Desdemona, still known as "Hogtown," reached its peak just after World War I when the discovery well blew in on September 2, 1918, on the Joe Duke farm, three miles south of Desdemona in Comanche County. The Duke well, which was an estimated 8,000 barrels a day gusher, caught fire when it blew in and burned at length before it was brought under control.

During the "Hogtown Oil Boom" days, the population was an estimated 28,000 to 30,000, but soon declined as the boom ended after 18 to 20 months of being one of the "greatest oil booms in history."

Desdemona, a settlement before the Civil War, acquired its first church in 1872. The first services were held in a log cabin near Hog Creek—it had one door and a hole for a window. The benches were hewn logs and the pulpit was flanked by guns for emergency use against the Indians, who were on a war path during this time. The first church was named Rockdale Church, later on changed to First Baptist Church. The first preacher was Johnny R. Northcutt.

The settlement, know as "Hogtown," was officially named Desdemona when the post office was established in 1877. But the town has never lost the title "Hogtown."

Stories of how Desdemona actually got its name are many. Some say an oil investor of the Oil Boom Days (after many days of waiting) saw oil shooting through the top of a derrick toward the sky and he shouted, "Deah's de money!" Others claim it was named Desdemona from Shakespeare's play "Othello," Officially it was named after Desdemona Wynn, a lovely daughter of the Justice of the Peace at that time, J.J. Wynn, She later on taught school in Desdemona. She is buried near Kilgore at Laird's Hill next to her husband, B.O. Thompson. It is named Thompson Cemetery.
