Immunization Clinic Set Here Friday, 9 to 12

The State Health Department has scheduled free immunization clinic for March 24th from 9 a. m. to 12 noon in the Gorman High School gym for all pre-school children and all those who have missed them thus far.

The clinic is for all pre-school age children. To comply with State Law all children entering school must have all shots by 1972-73 school year. The immunization includes diptheria, tetnus, rubella, measles and oral polio.

All parents are urged to get their pre-school children immunized at this time, as the new State Law requires these immunization shots be given before a child can enter school next fall.

The shots are free and will be under the supervision of the State Health Department nurses.

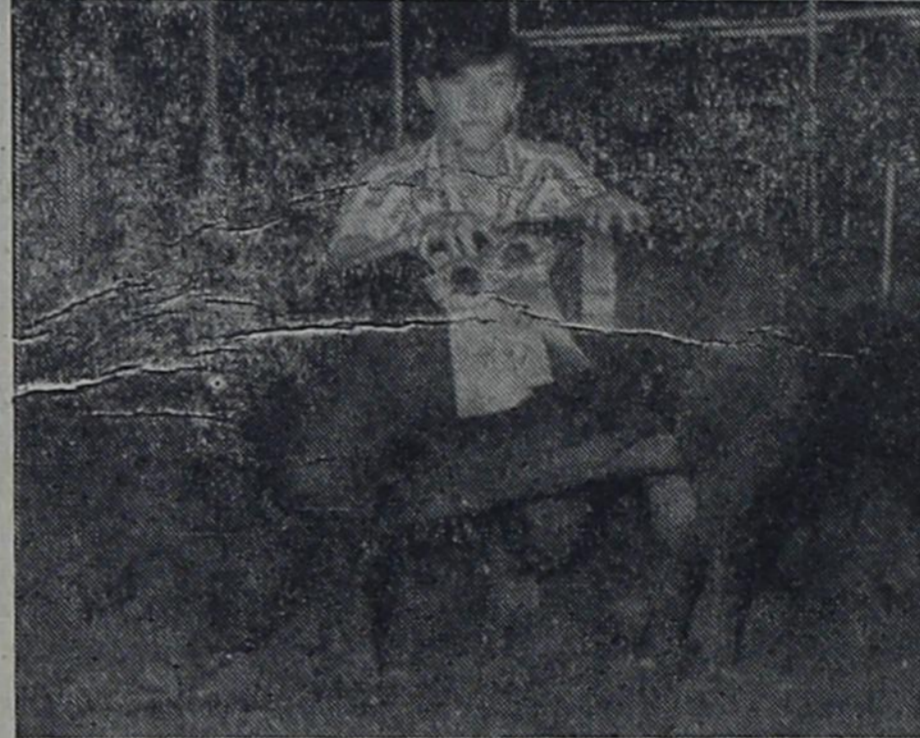

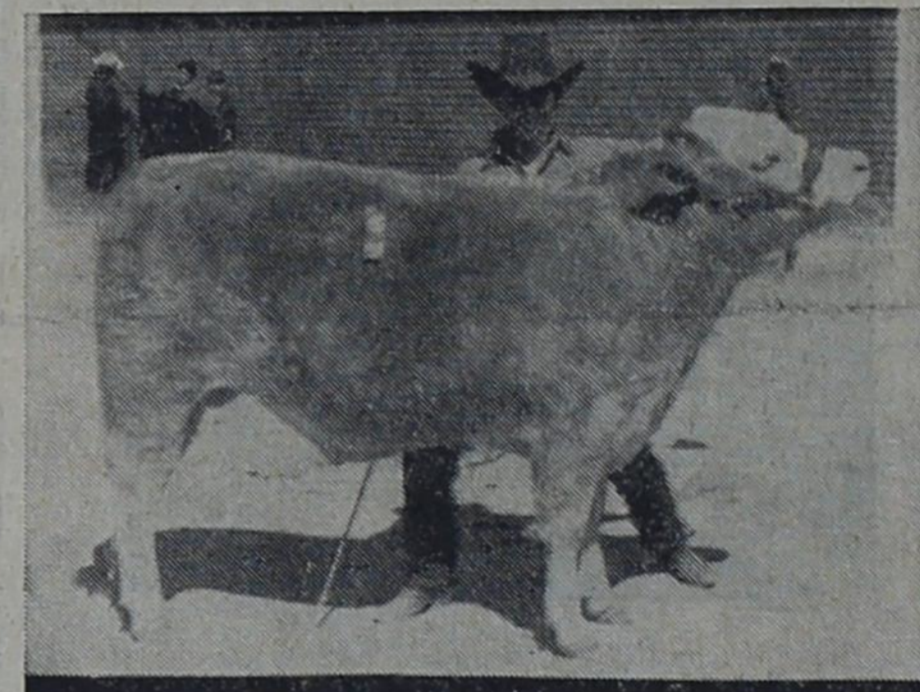
The ladies of the First United Methodist Church will hold a bake sale Friday, March 24 in front of the Post Office beginning at 8:30 a. m.

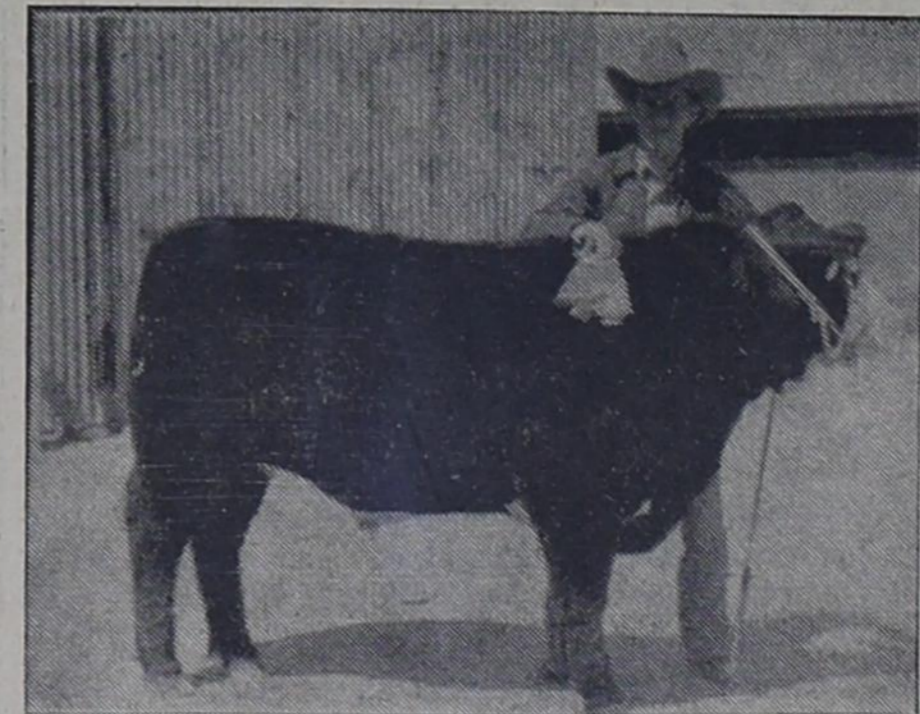

Mrs. C. O. Revels Hosts Woman's Study Club

"The wire that fenced the West" corralled quite a crowd last Monday evening when the Woman's Study Club members and guests gathered in the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Revels. Miss Ozella Pulley called the meeting to order in the spacious den area and welcomed guests Mmes. Charles Morgan and R. M. Higginbottom of De Leon; Mmes. Charles Day and Houston Jolley; Dr. and Mrs. A. E. Pino; and Dr. and Mrs. J. R. Canut, all of Gorman.

Program chairman Mrs. Ray Rankin introduced the first speaker, Mrs. Charles Morgan, with the quote, "The Barbs of Texas." Mrs. Morgan has been "hooked by a barb" and is now a dedicated barbed wire collector. Displaying a small selection from her collection of over five hundred different types, Mrs. Morgan told a bit of history about early fences in the west and of the development of barbed wire. Describing how the barbs were tediously applied by hand in the early days, Mrs. Morgan continued with explanations of the many different types she displayed. Barbed wire collecting has rapidly emerged as a major hobby all across the United States, and Mrs. Morgan's enthusiasm created much interest in the group. Someone just may have gotten hooked.

The second program part, as Mrs. Rankin presented Dr. A. E. Pino, was "just anything about Gorman's medical facilities." Everyone quickly realized that Dr. Pino is equally enthusiastic about what he likes to think of as "The Gorman Community Health Center." Noting how fortunate Gorman is to have the clinic, the hospital, and the nursing home located in close proximity, Dr. Pino stated that such centralizing is a much sought after arrangement in the cities. Dr. Pino continued with descriptions of some of the special services such as physical therapy and inhalation therapy, and of special equipment Gorman is blessed in having. As he continued, his enthusiasm became contagious, and club members began to ask questions. Could there be a hospital auxiliary organization here? Why not a vocational nursing school in Gorman? Surely everyone is proud of our facilities in Gorman, but the pride expanded as Dr. Pino explained more and more of what we really do have. He ended by noting that May

12 marks the date of National Hospital Week, and it is hoped that some special observance can be planned here.

As Mrs. Revels announced refreshment time, questions continued to be directed to both Mrs. Morgan and Dr. Pino. And discussion continued on both subjects, as well as recipes getting involved. The dining table, covered with a beautiful lace cloth, was loaded with delicious food —

pimiento sandwiches, potato chips, two different fruit salads (both very pretty as well as good), chocolate pound cake, lemon pound cake, olives, peanuts and all that, coffee and cold drinks. And lots of it all — second helpings proved it as good as at first believed.

It was a happy, interesting and entertaining evening. Yes, Club does get better and better as the year progresses.



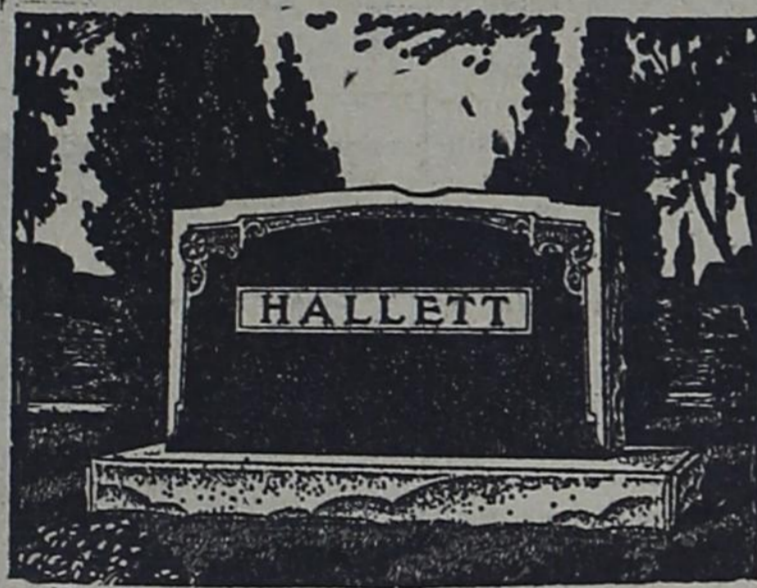

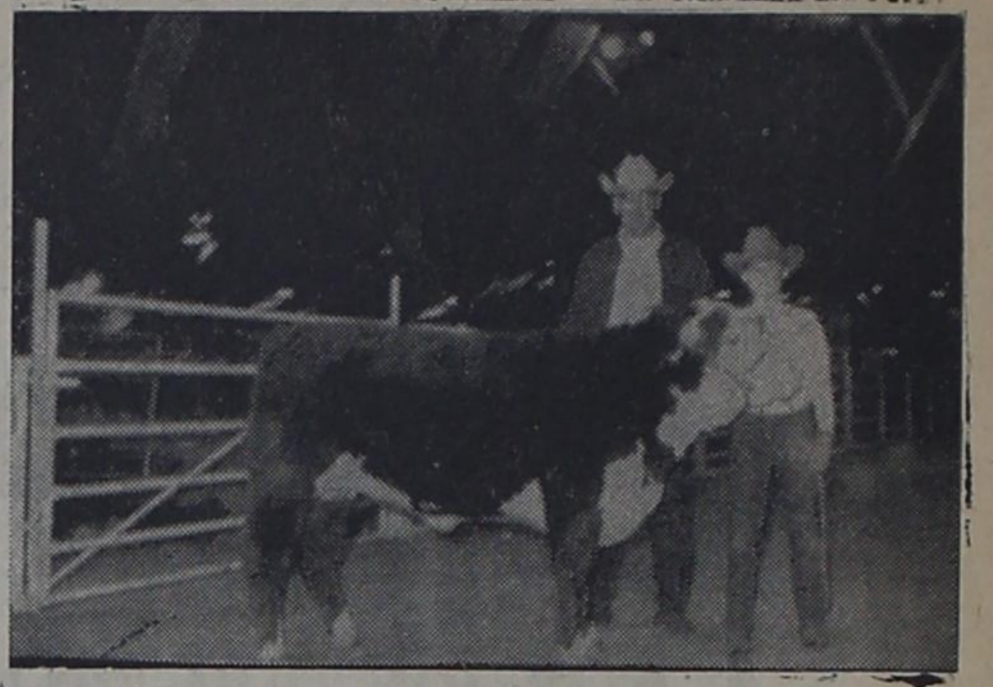

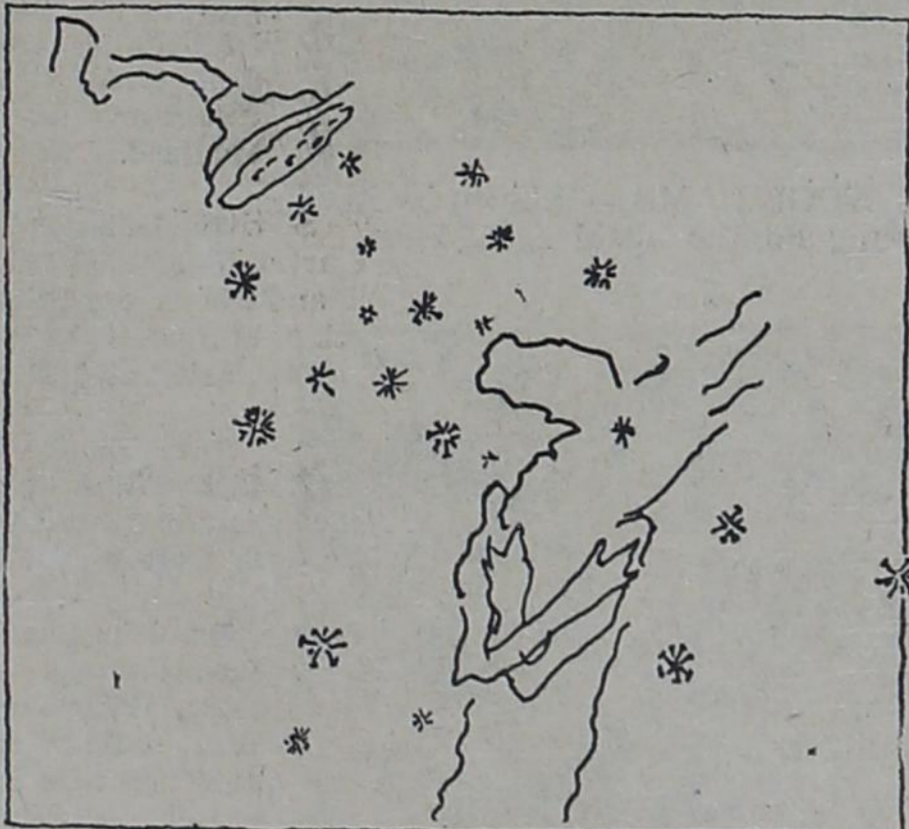

"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THOUSANDS OF YOUNG MEN, the exact number unknown, evaded the Vietnam war illegally and are now living mostly in Canada and Sweden.

SHOULD THEY BE FORGIVEN AND GRANTED AMNESTY? If so, should it apply only to draft resisters or also deserters? Should their forgiveness be tied to certain conditions of atonement or should these young men continue subject to prosecution, which would mean that most would remain in exile?

THESE ARE QUESTIONS THAT TOUCH the raw emotions generated by the war itself. These emotions run the full spectrum from the ennobling of the draft dodger as above the law to the furious portrayal of these men as self-indulgent cowards to be written off by their Country, permanently or indefinitely.

THERE ARE ESTIMATED TO BE 70,000 to 100,000 young men living outside the United States, having left to avoid prosecution for draft dodging or desertion. Late last year the Department of Defense listed 35,249 deserters still at large.

LEGISLATION INTRODUCED IN THE CONGRESS distinguishes between the draft dodger and deserter and provides that amnesty be granted the draft resisters on condition that they return to the United States and serve three years as provided in a Senate Bill and two years in a House Bill, either in civilian or military programs. Deserters are not included in the proposed legislation.

EITHER THE CONGRESS BY LEGISLATION or the President by proclamation can grant amnesty and there is precedent for it. The U. S. Constitution, Article II, Section 2, says, "The President ... shall have Power to grant

Reprieves and Pardons for Offenses against the United States . . ." The Constitution does not use the word amnesty but there is a long tradition of it being applied. George Washington granted this forgiveness to farmers who staged the Whiskey Rebellion in 1794.

ON DECEMBER 8, 1863, ABRAHAM LINCOLN issued a proclamation for general amnesty for persons who would sign an oath of allegiance to the Union. This was more than a year before Lee surrendered at Appomattox. Andrew Johnson declared three general amnesties, requiring an oath of allegiance, in 1865, 1867 and 1868. In 1924, Calvin Coolidge granted amnesty to men who had deserted since the World War I armistice.

FORMER PRESIDENT TRUMAN APPOINTED a board to look into the matter of recommending pardons for 15,805 men convicted of violating Selective Service dur-

ing World War II. The board recommended 1,523 pardons and they were granted by Mr. Truman.

FOR WHATEVER MAY EVENTUALLY be the case justifying amnesty for deserters and draft evaders of the present war, the time is certainly not now and neither by legislation nor Presidential order is it soon likely.

THE WAR IN VIETNAM IS WINDING down but it is not over. We still have men in Southeast Asia and some are fighting and a few are dying. At least 55,000 American boys have already died in that unfortunate conflict. Other American men languish in North Vietnam prisons. To welcome home, at this time, the draft dodgers and deserters, as if what they did was guileless and incidental, would be a monumental affront to those who have performed their duty and continue to perform it.

THE WORD "AMNESTY"

DERIVES from the Greek word amnesia, meaning "forgetfulness." In reverse, to grant amnesty at this time to the draft evaders and deserters would be forgetfulness of those 55,000 or more who have given their lives in Vietnam and the environs and forgetful of those prisoners of war whose condition and circumstances should be wringing the heart of America.

TIME HAS A WAY OF CHANGING things but not enough now to make us forgetful.

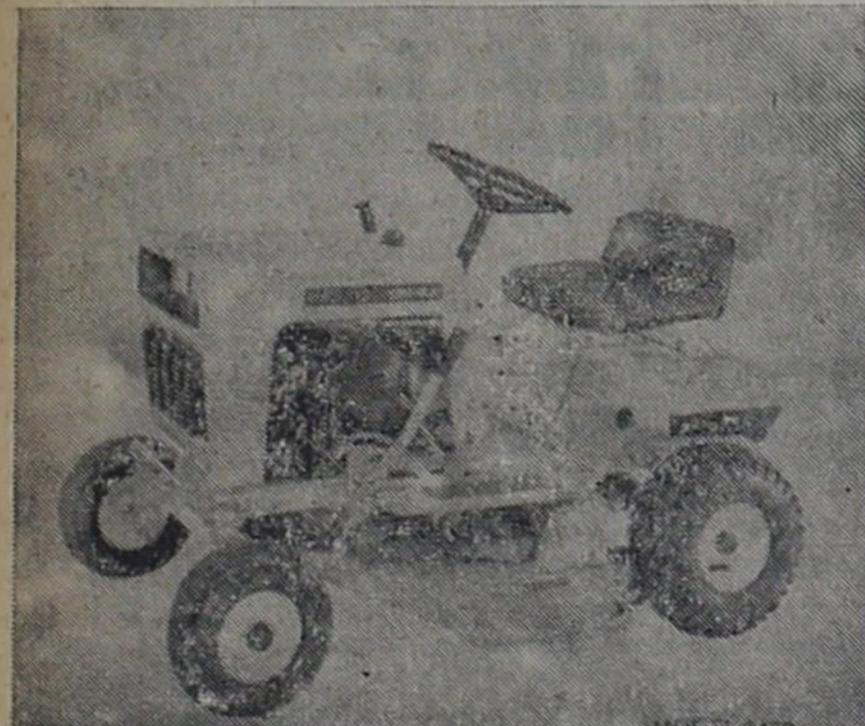

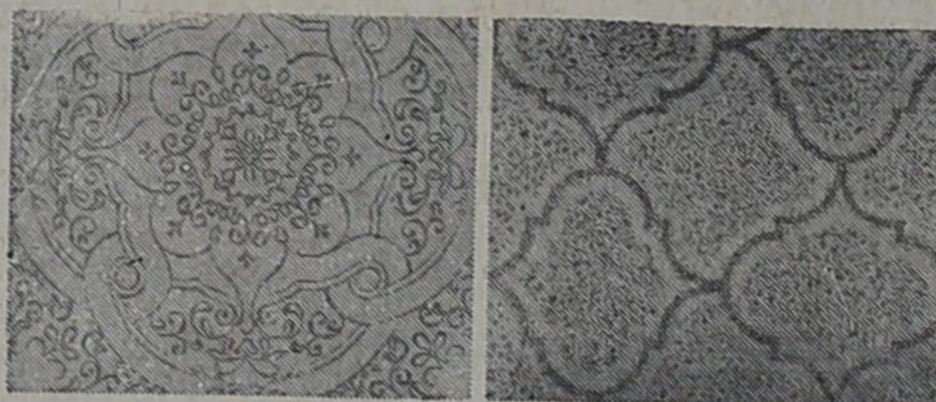

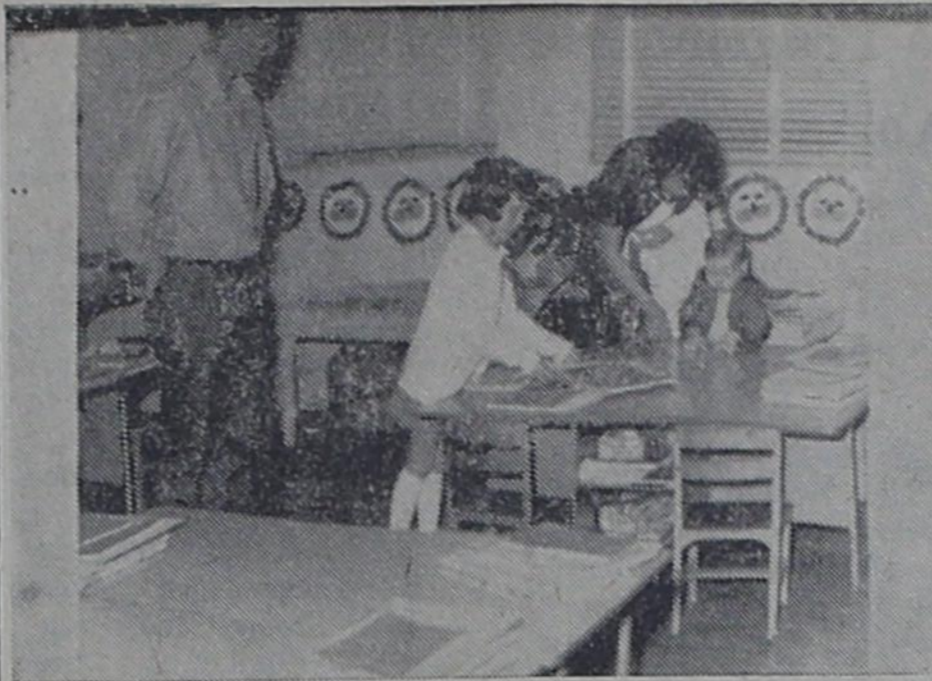
Predator Control Vote Deadline Is March 28th

AUSTIN — Commissioner John C. White reminded sheep and goat raisers in 73 West Texas counties to vote before midnight March 28th on a proposed predator control program.

Voting is by mail and is being conducted by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. Commissioner White authorized the referendum under provisions of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

Voters will decide whether or not to allow deductions of 20 cents a head for sheep and 10 cents a head for goats to be used in the predator control program. Nine members of a board to administer the fund also will be elected.

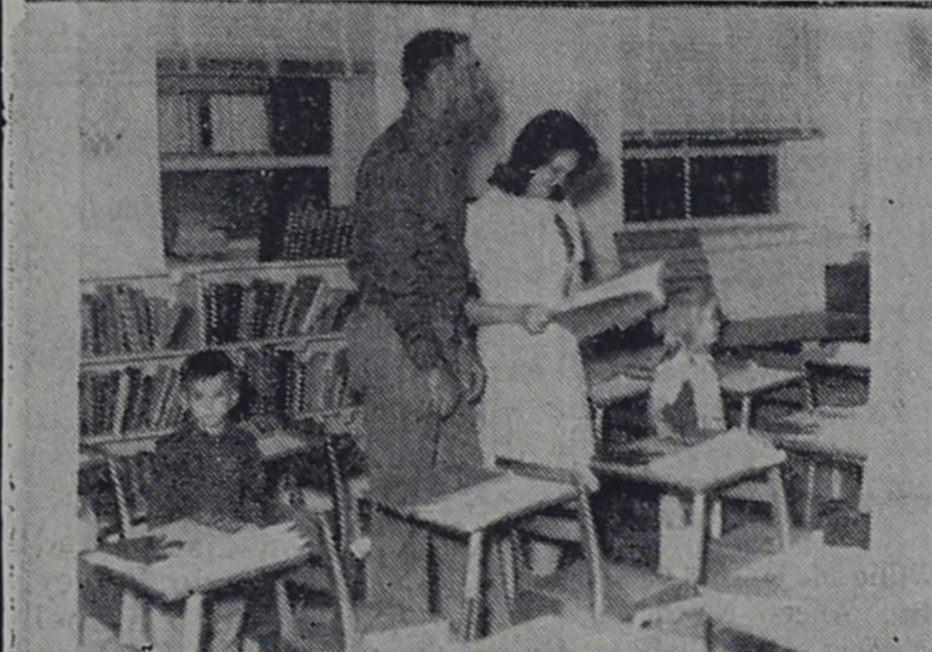
"It is important for sheep and goat raisers to make known their wishes on whether or not to conduct a predator control program," Commissioner White said.



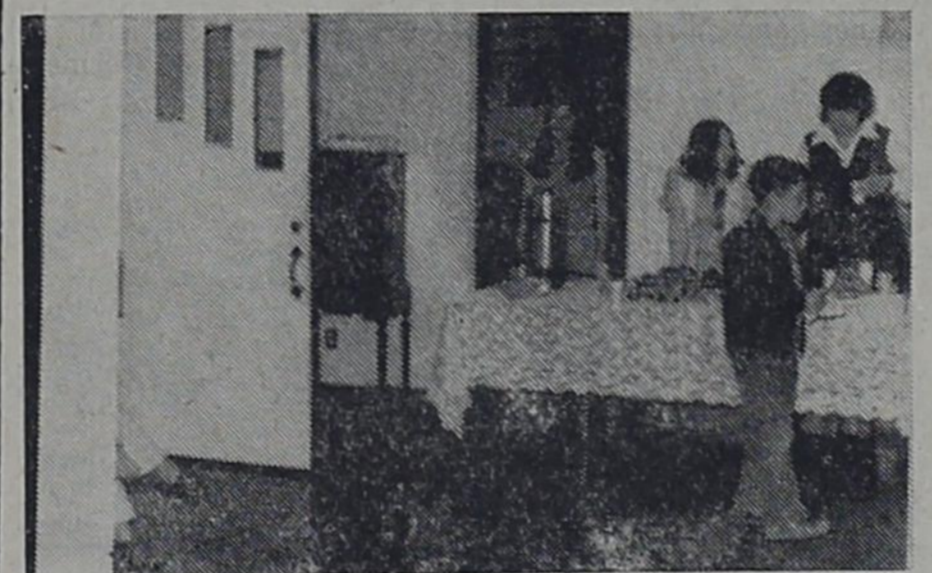

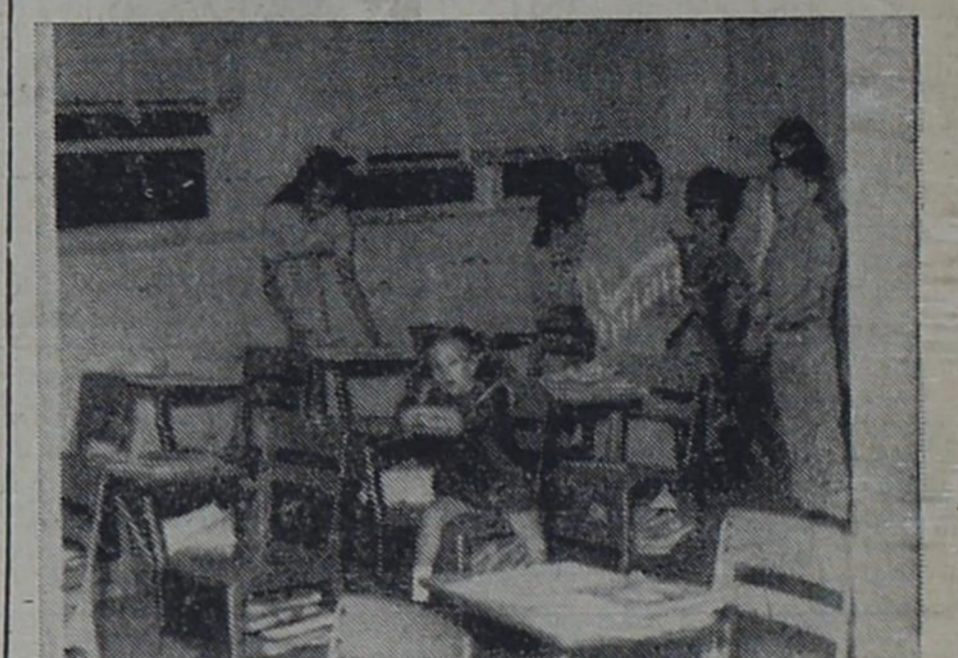

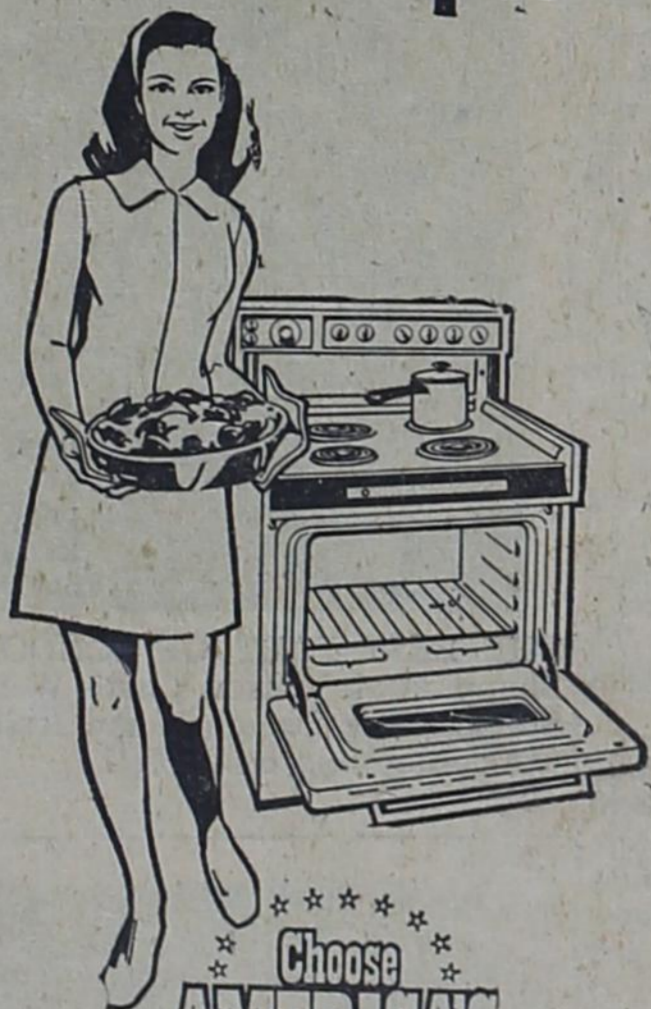
