

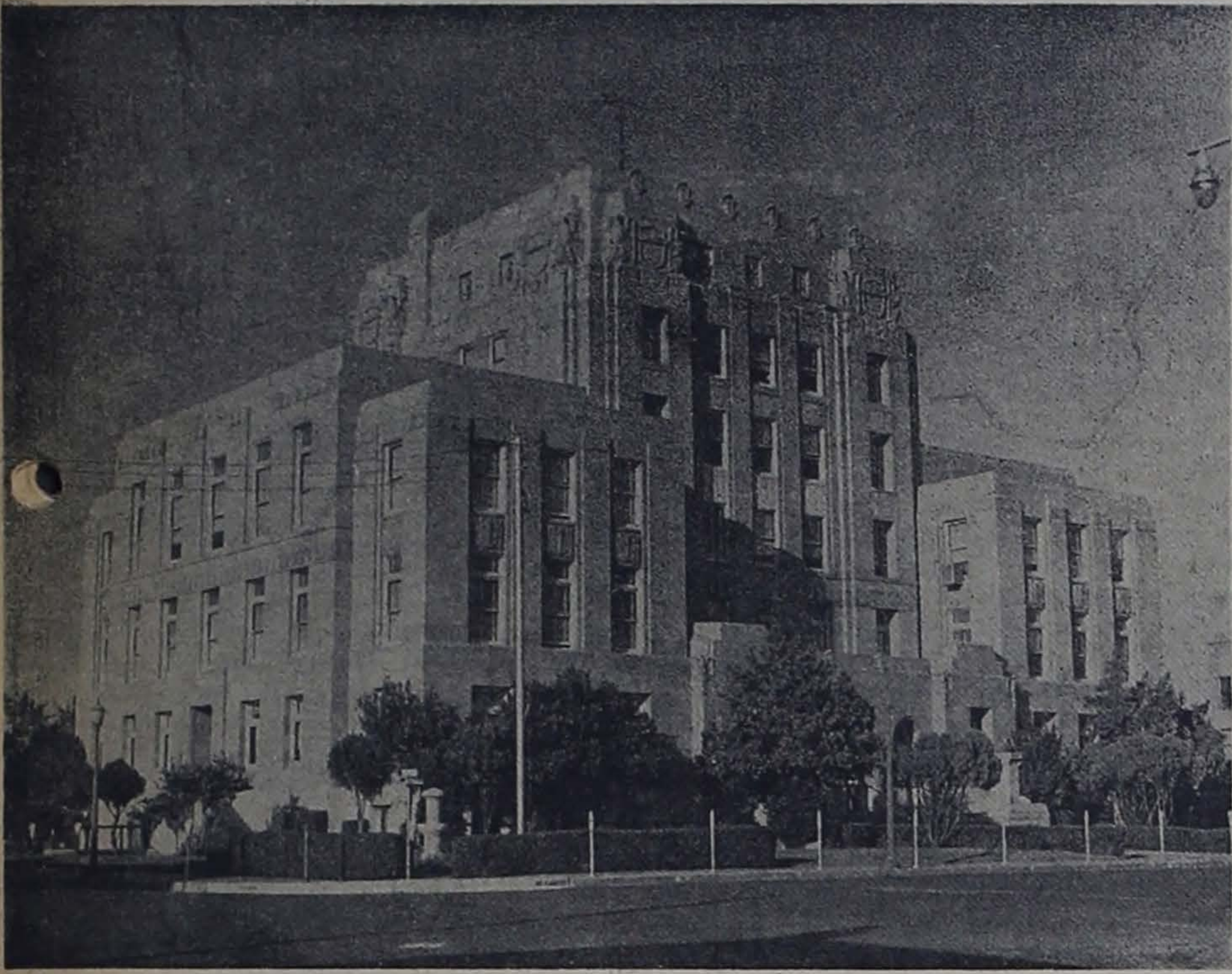

**THE PRIDE OF EASTLAND COUNTY** — The above engraving of the Eastland County Court House was loaned to B. M. Bennett, County Commissioner, by "The County Progress" of Brownwood, which is the official publication of County Judges and Commissioners' Association of Texas. An engineer stated recently that it would cost at least \$1,250,000 to replace the five-story brick and stone court house at present day prices. The original cost of the building was \$313,298.

The courthouse is dedicated to the Eastland County men who served in World War I. A bronze plaque, listing 761 names of these men, is the focal point of the lobby, which also displays "Old

Rip", the horned frog which spent 30 years in the corner stone of the 1897 structure and lived to tell the world about it. The frog is displayed in a miniature coffin inside a glass case and is a draw-

ing card for tourists. There are many in Eastland County who vouch for the truth of the story. Boyce House, noted author of Tall Tales of Texas, has written many stories of Old Rip and will vouch for its authenticity.

## Commissioner Praises County Citizens



**B. M. BENNETT**, County Commissioner of Precinct Two, visited the Progress office Tuesday and was telling about how he operated a linotype for J. W. Cockrill.

During the conversation Bennett said, "Eastland County is a good organization to work for. It has furnished me employment for the past eight years. I believe all public officials should bring before their constituents a report of both the success and failures they have made during their term of office."

"With the help of the County Judge, County Auditor and the other three commissioners, I have had a successful term of office financially. I took my oath of office on January 1, 1953 and we have never asked or called for a bond election. In every walk of life one makes a record; after it is made you can't alter it. I would appreciate the Progress publishing my financial record."

"The first day of January, 1953, Eastland County taxpayers owed \$492,550. As of October 1, 1960 the indebtedness was \$138,000. As you can see we have reduced the debt \$354,550 without any tax suits."

"Now let's take a look at the farm and ranch land. We have a scale of \$4.50 per acre on pasture land and \$9.00 per acre on cultivated land. This rate was set during the dark days of the depression. On these farms you will notice from \$5,000 to \$20,000 improvements and they are still on the tax roll at \$4.50 to \$9.00 per acre."

"Where I have failed in my work is by not holding the friendship of a few where the many farm-to-market roads were located. The roads getting bad, almost impassable, in a long stretch of bad weather; the labor I hire, the products, vehicles and machinery I use. Then most of all the question of taxes during the board of equalization. This is one thing I am proud to discuss."

"Eastland County has a tax rate of 80 cents per \$100. Only 17 counties in the state of Texas have a lower tax rate than Eastland County. We figure and try to maintain 20 percent of the real value instead of 100 percent as some counties do."

## Area Growers Urged To Enter County Pecan Show

Pecan growers from adjoining counties are invited and urged to bring or send entries to the eighth annual Eastland County Pecan Show, Cisco, December 14th and 15th according to Sam Kimmell, President of the Chamber of Commerce, whose organization is cooperating with the county pecan growers in sponsoring the annual affair.

The show will be held in the Rawson building, same site as the 1959 show, it was said.

A quart of pecans constitutes an entry according to Hank Sims, Eastland, president of the growers group. Entries must be in by 9 a. m. on the 14th. They may be left at either the Cisco or the Ranger Chambers of Commerce office in those two towns or in the county agents office in Eastland prior to this date, however.

Nuts entered must have been grown in 1960 by the person exhibiting them. All first place entries will be sent to A&M College for the state show. Growers are limited to one entry of the improved or papershell varieties but there is no limit on the number of native seedling entries he may show.

H. G. Hancock, Horticulturist from the A&M College Extension Service will again head a judging team that will begin work, on the large number of entries expected, shortly after noon on the 14th of December. Completion of the judging will likely not be until mid-afternoon on the 15th. The show has been rated as the largest in the state.

Varieties of nuts with less than three entries will be judged and ribbons and cash premiums awarded. Those with three or more entries will receive both cash and ribbons. Those wishing a copy of the rules and regulations may obtain one from Ben McKinis, Secretary-Treasurer, Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, Eastland, Texas.

There will be more entries of the Burkett than any other variety of nuts it was explained.

### JANET TRACY DOWD RECEIVES ROYAL WELCOME AT CHURCH

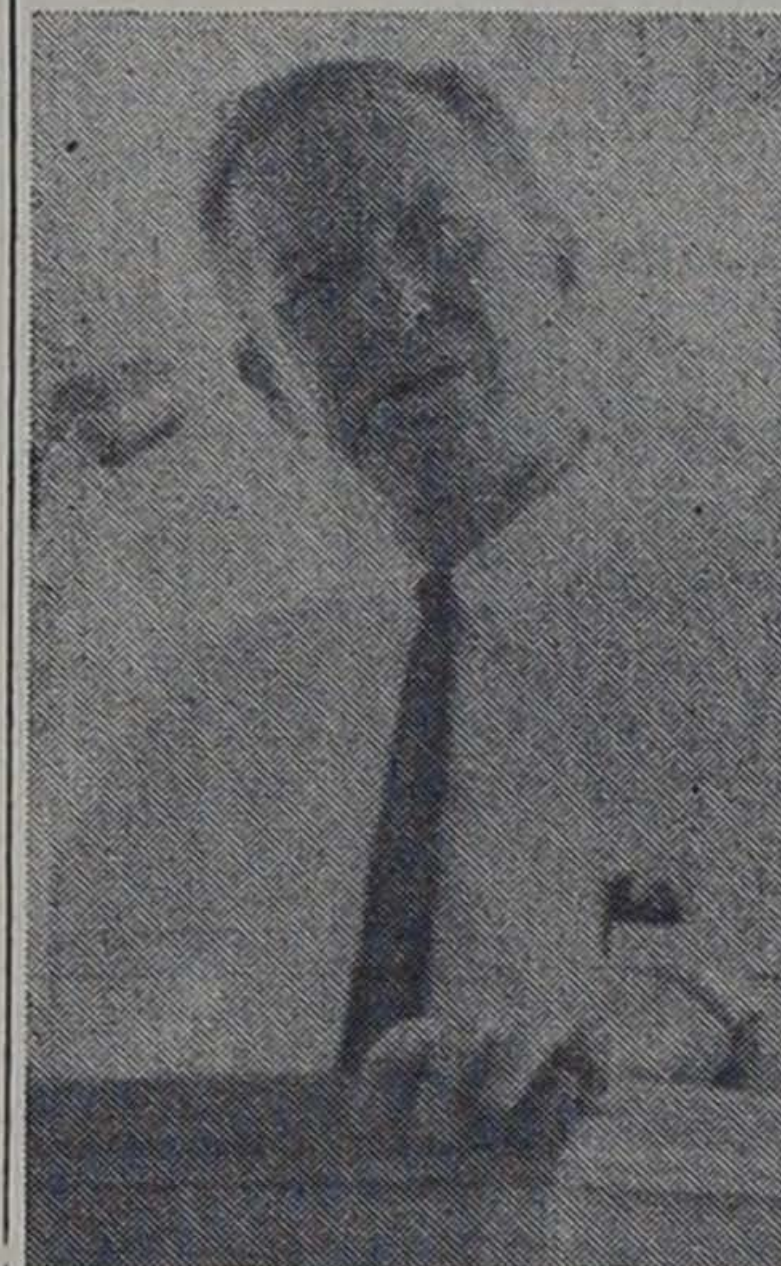

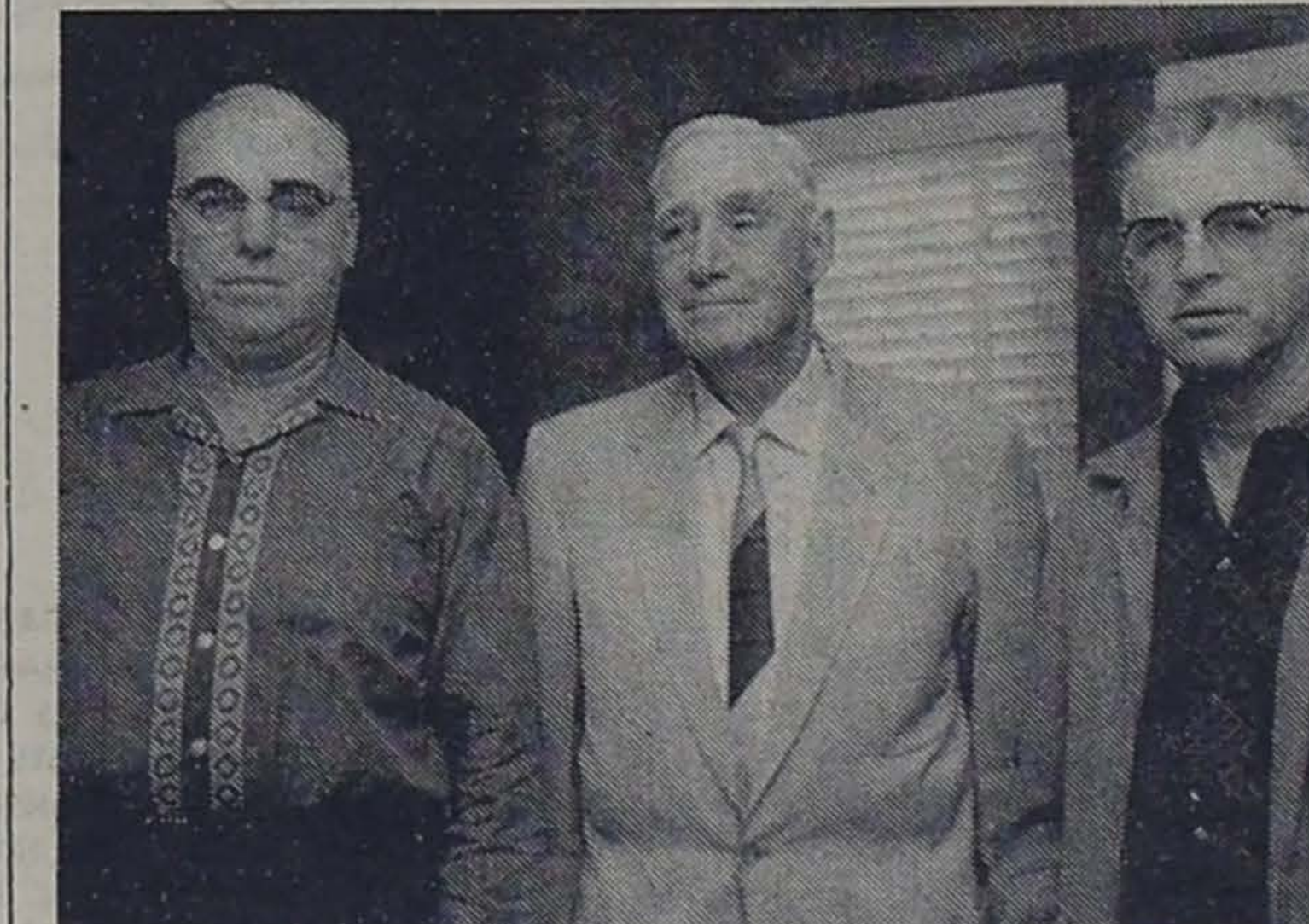

## SHELL BROS. SHELL PEANUTS 20 YEARS AT GORMAN PLANT

Early in September Melvin and Wilbur Shell, brothers and owners of the Gorman Peanut Company, marked without fanfare 20 years of successful business in the peanut industry. With the coming of September 1st, the 1960 harvest, (85% of the 1958 bumper crop), was on and the Shells had begun their 21st year of shelling.

Forty extras employed for the 3-month buying season, now 99% complete, raised area employees to eighty. Average run has approximated 100 tons, trucked in from four counties. The season's estimate of 15,000 tons shows the increase from the 150 tons processed in the shellers initial year, 1940.

O. T. Shell, a machinist, and his two sons began the sheller operation in a small brick building adjoining his machine shop in the downtown section. In 1943 the plant was moved to a location covering about 2 blocks and divided by the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railway. Three years later the sons became sole owners. More recently a corporation was

formed with members of the brothers' families owning all stock.

A 20-bin dryer, blue-printed by the Shells, was installed for the 1960-61 operation. The dryer allows emergency harvest of wet peanuts and keeps the farmer's spoilage at a low per cent. Electronic controls to be installed will increase the dryer's effectiveness.

Peanuts grown in this area, like most grown in other parts of Texas are Spanish type and are used for food consumption. The Gorman Peanut Company ships most of the peanuts processed to firms in Lexington, Kentucky; Chicago; San Francisco; Alameda, California; Kansas City and Dallas. Only damaged peanuts are sold for oil.

According to Mr. Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Orville Barnett and Royal Hampton are reported to have had the highest area production for 1960 with an approximate 50 bushel to the acre. Among other large producers are D. B. Warren and Edgar Higginbottom.

### SURVIVORS OF PRE-1940 DEATHS MAY NOW GET SOCIAL SECURITY CASH

Social Security benefits may now be paid to survivors of workers who died before January 1, 1940, if the worker had at least a year and a half of social security work after January 1, 1937, when he died, says H. W. Weatherly, Field Representative for this county for the Social Security Administration.

Before the social security amendments of 1960, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of a worker who died before 1940.

Under the new law, if a worker had social security credit for at least a year and a half, benefits may now be payable to his widow (and dependent mother) if age 62 or older, to his dependent father at age 65, and to his disabled children if they became

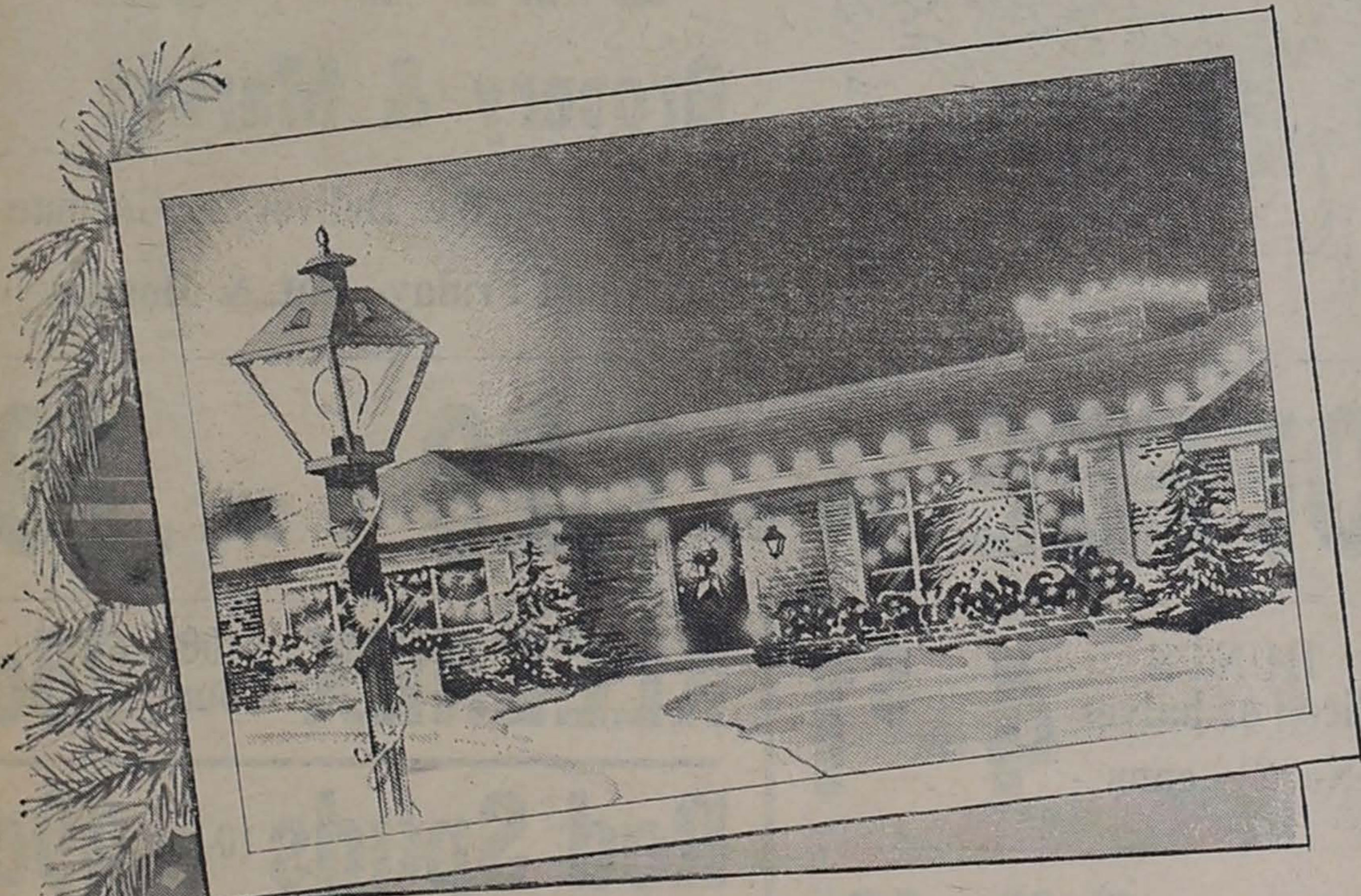

### DURABLE WOODS

There are many misconceptions about the durability of wood. Any wood exposed to conditions suitable for fungus growth will eventually decay. No wood will decay if it is adequately protected from fungus attack. However, some woods are more durable than others.

Wood cut from dead trees is just as durable as wood cut from living trees of the same species. Also, the season of year during which a tree is cut also has no direct effect on its durability or other properties. Similarly, the geographical region from which a tree is obtained bears no relation to its decay resistance. It is the conditions of use which affect durability.

Some of the naturally durable wood species commonly grown in Texas include black locust, bois d'arc, catalpa, cedar, cypress and juniper. However, only the heartwood of these durable species resist fungus attack. When used in contact with the ground, even these woods may fail, since decay fungi eat away the sapwood in a short time. Thus, only the durable heartwood core remains for support and strength. On the other hand, the sapwood of all our construction species, when properly treated with approved preservatives, can effectively resist decay for at least 30 years.
