## Feed Contamination Issue Resolved by FDA

The following statement was issued by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) on Tuesday, January 30, 2001. The FDA is the federal agency in charge of regulating feed components. The cattle involved are to be rendered and the resulting material will not enter ruminant or human food channels. The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) will provide assistance to the FDA as requested.

## FDA Announces Test Results From Texas Feed Lot

Today the Food and Drug Administration announced the results of tests taken on feed used at a Texas feedlot that was suspected of containing meat and bone meal from other domestic cattle -- a violation of FDA's 1997 prohibition on using ruminant material in feed for other ruminants. Results indicate that a very low level of prohibited material was found in the feed fed to the cattle.

FDA has determined that each animal could have consumed, at most and in total, five-and-one-half grams -- approximately a quarter ounce -- of prohibited material. These animals weigh approximately 600 pounds each.

It is important to note that the prohibited material was domestic in origin (therefore not likely to contain infected material because there is no evidence of BSE in U.S. cattle), fed at a very low level, and fed only once. The potential risk of BSE to such cattle is therefore exceedingly low, even if the feed were contaminated.

According to Dr. Bernard Schwetz, FDA's Acting Principal Deputy Commissioner, "The challenge to regulators and industry is to keep this disease out of the United States. One important defense is to prohibit the use of any ruminant animal materials in feed for other ruminant animals. Combined with other steps, like U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) ban on the importation of live ruminant animals from affected countries, these steps represent a series of protections, to keep American cattle free of BSE."

Despite this negligible risk, Purina Mills, Inc., is nonetheless announcing that it is voluntarily purchasing all 1,222 of the animals held in Texas and mistakenly fed the animal feed containing the prohibited material. Therefore, meat from those animals will not enter the human food supply. FDA believes any cattle that did not consume feed containing the prohibited material are unaffected by this incident, and should be handled in the beef supply clearance process as usual.

FDA believes that Purina Mills has behaved responsibly by first reporting the human error that resulted in the misformulation of the animal feed supplement and then by working closely with State and Federal authorities.

This episode indicates that the multi-layered safeguard system put into place is essential for protecting the food supply and that continued vigilance needs to be taken, by all concerned, to ensure these rules are followed routinely.

FDA will continue working with USDA as well as state and local officials to ensure that companies and individuals comply with all laws and regulations designed to protect the U.S. food supply.

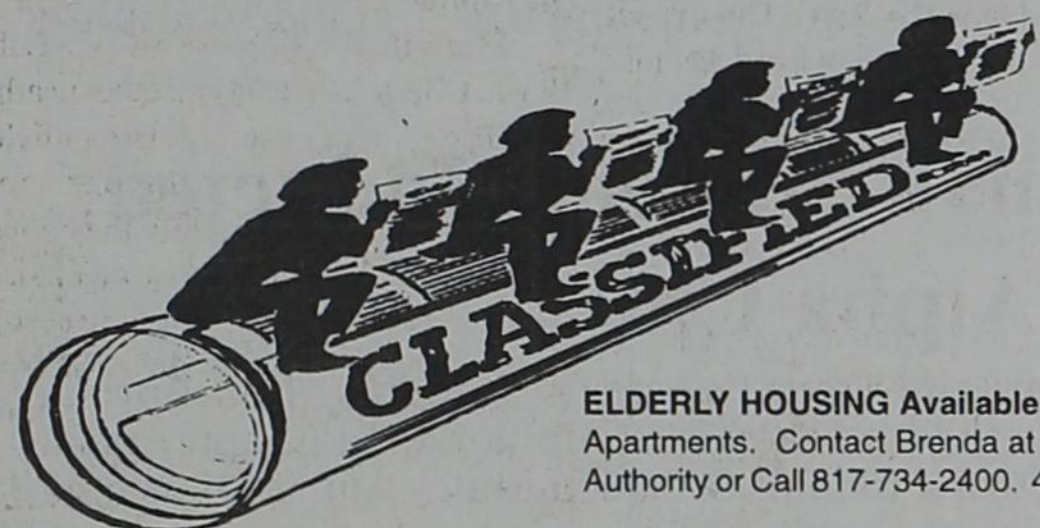
He was preceded by his wife, Lucille Little, 2 brothers and 2 sisters.

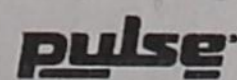

# STENHOLM PUSHES "TRUTH IN BUDGETING" RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charlie Stenholm and Congressman Dennis Moore of Kansas, co-chairmen of the Blue Dog Coalition Task Force on the Budget and Social Security, today introduced a "sense of Congress" resolution urging budgetary restraint and the continuation of fiscal discipline. The resolution was introduced in anticipation of the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) release of its semi-annual budget and economic outlook on Wednesday.

"These projections will have a major impact in framing the debate on tax and spending issues in the coming months," said Stenholm. "Both sides will pick-and-choose assumptions to produce a baseline surplus figure that reflects positively on their agendas. My resolution asks that Congress agree on a bipartisan basis to a set of principles that allow us to debate specific policy proposals with everyone on the same page."

"We need to keep in mind that these rosy budget scenarios are just projections that may or may not materialize," said Stenholm. "Congress needs to look at the entire context of obligations and promises, and then agree on reasonable surplus figures as well as their future use among competing priorities."

Most mainstream economists agree that CBO's baseline figures can be inaccurate over longer periods, and that economic circumstances could quickly change these projections from surplus to deficit. Federal Reserve Board Chairman Alan Greenspan indicated in testimony before the Senate Budget Committee last week that "...the risk of adverse movements in receipts is still real, and the probability of dropping back into deficit as a consequence of imprudent fiscal policies is not negligible."

The nonpartisan budget watchdog group The Concord Coalition was quick to praise the effort. "Congressmen Moore and Stenholm are to be commended for focusing their colleagues' attention on the most important fiscal issue facing the Congress, which is how to effectively manage the projected budget surplus," said Corey Davidson, Concord's Midwest Regional Director.

"Eight years ago, the CBO predicted there would be a \$513 billion deficit in 2001, but the reality is that we now have a \$256 billion surplus," said Stenholm. "I'm glad those projections were wrong, because it has meant great prosperity for our country. At the very least, this should serve as a cautionary tale for future planning. Last week I sent a letter to CBO director Dan Crippen asking that he help in this process by providing additional data to congressional policy makers."

"If Congress can show a little prudence now, our nation can have the economic benefits of tax cuts, national debt reduction, and taking care of basic needs, like the future of Social Security and improved public education," said Stenholm. "With our resolution, we're just asking Congress to acknowledge the need for reasonable and comprehensive budget assumptions before jumping into a course of action our nation may later regret."

Among other concerns, the resolution notes budget projections are often inaccurate, that spending caps are set to expire in fiscal year 2002, and that Social Security and Medicare trust funds continue to be counted in general fund revenue. Stenholm's resolution seeks to build support for prudent budget assumptions by calling for agreement that:

- \* The size of the available surplus should exclude Social Security and Medicare trust funds;
- \* The uncertainty of long-term economic forecasts should be recognized;
- \* Realistic assumptions for the growth in discretionary spending should be accounted for;
- \* The projected surplus should be adjusted to recognize that scoring conventions do not incorporate the costs of policies that Congress historically reauthorizes;
- \* There should be a recognition that the federal government will incur sizable, future obligations due to demographic pressures set to occur upon the retirement of our baby-boom generation.

## AG TALK

### Commission on 21st Century Agriculture

The Commission on 21st Century Agriculture appeared before the House Agriculture Committee this past Wednesday to discuss their report, "Directions For Future Farm Policy."

The commission was formed to take a hard look at what role the government should have in support of production agriculture. In particular, the members of the commission studied the 1996 Farm Bill, "Freedom to Farm," and conducted a review of the nation's agriculture programs.

Some disappointment was expressed at the commission's failure to make specific policy recommendations. Nevertheless, the report can be viewed as a foundation to work from as the House Agriculture Committee begins work on the 2002 Farm Bill.

### Disaster Assistance

Sign up for disaster payments began on January 18. Payments will be sent out after the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) certifies the regulations and the Office of Management and Budget completes the clearance process. In the event there is a delay, it is hopeful Agriculture Secretary Veneman would consider giving folks a partial payment. I would emphasize, however, that there is currently no indication that Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices will encounter difficulties in mailing out checks by March 1.

### Ag Outlook

Some help for the Ag sector came this week as Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan cut interest rates by half a point. This should help the export demand for agriculture products and lead to higher prices for domestic producers. Even better news is the amount of moisture we have been receiving in the Big Country this fall and winter. Hopefully, this precipitation will continue and we will have a wet spring that will pull us out of the drought that has consumed West Central Texas.

### Livestock Prices

We are also still experiencing strong cattle prices. The USDA reported Wednesday that cattle prices are up 6 percent from last year, and hog prices are up 31 percent. This is a big help to producers who have been hard hit by depressed prices over the last few years.
