

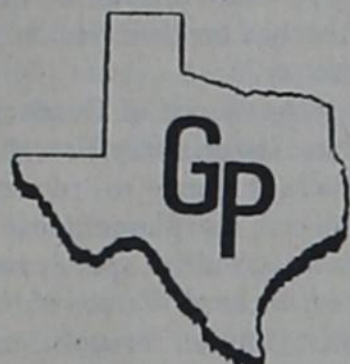

There is little doubt that it will be a book we will all enjoy in our lifetimes, but more importantly, it will be a treasured family heirloom to be enjoyed by your descendants.

Family stories are due May 31, 1987.

4. Related events and circumstances.
5. Your childhood, health, accidents, playmates, trips, brothers and sisters, unusual happenings, visitors, relatives you remember, finances that influenced your lifestyle.
6. School days: Schools attended, teachers, special activities, achievements, humorous situations, who or what influenced you?

II Activities:

1. Vacations
2. Jobs: What did you or your parents do for a living? What business and neighbor problems affected you?
3. Sports
4. Tasks at home
5. Fun and funny situations
6. Transportation
7. Courtship and Marriage: Where you met, proposal, wedding, parties, honeymoon, meeting your in-laws.
8. Married life: Settling down, your new home, housekeeping, joys and sorrows.
9. Vocation: Training, promotions, achievements, etc.

III Avocations:

1. What did you do for recreation?
2. Civic and Political activities.
3. Church: Activities, Influence
4. Hobbies
5. Travels
6. Family landmarks and historical sites.

IV Remembrances of unique family experiences.

1. Special celebrations
2. Holidays: Christmas, birthdays, etc.
3. Ancestors: Impressions of those you knew and others you heard about.
4. Hardships
5. Remembered impressions of the land and people
6. Problems: Water? Dirt? Animals?
7. Humorous incidents. Frightening experiences.
8. Recollections that are unique to your family.

V Writing tips:

1. If you tell what is interesting and meaningful to you, it will be more than adequate.



SPECIAL BRIDGE REPLACEMENT PROGRAM APPROVED

Two hundred twenty-two existing state highway system bridges will be rehabilitated in a program approved today by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The \$20,286,350 highway department program saves money by extending the useful lives of bridges needing more than normal maintenance but not requiring full replacement.

The program was designed to add at least 10 years to the lives of the bridges, department engineers say, barring unanticipated increases in traffic volumes or changes in stream flows.

Normal bridge maintenance is done usually by highway department crews who perform all types of "good housekeeping" chores on the Texas' 74,000-mile state highway system.

A federal program available to the states covers replacement only of bridges that are inadequate for present traffic or are structurally deficient.

The program approved today includes bridges on Interstate, US- and state-numbered highways, and farm- and ranch-to-market roads.

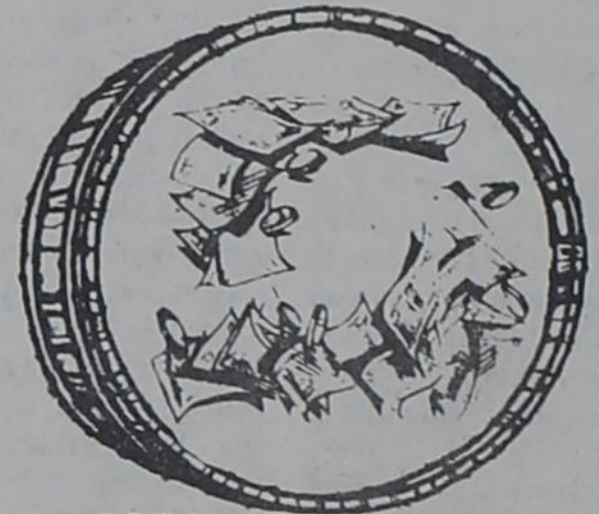

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CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



Now seems an appropriate time to recommence my Capitol Update column, not simply because I think you want to read one more political writer's column, but because so many strange and quasi-wonderful things are now happening in Austin that you probably ought to get as many viewpoints as possible. Let me start by telling you a little about the unhappy state of affairs in our prison system.

If you break it down to a "good news, bad news" scenario, the bad news is that our prisons are staying closed about as many days per month as they are staying open. They are literally packed to the bursting point and on the 15th of this month we have to, as a state, show the Honorable William Wayne Justice good cause why we should not be assessed \$855,000 per day in fines for failure to comply with his mandate.

As late as last week over 500 inmates were released from TDC simply because there was no room to put them. In one example out in an adjacent county, an inmate who was given a 6-year prison term by a jury, actually served less than 6 months in TDC!

That is the bad news. The good news is that if you ever seriously considered committing a felony crime, now would be a real good time to do it.

As with many problems of the state, there is nothing wrong with TDC that money wouldn't cure. The problem seems to be that the powers that be in Austin are simply not prepared to spend the money to adequately fund our prison system.

The prison problems did not just materialize two weeks ago, tow months ago, or even two years ago. The problem with TDC is a problem that knowledgeable observers have watched build and grow for at least the last ten years. One of the first crises that I heard about when I first came to Austin as your shiny, new, take-on-the-world State Representative in January, 1983, was the prison crisis. It's the same old crisis, only worse.

I firmly believe the people of the State of Texas want the people that Texas juries send to TDC to at least stay long enough for their changes of address to be processed by the post office. I believe the people of the State of Texas are willing to pay for that in the form of additional taxes if that is necessary.

Now, before you start, there is nothing I can do, at least in the short term, about the television sets and so

forth that William Wayne Justice has ordered TDC inmates. That comes under the heading of making the best of a bad situation which is clearly what we have got to do.

As always, I'd be tickled to hear from you.

RELEASE OF INMATES SHOCKS DA WALTON

Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County, has received notification from the Board of Pardons and Paroles of the impending release of inmates from the Texas Department of Corrections as the result of recently passed legislation authorizing early release of inmates who are not charged with violent crimes. Among those being considered for early release are: Charles William Gilmore, who has 2 convictions for burglary and one for passing a forged instrument with sentences for 10 years in each case beginning in August, 1986; Wayne Benton Weeks, convicted for engaging in organized crime with a sentence of 8 years beginning in July, 1985; Billy Joe Hibbler, convicted for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, with a 3 year sentence beginning September, 1986.

Bryan David Frey, convicted for burglary and sentenced to 3 years beginning in February, 1986; Kevin Wayne Garmon, convicted in Eastland County for theft by check, over \$200 and theft, over \$200 with sentences in each case for 8 years beginning in May, 1982.

Walton explained that some of the above named persons had been on parole and had their parole revoked and now appears they will be given credit for time they were on parole. He added that he was shocked at the early release of Gilmore who is facing three 10 year sentences after having only served 8 months. Anyone interested in filing a protest to the early release of any of these inmates sentenced in Eastland County should contact the Board of Pardons and Paroles, P.O. Glasgow Carries Important Economic Development Bills

Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) reported that he is the Senate sponsor of several House bills designed to stimulate the stagnant Texas economy. "These bills will create needed jobs and infuse capital back into the state," Glasgow stated. Glasgow will sponsor H.B. 3, H.B. 4 and H.B. 5 as well as House Joint Resolution 5.

H.B. 4 would create the Texas Department of Commerce which would combine several existing state agencies to promote economic growth and development. "One of the most innovative aspects of this bill is that it will authorize the new Department to make loans to businesses from capital raised from the sale of general revenue bonds," Glasgow said.

The Texas Department of Commerce would be designated as the primary state economic development and marketing agency. The agency will provide a new level of coordination and review of various economic development functions presently scattered in a number of agencies with a primary emphasis concerning small businesses.

H.B. 5 would give small businesses relief by streamlining the complicated process of obtaining business permits. H.B. 3 would set up a committee to promulgate the economic development policies for Texas. The Resolution which would be placed on the November ballot, if passed, would allow the Legislature to provide assistance to encourage economic development.

Senator Glasgow remarked that the current economic outlook is unlikely to improve unless the state takes a positive and progressive approach to foster new business growth.

CITY CHIT CHAT

The City Commission met at 6 p.m. on April 9 with the mayor and all commissioners present. The votes were canvassed and Jackie Don Simpson, Kenneth Roberts, and J.A. Carter were declared duly elected to the commission. They were given the oath of office by Municipal Judge Parker. Other city employees present were Chief Funderburg and Mrs. Brinegar.

There were a number of people who came to the meeting to hear a discussion on the possibility of asking for a Community Development Grant to improve water distribution and possibly sewer improvement. Mr. Carl O'Neal, an engineer from Dallas, was present to explain what would be required in order to have a chance of getting a grant funded. He pointed out the fact that the project would have to serve a concentrated area of low to moderate income people. It was agreed that some investigation would be done and a decision made on the matter later.

There were representatives present from Stephenville Hospital to discuss the possibility of the operation of a volunteer ambulance service in Gorman. The Hospital District agreed to furnish the ambulance and handle the billing. They also have the ambulance covered with insurance to the last of June. The Clinic would provide a place for the ambulance. Canterbury Villa would provide a work station for volunteers and coordinate the program. The City agreed to furnish the gasoline and take care of regular maintenance on the ambulance. They also agreed to look for a way to pick up the cost of the insurance when the present policy expires. There were some suggestions made that the City add one dollar per month to all utility bills to be used for this purpose. We would like to hear from you on this suggestion. Tell one of the commissioners, myself or call the City Hall and tell Edna. This one dollar would just about take care of the insurance cost. The Stephenville Hospital agreed to pay for the cost of training the volunteer help through Tarleton. It was reported that there were ten people who had volunteered and training was to have started on Monday night. Let us hear from you. We need an ambulance.

The Commission organized for the coming year. Bill Clark was elected as mayor pro tem and police and fire commissioner. Jackie Don Simpson was elected as street commissioner, J.A. Carter as sanitation and garbage commissioner and Kenneth Roberts as water and parks commissioner. Jackie Don Simpson will be acting as City Manager for the months of April and May.

We passed on second reading City Ordinance #299 which will regulate truck traffic within the city.

The Commission set the week of April 27 through May 1 as city-wide clean-up week. We urge all of you to pitch in and help to clean up around your place. We will be hauling material that is not regularly picked up. Any trimmings, or any other materials to be hauled must be placed near the street or alley and be of such size that it can be loaded on a flat bed. If you have trash to be hauled, call the city office at 734-2317 and tell Edna what you have and where it will be piled. Come on now and help us make our town a cleaner place to live by each of you making your place a cleaner place. Just take a look around in your yard, along your fence lines, and everywhere else around your place to see just what you could live without. Trash not only looks bad, it creates a place for insects and rats to breed in and infest your property.

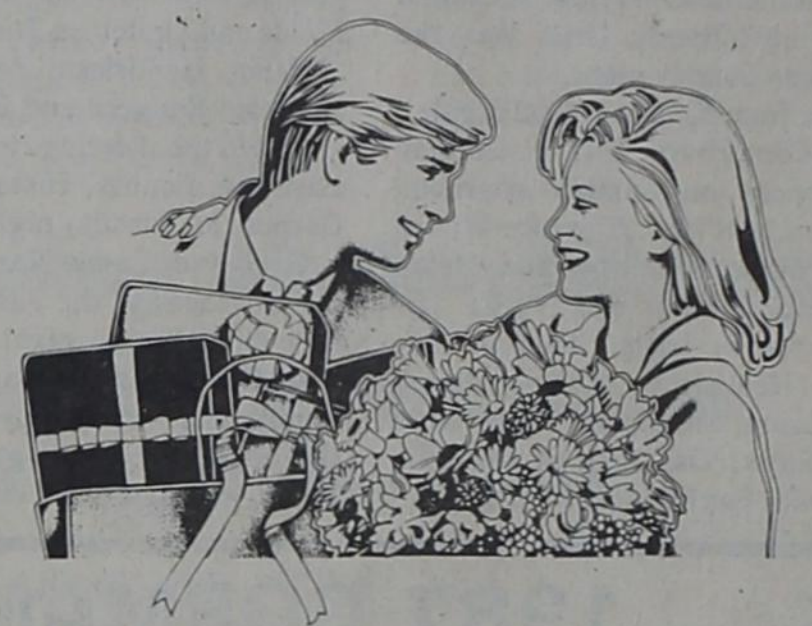
