The Gorman varsity football team traveled to Fort Worth Nolan to take on Muenster Sacred Heart in a scrimmage this past Friday. The Panthers looked good at times, but made some early season mistakes that Muenster capitalized on and therefore defeated the Panthers 3-0. Gorman showed some promise with a big completion in its first set of plays as Kennon Hornback hit Armando Giles for a 46 yd connection. Rejinaldo Sanchez added some excitement with 44 yd run in the first teams second set of plays. Defensively the Panthers had some difficulty containing Muenster's senior tailback which was 6'0 180 pounds and ran a 4.4 40 yd dash. "I feel we played a little like we practiced last week. With the weather, a kid out here and there, we just weren't very consistent in practice so that is how we played in the scrimmage Friday. The good thing is we got a lot of work in and we can correct the mistakes we made. I didn't see any quitters or things that can kill a team. What I saw was a lot of youth learning on the job."

The Panthers have little time to prepare as their season and home opener are coming up this Friday. Gorman will be taking on the Cardinals from Hermleigh here in Gorman this Friday. Hermleigh has scrimmaged Clarendon (Preseason #20) and Petersburg. The Cardinals lost to Gorman last year 14-27. Hermleigh returns 6 offensive and 7 defensive players from last year's team. They will be under the direction of a new head coach in Danny Brittain. Coach Brittain comes from Lancaster where he served as an assistant. The Cardinals will base out of a split back veer offense and they will mix some one back in as well. They have a decent sized offensive line and a quality running back. Their defensive set will be a base 50 look that incorporates a big defensive line. "We are excited about opening the season especially here at home. We hope everyone will come out and support our boys. They have worked extremely hard and we are proud of the work they have done so far. We will be learning from every snap this year, but I promise you our boys will give all they have. Come out and let them hear you this Friday at 7:30 pm!!!!"

The Eastland County Commissioners Court has approved salary increases for elected county officials for the 2006 fiscal year beginning October, 1905.

Salary increases ranged from \$588 up to \$1,920.

The County Judge will receive \$67,087, up from \$65,967. The County Sheriff will receive \$33,920 up from \$32,000. The County Clerk, District Clerk, the J.P.'s from Pct. 1, 2, and 4, the County Treasurer, Tax Assessor and Commissioners of Pct. 1, 2, 3, and 4 will each receive \$29,988 up from \$29,400. The Precinct 1 Constable will get \$16,810 up from \$16,480, and the Constable of Pct. 2 and 4 will receive \$10,012 up from \$9,815.

\$10,000 of the County Judge's salary is paid by a State supplement.

For several weeks I have been discussing the issue of attaching "significance" to the actions of others. It is my belief that the biggest part of our emotional turmoil and interpersonal conflict can be blamed on this one issue. When I judge the motives of others, I invariably make their actions into a statement that attacks my own personal worth. In so doing I create my own emotional reality. Never mind that my perception is at best faulty! The other person might think that I am a great person, but after I decide that he or she doesn't care for me I get in judgment!

On the other hand, when Jesus said "Do not judge", He couldn't same Biblical passage He warns us about wolves in sheep's clothing! And He tells us that we "will know a tree by its fruit". So Jesus is obviously **not** telling us that it is wrong to have an opinion about the actions of others! If you run the stop sign and crash into my car, it's not judging for me to say, "Hey, you ran the stop sign and totaled my car!" That's the simple observable fact of the matter. Crashing my car has very little power to deeply affect my life, however, unless I go home and stew over the matter and start entertaining thoughts about your motives. Then I'm "judging". Perhaps I think: "He ran that stop sign on purpose. He's still bitter over me not paying him for that hay he baled for me last year." Now we've created a deeper problem.

And here we find a key to why we are often tempted to judge the motives of others: we may have a guilty conscience ourselves! Sin is a real issue. It may not be politically correct in our day to talk about it. But the fact remains. Jesus is not telling us to avoid dealing with sin. Joe made a motion to amend the Police Dept. budget to reflect the hiring of another officer. The budget will be amended as: \$14,560.00 salaries; \$ 1113.84 payroll tax expense, and \$2070.00 insurance. Nathan made a second and motion carried 3-0.

Joe made the motion to adopt the NIMS Resolution. Tony made a second and the motion carried 3-0! NIMS stands for National Incident Management System. President Bush Has Made The Right Choice For The Supreme Court

With members of Congress back in their districts meeting with their constituents during August, our nation's capital has been relatively quiet the past few weeks. However, when Congress reconvenes after Labor Day, the Senate will begin work on a task that will be sure to cause quite a bit of noise. The task at hand will be the constitutional duty to either approve or reject President Bush's nominee to the United States Supreme Court: John Roberts. I think it is imperative that the confirmation hearings focus on issues that matter and that Senators do not attempt to smear Judge Roberts' reputation.

There are many legal issues that the Supreme Court will have to face in "measured" to me in my own emotions what I have "measured out" the coming years, and we need justices who understand the proper constitutional role of the judicial branch sitting on the highest court of the land.

From what I have read about Judge Roberts, President Bush made the possibly have meant to turn a blind eye toward evil actions. In the right choice in nominating him for the Supreme Court. He is a smart man with a lengthy legal resume that should make him well suited to be a Supreme Court justice. He has been an adviser to President Reagan and the first President Bush. This notice concerns 2005 property tax rates for the City of Gorman . It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Notice of Public Hearing On Tax Increase

Last year, the Eastland County property tax rate was \$0.56. That rate raised \$3,260,808, a portion of which was used to fund operations such as: County offices operations, indigent health care, indigent legal services, elections, Central Appraisal District support, courthouse operations and maintenance, Department of Public Safety support, Texas Ranger support, Texas Parks & Wildlife support, Veterans' Service Officer support, MHMR court costs and support, ambulance service, libraries support, Agricultural Extensions Service, Adult and Juvenile Probation support, juries, Fire Department support, Road and Bridge operations, debt service.

This year, Eastland County is proposing a property tax rate of \$0.56. That rate would raise \$3,464,840, which is \$204,032 more than taxes imposed last year.

There will be two public hearings to consider that increase. The first public hearing will be held on August 29, 2005 10 a.m. at Eastland County Commissioners' Courtroom. The second hearing will be held on September 2, 2005 10 a.m. at Eastland County Commissioners' Courtroom.


