Terms of James Miers, Lowell Rawls, Hershell Cordell and Lester Seaton, will expire in April.

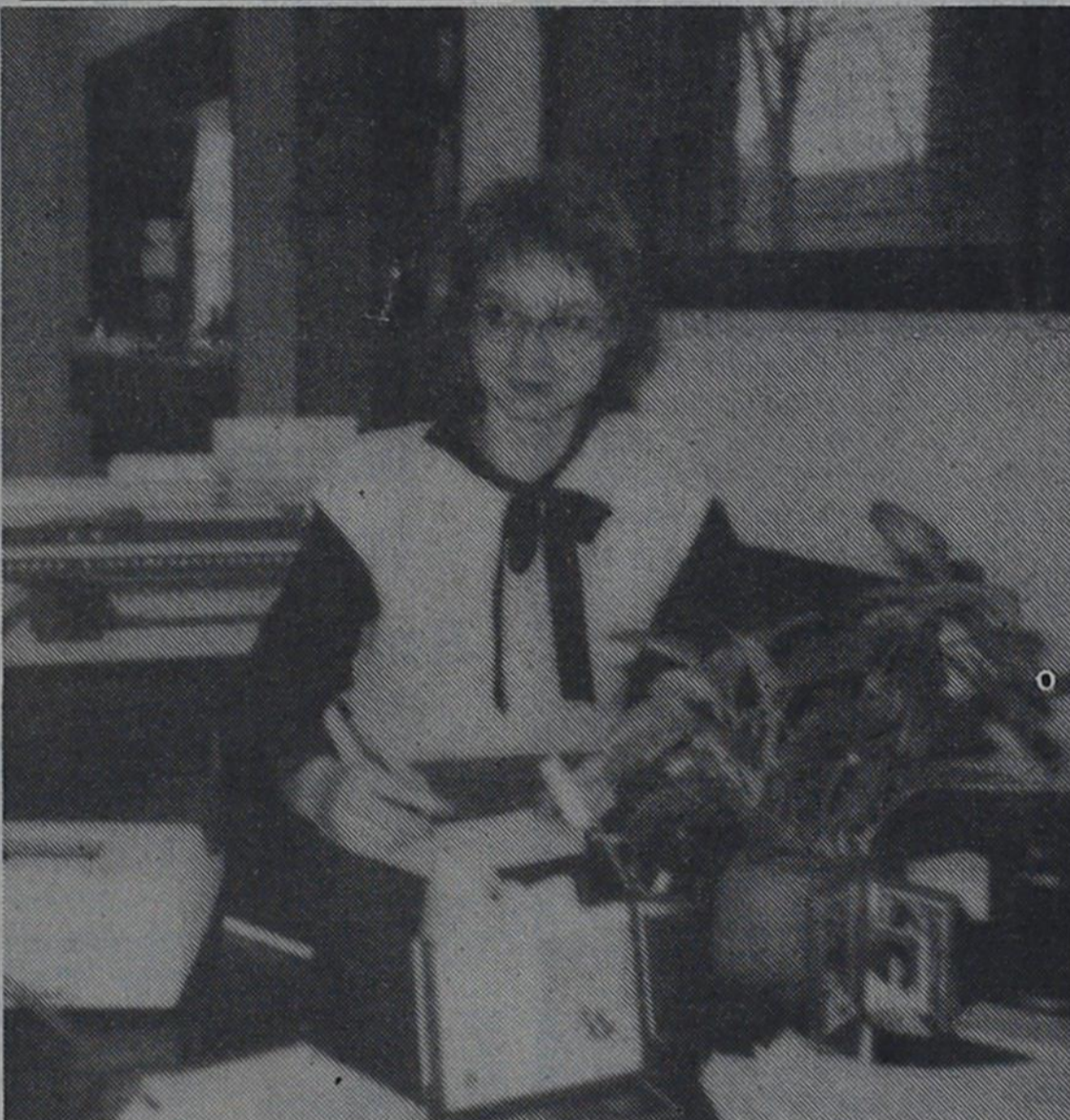
Hold over members of the board are Graydon Baze, Lane Campbell and Dale Curb.

Vacant House Burned In Blaze Here Thursday

Fire destroyed a vacant house about 1 1/2 miles southwest of Gorman on Bass Lake Road early Thursday morning.

Gorman police chief Cecil Funderburgh said Daniel Fraley, a Birdsong Peanut Corp. employee, knocked at his door at 12:55 a.m. to report seeing the fire glowing in the sky.

Funderburgh said he notified the fire department.

The back portion of the frame house, owned by John Edward Clark, and the former late George Hollifield, was burning fiercely, and the fire couldn't be stopped, Funderburgh said.

Funderburgh said the fire could have started by faulty wiring.

PEANUT ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE AND U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

SOUTHWEST AREA PEANUT GROWERS TO NOMINATE COMMITTEE MEMBER

Peanut growers of the Southwest Area -- primarily, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas -- will meet at Pleasanton, Texas on Thursday, March 7, 1985, to elect a grower member and alternate to the Peanut Administrative Committee.

The meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. (CST) at the St. Andrews Church in conjunction with the Atascosa County Peanut Growers' Association annual meeting.

Lane Campbell, Peanut Administrative Committee representative, will conduct the nomination. Committee Manager WM. I. Yarbrough explains that the Peanut Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement. The committee is made up of growers, shellers, and the Area Association managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the Secretary of Agriculture under the Agreement. These regulations apply generally to the entire industry.

The grower member position to be filled is currently held by Joey Boswell, De Leon, Texas. The alternate's position is occupied by H. R. Helm, Comanche, Texas. Both terms expire April 30, 1985. Both men are eligible for renomination.

A special program of interest to peanut growers will be held in conjunction with the meeting. All peanut growers from the Southwest Area states are invited to attend and urged to participate in the nomination.

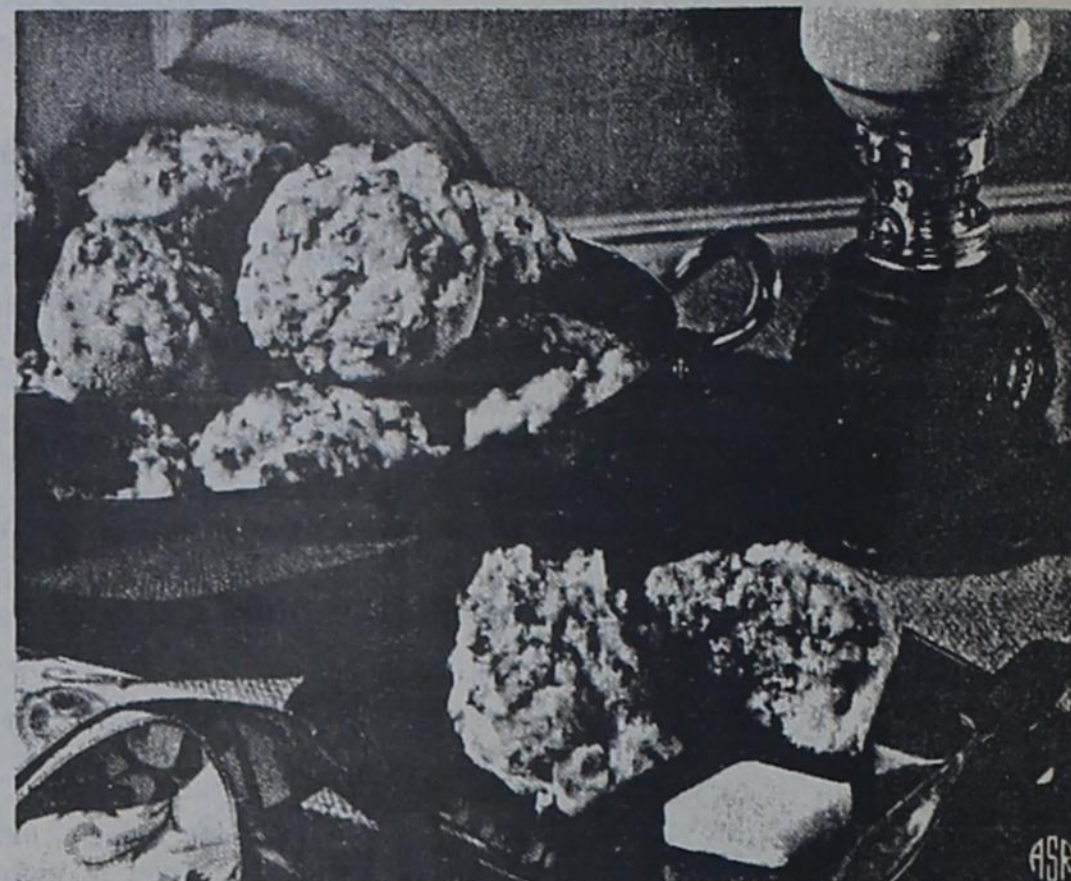

COMMISSION GRANT UPS APPLICATION TO TRANSPORT PACKAGES IN TEXAS

AUSTIN - The Railroad Commission Monday granted the application of Unite Parcel Service for authority to transport packages from point to point within Texas.

The Commission voted two to one to approve the examiner's recommendation and grant the UPS application. Chairman Buddy Temple and Commissioner Mack Wallace voted for approval, while Commissioner James E. (Jim) Nugent voted against and filed a dissenting opinion.

The order signed by Temple and Wallace adopted the examiner's conclusion that the proposed UPS service would "meet the demonstrated public need for a single, consistent, and reliable statewide carrier" and that it would "advance the commercial potential of all areas of the state, not just the locations along service routes."

The commissioners went on to say that "no existing regulated transportation service can presently fulfill this public need."

Nugent said in his dissent that "I am firmly convinced the Legislature has not granted the Railroad Commission the power to grant authority for a common carrier to operate over irregular routes with no schedule." He also said the evidence in the case "demonstrates the applicant does not intend to provide a service in accordance with present laws and regulations of the Commission."

UPS filed its application with the Commission in August, 1978. After lengthy consideration in state courts of the question of whether the Commission had jurisdiction to consider the application, hearings were conducted by the Commission's Transportation Division in 1982 and 1983.

In August of last year, the hearing examiner recommended the application be denied, saying state law requires applicants to provide specific route maps and service schedules and that in her opinion, the UPS application did not meet those requirements. Commissioners Wallace and Temple overruled that recommendation and directed the examiner to prepare a new recommendation based on the question of need for the proposed service in Texas.

The examiner returned to the Commission Dec. 10 with a recommendation that the UPS application be granted, citing the testimony of over 300 public witnesses who supported the application.

Today's Commission order grants UPS authority to transport packages or articles between all points in Texas. The packages or articles may not exceed 50 pounds in weight or 108 inches in combined length and girth measurement. Each package or article must be considered a separate shipment.

Examination of such rate requests usually involves a public hearing. Another matter to receive Commission examination will be the type of shipping documents UPS will use in its service. The company must also file proof of insurance and must register all vehicles it will be using in the state with the Commission.

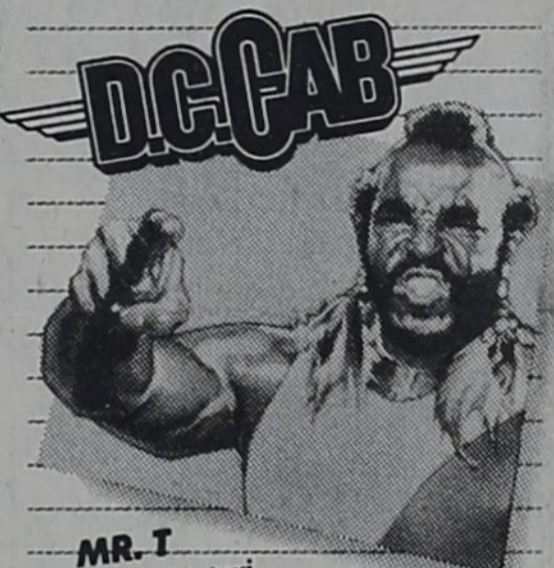

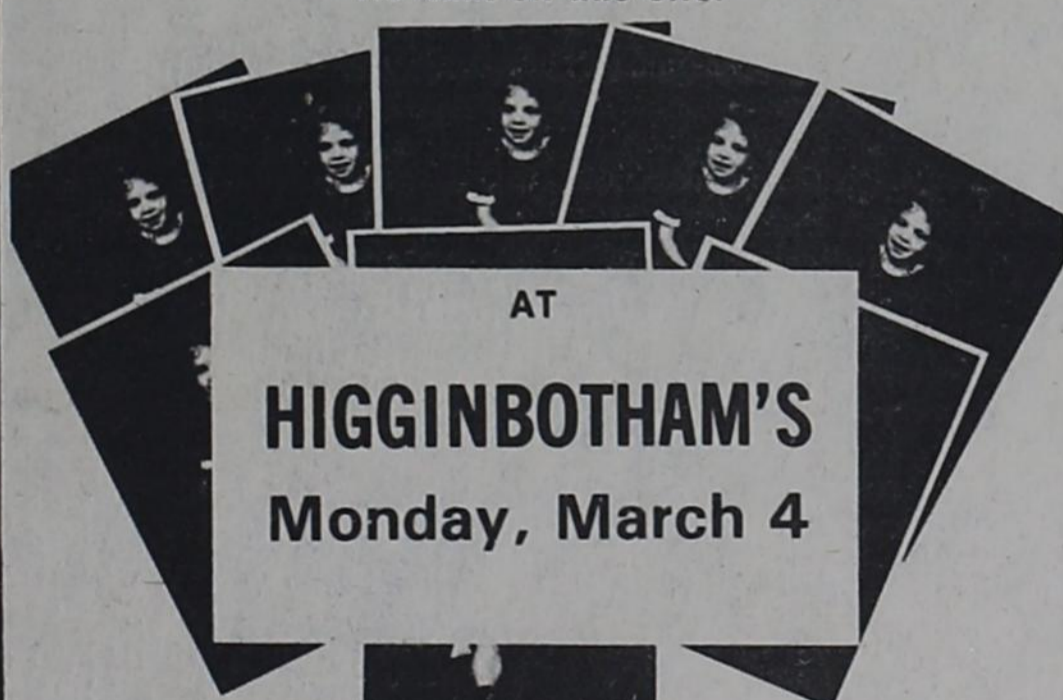

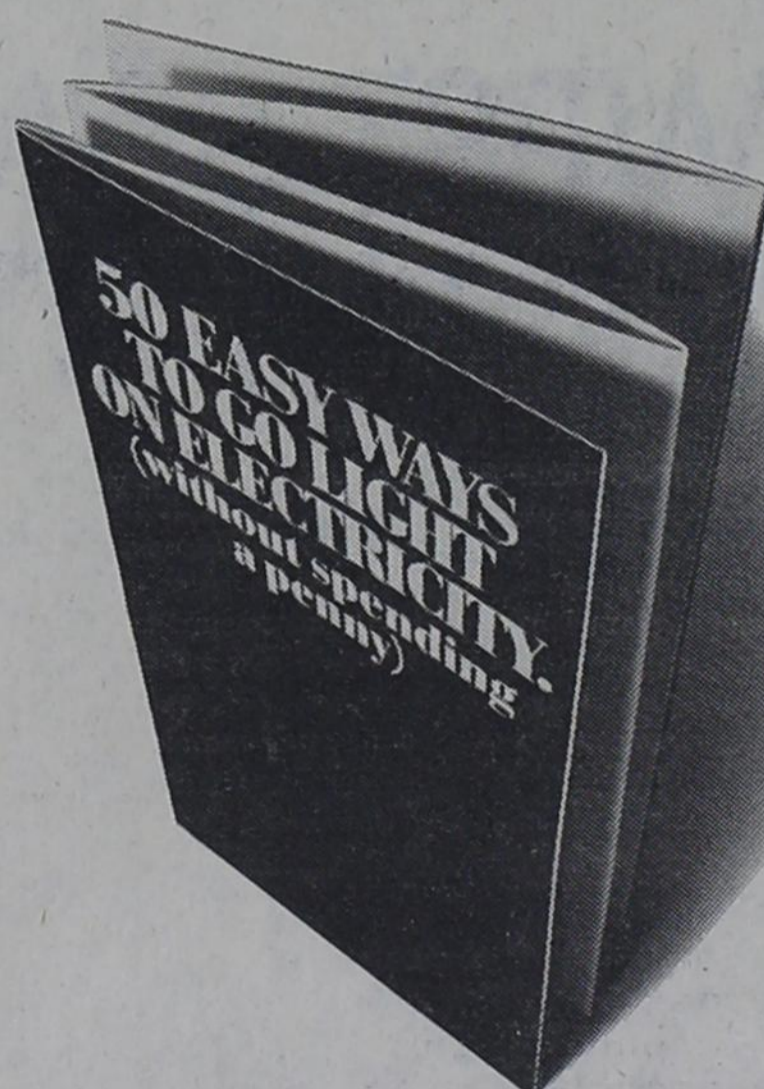
