PANTHERS OUTLAST SANTO 44-14; GO TO RISING STAR FRIDAY AT 7:30

The Gorman Panthers made it three-in-a-row last Friday evening when they hosted the Santo Wildcats at Brogdon Field in a non-district battle. The final score read 44 to 14, but it was a tough battle for the Panthers a good deal of the way as the Wildcats answered the Panthers scoring drives on the first two occasions, before the Big Red defense settled down and stopped the Wildcat offense.

The Panthers started off the game with a long drive, going 63 yards in 6 plays with Scott Gressett getting the final 2 yards on a keeper with 9:16 left on the clock. The drive featured a 20 yard run by Don Rodgers, a 25 yard pass to John Carter and also a 10 yard pass to Don Rodgers. Rodgers ran for the two pointer and Gorman led 8-0.

This lead was short lived, however because on the following possession the Wildcats took the ball on their own 38, and after a 12 yard gain on first down, Adam Popplewell again took the handoff and scooted 55 yards for the touchdown with 8:37 left in the period. Popplewell ran for the two pointer and the score was knotted 8-8.

The Panthers got on the board again with 1:57 left in the first period when Joe Rodgers ran it in from the 4 yard line. The scoring play was set up by a beautiful 26 yard run by Brandon Gilmore. Gressett scored the two pointer on a keeper and the Panthers were up 16-8.

Again this lead was short lived as the Wildcats' man of the hour Popplewell, took a reverse handoff

The Panther defense started hitting tough and caused the Wildcats to fumble on their own 24. From there the Panthers scored in just three plays with Gilmore racing for the final 14 on a great run with 5:05 left in the period. The run for points failed and the Panthers led 22 to 14.

The Big Red added another touchdown prior to the first half intermission when they started a drive on the Wildcat 42 and scored in 6 plays with Don Rodgers getting the final 3 yards on a run with 1:06 left in the half. The drive featured a 12 yard run by Don a 25 yard pass to Joe Rodgers. The pass try for points failed and the halftime score was 28-14.

The second half was played on more even terms, especially in the third quarter. However, the Panthers took the ball on their own 15 and went the distance with John Carter getting the credit for the touchdown by recovering a fumble by Gilmore following a beautiful 20 yard run, then the ball was knocked loose and rolled into the end zone and John was alert and recovered for Gorman. Gressett added the two pointer on a run and the score rose to 38-14.

The final Panther score came with 2:55 left in the game when Gilmore

ran for the final yard, following a Wildcat fumble recovery on the Santo 13. Joe Rodgers got the two pointer on a run and the final score read 44 to 14.

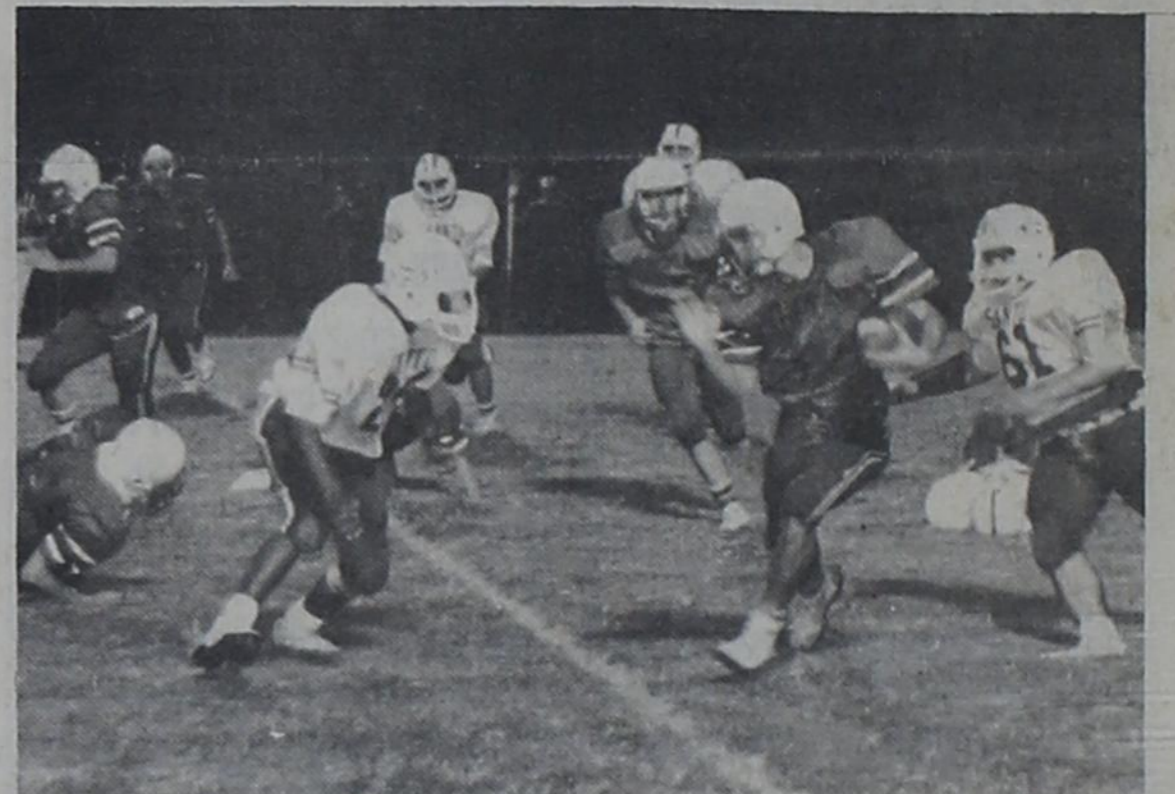

Joe Rodgers was in the lineup for the first time and really added to the Big Red offense as he had 82 yards on 11 tries. Brandon Gilmore lead the Panthers with 119 yards on 14 carries. Don Rodgers got 93 on 11 trips. Gressett had 34 on 6 keepers, and Jay McCormick was 2 for 8 yards.

The Panther defense will really have to be up and ready this Friday night as the Panthers travel to Rising Star to begin District 8A play with the Wildcats. The Wildcats have a real fine ball club and will be favored in this game I'm sure, as they have done good this season. The Wildcats have been picked as one of the favorites in our district and the Big Red will have to have another really great game to bring home the victory and that is exactly what we think they will do.

Don Rodgers, Scott Gressett and Eddie Woodall were standouts on defense for the Panthers this game.

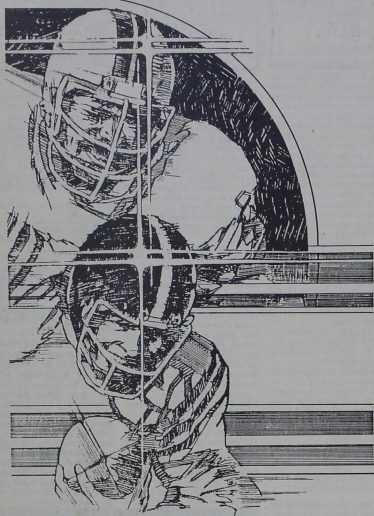
