A new pecan variety has just been released by the W.R. Poage Fecan Field Station at Brownwood. The new variety. Pawnee, was developed through their pecan breeding program for commercial and home plan-

The Pawnee is a slection from a Mowhawk and Starking Hardy Giant cross made in 1963 at Brownwood. It takes a long time to breed and develop a new pecan variety. A bud from the resulting seedling was propagated to a large tree in 1964, and fruited in 1969. Scienwood or graft wood was distributed to cooperating growers for testing over a wide area beginning in 1978.

As a young tree, Pawnee. grows very fast, often producing long unbranched limbs. The trees later branch well, fruit throughout the trees, and have strong branch angles.

Early data indicate that this variety bears early and heavy. Pawnee produced 2,700 pounds per acre in 1983 in El Paso. One big advantage of Pawnee is that it matures very early, about September 15-30 in Eastland County. This early nut maturity possibly will contribute to the regular bearing potential of this variety. by allowing more time for replenishment of tree carbohydrate reserves in the period between nut maturity and tree dormancy

Pawnee should have good scab resistance in this area. It has shown no or slight

scab when Western Schley was severely infected. It has fair resistance to downy spot, being more resistant than Wichita, Mohawk, or Choctaw, but it is less resistent than Chevenne.

Pawnee sheds pollen early, as does Chevenne, Western and Desirable. It should be a good pollinator to plant with Wichita, Choctaw. Shoshoni, Tejas and other late pollen shedding varieties.

Nut quality in general is excellent, and in-shell appearance and size are good. Kernel percentage is higher than most varieties, 50 to 50% kernel and kernel color is very good. Nuts of this variety have consistently been rated very high for suitability for the Thanksgiving and Christmas trade by industry personnel in Texas and Georgia.

Budwood and graftwood will be supplied only to nurserymen and state universities and experiment stations in 1985. Growers may purchase graftwood or budded nursery trees from nurseries in 1986 and thereafter. A list of nurseries


that will have this new variety will be available later.

Pawnee is the 16th variety released by the fifty-threeyear-old Brownwood pecan breeding program.

Other varieties developed by the research station are Barton (released in 1953) Comanche (1955), Choctaw and Wichita (1959), Apache and Sioux (1961), Mohawk (1965), Caddo and Shawnee (1968), Chevenne (1970), Cherokee (1971), Chickasaw and Shoshoni (1972), Tejas (1973), and Kiowa (1976). Wichita is currently the most popular pecan variety in the world, as far as number of trees being propagated. Also, Cheyenne is recommended for planting in more states by agricultural extension personnel than any other variety. Choctaw, Kiowa, Shoshoni, Sioux, Tejas, and some others are also very popular with growers.



The spirit of Christmas fills hearts and homes with joy

Yuletide messages of love, reverence, hope, reflected in customs from around the world

The music of carols fills the air, ringing in the brisk December afternoon. The sun, setting early, touches innumerable shaggy evergreens and buildings decked for Christmas with its pinkening rays, endowing them with a misty, almost mystical appearance. It's Christmas eve, and stores are bustling with last-minute shoppers, searching yet for the perfect present for the special people in

Back at home, a sense of merriment prevails as fireplaces are hung with garlands of greenery, and Christmas trees adorned with a variety of dazzling ornaments - family heirlooms, glistening metallic balls, candy canes stripped of their plastic wrap-

Upstairs, in a secret place, mom and dad play Santa Claus, and put the final wrappings on the presents. Later, after the children are asleep, they will file silently downstairs, arms overflowing with brightly decorated packages and a multitude of items meant to fill the row of stockings hanging from the man-

These are the elements of the contemporary American Christmas, a time of merriment for all and more crucially a time of joy, celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. Some people believe that the true importance of the holiday is disguised by the glitter and the plenty of its manifestations. Most, however, see the many ways of celebrating Christmas as an outpouring of good will and felowship, an occasion to enjoy and, even more important, to give easure - to friends, to family, and especially to people unknown: the needy who benefit from Christmastime generosity, the lonely who can enjoy Christmas too, thanks to the thoughtfulness of people they have never met.

Virtually every country on the globe has a different way of celebrating this important holiday, and all of them - merry or serene - are reflections of its joyfulness.

In Italy, the presepio, or creche, is the focus of much care and love, as elaborate manger scenes are constructed by eager hands. Everything is put in place on Christmas eve — the manger itself, the animals, the angels, the shepherds, Joseph and Mary. But, it is not till Christmas morning that the tiny figure of the infant Jesus is placed lovingly in the crib, traditionally by the mother of

In Germany, the country that gave the world the Christmas tree, the tree is the natural center of activity. The mother of the house is responsible for trimming it, and absolute secrecy pre-

vails till she has completed her task. For weeks prior to Christmas, she has been baking a vast assortment of cookies in decorative shapes - some are used as or-

naments for the tree; more are eaten by the happy household. In Poland, the Star of Bethlehem shines its rays over the Christmas festivities, a sign of the end of the Advent fast and the beginning of Christmas feasting. A Star Man and Star Boys pay each household a visit after supper has ended. Garbed in elaborate costumes, they orchestrate the Christmas eve activities, with the Star Man quizzing the children on the catechism, and giving them small gifts as reward for good performance, while the Star Boys regale the household with carols.

In Mexico, the poinsettias add brilliance to the Christmas festivities; its bright red and green leaves contribute to Mexicans' sense of it as the "flower of the holy night." Besides the poinsettia, the other uniquely Mexican contribution to Christmas celebrations is the pinata, a hollow vessel shaped like an animal or person, often fantastical, which is filled with a multitude of toys and candy. The children of the house are each blindfolded in turn, and given a stick with which to break the pinata. When one of them succeeds, they all share the favors that come tumbling out of

In Syria, a quieter tradition of Christmas celebrations prevails. The youngest son of each household reads out loud the story of the Nativity from the Bible, surrounded by his family, who sit quiet and attentive in a courtyard lit by a myriad of flickering candles. The gates of each home are locked — a sobering reminder of past years when religious persecution resulted in all worship being conducted in secrecy.

While the child reads from the Gospel, the father of the family lights a pile of wood which has been readied. The blaze is watched closely, for tradition states that the way in which it burns will reflect the family's fortune in the new year. While waiting for the fire to burn itself out, the family sings psalms; when it is burned to embers, a wish is made, and each member of the family leaps over the fire's smouldering remains. A very different way of celebrating the Christmas holiday, indeed.

It remains a fact that, the world over, the Christmas spirit makes itself felt in a multitude of ways. And, every one, as it should be, is an expression of joy.

Mistletoe lore, traditions

Kissing beneath the mistletoe - a metaphor in classical mythology. charming custom that virtually all of us

fellows vie to hang the sprig of mistletoe Balder was killed. from doorways, somewhat hidden from view, only to surprise an unsuspecting passionately and, so the legend says, every young lady with a kiss when she steps through the door and under the mistletoe.

Like many other Christmas traditions observed in this country, kissing under the death, the other Norse gods decreed that mistletoe would seem to have originated in mistletoe should no longer be an indepen-England. Numerous variations of the custom existed there.

berry from the mistletoe bough each time they kissed a young lady. When all the berries were gone, the kissing was over.

In many parts of England, the Kissing Bunch was popular. This was an extremely elaborate arrangement of greenery such as holly and ivy on a pair of hoops looped inside each other. Also part of the Kissing Bunch were colored ribbons, apples, oranges and paper roses, and three dolls, representing Jesus Christ, Mary and Joseph, which were hung from inside the hoops or, on occasion, arranged in a manger scene. From the bottom of the Kissing Bunch depended a sprig of mistle-

The Kissing Bunch would be hung in the center of a room, and all who passed under it would earn the right to seize a

A related custom is practiced in Austria and the Alpine region on New Year's Eve. There, the local inn is decked out in greenery, and the main room decorated with a pine wreath hanging from the roof beams.

In one corner of the room, a masked man lurks. He is known as "Sylvester," appears old and hideous, and wears a wreath of mistletoe. Whenever a young man or woman passes under the pine wreath, it is Sylvester's privilege to leap out and plant a rough kiss on the individual's cheek. However, his reign is shortlived for at midnight he is chased away a grotesque figure of the year which is now

Why all this fuss about mistletoe? What legends, hid in the mists of time, have impressed upon this parasitic evergreen which lives upon non-evergreens, and particularly the oak, an importance of this sort?

Many pre-Christian cultures have revered the mistletoe. It was probably Sir James Frazier's "golden bough," a central

The Druids, the Celtic priests of pre-Christian Britain, revered the holy mistletoe, which grew entwined on their sacred oak, and which they believed to contain the soul of the living oak tree.

According to Druidic legend the mistletoe, which grew out of the air itself, clung to the oak tree for support.

At the New Year, the Druids engaged in an elaborate ceremony which centered on the mistletoe. One Druid, garbed in white, would climb an oak tree and cut down a bough of mistletoe with a golden sickle.

Below the tree, to catch the mistletoe as it fell, was a white cloth, for the Druids believed that the mistletoe must never touch the ground lest it be sullied. Once this part of the ceremony was complete, two white bulls would be sacrificed, and prayers were intoned.

The Druids believed that the mistletoe had great curative powers, and called it the "all-healer." Applied to barren animals, it would make them bear young, and it was efficacious against poisons, epilepsy, consumption and the like. It was generally plete hung above doorways or over the fire-

toe, originally a free-standing tree, was dessert. the wood used for the Cross. However, because of the evil purpose it served it suffered the fate of becoming a parasite, never again to live independently but al- meat during Christmas dinner - a year's ways to live on another plant.

Another related legend states the mistletoe, after being used for the Cross, shrank to its lowly, shriveled state - a fit punishment for the use to which it was put.

However, it is its role as a tool of evil for the eventual attainment of good that gives mistletoe its place in myth and legend, and reinforces its importance in the celebration of Christmas.

How much do you know about the Twelve Days of Christmas?

The Twelve Days of Christmas are familiar to most people, chiefly as the raison d'etre of a fabulous giftfest comprising such unlikely presents as swans, geese, leaping lads, dancing ladies and the immortal partridge in its pear tree, star of innumerable Christmas cards.

Everyone, of course, knows Christmas Day itself (which, depending on which calendar you are using, is either the first of the Twelve Days or just prior to them), as well as Epiphany, January 6, the Twelfth Day (according to some systems of counting, the 13th), which signifies the close of the Christmas season. But how many people can recite the Holy Days which fall between the two?

The concept of the Twelve Days probably originated as a Teutonic, pre-Christian holdover, which was seized upon by the Church as a convenient link between Christmas and Epiphany, and only a few of the days are traditionally celebrated.

These are St. Stephen's Day (December 26), St. John's Day (December 27) and Holy Innocents Day, also known as Childermas (December 28).

St. Stephen's Day honors the first martyr of the Christian church, who died a gruesome death by stoning in 33 A.D.

of horses, the date was considered propitious for such activities as sweating and bleeding horses.

peasants to travel — sometimes a great distance - to neighboring farms to care for each other's horses on St. Stephen's Day.

Also in Sweden, St. Stephen's Day was customarily celebrated with horse racing, presumably a throwback to pagan purification rituals which were centered around horseback riding and races.

St. John's Day is associated chiefly with the tradition of drinking wine which has been blessed, and which was believed to render the imbiber safe from the effects of poison throughout the coming year.

poisoned wine which St. John the Apostle drank when challenged by a pagan priestess to do so as a test of God's power. Miraculously, St. John drank the wine without ill effects, having first made the sign of the cross over it.

Variations on the theme in regions of Europe have believers drinking consecrated wine to protect them from a wide assortment of ills: not only poison, but

Because St. Stephen is the patron saint lightning, ill health, a poor harvest and spoiled wine.

This has caused speculation among scholars that the drinking — sometimes to In Sweden, where the holiday was most excess! — of wine on St. John's Day arose extensively observed, it was traditional for as a holdover from a pagan wine sacrifice.

> At any rate, wine drinking on December 27th was so widespread that certain 17th century German scholars wittily suggested that Weihnacht - the German name for Christmas - might well be changed to Weinnacht, wine night.

> Childermas, the last in this triad of holy days, marks Herod's massacre of the innocents, by which means he hoped to kill the

It is, according to tradition, a particularly unlucky date. No one, if he could help it, would begin something on that This custom commemorates a cup of day. King Edward IV of England went so far as to postpone his coronation, originally scheduled for Holy Innocents Day, and King Louis XI of France categorically refused to transact business on that date.

> Leaving matters of state aside, housewives in Cornwall in Southern England refused to scrub their abodes on Childermas, and their counterparts in Northhamptonshire eschewed doing the

Needless to say, it was not a popular date for weddings, and no one with his wits about him would consider donning new attire for the first time on Childermas.

Customarily, children were whipped

(presumably, not too hard) on Holy Innocents Day, possibly to bring home Herod's More likely, this, too, is the survival of a pre-Christian ritual, as adults, as well as

children, traditionally came in for their share of whipping. That it was not considered punitive but was a boon is indicated by the almost universal ritual of rewarding the whipper with

sweets or nuts; presumably the beating -

frequently accomplished with omnipresent evergreen branches - was supposed to cause the expulsion of evil spirits. Today, of course, this ritual, like so many others, is a thing of the past. But it is unfortunate that we do not, for the most

part, even remember the existence of customs which were, for our ancestors, of great significance: central to their observance and understanding of their religion. For, each custom or tradition remem-

bered enriches immeasurably our understanding, and deepens our appreciation of the heritage which has made us what we

Tracing the spicy history of mincemeat, a favorite Yuletide dessert, from the Middle Ages through today

Merry-making often takes place around a table. Hence, for each holiday, there is an assortment of traditional dishes without which the occasion would not be com-

Christmas dinner is simply not Christmas dinner without a roast goose or turkey Christian legend has it that the mistle- as a main dish, and without mince pie for

In fact, so central is mince pie to the celebration of Christmas that it is considered bad luck to turn down a portion of minceworth of misfortune, to be precise.

On the other hand, mincemeat lovers will be glad to learn that, for every day during the Twelve Days of Christmas in which they partake of mincemeat at a different home, they will enjoy a month of happiness in the coming year.

The tradition of serving mincemeat at Christmas is centuries old. Since the Middle Ages, when the Crusaders brought back to England the first fragrant spices out of the east, British cooks have been

Christmas holiday. The use of spices had a two-fold importance. Primarily, the spices acted as a preservative, increasing the staying power of the meat which was the most important inhad a symbolic importance, as they repre-

brought to the infant Christ. This symbolism was enhanced by the shape in which the pie was baked. A rectangular form, called a "coffin," was used - a visual metaphor for Christ's cradle, according to some experts; for his sepulchre, according to others. Oftentimes, this metaphor was extended by decorating the top of the mince pie with an image of the Holy Infant.

pie contributed to its popularity during the centuries before the Puritan regime in England; however, once the Puritans took

preparing mincemeat pies - originally control of the British government, they called "shrid pies" and, somewhat later, outlawed mince pie. For, strict in their "shredded pies" - to commemorate the rules and expectations, they saw mince pie as it was baked and served, as "an abomination, idolatry, superstition and popish

Manage Soil To **Boost Moisture**

COLLEGE STATION - With this year's drought still fresh on their minds, Texas farmers can take steps in managing their crop land to better deal with dry weather should it occur agian next year.

"The time to prepare for a drought is well before it hits," points out Dr. Ed Colburn, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "This means managing the soil properly prior to the next crop year to improve its water storage capacity."

Practicing conservation tillage can go a long way in conserving rainfall that occurs during the fall winter month, Colburn points out. This means leaving part of the previous crop's residue - at least 30% - on the soil surface and then planting the next crop into that soil-residue mix.

"Conservation tillage helps to improve soil moisture conditions by increasing water infiltration and slowing evaporation from the soil," says Colburn. "It also reduces soil compaction, runoff and erosion and increases a soil's water storage capacity. That extra inch or two of stored moisture could help carry a crop through a dry spell."

Colburn advises farmers to choose a tillage operation that will leave a considerable amount of crop residue on the soil surface. While listing and

moldboard plowing reduce crop residue by as much as 90%, disking reduces residues by about 50% and chiseling and subsoiling reduce residue only 20 to 25%.

"Crop residue on the soil surface will intercept rainfall, thus reducing soil dispersion and surface sealing and increasing water infiltration and storage," Colburn explains. "That's why residue management is so important, particularily during fallow periods, mainly the fall and winter seasons, when rainfall may be signficant."

Conservation tillage requires increased management, adds the agronomist, including a good knowledge of the effectiveness of various herbicides in each weed control situation.

Where soil compaction is a problem, Cloburn advises farmers to use deep tillage operations, particularly chiseling, to improve the situation. Again, such an operation in the fall can help the soil store up moisture from winter and early spring rains.

Furrow diking is another practice that inables farmers to make more efficient use of rainfall as well as irrigation water. Furrow diking involves a tillage practice in which mounds of soil are mechanically placed at intervals across the furrow, thus forming small basins, the agronomist explains. These basins trap and hold rainfall so that the moisture can infiltrate the soil rather than being lost as runoff.



ially valuable practice in areas where rainfall comes in short, heavy spurts," says Colburn.

He points out that furrow diking more than doubled dryland grain sorghum yields in test at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland and at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Vernon-Chillicothe.

So, as farmers contemplate next year's crops and the vargaries of weather, they need to do their part in overcoming dry conditions by practicing soil management techniques that can improve water storage, notes Colburn. That extra bit of moisture in the soil could make a big difference in crop production next


