PEANUT CLINIC **SLATED FRIDAY** IN EASTLAND CO.

Peanut growers who would like to consult with the specialists about their crop problems will have an opportunity to do so on Friday, August 21st.

A Peanut Climic has been planned by the crops committee to help growers with current problems according to County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon. A team of Extension Service personnel will be at three different locations in Eastland County during the day. Growers are encouraged to bring plants showing problem symptoms or just come and ask questions.

The team of specialists will include Dr. George Alston, Extension Agrronomist; Dr. Chip Lee, Plant Pathologist, and Gordon.

The first location will be at Johnsons Seed and Fertilizer in Desdemona from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. The second location will be at the Carbon Farm Supply from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. and the third location will be at the Pioneer Farmers Co-op in Pioneer from 1:00 to 2:30 p.m. Peanut farmers may go to any one

of the locations during those time periods. Gordon says, there will be no formal presentations, but the specialists will discuss any peanut problem and identify diseases, weeds, insects, or soil problems. -GP-

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITIES REVISITED

As our fiscal year comes to an end, the Chamber would like to review our projects for the past year. Each year the Chamber actively supports our community in many ways.

Shut-ins are encouraged to designate an authorized representative to pick up for them. Commodities will be distributed on a first come/first serve basis. Volunteers are greatly needed and appreciated to help with this much-needed program.

In October, 1986, and January, 1987 we made a total donation of \$3,000 to the tennis court fund.

In January, 1987 we began our plans for the Annual Farmers Banquet that is held each year in March. It takes a lot of preparation to put this event on each year. The banquet was held on March 26. At this time we honored our Outstanding Farmer of the Year, Bill Underwood and awarded a Community Service Award to Mozelle Rhymes. We also awarded academic awards to Stacy Slampa, Scott Gressett, Kevin Love, and April Daniels.

In March we also made a \$200 donation to the 4-H and FFA Booster Club to help purchase an animal at the Eastland County Livestock Show and Sale.

In May we began work on our Miss Gorman and Little Miss Gorman contest. Sponsors selected candidates and the fund raising began. The Chamber again decided to use money raised from the contest for a Community Building. When the contest ended on June 20 there was \$4,737.96 raised. Our new Miss Gorman, Nikki Warren, and Little Miss Gorman, Tiffany Troutman, were named. They will be participating in area parades throughout the year.

Please allow me to discuss an issue that I think should be of growing concern to all of us. That is the current trend of issuing bonds to solve our state's financial problems.

By way of background, we have always prided ourselves in this state for having a "pay as you go" clause in our Constitution that prohibits deficit spending. We have been very self satisfied by virtue of the fact that we could not accumulate huge deficits like the federal government has done. By and large, we have been able to operate within that "pay as you go" framework.

Now, when faced with the need for huge expenditures in areas such as our prison system, we have proposed, and you will be voting on, a bond issue to fund that project. Do not be misled into a misunderstanding of the nature of a bond. A bond is simply an evidence of a debt that has to be paid at some future date. Mechanically, it is not at all different than your going to your local bank, borrowing money and signing a note to pay the money at some future date. Any way you calculate that, it's deficit spending. Quite simply, it is spending money you don't expect to receive in the future. approval of them may well be on.

Before we go into the merits of a bond issue, I just want to be sure we all know what a bond truly is. It is a debt.

The merits of the bond issue you are going to be asked to vote on are of the highest order. We desperately need prison space. Even as I am writing this, our prisons are once again closed. Virtually everyone agrees that the construction of prisons is absolutely necessary and I firmly agree with that; my concern is how do we pay for them.

I want you to think about it and I want you to be informed and realize when you vote to use bonds issued to pay for current projects, you are turning away from the historic "pay as you go" approach we Texans have always taken to state government. It may be time for that. I am not saying it's not. What I am saying is that it is a change in the direction of our state and a change in a unique Texas philosophy that we may never regain once it is lost.

Generally speaking, the constitutional amendments we vote on are, in most respects, not of monumental importance; but I think I can tell you that general obligation bonds that look to future tax revenues of have today against money you this state for payment and your have the opportunity to vote

Walnut caterpillars continue to defoliate pecan trees in our area. The caterpillar is a serious threat to pecan and walnut trees. They defoliate oak, willow, honey locust and certain woody shrubs sometimes but prefer pecans and walnuts. The caterpillars develop in large clusters and rapidly defoliate yard and orchard trees, if not controlled. Spraying with insecticedes is the best control measure. To avoid as

much damage as possible, spray the caterpillars when they are still young.

The adult insect is a moth with a two inch wing span. It is brown and tan with a dark region on the body behind the head and has wavy, dark lines across the front wings. The adults emerge from pupae which overwinter in the soil at the base of the trees. The female moth later deposits about 300 eggs on the

underside of one of the leaves. Caterpillars, or larvae, hatch from

the eggs in about 9 days and lve together in a group. They are reddish brown when young and turn black with white markings and long white hairs when they are older. Large larvae are conspicuously fuzzy and may grow up to two inches long.

Young larvae feed only on soft tissue, leaving a skelotonized leaf behind, while older larvae feed on the entire leaf, including the petiole. The last few stages, or instars, do the majority of the feeding damage. Larvae characteristically arch their heads and tails in a defensive posture when disturbed. Since they feed together, damage may be localized to just a branch or two. Isolated trees are more subject to attack than orchard trees.

Use products containing Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon, Zolone, Orthene, Methoxychlor, Dylox, Proxol, Pydrin, or Bacillus Thuringiensis. Throughly spray leaves, twigs, limbs and tree trunks. Large infested trees may require treatment by commercial applicators with high-pressure sprayers.

Insecticide label clearances are subject to change, so be sure to read and follow carefully the instructions on the container label. The pesticide user is responsible for the effects of pesticides on his own plants or household goods as well as problems caused by drift from his property to other properties or plants.


