## Historical Marker For Ellison Graveyard

A historical marker for the Ellison Family Graveyard will be dedicated at 3:00 P. M. Sunday, October 16, as announced by Mike Collins, Chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee.

The Ellison Family Graveyard originated within the first generation of actual Anglo-American settlement in Eastland County and has never had any other name than the unpretentious one. It was named for and by the family of James Madison Ellison (1840-1923) on whose land it was situated. The existence of the cemetery was first acknowledged legally in 1901.

Location is significant because it is associated with the historic Ellison Springs area and because it played an important part in the history of the pioneer Ellison family and their frontier neighbors. A historical marker for the Ellison Springs was authorized and

erected by the Texas Historical Commission in 1974. The springs were discovered by the young, adventurous James Madison Ellison in 1858. He claimed the location and settled there as the first home owner in that section of Eastland County -- a political entity which was created by the Texas legislature that same year. Ellison built his cabin, married his life partner, Eliza Jane McGough and started a family. The full circle of life upon this land came with a death in the family and the selection of a burial place. This first person buried on Ellison's land was his mother, Nancy Baird Ellison, a native of Georgia, in 1876.

The marker to be dedicated Sunday, October 16, will mark another historic site in the Ellison Springs area of Eastland County. The dedication will be held at the marker site which is immediately east of the Ellison Springs marker - three miles east of Gorman and four miles west of Desdemona on FM 8 Highway.

Following the dedicatory service descendants of the Ellison family invite those present to visit with them at the cemetery which is approximately 1/2 mile north of the marker. Several descendants reside in Eastland County and the surrounding areas. Mrs. Iva Buchan, age 95 of Desdemona is the granddaughter of James M. Ellison.

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## PANTHERS CLAW BULLDOGS; HOST EVANT FRIDAY NIGHT

The Panthers woke up their sleepy offense on Friday night at Millsap and rolled up over 400 yards of total offense to bury the Bulldogs 42 to 15.

Steve Keith had his best game of the year getting 187 yards on 24 carries to lead the Big Red. Blaine Gibbs had 136 on 22. Larry Keith, playing his first game at running back got 54 on 15 trips. David Good did a marvelous job at quarterback, handing the ball off sharply and quickly and also doing some real good passing. Ricky Troutman switched from running back to guard and surely helped to boost the blocking of the front line. They opened nice holes in the Bulldog front wall to let the runners through.

Gorman scored the first time they had the ball, taking the opening kickoff and going 68 yds in 12 plays with Steve Keith scoring from 1 yard out with 8:00 left in the first period. David Good kicked the PAT and Gorman led 7-0.

Then after intercepting a Panther pass of the Gorman 41 the Bulldogs moved the distance on just 3 plays with

Jimmy Skiles going the final 25 yards with 4:07 left in the quarter for the TD. John Aaron kicked the PAT and moved the score to 7-7.

However from there the Panthers took charge and rolled to a 28-7 halftime lead.

The second Panther score came with 8:34 left in the second period with David Good getting the final yard on a QB keeper, to cap a 56 yard drive in 9 plays. The kick try failed and Gorman led 13-7.

On the next possession by the Bulldogs the Panther defense caught the Bulldogs QB in the end zone for a safety with 7:17 left in the half. This upped the score to 15-7.

Then the Panthers took the kickoff and went 42 yards in just 3 plays with Steve Keith going the final 33 yards on a beautiful run for the TD. Good kicked the PAT and Gorman led 22-7.

The Panthers added another score before halftime going 38 yards on 2 plays Larry Keith picked up 20 for a first down at the 18. Then Blaine Gibbs went the final 18 yards for the TD with 4:01 left in the half. The kick failed and the Big Red had a 28-7 halftime lead.

Following the intermission the Panthers took over on the Bulldog 15 after a fumble recovery by Ricky Troutman. The Big Red scored in 3 plays. Gibbs ran for 11; then

## DROGRESS

There are 2 elected groups in Gorman that are worthy of more understanding than they receive. They are the City Commission and the Hospital Board of Directors. Down through the years much has been accomplished by these 2 groups. The latest venture they have jointly undertaken is the operation of the Ambulance service, since this is a non-profit service that was a service discontinued by Higginbothams. For the last 6 months, the City Commission and Board of Directors at the Hospital have shared the expense of Ambulance service and operation. The present Ambulance being antiquated and the Government putting so many regulations pertaining to Ambulance service, this has necessitated the need to update all of the equipment - including the present Ambulance itself.

At a joint meeting last Monday night, the Commission and Board of Directors considered a program offered by the government whereby they would match

dollar for dollar in a new, modern Ambulance that can be purchased - fully equipped - for \$20,000.

After careful consideration, the Mayor suggested that the City and Hospital District each put up \$5,000 to purchase the new equipment along with the Gov. grant of \$10,000 to give the Community this very modern equipment. Both groups unanimously agreed upon this plan.

Another venture of the Hospital Board was to establish the Gorman Clinic; thereby bringing in Dr. P. L. Flores, a general practitioner; thus providing the community with an obstetrician and general surgeon. The Community has not had this service in some time.

To be sure, these groups have made mistakes, however one would have to agree that they are sincere in their motives and their desire for Progress in our Community. We think it would be well if we carefully considered the plans presented to us and support their determined effort for Progress.

for 2 more yards before Larry Keith took it in from the 2 yard line. A pass try for 2 points failed and the score rose to 34-7.

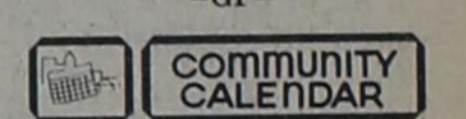
Then following an exchange of possessions, Bobby Jay blocked a Bulldog punt for a safety with 3:31 left in the third quarter to make the score 36-7.

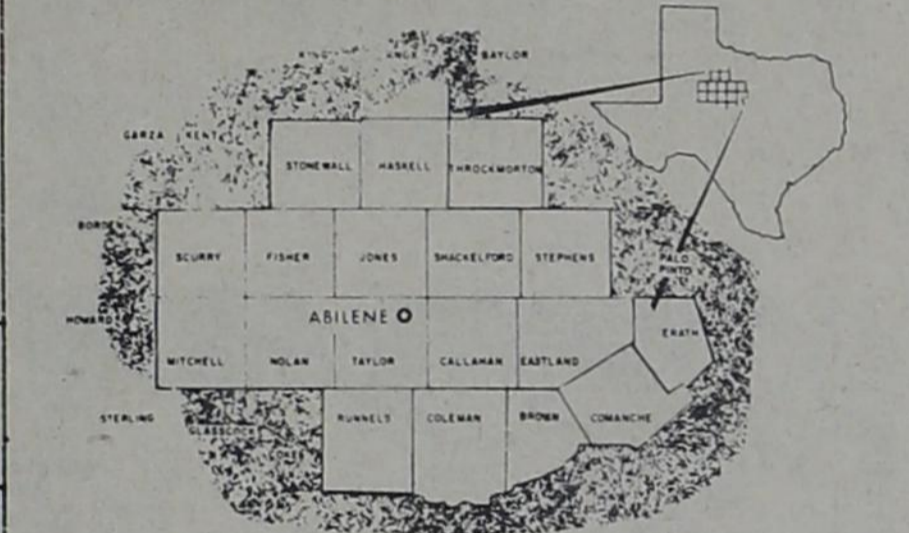

George Hedrick, TESCO senior electrical engineer, inspects a lignite coal-fired plant at Martin Lake. In 1983 four such units will be in operation there.



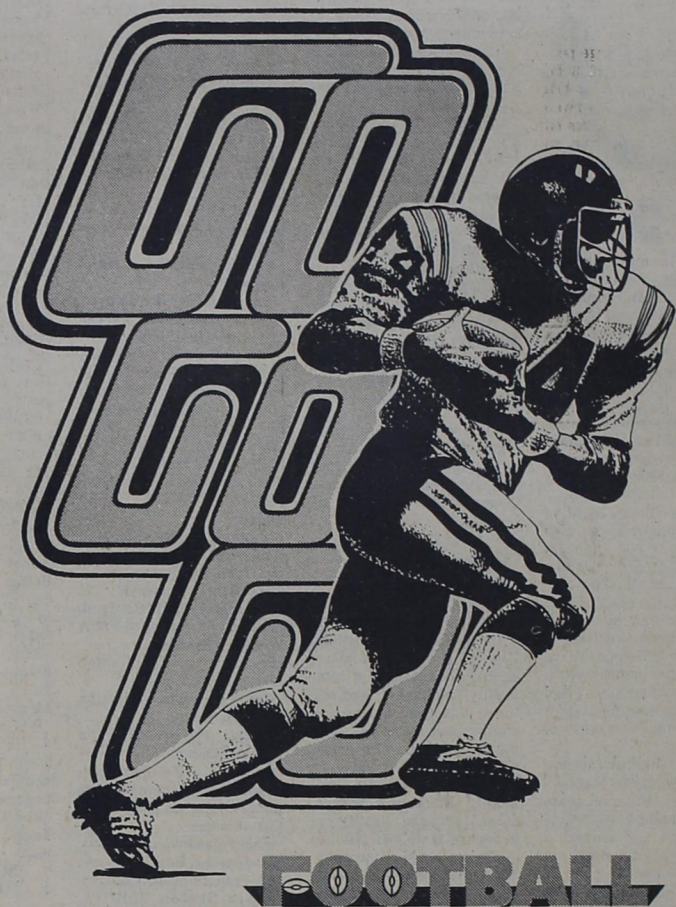
Two lignite coal-fired units are already generating electricity at the Monticello plant near Mt. Pleasant. A third unit is also under construction there.

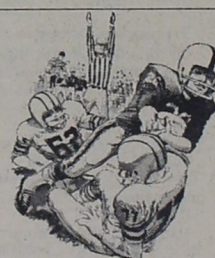

### Babies in goggles used for research

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Don't blink if you see babies in goggles at The University of Texas.

In studies on depth perception, Dr. Martin S. Banks, a UT psychologist, puts goggles with special lenses on infants to determine at what age babies develop stereopsis (the ability to use both eyes to see two different images of the same object and, thereby, perceive its depth).

Dr. Banks' research may make it possible for doctors to determine earlier when a child has developed stereopsis. Such detection would make it easier to correct abnormal development.

### SHRIMP CREOLE

1 pound frozen, peeled and deveined shrimp	1 teaspoon leaf thyme
2 tablespoons vegetable oil or bacon fat	2 teaspoons salt
1 cup chopped celery	2 cans. (1 lb. each) tomatoes, cut up
1 cup chopped green pepper	1/2 cup water
1 cup chopped onion	1/4 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
1 garlic clove, crushed	1 bay leaf
2 teaspoons paprika	1 tablespoon cornstarch
	2 tablespoons water

Cook shrimp according to package directions. Rinse in cold water and drain. Cut shrimp in half lengthwise; set aside. In a 3-quart saucepan saute celery, green pepper, onion and garlic in oil until tender. Stir in paprika, thyme, and salt. Add cut-up tomatoes with liquid, water, hot pepper sauce, and bay leaf. Bring to a boil; cover and simmer 15 minutes to blend flavors. Stir in shrimp. Blend together cornstarch and water until smooth; stir into sauce. Bring to a boil while stirring constantly; boil 2 minutes. Serve in pastry shells or over rice or pasta. (Allow 1 pastry shell or approximately 3/4 cup cooked rice or pasta per person.)  
 Makes 6-8 servings.

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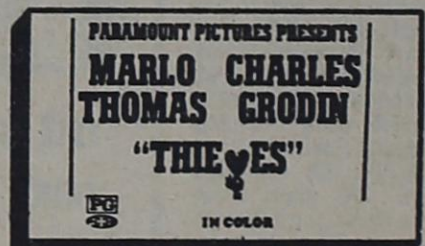
