



"Given To Us Eternal Life" "And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son," - I John 5:11.

One of the truly great assur ances revealed in God's word and enjoyed by all Christians is the assurance: "God hath given to us eternal life." The testimony is abundant that Christ came into the world in order that his disciples "might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." (John 10:10) No one would deny the fact that as many "as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ." (Gal. 3:27). No one would deny the fact that, because of obedience, "ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God." (Col. 3:3).

But the problem that develops in the minds of many people as they try to comprehend what John has written in I John 5:11 is the idea that once a person has the assurance: "God ha'h given to us eternal life," he cannot be lost. This concept, when put into its simplest terms, teaches that once a person is saved, he is always saved. Nowhere in the context of I John 5:11 (nor in any scriptural context) is the asurance given that once a person is saved it is impossible for him to be lost.

While we know that, as Christians, "God hath given to us eternal life," we know also that we must cortinue to "walk in the light, as he is the light." (I John 1:7). We must continue to "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world." (I John 2:15). We must continue to keep God's commandments for he that "keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him." (I John 2:4).

In light of what is taught in these and other passages of scripture, it is fally to teach or accept the erroneous concept that: "By the decree of God, for the manifestation of his glory, some men and angels are predestinated unto everlasting life, and others foreordained to everlasting death." (Confession of Faith, Chapter

The key to understanding I John 5:21 and all passages of scripture dealing with who will enjoy eternal life is found in the final chapter of the book of Revelation.
