Kendra Lewis is a 15 year old in Gorman High School. She is the daughter of Bit and Lori Lewis of Desdemona and Gina Alexander Roberts of Morgan Mill, and the granddaughter of R.M. and Ruth Lewis of Desdemona, Betty and Raul Perez of DeLeon.

Kendra has been experiencing fainting episodes for periods of five to 30 minutes and has been diagnosed Chiari I malformation (basically the brain has an extra growth that extends into the spinal canal affecting respiratory and heart rate). The surgery cannot be performed in Texas, but there is a neurosurgeon in Iowa City, Iowa that will do the surgery.

The surgery will take place in September and she will be in the hospital for approximately 3 weeks and then in halo traction for six months. The family is needing help from the community to help defray some of the medical expenses and parents will be unable to work during the time spent in Iowa. 

The Gorman Panthers opened the season on a bright note on Friday night when they travelled to Hermleigh to take on the Cardinals and came away with a 27-13 victory. The Panthers jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and added more points, in the third period while holding the pass oriented Cardinals to 7 points in the second quarter and 6 in the third.

Gorman's first score came on a 3 yard run by Reggie Sanchez with 2:15 left in the first period. The score came after the Big Red defense got a fumble on the Cards 5 yard line. John Torres ran for 2 yards on the first play. Scott Lewis booted the point after and the score was 7-0.

The Panthers got another break on the next Cardinal possession when they returned a Card fumble on the Cards 27 for a score with 1:49 left in the first. Lewis kicked the point after and Gorman was up 14-

But the Cards came back in the second quarter when they took the ball on their own 9 and scored in one big blast as Blaine Minton hit Keenon Garcia with a pass at the Hermleigh 42 and he out-raced the Big Red defense the rest of way for a 91 yard scoring play with 9:26 left in the second. The kick for point was good and the score was 14-7.

Following the intermission at which the Panther Marching Band entertained the crowd. The Panthers came back for another score when they took the ball on their own 33 and scored in 7 plays with Joey Jones getting the final 3 yards with 6:57 left in the third. The drive featured a 19 yard run by Reggie Sanchez and a great pass play of 13 to Joey Jones to set the Panthers up at the Card 3 yard line. Jones kicked the point after and Gorman was up 21-7

The Cards came right back on the next possession and took the ball on their own 43 and scored in 3 plays with the help of a 15 yard penalty by the Panthers. Following a 20 yard pass and a 9 yard run to set the Cards up at the Gorman 11, Robby Anderson ran it in with 5:28 left in the third. The kick for point failed and the score was 21-13.


Roger Dale Pruitt







Entries must be made by the contestant entering the item. Judges' decisions are final.






