Scores Attracted by Huge Flaming Cross Near Eastland Road Get Distant View; Rumored Parade Fails to Materialize.

While several score of people from Ranger and Eastland looked on from some distance away and while others in Ranger waited on the downtown streets in anticipation of a Ku Klux pacade, klansmen from many parts of the county last night initiated a large class of candidates in a pasture about three miles south of Ranger, just off the Eastland road. A huge fiery cross, and a large American flag made a colorful background.

Robed and hooded guards thrown around the pasture kept spectators 200 yards from the fiery cross of gas piping.

The wind, blowing strongly against the burning gas, caused a noise that prevented the words of initiation ceremony and talks that followed, from reaching the ears of the spectators. Ranger people, who had trailed the rumors of a klan parade to the scene of the initiation, had no difficulty in finding the spot chosen by the klansmen, the road at this point being congested with cars coming from the direction of Eastland and Ranger shortly before dark.

Guards with flash lights turned back spectators at one of the roads leading off into the pasture but left another unguarded. Cars proceeding along the latter road were halted, however, before they could proceed close enough for the occupants to recognize the features of the robed klansmen, who were grouped in a circle with raised hoods. Spectators arriving early found the klansmen having trouble in keeping the fifty-foot cross burning, because of the high wind. The cross was then lowered somewhat and the gathering did not break up until mid-

Because of the distance, the more or less flickering light and the activity of the gathering, it was impossible to estimate the number of the candidates, although the number of figures in civilian clothes appeared to exceed a hundred.

The report that the Klan would parade in Ranger for the first time in its existence spread over the city shortly before dark with the rumor that the parade was forming just off the Eastland road. Those driving out the Eastland road to catch the first glimpse of the parade found no difficulty in spotting the gather-

Wartime Rules to Be Put In Effect If Mining Is Not Resumed.

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, July 11-A system of coal rationing will be necessary if the coal miners and operators do not agree to resume mining operations within two or three weeks, a high official of the government in close touch with the situation said today. Plans are now being drawn up for a voluntary revival of the wartime conservation policy employed by the fuel administration and they will be put into operation if the strike is continued, it was learned.

The first step in the rationing and conservation program would be to give priority on coal shipments to those users upon whom the life of the nation depends to a large extent.

Representatives of the non-union

coal operators will be called together at the end of this week to consider means of dealing with the smaller operators who are selling coal in advance of the maximum recently set by voluntary agreement, Secretary Hoover said today.


