Cubs Beat Hamilton 26-8 To Tie For District Title

The Gorman Grade School Cubs won over Hamilton 26-8 to tie De Leon for the district title. The Gorman and De Leon teams will be declared Co-Champions of the district and identical trophies will be purchased for each school.

The victory over Hamilton brought the Cubs record to 25 wins without a loss with only the tie with De Leon marring a perfect record.

The first Gorman tally came on a pass play from Gary Overstreet to End Bobby Rodgers for 79 yards. Overstreet ran for the next score from 33 yards out with Don Wallace adding the extra points.

Wallace picked up the next two touchdowns on runs of 15 yards and 1 yard.

The blocking of Jim Rodgers and William Jay, along with the entire line, were satisfactory with their blocking.

David Harrison, along with the other linemen, were outstanding on defense.

The Cubs will host the Eastland Jr. High team at Brogdon Field today, Thursday at 4 p. m.

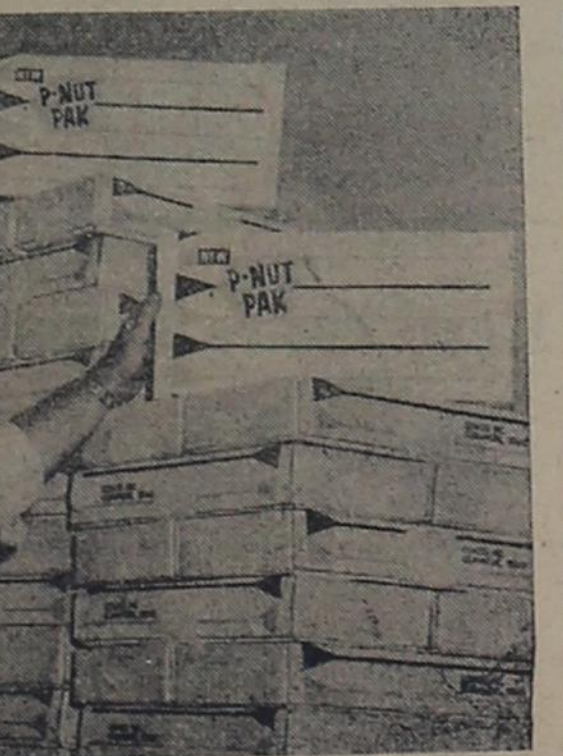

AMARILLO - Nov. 4 - The Board of Directors of Pioneer Natural Gas Company today declared a dividend of 40 cents per share on the outstanding common stock, payable December 4, 1959 to stockholders of record at the close of business on November 20, 1959.

The net income (unaudited) of Pioneer Natural Gas Company and Subsidiaries for the nine months ended September 30, 1959 was \$3,648,782, compared with \$2,696,384 as adjusted for the comparable period of 1958. This amounted to \$2.20 per share on the common stock compared to \$1.64 per share for the prior period, both based upon the common shares outstanding at the end of the respective periods.

An interim report will be mailed to the stockholders shortly.

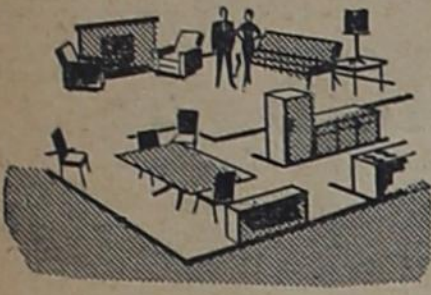

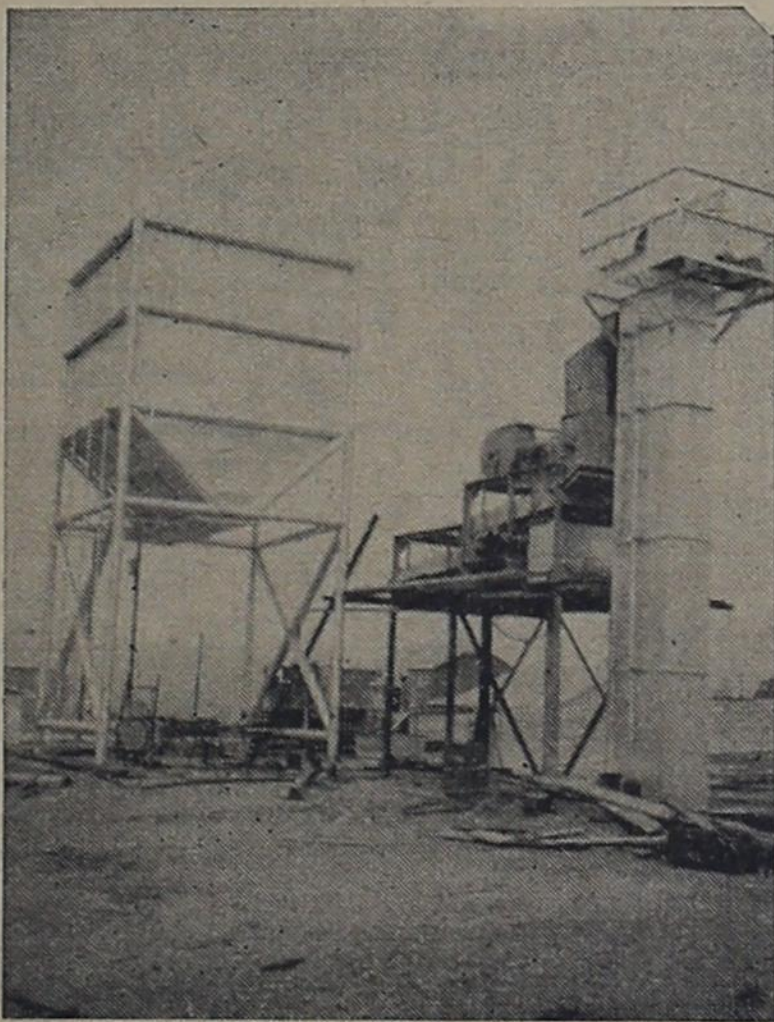

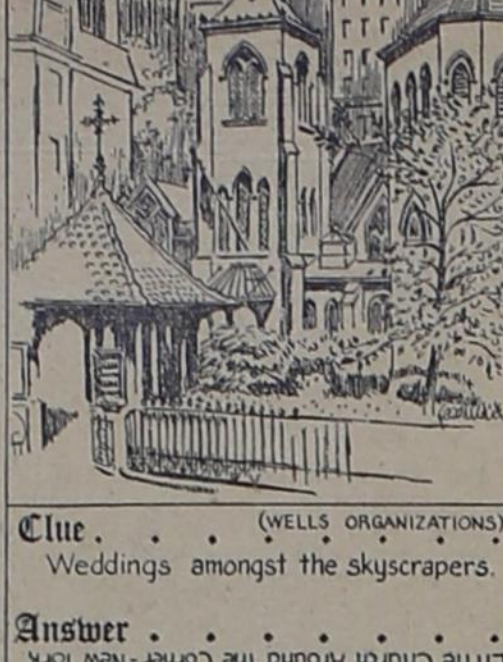

Patrons receiving livestock cards are requested to complete and return them to their mail box. Cards will then be returned to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. Information from this survey is used in estimating numbers of cattle, hogs, sheep and chickens on Texas farms and ranches.

Many farmers and ranchers are glad to take a few minutes time to answer the questions asked on livestock numbers in order to have information available for making business decisions. Information obtained from this survey is returned to farmers and ranchers through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, radio and television.

This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the Post Office and the Department of Agriculture since 1924, concluded Mr. Baze.
