
Christmas Tour of Homes

The Lady Panthers record is 1-1.


The Panthers also won their game over the Pirates by the margin of 56-53.

Pecan Bake Show Sponsored by De Leon 4-H Club

Food products entered must be made "from scratch"--no mixes will be allowed. 4. Each exhibitor may enter each class, but may enter only 1 item in each class. 5. Recipe should be typed or neatly printed, giving exact measurements for ingredients and with exhibitor's name and address on the back. Recipes will not be returned. (Plans are to prepare a cookbook of entered recipes to distribute the following year.) 6. Entries must be exhibited on paper plates, foil-covered cardboard or disposable pie tines, and then be enclosed in a zip-lock plastic bag or covered with clear plastic wrap or clear plastic bakery dome. 7. A label with the exhibitor's name, address, age division and entry class should be attached to the bottom of the item exhibited. 8. Entries will be on exhibit during the Country Christmas held in DeLeon City Auditorium on Friday evening, December 3. 9. Entries may be donated to be sold during the Country Christmas, with proceeds going to the sponsoring organization (DeLeon 4-H Club), or may be picked up by the exhibitor 8-9 p.m. on Friday, December 3.
