ELECTION RESULTS FOR EASTLAND COUNTY CANDIDATES

countywide incumbents won renomination in Saturday's Democratic primary, but runoff races will be needed to determine several precinct race, Danny Claborn led the field offices.

Incumbent County Clerk Joann got 349 to win a spot in the runoff. Johnson withstood the challenge of Unsuccessful candidates in that Sherry Staggs Johnson, winning 2,087 to 1,706.

District Clerk Mary Jane Rowch-Brown won renomination by less than 200 votes over Dorothy J. Pyke. The final, unofficial count was 1,941 to 1,792.

Veteran Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton edged past Eastland attorney Leslie Vance, 1,948 to 1,810, to win his fifth term. Runoffs will be required to determine the Democratic nominees for 147. county treasurer and both commissioner and justice of the peace slots

that are up for election this year. Ruth Publiese was the top vote getter in the county treasurer's race with 1,642. Betty Cross polled 1,312 to gain the runoff. Rita Reid Byrd was the third candidate. She had 854.

GORMAN FOLKS WANT A BLOOD DO **PROGRAM HERE?**

The Gorman Lions Club discussed a Blood Donor program at their meeting on Tuesday at Noon in the band hall.

The idea of having a blood drive program set up in Gorman was discussed with the majority of the members having the same thought on the program - - Does Gorman folks want a Blood Donor Program

here? The Carter Bloodmobile will come to Gorman and set up a blood donor program in the "Give the Gift of Life" project if there are 50 folks to donate blood who are eligible to do so. There will be a need for more than 50 people to donate because there are always a few who will not qualify when the time comes for taking blood. So it is thought that about 60 or 65 donors will be needed so that we could qualify for the 50 pint donation needed to set up the program. It is the understanding of the club that if 50 pints of blood is donated then Gorman could qualify for all the blood they would need for one year. The Bloodmobile is set up to come around every 6 months. This would give Gorman folks the blood they would need for one year.

PRIMARY RESULTS REPUBLICAN RELEASED FOR GORMAN

The returns from the Republican Primary Election held on Saturday, May 3 have been released. The election was held in the new fire hall building.

In the Governors race Bill Clements received 30 votes, while Kent Hance had 25 and Tom Loeffler had 6.

In the Lt. Governors race Aaron L. Bullock polled 22 votes, while David Davidson had 16, Glen Jackson 6 and Virgil Mulanax 5.

In the Attorney Generals race Ed Walsh received 28, while Roy Barrera had 10 and John Roach 9.

In the General Land Office Commissioners race M. D. Anderson polled 18, while Grady Yarbrough had 15 and George Collis 12. Bill Powers lead all candidates in the Ag. Commissioners race with 28, while Charles Trompler had 18.

In the Railroad Commissioner race Milton Fox and John Henderson tied with 18 votes each, while Ralph Hoelscher had 6 and Ed Emmitt 3.


Charles Howell lead Nathan Hecht by a large margin in the Justice Supreme Court, Place I, polling 35 votes to Hecht'a 9.
