

CITY CHIT CHAT

The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on Thursday, June 26 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Others present were Mrs. Rhymes, Mrs. Ingram, Mr. Funderburg, and Mr. Irvin.

Minutes of the last meeting were approved, bills for May were approved, and heads of the different departments gave a report of activities for the last month.

A motion was duly passed to turn down the sewer grant at this time. The estimated cost had reached such a figure that it was the thinking of the Commission that we accepted the study phase and then Federal money was not made available, that it would be too great a burden for no real improvement. It is hoped that in the next few years that the City can take care of part of these problems on their own. The

major factor that caused us to reject the grant was that over 60% of it would have gone to engineers for their services and only about 40% to the actual construction of the project. Since we had to furnish 25% as our part, this actually was giving us only about 15% of the cost.

The city crew was instructed to paint warning lines at the step down and step-up in front of the "Nut House." We hope that this is done

soon. Also Robert was instructed to mark the space in front of the ramp as a "NO PARKING AREA" and I am asking you not to park in front of the ramp. If this should continue, we may have to start issuing tickets




