Mr. Woodall was born February 14, 1907 in Comanche County and passed away on Friday, Oct. 23, 1959 in the Blackwell Hospital. He was 52 years, 8 months and 9 days old.

It was on October 13, 1929 that he was married to Miss Ida Shugart in Eastland. The couple moved to Gorman where they spent their lives together. Mr. Woodall worked for the Gorman Peanut Company for 19 years.

He was affiliated with the Pentecost Church.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Richard of Austin and Donald Ray of Houston; and two granddaughters.

Interment was in the Simpson Cemetery at Kokomo.

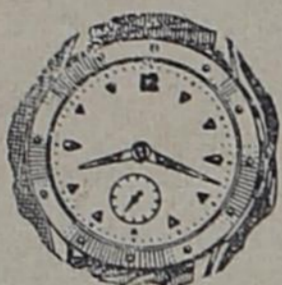

During the business of policy development, several resolutions were presented:

No. 1 - that cotton allotments be simplified by the Dept. of Ag.
No. 2 - that we endorse 1958 Texas Farm Bureau policy regarding Education.

No. 3 - that we endorse Texas Farm Bureau policy in regard to changing the insurance laws of Texas to a uniform flexible rate.

No. 4 - that the State Gas Tax Refund be made the same as the Federal Tax Refund, from July to July.

Bill Hoover, Editor of Texas Agriculture, the State Farm Bureau organ, spoke briefly of policy development after it comes from the county level, and is presented at the annual meeting from policy committees and sub-committees. In his talk he said, "Farm Bureau is not a poll-taking organization. Its policies come from the ideas and suggestions of the Farm Bureau members in counties and communities over the state. In this way the combined efforts of Farm Bureau members have a strong influence over the agricultural economy of the Nation."

- 1 cup evaporated milk
- Orange sections
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger

- 1 - 1 lb. can pumpkin
- 1/2 cup sugar

Mix gelatine, 1/2 cup sugar, salt and spices in a saucepan. Blend in egg yolks and orange rind. Add evaporated milk; blend thoroughly. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened (about 10-15 minutes). Chill until mixture just begins to set and barely cool.

Stir in pumpkin. Beat egg whites until stiff. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar, continue to beat until stiff and glossy. Fold into pumpkin mixture. Turn into baked pie shell and chill until set, 2 to 3 hours. Garnish with orange sections.
I made one and it was um-m, so good.

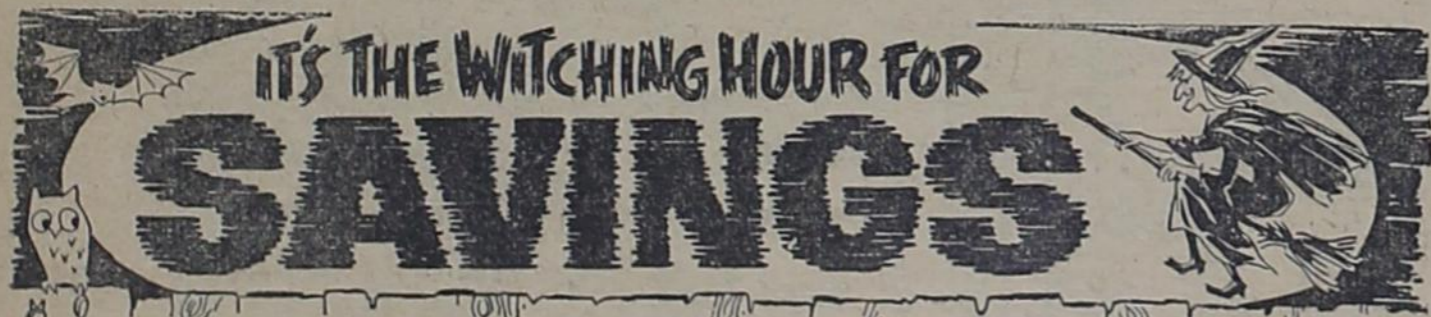
