CLINIC FESTIVITIES SET FOR JUNE 29TH

The long-awaited Open House at the new Doctors Clinic is just around the corner, and several activities are planned to celebrate the Grand Opening.

On the afternoon of Friday, June 29, there will be a picnic-type gathering at a yet-to-be-determined location, with live entertainment and guests. The Master of Ceremonies for the event will be Gorman Mayor Charlie Garrett, who will introduce the honored guests and pay tribute to our community's medical personnel.

The clinic, which was constructed under a contract with Clark Construction company in Gorman, was recently completed and houses the offices of Drs. Limneo and Nimfa Aguila, M.D.'s, and Dr. James Gray, D.D.S., providing the finest in medical and dental care. The clinic personnel have good reason to be proud of the new facility. It contains the latest in diagnostic equipment, and the friendly atmosphere makes it a pleasure to visit the clinic for medical tests and treatment.

At the picnic on Friday, June 29th, donations will be accepted to help buy new and modern equipment for our hospital. Among some of the more urgently needed equipment is a fetal monitor, which helps to monitor the condition of the mother and child during labor. Also badly needed is a Pocket Dop II, which is a device for detecting blood clots and other types of obstructions in veins and arteries. Another modern piece of equipment that would be beneficial to the patients in this area is a Sigmoidoscope, which detects colon cancer in its early stages. At the present time, patients must go to Abilene or other larger hospitals to have those tests conducted.

Those who are planning to attend the celebration should pack a picnic lunch and bring your lawn chairs. Ice will be provided for your drinks. The ceremonies should start at about 6:00 p.m., and continue until sundown. Those who are unable to attend, but wish to contribute to the equipment fund may send the contributions to "Hospital Equipment Account", c/o First National Bank, Gorman, Texas 76454.

On Saturday morning following the picnic, Open House will be held at the Clinic, with personnel on hand to perform free fasting blood-sugar tests and free blood pressure tests.

Plan to come to both events, and bring your friends. Location of the picnic will be announced next week.

CRIMESTOPPERS SAY MARK YOUR VALUABLES

The onset of good weather has brought more and more people out on the streets and highways, and as usual, with the increase of activity comes an increase in thefts and burglaries.

Gorman has not been excluded from the statistics. The swimming pool was burglarized on Sunday, June 10, and about \$200.00 was taken from the game machines in the pool house. The residential area was also hit when some took a stereo from the front porch of a house on the north side of town.

All persons are encouraged to mark their personal belongings in a way that will help the police to locate and return them in case they are stolen or lost. The best way to do this is to record the model and serial numbers of all items of value that have numbers. If your valued possessions do not have serial numbers, please mark them with an electric engraving pencil by stenciling your Texas Driver's License number on them. Please DO NOT use your Social Security Number! You items cannot be traced by Social Security Numbers!

The best way to mark your valuables is by etching your driver's license number in a place that is visible without dismantling the item, and to place the letters "TX" in front of the number so there will be no doubt that the number is a Texas DL number.

Any person wishing to mark their valuables may borrow an electric engraving pencil from the Gorman Police Department at City Hall. When borrowing the engraver, please mark your items and promptly return the engraver so that others may use it.

You can help fight the increasing theft and burglary problem by having your items marked for easy identification, and in a manner that will allow the information to be entered on the computer. "An 'X' on the left - hand corner" cannot be entered on the computer, so please...mark your valuables TODAY!...and record all serial numbers.

Gorman Panther Band Twirlers Attend Twirling Camp At HSU

Three students from Gorman High School in Gorman, Texas were participants in the 1984 Big Country Front Line Camp for baton twirlers, flag corps, drum majors, and rifles held on the campus of the Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene June 4-8. Approximately 200 youngsters were on hand for the five-day clinic.

The camp was conducted by Southwest Camps of Cisco, with Mr. Eris Ritchie as camp director. The baton twirlers were taught by a four member staff of twirling instructors and experts headed by Donna Oakley Nall of Abilene, Texas, a former feature twirler at the University of Texas and West Texas State University, and a well known Texas instructor and adjudicator. The drum majors were given their instructional program by James Edwards of Lubbock, Texas, a band director and former drum major at Texas Tech University. The flag corps and rifle students were taught by a staff directed by Sue Brumfield of Longview, a noted band director and auxiliaries coach of the East Texas-Louisiana area.

TABS RESULTS FOR GORMAN ISD STUDENTS

The results of the 1984 TABS for Gorman third, fifth, and ninth graders were given at the June School Board meeting by Linda Glover, School Counselor. The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills is a series of three tests to be taken in these three grades. Subjects tested are reading, writing (composition), and mathematics. The statewide testing program was mandated by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

TABS is designed to provide valid data on the learning achievement of students. The "Exit Level" tests focus on the essential skills a student should master before leaving the public school system. If a student does not score well on these objectives in the ninth grade, special programs may be designed. The student must re-take the tests during the remaining years of highschool or until he masters each objective.

The State Board of Education has set a goal of 85% Mastery for the TABS. That is, 85 percent of students taking the TABS should master the reading and mathematics objectives. By 1985, 85 percent should

master the writing.

GORMAN EXIT LEVEL: Twenty-three students were tested in the ninth grade. In Mathematics, 83% mastered these objectives. This is very close to the statewide goal. Major strengths include Adding, Subtracting, Multiplying, and Dividing Whole Numbers; Determining Distance and Location on Maps; and Reading, Interpreting Charts and Graphs. Major weaknesses are Solving Personal Finance Problems and Using Ratio, Proportion and Percent.

In Reading, 100% mastered these objectives. This is the first year that every student tested mastered any section of the test. Strength was shown on every objective. There were no areas of weakness.

In Composition or Writing only 43% mastered the test as a whole.

This is the first year Gorman has scored so poorly on this section of the test. Because of new scoring procedures, it is hard to tell if the students scored low because of harder grading or because of genuine difficulty in writing. On five out of six objectives 87-100% of our students showed mas-

tery. However, if a student did not score a 2 or better on his written composition, he could not master the Writing portion, regardless of his score on the objectives.

GORMAN GRADE FIVE: Thirty two students were tested this year. More than 80 percent of the class showed mastery on every objective in Mathematics. Major strengths include such objectives as Multiplying Whole Numbers and Interpreting Graphs. The weakest area was Solving Word Problems with Multiplication and Division, but still, 81 percent mastered that.

In Reading, major strengths included Using Context Clues, Using an Index, and Using Maps and Charts. Weaknesses included Distinguishing Fact from Non-Fact, Identifying the Main Idea and Sequencing Events. The class as a whole showed a weakness in the Reading area.

In Writing students scored well. Strengths included Spelling, Sentence Structure, and Commonly Used Forms. A Major Weakness was in Correct English Usage. Eighty-Seven percent scored a two or better on the written composition.

GORMAN GRADE THREE: An average of 30 students were tested on each section in the third grade. In Mathematics, more than 80% of the class showed mastery in eight out of ten objectives. A major strength was Identifying Fractional Parts. Weaknesses included Selecting Units of Measure and Solving Word Problems.

In Reading, 86% or more of the students mastered every objective except one. Every student mastered Following Written Directions and Recognizing Words Through Phonic Analysis. The one objective mastered by only 69% of the class was Sequencing Events.


