### **Central Texas Vegetable Short Course**

The Comanche County Extension Commercial Horticulture Committee has planned a Central Texas Vegetable Short Course for Thursday, January 16 at the De Leon City Hall Building in De Leon. Registration and exhibit viewing will begin at 8:00 a.m. with the program starting at 8:30 a.m. and continuing till approximately 4:00 p.m. The program will include a sponsored lunch and 3 continuing education credits for commercial, non-commercial and private applicators.

The program will focus on several vegetable crops that can be grown commercially in the Central Texas area including production and marketing information for those crops. Drs. Dainello, and Stein, Extension Horticulturists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Dr. Jim Moats with Oklahoma State University will present information about each crop that includes fertility, weed control and varieties. Dr. Moats will discuss some crops grown by producers in Oklahoma that have been successfully in direct markets. Potential markets include hot peppers and herbs for the upscale herbal market.

The afternoon program will feature High Intensity Melon Production as demonstrated by Dr. Jody Worthington, Retired Texas Agricultural Research Service Horticulturist, at the Stephenville Research Station. Dr. Worthington will discuss potential problems growers may face as they move into intense melon production using plastic mulch and drip irrigation. Dr. Worthington has spent a lot of hours in the field with growers and his experiences will help avoid problems. Jennifer Koerner, Graduate Research Assistant, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will discuss the success of Trap Crops for insect control. This method of control was used in several melon fields this past year. Dr. Chris Sanson, Extension Entomologist, will present information on insect control in vegetable crops including innovative methods used when chemicals won't work. Dr. Frank Dainello will present information on weed control systems in vegetable production. Weeds significantly lower potential production of any crop and more so in vegetable crops that have shorter season. Dr. Dainello has taken an active role in the IR4 program to get new products registered. Dr. Jerry Cornforth, Extension Economist, will present budget information on several vegetable crops that have the potential for growing in this area. Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, will present information on disease control and how crop rotations influence disease development and control. Nematode control through rotation, chemical and biological methods will be discussed.

#### **Local Host Families Needed For Exchange Program**

ASSE International Student Exchange Programs (ASSE) is seeking local families for boys and girls from Scandinavia, France, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Germany, Holland, Great Britain, Poland, the Newly Independent States of teh former Soviet Union, Czech Republic, Slovakia, Switzerland, Mexico, Brazil, Thailand, Japan, Canada, Australia and New Zealand, 15 to 18 years of age, comsing to this are for the upcoming high school year. These personable and academically select exchange students speak English, are bright, courious and anxious to learn about the USA through living as part of a family, attending high school and sharing their own culture and language with their newly adopted American host family.

The students are sponsored by ASSE, a nonprofit, public benefit organization, founded by the Swedish Ministry of Education. ASSE also cooperates with the Canadian Provincial Ministries of Education and is approved by the Australian and New Zealand Departments of Education. ASSE is the only organization with these credentials.

The exchange students arrive from their home country shortly before school begins and return at the end of the school year. Each ASSE student is fully insured, brings his or her own personal spending money and expects to bear his or her own share of household responsibilities, as well as being included in normal family activities and lifestyle.

The students are well screened and qualified by ASSE. Families may select the youngsters of their choice from a variety of student applications, family photos and biographical essays. Students and families are encouraged to begin corresponding prior to the student's arrival.

ASSE is also seeking local high school students to become ASSE exchange students abroad. 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#### TAMU MARE/FOAL **MANAGEMENT** WORKSHOP

A new workshop has been developed for mare owners who want to learn more about managing broodmares and developing, young, growing horses. The workshop will be held at the Horse Center on the TAMU campus March 18th.





A common concern among parents of children with disabilities is whether there will be enough money for their children if something should happen to the parents. The Ss and Supplental Security Income (SSI) programs can do much to lessen this concern. These

THE GORMAN PROGRESS two programs can assure some eco-

nomic security to disabled children of all ages. Although there are differences be-

tween the programs, both pay monthly cash benefits to people with disabilities. And someone who receives SS or SSI is usually eligile for Medicare or Medicaid which can help pay the costs of health care expenses.

The Social Security program pays benefits to the children of retired or disabled people receiving Social Security benefits. Benefits also can be paid to children of workers who died. Any child under 18 may be eligible for benefits.

A child over 18 may receive bene-

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
fits if he or she is disabled and the disability began in childhood -- before the age of 22. Benefits can start at any age. For exampble, suppose Joe James, who has a 40-year-old developmentally disabled son living with him, is planning to retire. Chances are Joe's son probably could collect benefits when Joe retires and probably could get benefits if Joe died or bacame disabled, too.

The SSI program is somewhat different from SS. It pays monthly benefits to people with disabilities who have limited income and resources. The age at which the disability started has no bearing. Disabled people of any age- -young or old- - can qualify for SSI benefits.

A disabled child under 18, who lives with his or her parents can qualify for SSI only if the income and resources of the parents are limited. However, once a child turns 18, the parent's income and resources no longer count. If the child has little income and few resources, he or she will likely qualify for SSI.

Sometimes children with disabilities who live in institutions could leave and live outside the institution if they had an income. Often, that needed income could come in the form of SSI.
