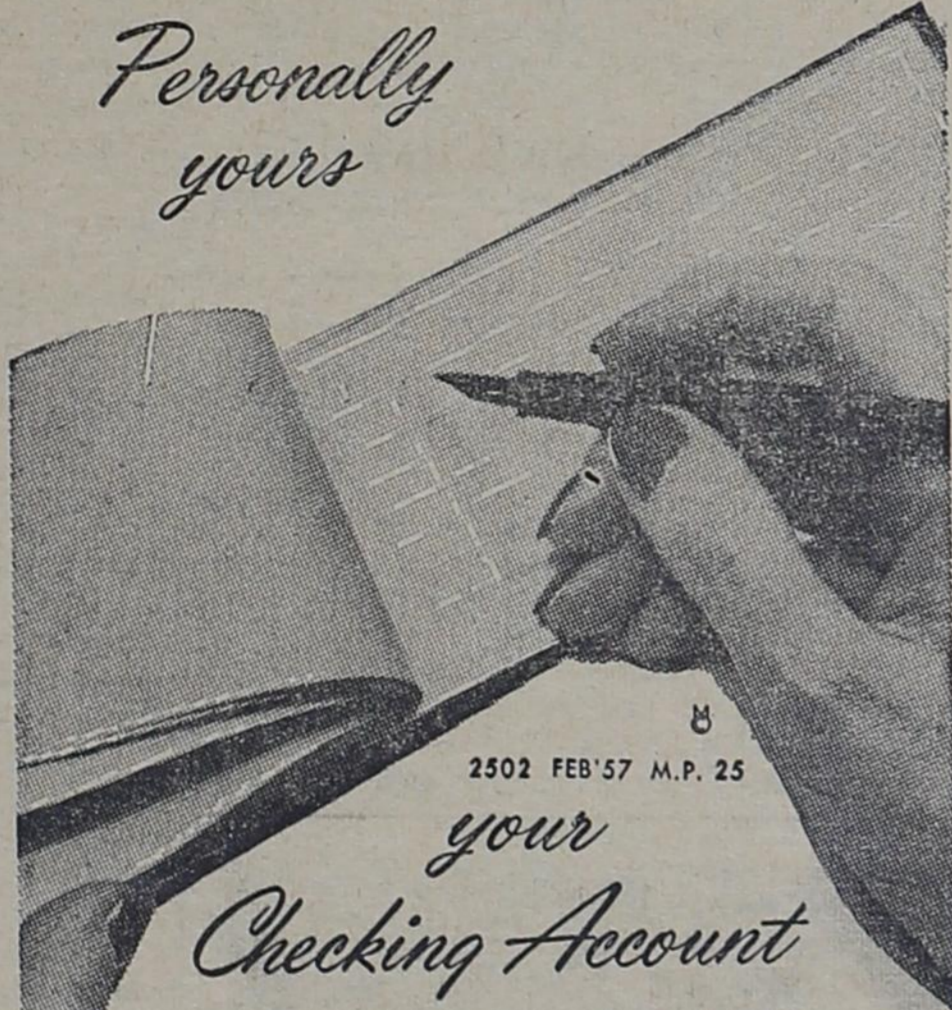

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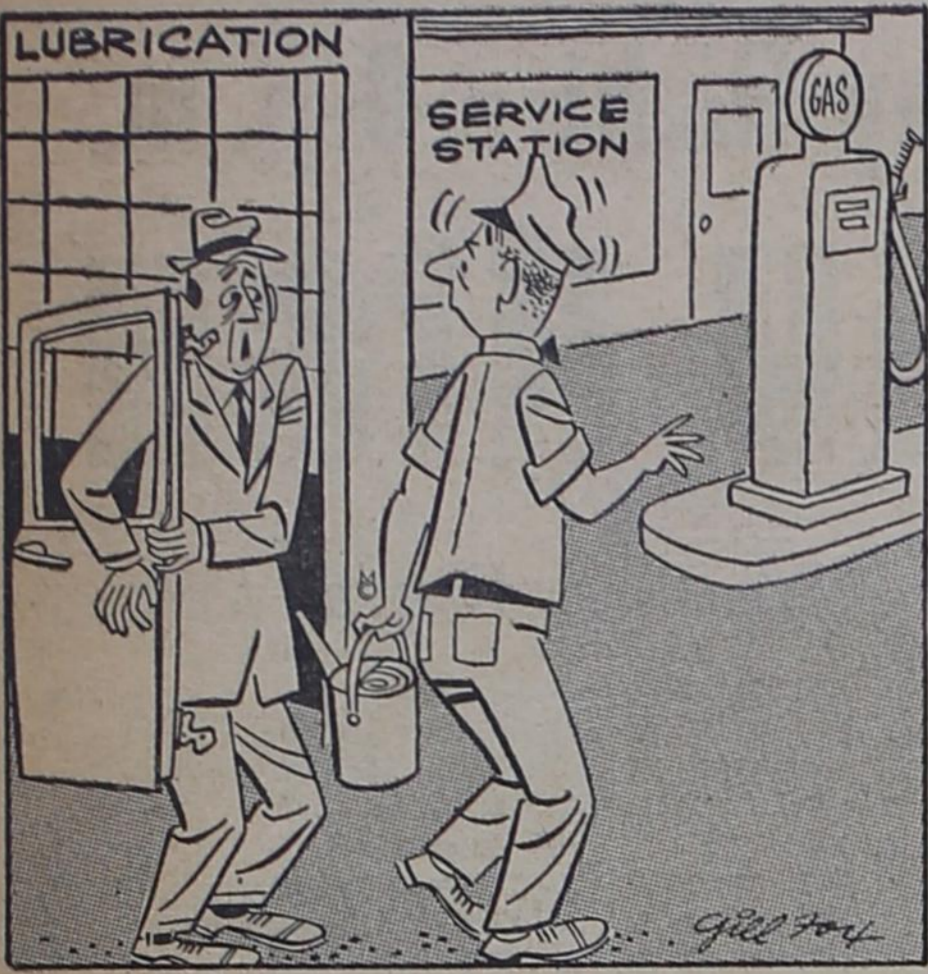
