The Panthers then took the kickoff on their own 34 and moved the distance for a score in 6 plays with Ricky Hunter scoring on a beautiful 22 yard scamper with 9:21 left. A pass from Dane Gressett to brother, Russ, added the two pointer and Gorman had bounced back to make the score 15 to 8.

The Eagles got the ball again with about 2:30 left in the half and moved 63 yards in 8 plays for a score with just 23 seconds left. Dennis added the PAT and Goldthwaite led 22 to 8. The Eagles had held the Panthers on the Eagle 37 on a fourth down try.

The Eagles scored again with 6:36 left in the third period, going 72 yards in 12 plays with Corona scoring from the 1. Dennis kicked the PAT to make the score read 29 to 8.

The Panthers got another drive going late in the game but was stopped at the Eagle 9, and just could not muster a score in the remainder of the game.

Ricky Hunter led the Pan-

thers with 40 yards on just three carries. Mark Swanner also had 40 yards on 14 tries but couldn't get loose for the big run. Jacky Johnson had 7 on 4 tries. Rhett Harrison got 2 on 1 try and Eddie Pettit was 1 for 1. Dane Gressett went all the way at the quarterback position and was minus 9 on 5 keeps but was thrown for losses on three pass tries.

The Panther defense just couldn't hold the big, strong rush of Corona and Louis Coronado in the first half, but did seem to do a much better job the second half. The Big Red defense is a bit smaller than in previous years but they put forth all the effort they could muster and we're proud of our Panthers.

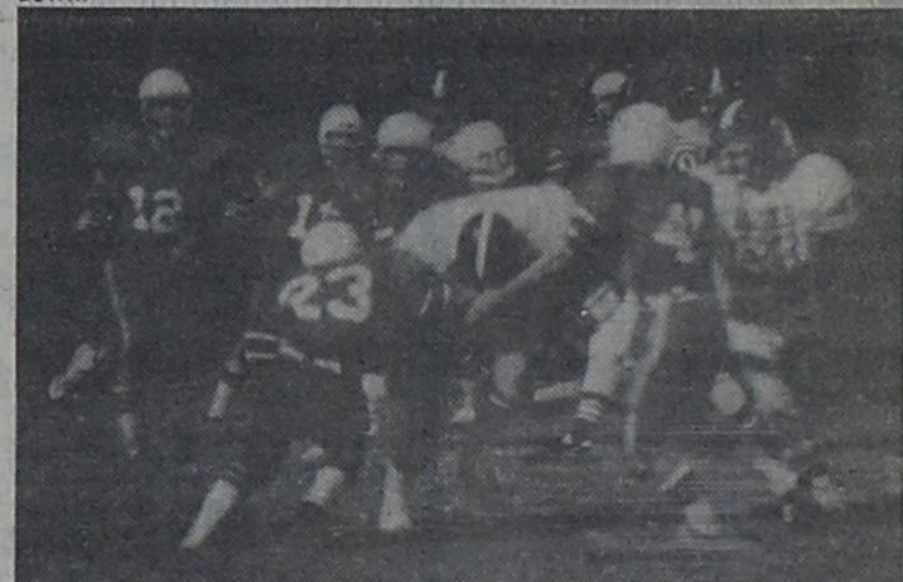

We think the Panthers will bounce back and urge all the Big Red fans to travel to Rochelle and Back the Panthers.

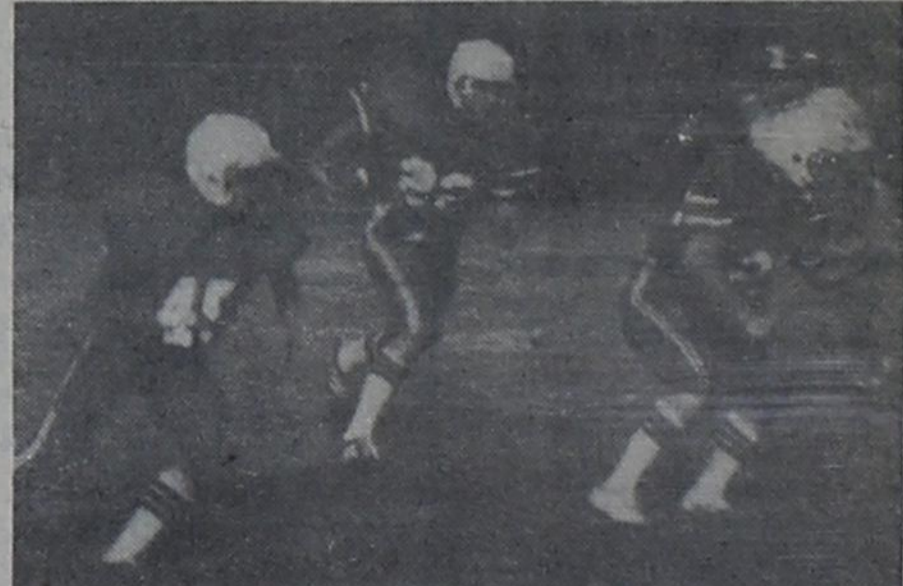

RABID SKUNK FOUND IN GORMAN

Louie Roberts Killed a rabid skunk at his home Thursday, September 23. It had bitten his dog and the positive rabid report from the animal was received Monday September 27.

All persons who own pets should keep a close check. If your pet has not had rabies shots, they should be inoculated immediately. This will not prevent the rabies if your pet has been bitten before the shots were given, but will prevent the disease in the future. Cats as well as dogs should have the immunization shots.

The rabid skunk killed Thursday may not be the only rabid one in the area and there is no way knowing how many animals this one had bitten and spread the disease.

ovation after his speech because of his apparent concern for the welfare of young people in the area. He said that drug dealers will give marijuana to kids free of charge just to get them to try it, and that once they try it, they will be back for some more. Later, after the dealer has kids smoking marijuana regularly, he starts "lacing" the marijuana with "crystal" or PCP in order to get them "hooked" on the more expensive drugs. He said he knows from experience that "Crystal" (methamphetamine) "fries your brain", and is readily available.

Funderburg explained some of the steps that can be taken by the public in fighting drug on a local basis, including the newly-formed Gorman Crimestopper Program and community involvement in observing and reporting crime, especially in the area of drugs or drug-related crime.

Concerned citizens who wish to contribute to the program may send a check to Gorman Crimestopper Fund, in care of First National Bank of Gorman. The program is being administered by a citizen committee and is focused primarily at reducing the drug-related crimes by offering cash rewards for information leading to the arrest and indictment of those involved in this type of activity. Other serious crimes are not excluded from consideration for rewards, and will be eligible for rewards at the discretion of the committee.

Several citizens expressed a desire for future meetings to discuss the drug problems in Gorman, and if there is enough interest, arrangements will be made to present a film or slide program.

VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE IS OCT. 3

Eligible voters who have not registered to vote must do so by Oct. 3 if they wish to cast their ballot in the Nov. 2 general election.

"All that is involved is filling out an application card available at the county voter registrar's office," said Joe Rothe with the county officials program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Rothe particularly encouraged high school seniors to register to vote. Those who are 17 year 10 months of age are eligible to register and may exercise the right to vote on or after their 18 birthday. Some 188,000 high school seniors should be eligible to vote in Texas this fall.

"Everyone eligible to vote but unable to do so on Nov. 2 should apply at the county voter registrar's office to vote absentee," said Rothe. Oct. 29 is the deadline for voting absentee in person while absentee ballots will be accepted in the mail as late as 7 p.m. Nov. 2.

Any of the following conditions can qualify an individual to vote absentee:

1. Absence from the county of residence on election day.
2. Age 65 or older on election day.
3. Inability to appear at the authorized polling place on election day due to sickness, growers if we all get behind it.

4. Service as an election clerk or a poll watcher in an election precinct other than the precinct of residence.

5. Under certain circumstances, voters confined to jail may be eligible to vote absentee.

"Every Texas House, Senate and Congressional seat is up for re-election this fall along with nearly every statewide office," said Rothe. "So it's especially important for all eligible voters to get to the polls on Nov. 2. Only 24 percent of those eligible voted in the May 1 Texas primary, the lowest in 30 years for a gubernatorial primary election."

South Eastland County Hospital District — It's Your Business

Accompanying this report on your Hospital District are the Statement of Financial Condition and the Annual Budget for the coming fiscal year.

We have been very successful in retiring our indebtedness. A debt of \$50,292.00 to the Gorman National Bank has been paid in full and all payments on the hospital building has been paid in full and all payments on the hospital building are current. We have a balance of \$106,000.00 on the mortgage that is scheduled to be paid in full this fiscal year.

November 1981 we engaged a tax collector attorney to collect delinquent taxes. Since that time we have collected \$23,646.00 in back taxes and have many tax suits filed and awaiting trial. We will continue to pursue the collection of delinquent taxes.

Gorman Hospital Management Associates, who lease our building and equipment for \$3,000.00 per month, are doing an excellent job of operating the hospital and are honoring their lease agreement to the fullest. Contrary to a report in last weeks paper, GHMA does not own Blackwell Hospital.

The Hospital District owns and operate the Ambulance Service, using hospital personnel as drivers and attendants. This past year we have made 210 ambulance calls. The Ambulance Service loses money each month but it is a necessary service that only the Hospital District can provide for the residents of this district.

We have two lawsuit pending against us in Eastland 91st. District Court. No. 28536, Callaway vs. SECHD and others, filed 1-1-80 for \$55,000.00. No. 30105 Dunaway vs. SECHD, filed 9-9-82 for \$445,000.00. We will defend against these suits.
