The Gorman Panthers closed the season when they traveled to Goldthwaite on Friday night and came out on the losing end against a very strong Class A team by a 54-0 margin. The Panthers came close to scoring only on one occasion when they moved inside the five yard line only to lose the ball on downs at the five yard line. The Big Red Defense held the Eagles to only 7 points in the initial quarter but gave up 26 in the second to trail 33-0 at halftime. Then the Eagles added 14 in the third and 7 in the fourth for the 54-0 mar-

The Eagles got the ball on their own 10 and went the distance in just 4 plays with Tye Mosely getting the final 60 with 7:33 left in the first. Tyler Schmidt added the point after and the score was 7-0.

After the Panthers drove to the Eagle 5 the Eagles moved the distance in only 2 plays with Tyler Schmidt getting the honors from 25 yards out with 9:23 left in the half. The score was set up with a 7 yard run by Clifton. The kick for point Texas, going on to Orlando, Florida failed and the Eagles were up 13-0.

Then following a Panther fumble on the Gorman 25 the Eagles scored in just 4 plays with Jefferson Wesson catching a 20 yard pass for the score with 6:21 left in the half. Schmidt added the point after and the score was 20-0.

The next score came on a interception and runback of a Panther pass by Clifton for 65 yards with 4:45 left in the second. The kick failed and the Eagles were up 26-0.

After holding the Panthers the Eagles got the ball on their own 40 and scored in 2 plays with Mosely catching a 25 yard pass with 2:50 left in the half. Schmidt added the point after and the score was 33-0.

Following very good halftime performances by both bands the Eagles blocked a Panther punt and Bryan Miller returned it for the touchdown with 10:24 left in the third. Schmidt made it 40-0 with the point

Another Eagle score came with 4:27 left in the third when Mosely ran in from 9 yards out for the score. Schmidt added the point after and the Eagles was up 47-0.

The final Eagle TD came with 11:12 left in the game when Bo Lindsey scored from 4 yards out. Schmidt made the final score 54-0 with the point after.

The Panthers had a tough schedule this season with a very young team and some very tough teams on the schedule. 

The Gorman Panthers and Cubs closed out their 2005 seasons this past week. The Junior High Cubs finished an impressive 9-0 by defeating Goldthwaite for the District Title in a 22-14 hard fought game. "The junior high coaches (Coy Barker, Howard Cox, and James Gerick) did an outstanding job preparing our young men all season. The kids worked hard and improved each week and deserve to feel proud of their accomplishment. We hope they will all play again next year and we look forward to it as well. We appreciate all the support from the cheerleaders, parents, and fans. 
