Friday, 9 to 12

The State Health Department has scheduled free immunization clinic for March 24th from 9 a. m. to 12 noon in the Gorman High School gym for all pre-school children and all those who have missed them thus far. The clinic is for all preschool age children. To comply with State Law all children entering school must have all shots by 1972-73 school year. The immunization includes diptheria, tetnus, rubella, measles and oral polio.

All parents are urged to get their pre-school children immunized at this time, as the new State Law requires these immunization shots be given before a child can enter school next fall.

The shots are free and will be under the supervision of the State Health Department nurses. -GP-

The Farm Bureau itself is non-partisian and does not endorse any candidate or party. It develops policies on a nonpartisian basis and seeks support for those policies on a






CHAMPION FINE WOOL LAMB - Shown by Mark Eaves. Gorman Young Farmers paid61.75 for this lamb.
