Taylor Chew carried three times and scored twice and finished with 77 yards. Ernie Rodriguez scored one touchdown and totaled 51 yards on four carries. Cameron Clark converted two 2 point conversions and ran hard throughout the game. A.J. Vaughn came into the game and ran hard, carrying the ball seven times for 57 yards and a 2 point conversion. Justin Little ran in a 2 point termission. However, they were conversion and did a good job at quarterback running the offense.

Defensively, the Cubs did a great job. The first unit was done early and many younger players received valuable playing experience. Ben Burgess recorded an interception, Keifer Wilson lead the team with seven tackles, and Cameron Clark finish with six tackles. Panthers Lose To Baird; Host Ranger On Friday Night

The Gorman Panthers journeyed to Baird on Friday night to meet the Bears in the Bears Den and held their own for the first half and had the score at 14-7 at the halftime inoutscored 14-7 in the third and 12-7 in the final period and came out on the short end of a 40-21 score.

The Bears got the ball on the Gorman 14 after a long return on a Panther punt. It took only 3 plays for the Bears to score, when following a loss of 6 yards on a run and a no-gainer, Blan Scott threw a pass yards for the TD with 11:15 left in the second. Chance Rodriquez added the point after and the Bears were up 7-0.

After holding the Panthers the Bears took the ball on their own 35 and scored in 4 plays with Scott hitting Chance Rodriquez on a 55 yard pass with 5:48 left in the second. Rodriquez kicked the point after and the Bears were out front 14-0.

But the Panthers answered back with a drive of their own when they got the ball on their own 37 and drove 63 yards in 10 plays with Tyson Swanner passing it to John Torres for the final 10 yards with just 29 seconds left in the half. The drive featured passes of 17, 27 and 6 to Torres. David Ibarra added the point after and Gorman was on the board.

At the intermission the Panther Marching Band and the Baird Band performed the routines they used at the Band Contest in Abilene on Saturday. They did great.

Following the halftime break the Panthers got the kickoff on their own 33 and moved the distance in 6 plays with Matt Underwood getting the final 9 yards for the score with 9:50 left. The drive featured runs of 4 and 37 by Kennon Hornback. David Ibarra tied the score at 14-14 with the point after.

But the Bears answered right back going 66 yards in 19 plays with Tyler Orlando getting the final 9 yards with 5:18 left in the third. Chance Rodriquez booted the point after and Baird was up 21-14.

After holding the Panthers on their next possession the Bears got the ball of the Gorman 42 and scored in just 2 plays with Rodriquez catching a pass from Scott from 28 yards out with 2:55 left in the period. Rodriquez added the point after and Baird enjoyed a 28-14 margin.

Baird got another score in the final period when they took the ball on their own 25 and scored in 7 plays with Blake Manning catching a 5 yard pass for the score with 10:33 left. The point after kick failed and the score was 34-14.

The Panthers came back with a drive of their own getting the ball on the Baird 33 and scored in 10 plays with Orlando Valenzuela catching a 5 yard pass from Swanner for the score with 4:46 left. Ibarra added the point after and the score was 34-21. The drive featured runs of 14 and 1 by John Torres and passes of 8 to Torres and 6 to Underwwood.

The Bears got another score with 2:49 left when the Bears got the ball on the Gorman 35 and scored in 4 plays with Orlando going the final 22 on 18 a run. The kick for point failed and the final score was 40-21.

The Panthers suffered 2 pass interceptions to kill 2 drives and just 175 couldn't seem to hold the Bears on defense in the last half. They will need good defense effort this Friday night when they host the Ranger Bulldogs.

Torres led the Panthers with 57 yards on 12 carries. Hornback had 41 on 2 keepers. Underwood got 27 on 12 tries. Valenzuela got 24 on 5 and Reggie Sanchez had 10 on 5 tries. Swanner had a minus 4 on 2 and was 10/70 caught for losses on a pass try.





She was initially taken to Canterbury Villa in Hillsboro and then subsequently to Heritage Manor where she (and I) spent four nights.

Just the fact that these facilities took in these frail and elderly evacuees during their time of need was plenty enough, but the warmth and kindness demonstrated by so many was a blessing.

Diane Ward, President and CEO of Pyramid HealthCare, was there in Hillsboro when the Friendship Haven residents arrived, ensuring that everyone was cared for. Sherry, Shawnah, and Kathy were among the Heritage Manor staff members who freely offered any assistance they could provide and showed genuine concern, as did the pastor of First Baptist Church. Rachel and her mother sweetly invited me to participate in the Sunday school gathering their church brought to Heritage

Finally, I wanted to give a special recognition to wonderful Ina and Johnny Smith, who opened their home to the Friendship Haven nurse and aide, Candace and Earlene, respectively, who were caring for the evacuees. A Word in Season By Pastor Dane Gressett THE REAL PRESENCE OF EVIL

Just then there was a man in their synagogue with an evil spirit; and he cried out, saying, "What business do we have with each other, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who You are - the Holy One of God!" And Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be quiet, and come out of him!" Throwing him into convulsions, the unclean spirit cried out with a loud voice and come out of him. (Mark 1:23-26)

There is an innate curiosity regarding the supernatural in each of us. statistics reveal that Americans are searching for spiritual experiences in greater numbers than in former decades. But they are seeking these experiences outside the traditional Christian faith.

Why is this? I suppose there are many reasons, good and bad. One reason is because many people see Christianity as a powerless set of rules for those who lead boring lives. Others have tried going to church, found little help there, and left feeling guiltier than when they arrived.

The occult, on the other hand, seems to be filled with mystery and with supernatural encounters. This at least partially explains why on Halloween night ghosts and witches can often be seen on front lawns and front porches. Is this simply innocent fun or dangerous dabbling in the dark side? I think for the most part people are just wanting some excitement. But we must not be ignorant about the reality of Satan and of evil spirits in our world. It often amazes me that people who call themselves Christians do not believe in a real devil and evil spirits. One cannot read much of the Bible without being confronted with the reality of evil spirits.

Though I have not sought it out, I have had a number of experiences in dealing with the dark side. I remember one evening in South India when we were baptizing several new Christians in a remote village. A lady was following us at a distance. Her hair was a filthy tangled mess and her clothes were torn. A guttural male voice was coming out of her mouth, saying, "Have you come here to disturb us? These people are ours. Go away and leave us alone." It would have been a spooky moment except for the fact that I had previously encountered similar things. This woman was terribly demon-possessed. Her life was reduced to the apparent hopelessness of cruel demonically-induced bondage.



Don't forget the Book Fair all next week. If you would like to volunteer to help, please contact the school. We need all the help we can get.


