



Albert Wesley Hendricks passed away on Tuesday, November 6, 1984, in the Blackwell Hospital after a lengthy battle with cancer.

Services were held on November 9, at 2:00 p.m. in Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel in Gorman. Bro. Jim Andrews, Bro. Clarence Wilson and Bro. Joe O'Neal officiated. Teddy Dean Jordan gave the Eulogy. Albert left the chapel draped with the U.S. Flag for his journey home to his burial in Simpson Cemetery at Kokomo. Bert Kent and other V.F.W. members folded the flag and presented it to his wife, Nancy.

Music was rendered by Sharon Mearse and a quartet composed of Woodrow and Helen Browning, Jimmy Little and Archie Skaggs accompanied by Juanita Fuller.

Albert was born on March 30, 1918 in the Kokomo Community, Eastland County, Texas. He attended Kokomo Schools and graduated from Gorman High School in 1937. He was a member of the Kokomo Baptist Church.

The Gorman Panthers ended the season on Friday night at Lometa when they lost a hard fought 19 to 12 decision to the Hornets, who wound up as the runner-up in District 8-A East and will meet Eden, winner of the West zone. The Panthers really helped the Hornet cause with four fumbles and four turnovers on pass interceptions. You might say "it just wasn't the Panthers' night" to say the least.

The Hornets hit the scoreboard first on the initial play of the second period on a 49 yard draw play by Alex Whittenburg which caught the Panthers napping. The kick for point failed and Lometa was up 6 to 0.

The teams played on even terms the rest of the way until 10:22 of the third period when the Panthers scored on a beautiful 31 yard run by Jimmy Woodall after the Big Red had taken over the ball on the Lometa 39. The run for two points failed and the game was tied at 6-6.

Then with just 51 seconds left in the third quarter, the Big Red defense held and forced the Hornets to punt. On the punt try the snap to the kicker went over his head and he was hit as he picked up the ball, which went into the endzone and was recovered by Rhett Harrison for a touchdown. The pass for two points missed and the Panthers were up 12 to 2 and seemed to have the momentum going. However, things changed fast as Bryan faded back and tossed a pass to Willie Jasso who caught the ball in the open when two Panther defenders fell down and raced 62 yards for the score with no time showing on the clock in the third period. Then Bryan Thorp kicked the PAT and Lometa was up by 1 point at 13-12.

The Panthers fumbled on their

next possession, giving the Hornets the ball on the Gorman 35. A pass for 20 yards put the Hornets at the 15. Then a sweep to the left added 11 yards to the 4. From there Thorp ran a OB sneek for the TD with 9:50 left in the game. The kick try was blocked and the Hornets were out front 19 to 12.

The Panthers played a hard hitting game, as did the Hornets. In fact it was one of the hardest hitting games the Big Red had played all season. But with all the turnovers, the Panthers just couldn't get things going.


The Panthers have had a very good season considering the injuries that plagued them this season and came up with a 6-3-1 record. But this is not surprising, however, as the Panthers have had winning season

the past "hump-teen" seasons and have been in the playoffs several years in a row.


