In City Sales Tax Rebate

The Big Country received \$480,565.54, or 2 per cent, of the total \$22 million sent to 867 Texas cities in monthly city sales tax rebate checks raised from the state's 1 per cent city sales tax.

The May checks brought the eight-month (Texas fiscal year) rebate figures to \$253.3 million, a \$44 million increase over the same period for 1976, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

However, the 23 percent increase figure is misleading since the May rebate check covers a five-week period instead of the normal four.

Even so, Bullock's office reported that state and local sales tax collections still surpass the national average.

In the Big Country, Abilene topped the list of 45 cities receiving rebates with a check of \$263,478.34. Others receiving rebates in alphabetical

Registration Now **Underway for Beef** Referendum

Eastland County cattle producers can register to vote in the National Beef Referendum June 6 through June 17, at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Eastland.

At stake is the Beef Research and Information Plan - a producers' self-help plan to strengthen beef markets here and abroad, increase research to solve beef industry problems and improve communications throughout the cattle business.

The plan would be funded by a deduction of 30c per \$100 on all cattle sales. But any producer who does not want to participate can get a prompt refund.

"The Beef Research and Information Plan will benefit every producer right here in Eastland County," according to Luther Fambro, Ranger, Texa, "I urge all local producers to study up on the plan and vote for it."

Producers will return to their ASCS office the first two weeks of July to acqually cast their ballots.

Any legitimate cattle producer who has owned cattle in the last 12 months is eligible to register and vote, including FFA and 4-H youths who own their own cattle.



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
