Farm Program Sign-up Ends **April 29th**

"Farmers have only two more weeks to sign up and become eligible for program benefits on their 1994 wheat and feed grain crops," David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. The sign-up period ends April 29th.

He said producers will not have the opportunity to change their minds and sign up after this deadline. Producers who have already enrolled and those who sign up before April 29th, have the option of witgdrawing and returning any advance payments.

"There are no acreage idling requirements for wheat, corb grain sorghum, oats, barley and rice," Mr. Martin said.

Target prices protect farmers' incomes if market prices fall below the federally-established levels. Through the ASCS price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing to operate and

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have time to wait for a better market.

Additionally, the 1994 farm programs offer advance payments in cash and flexible planting options.

"If producers do not sign up, they should clearly understand that they will not be eligible for benefits offered under the 1994 programs," ASCS official David Martin said.

USDA Seeks Comments On 1995 **ARP For Wheat**

The U. S. Department of Agriculture is seeking public comment on whether the acreage reduction percentage (ARP) level for the 1995 wheat crop should be 0, 5, 10 or some other level between zero and 15 percent, according to Grant Buntrock, executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation. The ARP decision must be announced by June 1, he said.

CCC has provided an analysis that includes estimated planted acreage, production, domestic and export yse, ending stocks, season average producer price, program participation rate and cost to the Federal government. Details appeared in the April 6 Federal Register.

Gramm Named Taxpayers Friend

Washington - U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm has been awarded the Taxpayers' Friend Award by the 250,000 member National Taxpayers Union for his outstanding voting record on reducing federal spending and deficits during the 103rd session of

Gramm also qualified for a grade of "A" in the organization's 1993 Congressional Spending Study. The senior had one of the best scores in the U. S. Senate, reflecting his consistent votes to balance the federal budget and reduce tax burdens by limiting and reducing spend-

"Many members of Congress talk about balancing the budget and controlling spending. But Sen. Phil Gramm's outstabding score in our rating of Congress shows that he backed up those words with votes," said David Keating, NTU executive vice president. "If every member of Congress cast spending votes as carefully as he did, we would have a balanced budget, lower taxes and a healthier economy."

In the study, NTU analyzed every roll call vote taken during the first session of the 103rd Congress and selected all votes that could affect the amount of federal spending. A total of 271 House and 206 Senate votes were selected, including votes cast on appropriations bills, authorization bills, budget target resolutions, major tax bills, amendments and certain procedural votes.
