### State Gearing Up For Possible Winter Wildfire Siege

State fire control leaders continue to gear up for what could be a long winter wildfire siege for the state's firefighters. Additional in-state and out-of-state personnel and equipment resources, including six dozers, six engines and a mechanic truck from Wisconsin, have been orderer and mobilized to strategic areas to bolster the state's firefighting arsenal. Critically dry fuels (vegetation) exist across much of the state, a fact evidenced by several large wildfires that have already occurred. With no significant change in the weather pattern in sight, fire control leaders are planning for the worst but hoping for the best.

Grasses, weeds and other vegetation in much of the state lie dead and dormant from a combination of drought and hard freezes, according to Mike Dunivan, fire behavior analyst with the Texas Forest Service. Areas hit by hard frosts earlier in the year are where the lion's share of the known large fires occurred, but essentially all of the state is now at risk, due to the presence of the dead vegetation, said Dunivan. "Vegetation is critically dry in much of the state," said Dunivan. "Add winds and low humidity during the afternoon prime burning period, and you have a recipe for fastspreading, dangerous wildfires. Most of the large wildfires that already occurred statewide resulted from this deadly combination of wildfire ingredients."

The fire analyst noted that the Texas Forest Service sent an advisory to fire departments in Texas warning of the possibility of dangerous fire behavior during periods of dry, windy weather and the need for diligent use of fire safety practices and protective gear. Already this year, two volunteer firefighters suffered serious burns upon being overrun by wildfires, and another firefighter lost his life in an accident when the fire tanker he was driving rolled over.

"Now that most summer grasses and weeds have gone dormant, any wildfires that arise will have more fuel available to stoke the flames. Also, wherever dead grass, weeds and other fine-textured fuels are present, even short periods of dry, windy weather can cause a rapid escalation in wildfire risk and difficulty of control," Dunivan declared. Unless the weather cooperates and brings significant moisture statewide and/or the public exercises greater safety with all outdoor fire use, firefighters fear that additional wildfires are likely. Many wildfires result from careless burning of household trash, leaves and brush piles. The following are suggestions from the Texas Forest Service.

- \* Obey outdoor burning bans.
- \* Postpone all outdoor fires during periods of dry, windy weather. \* When outdoor fires are permitted, establish wide control lines
- down to bare soil before igniting your fire, and stay with your fire until it is cold to the touch.
- \* Dispose of smoking materials properly, either in an ashtray or crushed out in bare dirt.
- \* Avoid using welding or grinding equipment in or near dry grass and weeds.
- \* Avoid driving or parking in tall grass and weeds that could be ignited by the pollution control equipment on your vehicle.

### Order Prohibiting Certain Fireworks Issued To Be In Gorman December 12

STATE OF TEXAS

COUNTY OF EASTLAND

ORDER PROHIBITING CERTAIN FIREWORKS

IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS WHEREAS, the Texas Forest Service has determined that drought conditions exist in Eastland County; and

WHEREAS, on the 28th of November, 2005 the Commissioners Court of Eastland County has determined that the normal danger of fire in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County is greatly enhanced by the extremely dry conditions now existing;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Commissioners Court of Eastland County adopts this Oder prohibiting the sale or use of restricted fireworks in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County.

A. No person may sell, detonate, ignite, or in any way use fireworks classified under 49 C.F.R. part 173.100(r)(2) (10-1-86 edition), as "skyrockets with sticks" and "missiles with fins" in any portion of the unincorported area of Eastland County.

This order does not prohibit:

1. common fireworks, small in size classified as Class C explosives:

2. large fireworks devices designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation and classifed as Class B. explosive by the U. S. Dept. of Trans. {Tex. Occ. CODE, Chapter 2154}.

 A person commits an offense if the person knowingly or intentionally violates a prohibition established by this Order. A offense under theis order is a Class C. Misdemeanor.

### Minutes From The Gorman City Commission - December 1st

The Gorman City Commission met on the above date. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners Joe Casey, Tony Carter, Nathan Files, Mayor Pro-Tem, Charlie Torrez. Please note that Charlie and Nathan both arrived a few minutes late. Others present were Kenneth Good, Lori Dodd, and several applicants for the maintenance position.

Joe led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:35 p.m.

Joe made the motion to approve the minutes as read. Tony made a second. Motion carried 2-0.

Tony made the motion to approve the bills for payment. Joe made a second. Motion carried 2-0.

Kenneth Good was present to request that the Commission "drive thru" the intersection of Kent and Roberts Street, especially on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights. He expressed that it was difficult to see down the street for clearance to proceed thru the intersection. He had several suggestions, but also mentioned they too had draw backs. A double Stop sign, a blinking light, or Block off parking on the corner (s).

Three men were present to express their interest in the open maintenance position. No action was taken at this time.

Lori Dodd was present to request that the Commission pass a Resolution to file an application with Texas Yes Downtown Beautification grant. The grant is a dollar for dollar match grant. It would go towards the purchase of things such as light poles, flags, benches, etc. for the downtown area. Tony made the motion to pass the resolution, and pledge \$500 toward the dollar for dollar match. Joe made a second and the motion carried 3-0.

Joe made the motion that all purchases, placements, utilization, and locations etc. must meet the City's final approval. Nathan made a second to the motion. Motion carried 4-0.

The Commission expressed again the need for issuing more citations for animals, mainly dogs, running at large and not being contained on the owner's premises. ### FRAUD ALERT: With Counterfeit Financial Instruments, Everything Old is New Again

A fraud scheme involving counterfeit checks and money orders is speeding across the Internet, costing financial institutions and their customers thousands of dollars.

The scheme begins when a scam artist, typically associated with a Nigerian criminal enterprise, goes on the Internet posing as a student or other person working overseas who needs your help cashing a check or money order. The scammer typically contacts you by e-mail, an Internet chatroom, or an online auction site.

You provide a mailing address, and the scammer sends you a check or money order with a request to cash or deposit it into your bank account. You're told to keep some of the money as payment for your help and to wire students. The project will serve 31 school districts with a combined enrollment of 43,932 students. back the remainder.

The catch? The money orders and the checks are counterfeit. They're absolutely worthless.

U.S. Postal Service Money Orders are just the latest financial instrument used in the scam, which has long live in rural areas can access expanded health care options." made use of bank drafts, cashier checks, and other brands of money orders. But the similarity ends there.

U.S. Postal Service Money Orders have security features that distinguish them from other financial instruments. Learning to recognize them will protect you from being victimized by the scheme. Postal Money Orders have special inks, watermarks, and security threads. The two most prominent security features can be viewed by holding the money order in front of a light source. Look for these features:

A watermark of Benjamin Franklin, the oldest and one of the most famous signers of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution, is visible on both the front and reverse side of the money order when held to the light. A dark secu-

rity thread running (top to bottom) to the right of the Franklin watermark, with the tiny letters "USPS" facing backward and forward.

The Postal Service issues domestic and international money orders. Domestic Postal Money Orders cannot

exceed a value of \$1,000. They are distinguished by their green, yellow, and blue colors. Most counterfeit Postal Money Orders are domestic, with a face value of \$750 to \$950.

International Postal Money Orders are printed in pink, yellow, and gold and cannot exceed a value of \$700. There has been an increase in counterfeit international money orders printed with values of \$500 to \$700.

With the cooperation and assistance of our law enforcement partners--especially U.S. Customs and Border and LaVeda Scitern's Protection, the FBI, and local law enforcement agencies across the country, we have seized almost \$21 million dollars in counterfeit Postal Money Orders prior to negotiation in the United States. We have seized an additional \$74 million dollars in other counterfeit instruments, including cashier checks, bank drafts and non-postal 2005 Alvis, Bonnie and LaVeda money orders.

A new twist in the scam is the use of an authorization letter advising a financial institution that the sender is authorized by the U.S. Postal Service to negotiate the instrument. Don't believe it—the letter is a fake! The Postal Service does not issue authorization letters, and the receipt of one should raise a red flag to financial institutions and potential victims.

#### **Economy Keeps Going on Strong**

The headline read "Job market gets major boost during November." The story that followed detailed how the economy created 215,000 jobs and the unemployment rate remained at the historically low number of 5.0 percent in November. This story - and others like it - appeared in newspapers across the country over the weekend. The positive numbers from last month mean the economy has now added jobs for an amazing 30 consecutive

This period of economic growth began more than two and a half years ago. It was in May of 2003 that Congress passed the Jobs and Growth Act which provided tax relief for millions of Americans. Since the enactment of that law, 4.5 million jobs have been created, the stock market has rebounded, record numbers of Americans have realized the dream of homeownership, and there has been constant GDP growth. There are several factors that have contributed to our healthy economy, but smart tax policies have proven to be one of the primary drivers of this growth.

This week, important legislation will come to the House floor which will give Congress the opportunity to keep this economy moving by making sure these policies remain in place. This measure keeps taxes on individuals at current rates, retains the tax relief on capital gains and dividends, and extends sales tax deductibility provisions (which I wrote about two weeks ago in the Roundup). If Congress does not pass this bill, it will mean an automatic tax increase for millions of taxpayers. This would not only mean that, come January, the federal government will be taking more money out of your paycheck, but it would also be bad news for the economy.

#### House to Take Up Immigration Reform

The wheels are in motion to get a major immigration reform bill to the floor of the House. This legislation, in combination with a stronger commitment to enforce laws already on the books, is the remedy needed to fix an ailing immigration system. There is some talk of voting on the bill before Christmas. If we don't get to it this year, it will be one of the first pieces of legislation we focus on in the new year. As this bill makes its way through the legislative process, I will provide additional updates on this very important issue.

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
