CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION IN THE UNITED STATES SHOWS SLIGHT DECLINE

Crude oil production in the United States averaged last week 1,500 barrels less than the week previous according to figures given out by the American Petroleum Institute.

The institute summary gives production of the major districts as follows:

Oklahoma showed a daily average production of 487,950 barrels, an increase of 2,000 barrels; Kansas, 81,000 barrels, increase of 1,300; North Texas, 75,600, decrease of 1,750; Central Texas, 176,300, decrease of 3,300; North Louisiana, 55,250, decrease of 1,050; Arkansas, 144,950, decrease of 4,150; Gulf coast, 124,250, increase of 850; Eastern, 107,300, decrease of 200; Colorado, 125,200, increase of 700.

Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports for the month of July were 234,194 barrels, compared with 261,367 for June, and for the week ended Aug. 2, 228,143 barrels, compared with 203,571 for the previous week.

LA FOLLETTE CONDEMNS KLAN

Independent Presidential Candidate Deplores Religious Controversy and Declares Movement Foredoomed; Has Greater Issue to Fight.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Senator Robert M. LaFollette met the Ku Klux Klan issue today with an open denunciation of the order by name.

"I am unalterably opposed to the evident purposes of the secret organization known as the Ku Klux Klan, as disclosed by its public acts," the independent presidential candidate declared.

LaFollette's first official statement of the issue was contained in a letter to Robert T. Scripps, editorial director of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, who wrote suggesting to Senator LaFollette that his position should be made known because of the national prominence, justly or unjustly, that had been given to it.

FRANK BROWN'S STORED CHINA BROKEN INTO

Pieces of Haviland Offered for Sale Lead to Detection of Theft and Arrest.

C. L. Collins, 34, is in the Ranger jail, being held for investigation in connection with the looting of P. A. Brown's garage and removing from it a quantity of Haviland china.

Collins is said to have offered some of the china to Dr. T. J. Earnest of Ranger at a figure which evidently was far under its real value.

Mr. Brown is anxious to recover the rest of his stolen china, for a Haviland set, once broken, can hardly be replaced.

Collins will be transferred to the county jail at Eastland and charged with theft, according to Assistant Police Chief Leonard Davenport.

MISS RUBY WALKER IS AWARDED FELLOWSHIP IN CINCINNATI UNIVERSITY

PORT WORTH, Aug. 8.—Miss Ruby Walker of Ranger has been conferred a teaching fellowship in the University of Cincinnati according to Prof. Raymond Smith, head of the department of education in Texas as Christian university, by whose recommendation the honor was given.

The fellowship will give \$600. At the end of the first year after having completed work in education at the Ohio institution, and having taught some in the Cincinnati public schools, Miss Walker will receive the degree of bachelor of education.

LaFollette expressed regret that the question involving religious opinion had been raised. Even after the republican convention wrote its religious freedom plank and the democratic convention had staged its bitter floor fight over the Klan plank, LaFollette presented his platform without taking any cognizance of the Klan. He stressed economic ills and the remedy as the great issue of the campaign.

In this, his first statement relative to the Klan, LaFollette quotes Abraham Lincoln and Thomas Jefferson to support his stand. He quotes from a letter written by Lincoln in 1855, in which that great statesman declared that certain forces at that time were attempting to change the constitution of the United States so as to provide that "all men are created equal except negroes and foreigners and Catholics."

Jefferson, who wrote the nation's constitution, is quoted as saying in 1803: "I never will, by word or as a citizen, bow to the shrine of intolerance or admit a right of inquiry into the religious opinions of others."

ROMANCE HAS NO AGE LIMIT, SO IT SEEMS

Aged Couple Leave Eilemossynanymy Homes to Marry and Now Wish to Return.

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—Romance in which an 84-year-old veteran of the confederate home and a 76-year-old woman in the confederate woman's home has presented a problem to the state board of control.

The aged couple were married several weeks ago and withdrew from the homes. They went west to visit relatives. Today they reappeared at Austin and asked to be reinstated in their homes.

After they withdrew their places were filled from a long waiting list. Now the question is what to do with them. Neither is known to have any means of support.

JESSE R. SMITH OF BRECKENRIDGE ELECTED MEMBER TEXAS SENATE

BRECKENRIDGE, Aug. 8.—Jesse R. Smith has won the nomination to the senate from the 24th district, defeating Judge Harry Tom King of Abilene, the latter announcing that he will not contest any further.

Mr. Smith is an educator. He came to Breckenridge from Milford, Ellis county, fifteen years ago, and served here as city superintendent of schools for five years. He was then elected county judge and served in that capacity for four years.

Mr. Smith also has had banking experience and now is a director in the Security State Bank of Breckenridge.

WRONGED WOMAN LEAVES MAN WHO WOULDN'T MARRY

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 8.—Maintaining their silence throughout a long night of questioning regarding the murder of R. Wilson, a tourist, the police were unable to break down the reserve of Don Carlos and his bride of a few weeks. Houston police officials were refused permission to take the couple to Houston for questioning.

Wilson was found shot to death in a ravine near Harrisburg, Wednesday. The woman when arrested was thought to be Wilson's wife. She said that she had married Carlos a few weeks previous but that she had lived with Wilson for 6 years hoping ever that he would be man enough to marry her and give her four children the name that was rightfully theirs.

LOEB'S FORMER FRIENDS TELL HOW HE ACTED

He is Pictured as Childish, Very Nervous, Smoking and Drinking Much.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—The defense in the Loeb-Loepold hearing today sprung a surprise when it placed Dr. Robert Bruce Armstrong, family physician of the millionaire Loeb family on the stand. He came from Charlevoix, Mich., where the parents of Loeb have their palatial summer home.

Young Loeb, the doctor said, displayed nervous symptoms which led him to believe that he was slightly abnormal.

Leonard Louey, University of Michigan graduate and fraternity brother of Loeb, spoke of seeing Loeb froth at the mouth and become rigid on several occasions. He said Loeb was rather childish. On cross examination he showed that his estimate of Loeb was based on the fact that "Dickie" was younger than other students. Also he said that when "Dickie" frothed at the mouth he was intoxicated.

Theodore Sciengrt, graduate of the University of Chicago, said that Loeb was very nervous and smoked constantly, and was drunk much of the time so much that he was regarded childish.

Wallace Brockway, graduate of the University of Chicago, said that during the four years of his acquaintance with Loeb he had repeatedly heard the latter enunciate his superman soliloquy.

Agreement Appears Imminent In Inter-Aligned Conference

LONDON, Aug. 8.—Final agreement by the international conference on putting the experts' plan into operation is believed imminent. Observers forecast the likelihood that this, the fifteen conference on reparations since the Versailles treaty was signed will end in success.

First, the contact which the German delegates, especially Chancellor Marx and Foreign Minister Stresemann, have succeeded in establishing with Premier Herriot of France. Second, the fact that Prime Minister Macdonald of Great Britain still plans, if possible, to leave London at 5 p. m. tomorrow on his vacation. Macdonald's preparations for his departure are accepted as strong indications that an agreement is at hand. The British premier is going to Lossie Mouth, Scotland, for as long as the somewhat troubled affairs of state will permit.

The German delegation conferred at the Ritz hotel this morning and was to meet the allies in conference this afternoon.

PRO-FERGUSON MEETING OF WOMEN HAS INTERRUPTION

HOUSTON, Aug. 8.—A near riot occurred Thursday at a mass meeting of Mrs. Miriam Ferguson's partisans, when Miss Polly Wilson, said to be a keagel of the local ku klux Klan, and Mrs. Willie Nations, said to be a member of the Klan, attempted to make speeches in favor of Felix D. Robertson of Dallas, Klan candidate for governor.

Mrs. Hortense Ward, chairman of the meeting, was speaking. Miss Wilson interrupted and attempted to refute statements by Mrs. Ward about Robertson's prohibition record. Mrs. Ward asked Miss Wilson to leave the hall and Mrs. Nations then took up the argument in Miss Wilson's defense. For a moment the hall was in confusion, shrill cries of "we was," "she wasn't," "my husband says," and "I know better" being heard. Several men left the hall, among them Mrs. Nations' husband. Mrs. Ward insisted that all not sympathetic with Mrs. Ferguson leave the hall and order finally was restored.

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County Democratic Chairman Refutes Uncalled For Libel

In a statement issued today, Milburn McCarty, chairman of the Eastland county democratic executive committee, refutes an uncalled for libel appearing in the Eastland Oil Belt News, when he says:

The statement in Thursday's Oil Belt Klan News to the effect that I have recently attended conferences relative to the filing of contests by certain candidates in the recent primary is a malicious falsehood published for political purposes.

The insinuation that there was some ulterior motive in the delay in certifying the returns of the primary to the county clerk is also untrue and without any foundation. The election returns for Eastland county were canvassed by the county democratic executive committee last Saturday and on Sunday the vote in all races as determined and declared by the committee was published in the Eastland Telegram, Ranger Times and Cisco News.

Our stenographer left last Saturday on her vacation and we expected the two court stenographers to help us with our work during her absence. Both the court stenographers have been quite busy this week and it was not until Wednesday that I could obtain the services of either. Then at the first opportunity I dictated to Claude Smith the certificate of returns to be made to the county clerk Thursday afternoon and was promptly filed with the clerk.

The article appearing in yesterday's Oil Belt Klan News is but another manifestation of the inability of the editor of that vile sheet to have and show any regard for truth and decency.

HEAVY RAINS FLOOD SECTION OF NEBRASKA

Extensive Crop and Property Damage Reported; Western Iowa Also Storm Hit.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 8.—Rain, wind, hail and floods damaged Nebraska and western Iowa to the extent of millions of dollars last night and early today. A score of telephone lines are out at Omaha and telegraph service is very meagre.

The worst damage was near Columbus, where the Loup river left its banks, carried away livestock and inundated fields in a strip several miles wide and 25 miles long. All bridges over the Loup, Beaver and other rivers are damaged or washed away.

St. Edwards was flooded to a depth of three feet. A chautauqua was in session there when the storm broke and the tent was whipped to shreds. Several hundred persons had to rush to high ground and later were rescued by boats. Many other refugees are being rescued today.

The storm is the worst experienced in 19 years. Hail stripped the corn fields in a section 10 miles wide and 18 miles long.

COTTON PRICES BREAK ON CROP REPORT WHICH SHOWS FAIR CONDITION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The condition of the cotton crop August 1 was 67.4 per cent of normal, compared with 68.5 per cent on July 16, forecasting a crop of 12,351,000 bales of 500 pounds each, according to the estimate given out today by the department of agriculture. Last year the total cotton crop was 10,218,478 bales.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Following issuance of the government cotton crop report, giving figures of condition in line with expectations, cotton futures broke \$4.50 a bale on selling by speculators and profit taking on a heavy scale. Later a portion of the losses were recovered.

THREE ALLEGED BANDITS RESIST, TWO ARE SHOT DOWN

SEDAN, Kan., Aug. 8.—One man is dead and another wounded and a third was being sought by officers today following a gun battle between a sheriff's posse and three suspected bank robbers. Jess Burree, who was killed, Elmer Downs, the wounded man, and Charles Burree, who escaped, were being sought for the robbery of the Altamont bank about three weeks ago. When the posse surrounded the men they refused to surrender and gave battle. Two were shot down and the third escaped in an automobile which he commandeered from a tourist.

FIVE DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES ALLEGE ILLEGAL IRREGULARITY OF VOTING AND COUNTING VOTES

Charge Members Ku Klux Klan Not Democrats and Not Entitled to Participate in Primary. Vote in 12 Boxes of County Contested. Entire Recount Demanded.

Alleging among other things that their opponents are not Democrats, but are members of the Ku Klux Klan, another political party, and were members of such party at the time they made application to have their names placed on the ballot for the Democratic primaries and therefore had no right to have their names on the Democratic ticket, L. H. Flewelling of Ranger, candidate for county judge; George Bryant of Ranger, candidate for tax assessor; Frank Judkins of Eastland, candidate for county attorney; Ernest E. Wood of Eastland, candidate for county commissioner of precinct No. 1, late Thursday afternoon filed with Milburn McCarty, chairman of the Democratic county executive committee of Eastland county, protests against their opponents, Ed. S. Pritchard, candidate for county judge; W. J. Herrington, candidate for tax assessor; W. J. Barnes, candidate for county attorney; Ernest H. Jones, candidate for county commissioner of precinct No. 1, being certified as the nominees of the party in Eastland county for the offices named.

The petitions further allege that the primary election, held Saturday, July 26, was held only for the purpose, as provided by law, for those affiliated with and members of the democratic party to express their preference as to who should be the nominee of the democratic party in Eastland county, and over the state generally, for the various offices to be filled by all the voters of the county and state at the general election in November, 1924, but said primary election was irregular, illegal and fraudulent, and participated in by those not entitled to do so, thus depriving the contestants of a valuable right.

Aliens Count Votes. The petition further recites that members of another political party, that of the ku klux Klan party, were officers of and held the democratic primary election in the following named voting boxes: Eastland, Olden, Carbon, Scranton, Desdemona, Kokomo, Fir, Long Branch, East Cisco, and Pleasant Hill, and that members of said political party, that of the ku klux Klan party, were illegally allowed to participate in and vote in the democratic primary at said boxes, and at Gorman and Rising Star, all of such votes being illegal and not entitled to be counted in the democratic primary.

The contestants further allege that the primary election was fraudulent and illegally held in the voting precincts of Eastland, Olden, Carbon, Scranton, Desdemona, Kokomo, Fir, Long Branch, East Cisco, Pleasant Hill, Gorman and Rising Star in that lottering and electioneering was allowed within less than 100 feet of the polling place, and further that in Eastland, especially, intimidation was practiced and allowed by the officers of the election, by placing armed officers around and about the polling place, threatening voters with arrest for alleged violations of the law, when in truth and in fact the law had not been violated, and thus kept many voters from voting who otherwise would have cast their ballots for the contestants.

The petition alleges that at Carbon and Eastland illegal votes were permitted by the officers holding the primary at those places, in that at least four, and probably more, absentee votes were cast which should not have been allowed because no account of the gross irregularities and fraud, and only the legal votes counted, the contestants will be the nominees of the democratic party for the offices named.

The contestants further allege that they are informed and believe that at Carbon, Gorman, Kokomo, Desdemona, Scranton, Fir, Long Branch, Rising Star, Eastland and Olden, some of the tally clerks, that is some of the election clerks calling the names for the purpose of tallying the vote, did wrongfully, fraudulently and illegally and purposely, or inadvertently and through mistake, call the names of the contestants on many of the ballots when the name of the contestants should have been called and that in this manner votes were counted for the contestants that should have been counted for the contestants and that if this had been done the result of

the election would have been entirely changed.

The contestants ask that the democratic executive committee be called together and that the ballots in each and every box be recounted and that evidence be heard as to members of another political party, to-wit: the ku klux Klan party, having voted in the democratic party in this county, and that such illegal votes be thrown out and disregarded; that evidence also be heard as to acts of intimidation and gross irregularities at the boxes specified and that because of such intimidation, irregularities and fraud, the vote in said boxes be entirely thrown out and disregarded in determining the results of the election and that the contestants be declared the duly elected nominees of the democratic party for the offices named.

The chairman of the democratic executive committee must call the executive committee together within 20 days from the time that body canvassed the returns and declared the nominees. When the committee has met and passed on the matters alleged in the contests the side ruled against by them may take the case to the district court and from there it may be appealed to the higher court.

ACTIVE CAMPAIGN FOR MRS. FERGUSON PLANNED IN EASTLAND COUNTY

Senator Joe Burckett, who has charge of Mrs. Ferguson's campaign for governor in this senatorial district, announced the following speakers and dates before leaving today for Wichita Falls, where he goes by invitation of the Wichita Falls Ferguson club to deliver an address Friday night in the interest of Mrs. Ferguson's candidacy.

L. H. Flewelling of Ranger speaks at Putnam Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Senator W. J. Rodgers of Eastland speaks at Carbon Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock and at Breckenridge Saturday night at 8 o'clock. O. E. Ghaslain speaks at Cisco Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Mr. Burckett said that an effort was being made to have M. M. Crane, of Dallas, formerly attorney general of Texas, make a speech somewhere in Eastland county during the campaign. Jed Adams of Dallas is also being invited to speak here in the interest of Mrs. Ferguson's candidacy.

DEATH SPREADS HIS ARMS OVER DANCERS IN PAVILION ON A LAKE

BUCKEYE LAKE, Ohio, Aug. 8.—Seven bodies have been recovered and four persons are missing in the wreckage of a dance pavilion which collapsed into Buckeye lake last night during the annual ball of the negro Elks of Ohio. Scores of dancers were precipitated into the water when a section of the floor of the dance pavilion parted.

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"LEGAL" BOOTLEGGING.

During the last fiscal year 34,161 permits to prescribe or use whisky or both, were renewed and 23,436 new ones were granted in the 25 states where local laws permit. Just how they are distributed between physicians, who alone may prescribe, and veterinarians and dentists is not set forth in available statistics.

Each holder of a basic permit to prescribe may receive 100 blank fluor prescriptions at the beginning of each quarter. He may apply for more, if needed, and these may be issued if the showing made is satisfactory to the officials.

Prescriptions filled—a total of 11,268,469 of them—during the last fiscal year called for a total of 1,347,573 gallons of whisky, 9,945 gallons of brandy, 8,173 gallons of gin, 2,015 gallons of rum, 30,733 gallons of wine and 2 1/2 million gallons of alcohol. Notwithstanding the fact that the Journal of the American Medical Association a year or two ago held that whisky is either of no or of doubtful value it is now asserted that more than 90 per cent of the physicians in states where it is allowed have permits to prescribe alcoholic stimulants for medical use.

According to prohibition authorities in Chicago unscrupulous physicians sell their blanks in bulk to drug stores that specialize in the sale of prescription liquor. Trusted customers pay these drug stores \$3 for the prescription, and another \$3 to \$5 for the pint of liquor sold by authority thereof. The prescription, signed in blank by the doctor, is filled out by the drug store proprietor. Limited to not more than a pint each ten days, it would seem that no matter how obliging one's doctor no one could thus get enough "drug store stuff" to count very heavily for either hilarity or evil. But the law puts no limit on the number of physicians a patient may employ, and in many cases fictitious names are used. This is not exactly "bootlegging" because it is "within the law"—a legal violation, as it were.

MURDERER WRITES HIS CRIME CONFESSIONS FOR PUBLICITY AFTER DEATH

VILLE PLOT, La., Aug. 8.—Simultaneously with his hanging at high noon today, Evude Vidrine's confessions, a book detailing the author's life of crime, including five murders, was released for distribution to the public.

Vidrine, 26, was hanged for the murder of Robert L. Wiggins, son of the former sheriff of the parish. He has confessed to four other slayings and recounts details of them in his book, which he wrote in the shadow of the gallows.

Those who have seen it say it is one of the most unique confessions on record. It tells of his early hog stealing and boyish pranks and the first killing, that of a neighbor. The killing was done with a shotgun, shooting his man from ambush.

He continues with descriptions of his first trial for murder and acquittal by a jury. The motive was revenge because the victim talked too much.

BREWERY WORKER MAKES HENS PAY

LONDON.—There are all sorts of ways of amusing yourself. A London brewery worker, who raises chickens in his back-yard as a profitable side line, explained it this way, at a poultry show here where there was a prize-winner.

This man has his chicken-farm in a backyard which is only eighteen feet square. He is away from home so much, working at the brewery, that he has invented an alarm clock arrangement to feed the chickens while he is absent. He sets the clock at the time desired and its ringing releases a clutch whereby food, suspended by baskets, is lowered to the ground.

 NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 8.—For the first time this season the government condition crop was in line with the average of expectations, not so much the condition as the indicated yield of 12,351,000. There are many in the trade, of course, who are disposed to review this showing as bullish and considering that the market is two cents a pound lower than prices that prevailed after the reading of the previous condition it may not be well with the uncertainties of weather still ahead to engage in any aggressive bearish policy. However, when considering that the spinners' takings, as reflected in Secretary Hester's first statement for the season, show no interest or evidence of revival on the part of spinners and when giving proper value to the bearishness of his recent consumption and carryover statement, nowhere is any constructive advantage offered at or around present price levels, even though it might be assumed from political developments abroad that broadening demand and increased consumption another year

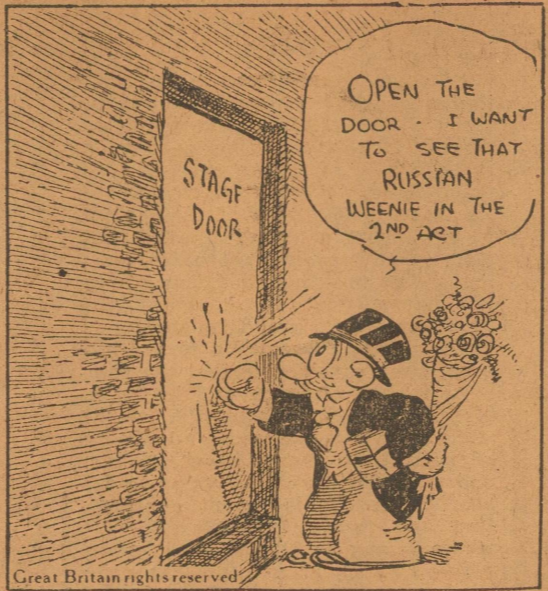
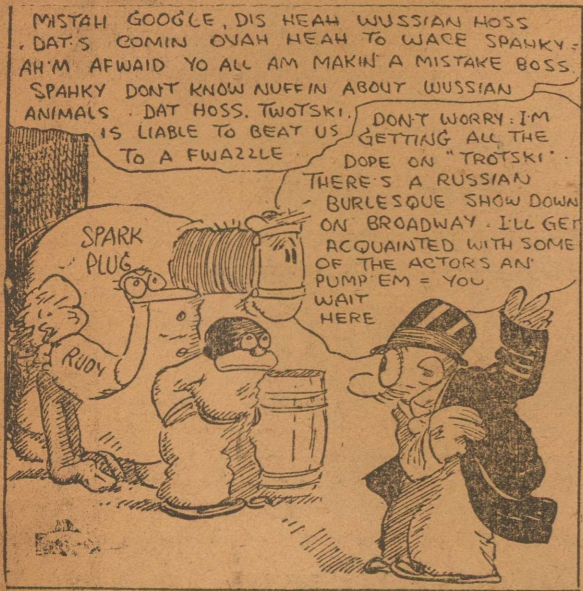

RANGER OFFERS BALL FRANCHISE TO DESDEMONA

In Absence of Deal Confirming Acceptance of Offer, Ranger Continues in League.

Ranger will play Cisco next Saturday and Sunday, C. A. Forrest, manager of the team, said today provided no deal is completed with Desdemona for the purchase of Ranger's franchise in the Oil Belt association. W. H. Madden, of Eastland, president of the Oil Belt association, sent out a written communication announcing that Ranger had offered her franchise to Desdemona which had been accepted. Forrest, manager and representative of the team at the meeting, said today that while the franchise had been offered to Desdemona it was only tentative and with the understanding that satisfactory arrangements be made between the two teams. So far, Mr. Forrest said, no one representing the Desdemona team has made any attempt to complete the transaction so Ranger remains in the Oil Belt association.

"We can do as well as Cisco," said Forrest. "We beat Breckenridge Thursday afternoon 12 to 6. A deal is contemplated with Desdemona, but so far no action has been taken. If the business men of Ranger would help we would have a team that would be virtually unbeatable representing Ranger. We have had the players but as no jobs are forthcoming you can't expect them to stay and play ball on imagination." Mr. Madden also wrote that an agreement was made to use only one umpire in the games and the following were chosen, Jack Elliot, Elmer Simpson, and Joe B. Hrdlicka. In view of the fact that dissatisfaction has been expressed on numerous occasions by the fans from all towns on the decisions of several of the umpires the action was acceptable, several of the fans said.

JOE BURKETT SAYS HE IS SUPPORTING MRS. FERGUSON

In response to a telegram from the Houston Chronicle asking whom he was supporting for governor and why, Senator Joe Burkett gave out the following: "Mrs. Ferguson is my choice for governor. I am supporting her because her views and mine on state matters more nearly coincide than those of her opponent and mine. Postal Telegraph Completes Link Of Western Line

In connection with the completion of the Fort Worth-El Paso section of the transcontinental line of the Postal Telegraph company, publication of the following is requested:

"The Postal Telegraph Cable company announces the completion of its new transcontinental line between Fort Worth and El Paso. While the section between El Paso and Los Angeles has not yet been finished, it should only be a matter of a few weeks when the entire line will be completed and put into service, thus giving the Postal company an additional important new route between its Atlantic and Pacific cable heads, and, at the same time, furnishing an important alternate route between the east and the west.

"The completion of this line will mean a great deal to Texas. It will furnish a direct route between Dallas and the Pacific coast and will result in quicker coast service from all Texas points. The Postal company has already opened up six new offices on this line west of Fort Worth and others will follow as conditions seem to justify. There will be a number of new offices opened west of El Paso.

"The line just completed is built of the very best material money could buy and none but expert workmen were employed in the building. In fact, no expense was spared in in-

spring that the line be the last word in telegraph engineering and construction. The poles are all of high-grade creosoted pine and the wires are all of heavy copper.

"The line will be one of the most important channels of communication in the western hemisphere. Traffic of international importance, including diplomatic exchanges between heads of governments, will be handled over it as well as local traffic. Cable traffic between Europe and the Far East will constitute an important feature of its load. Situated as it is, below the disastrous sleet belt of the north and middle west and above the tropical storm belt, the line is destined to become one of the most reliable links be-

tween the east and the west and nothing will be left undone to insure continuity of service. Dallas will be an important relay and repeater point on this line. Another repeater point has been established at Big Spring, where an up-to-date plant, including high speed repeater, dynamos, etc., has been installed. El Paso and Phoenix, Ariz., will be other repeater points."
