In his trial for robbing Edwards Thompson tried hard and long for len iency because of his proof of for yer goo reputation, his record in the army, and the prominence of his father as police man of his home town, Mexia. The defendant again took the stand and de tailed to the jury his wanderings through the oil fields, and his loss of memory and entire want of recollection of any of the events involved in his case. But he could not overcome before the jury the convincing statements in his written confes sion again introduced by the state.



PARDON BOARD WOULD PAROLE MEN OF MERIT

Men With Good Prison Records Would Be Released Under Supervision.

AUSTIN, Sept. 24.—Proposed revision of the Texas convict parole system and the creation of a parole officer at a salary of \$3,000 a year, is contained in a bill prepared by Fritz H. Smith, chair man of the board of pardon advisers, for submission during the fourth called sesion of the legislature which began last

The bill proposes that convicts who merit parole by faithful observance of prison rules, after serving specified portions of their sentences, be turned over to the parole officer. The parole officer then will be obligated to find employment for such convicts, apart from the regular peu-itentiary work, and obtain for them the any person except the employer that the paroled man is a convict. All of the wages for the paroled man's work except a portion sufficient to support him, would deposited in a bank to be selected by the governor, and when the convict, whose time would continue while on pa-ole, had served his term, the accumulated fund and accrued interest would be

Under the provisions of the proposed law, all convicts not previously convicted ed to serve slightly more than half of a two year sentence before being eligible to arole, a fraction more than two and a half years of a three to five years cears' sentence, five years of a twelve to fffteen years' sentence and seven years of a .twenty to twenty-five years' ence. 


