Communications Station Is Discussed By Commissioners

The possibilities of a new communications station for the Eastland Fire Department were discussed Monday at the regular meeting of Eastland County Commissioners.

The Court conferred with City Manager Lewis Tiner and Fire Chief Guy Robinson concerning the station. The Eastland Fire Department had requested the County to contribute \$250 for a new radio.

Commissioners agreed to take the matter under advisement and to meet with all Fire Chiefs of Eastland County Monday evening at 7:30 p.m. in the County Courtroom.

Oscar Schaefer, Rising Star rancher, and County Agent J. M. Cooper also met with the Court to discuss the possibilities of a county-wide screwworm eradication program.

Members of the Court declined the invitation to sponsor the program stating that it would be better for such a program to be sponsored by local farmers and ranchers.

Roy Lee Smith, Eastland County Civil Defense director, asked that a County Civil Defense Plan be worked out and

approved so that the county might be eligible to receive federal aid for their projects.

Commissioners expressed their favor and asked Smith to prepare a tentative plan to be presented for approval at a future time.

County Judge Scott Bailey called to the attention of the court the fact that Eastland County has accumulated a total of \$32,196.04 in Austin, Eastland County's share of money paid in for gasoline tax, to be used in the Lateral Road Account.

The County can receive the money by passing a resolution asking for the refund. The resolution was then passed. This amount will average \$8,000 per precinct.

Members of the Court then approved a \$1,000 bond for Blake Forehand of Rising Star, Constable of Justice Precinct 7.

The meeting was closed with the routine order of payment on accounts made during the month, that included \$10,000 for the new photostat machine purchased for the County Clerk's office and \$8,000 to the Texas Electric Service Company for rural utility improvements.

Judging the contests were Dale Trout of Eastland, Richard Moore of Cisco and Virgil Moore of Breckenridge.

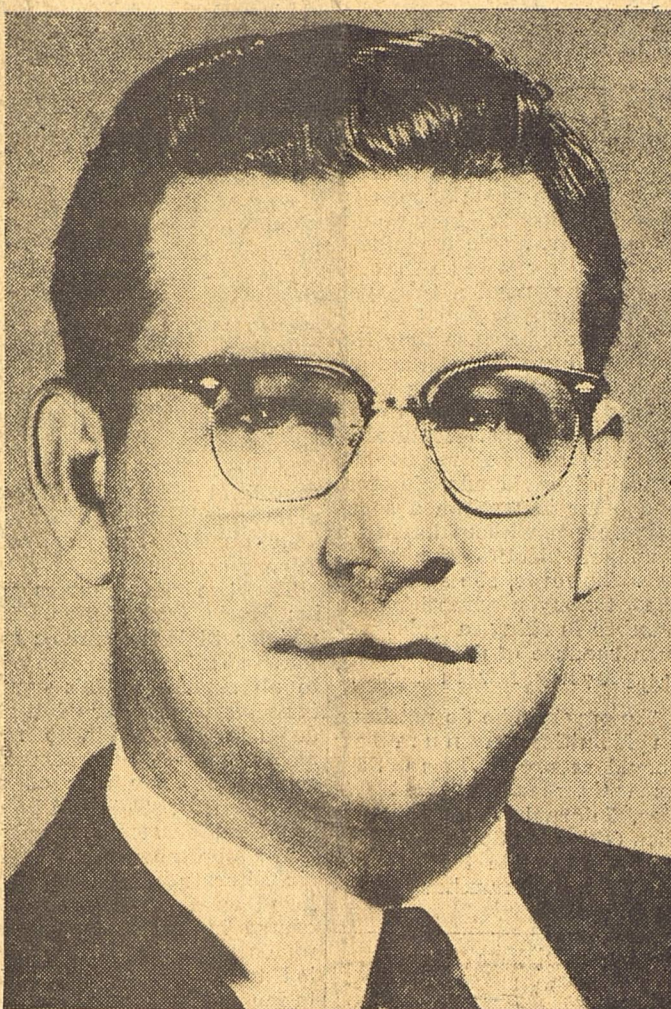

Realizing that there is nothing "peanut" (that is, small) about the current space program, the club chose the theme to emphasize the importance of the big county cash crop in this day and age.

And plans for this year's event are well under way with committees in session, and details being worked out. Dick Johnson is chairman for the event and has several sub-committees working with him.

President Glyn Gilliam challenged the membership this week to work with "vigor" to get the work done that needs to be done in time for the big spectacle.

And it looks as though this fourth edition will be the "biggest and best." In keeping

with the theme, arrangements are being made for space exhibits including modern rocketry as well as other components of this art. There'll be features on parade in Eastland that will attract visitors from miles in every direction, a club spokesman says.

Highlight again this year will be the annual clash of the Cisco and Ranger junior college grid teams at Maverick Stadium. This is expected to be

a power-match in that Ranger will be attempting to even a two-one edge now enjoyed by the Cisco team.

The club has a gigantic surprise bonus under wraps which will be a feature attraction — above and beyond the regular format. But plans are still being finalized and an announcement is expected soon.

The club met Tuesday evening to iron out details and set the "show in motion."

County Sheep And Goat Field Day Set For September

The date for the second annual Eastland County sheep and goat field day has been set for September 20, according to Col. Roy Plumley, Manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, which organization, together with J. M. Cooper, county agent, is sponsoring the affair.

Two veterinarians, Dr. J. B. Henderson, area veterinarian for Texas Animal Health Commission, and Dr. C. M. Patterson, A&M University, will round out the program. A Ranger veterinarian, Dr. John Foster, will be program chairman.

A ranch-style lunch will be served through the courtesy of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, Plumley stated.

SEVERAL MOVES ARE BEING MADE AT COLLEGE

Moving day on the Campus of Ranger Junior College seems to stretch to most every day of the week, what with trying to make room for all the classes, students and faculty offices needed to get the 1963-64 school year underway on September 12.

The entire Music Department is moving from quarters, just north of the Administration Building, to the new Texas National Guard Armory, located on Highway 80, west of the campus. This building is under lease by the college to house the Music Department, temporarily. This will in no way interfere with the building's use by the National Guard.

Kenneth Alford, chairman of the Music Department and Roger C. Martin, band director will share use of the building with their classes scheduled to take advantage of the space afforded.

Faculty offices will be shifted to fit the needs of the departments.

The athletic department is set to move into the old music department building. The old athletic building was torn

down to make room for the new addition to the men's dormitory.

The building program, which includes four more new buildings on the campus, will get underway soon after the buildings are put up for bids on August 15, by the Board of Regents of the college. All four buildings will be contracted to one builder.

National Guard Back Home After 15 Days At Fort Hood

Eastland County's Battery "C," with units in Cisco and Ranger, returned home Sunday after a 15-day active duty tour at Fort Hood with other units of the 49th Armored Division of the Texas National Guard.

CWO James Hendrick, administrative officer for the two units, reported that the men were dog-tired and drenched with sweat after the two weeks in hot, dry weather. The units came home in their own battery vehicles.

The trip "home" for the 7,000 men of the 49th involved 5,850 miles of highway travel, with the division's 3,000 vehicles consuming more than 250,000 gallons of gas just to get back to their 79 home stations.

This 15-day active duty stint for the 49th was a notable tour. It marked the first "reunion" of the division since its release from 10 months active duty exactly a year ago at Fort Polk, La., after the Berlin crisis call-up.

The effects of that rigorous training were still visible at Fort Hood.

The 49th was described as

"a hardened outfit" by Lt. Gen. W. H. S. Wright, chief of reserve forces of the U. S. Continental Army Command, who personally paid the division a visit.

He ranked the 49th "far among the best" of other National Guard and Army reserve divisions he had seen this summer, noting that some 85 per cent of the 49th's present strength were veterans of the Berlin call-up.

Gov. John Connally was another visitor, who reviewed the troops at the annual Governor's Mounted Review on Aug. 3, and a group of Texas legislators came to camp and saw realistic combat maneuvers from the "front lines."

This summer training was

the first for the 49th under the Department of the Army's "ROAD" reorganizational plan, which broke the division's combat elements into a more elastic and mobile fighting force while at the same time giving the division more fire power.

The realignment gave the 49th five tank battalions — instead of four as before — as well as a new artillery battalion packed with four Honest John rockets rather than two.

The 49th made good use of its three brigade headquarters, which commanded their own "task force" of tanks and infantry to perform their training requirements there.

Thus, every soldier of the 49th got his share of field training, with half of the division bivouacking the first week, and the other half hitting the field the second week.

Maj. Gen. Harley B. West of Dallas, 49th Armored Division commander, cited a "most successful camp. Certainly the performance of the division reflects the 10 months of active duty at Fort Polk."

All Arrangements Complete For Annual Peanut Meeting

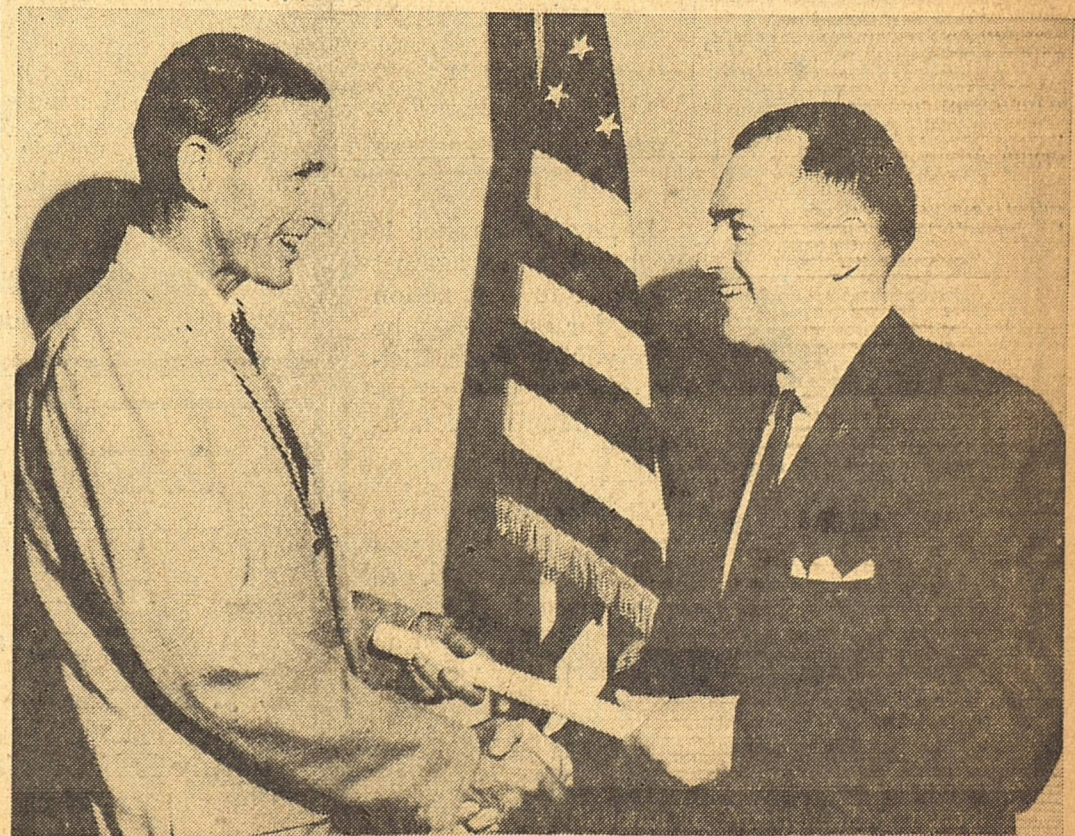

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Both Husband And Wife Need ID Card

In Texas both husbands and wives will need a taxpayer identification number for future income tax filing, according to Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., the Administrative officer at the Abilene office of Internal Revenue Service.

"The community property law creates many situations where both husband and wife have income that belongs to only one spouse in other states," Mr. Fogle explained. "Quite a few wives feel that they do not need a taxpayer identification, or social security number, because they file a joint return with their husband. There are times when it is to their advantage to file separate returns. Naturally, the wife can not report her share of dividends, interest and other income on a separate return without having a taxpayer identification number. However, she still needs the taxpayer identification number in filing a joint return because of the community property law in Texas."

Taxpayers who do not have an identification number should secure a Form SS-5 from their nearest Post Office, Internal Revenue Service Office, or Social Security Office, complete the application and get a number assigned.



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Facts About RJC

Ranger Junior College Music Department, under the chairmanship of Kenneth Alford, will be offering two new courses, not heretofore listed in the college catalog.

The Department of Music offers two years of music instruction leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Education, and Bachelor of Arts with a major in music, Alford said.

For non-music majors, several classes may be elected, such as: Applied Music, (private instruction on a musical instrument), Rudiments of Music, theory, music ensemble, college choir, music ensemble and band.

Music majors at the freshman level will be given theory placement tests to determine their qualifications for Music Theory course.

The two new courses will be: Music Appreciation, 150, which will be for music majors and minors and also open to all students. This course is recommended for adult students in this area who may also receive three semester hours credit or take as an audit course. This will be offered second semester only.

The other new course is Music Literature, 250, which is listed as a slightly advanced course in the literature of music from the Baroque Period in music history; rudimentary historical survey of music before 1600. This too will be offered second semester only. This course also is recommended for adult students.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (e), reading as follows:

"(e) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County, Texas; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision."

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States of America, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (e) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the addition of subsection (e) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

Mutation May Help Develop Better Peanut Varieties

A small, low producing Spanish peanut with no commercial value, may lead scientists to the development of better peanut varieties, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The line of typically small peanuts has been found to possess a mutation that can be used as a genetic marker in peanut improvement research, explains the USDA. These plants have crinkled or curled leaves while normal plants have smooth leaves.

Geneticists with the USDA have shown that the crinkle-leaf characteristic is a dominant inheritance when introduced into a cross between two peanut lines. This mutation can be easily seen at an early stage of the plant's development, they explain. The mutant line has already

helped scientists disprove the old belief that peanuts are self-pollinating, says the USDA. By the use of its marker gene they have shown that as much as 10 per cent natural crossing occurs in some cases. This means that natural cross hybrids, identified by their crinkled leaves, can be produced from known parents and thereby speed the breeding of improved peanut varieties.

The unusual crinkle-leaf peanuts were not discovered by scientists but by a Sidney, Texas, farmer, William Bryant. The mutation studies by the USDA have been with plants from the original seed stock supplied by Bryant.

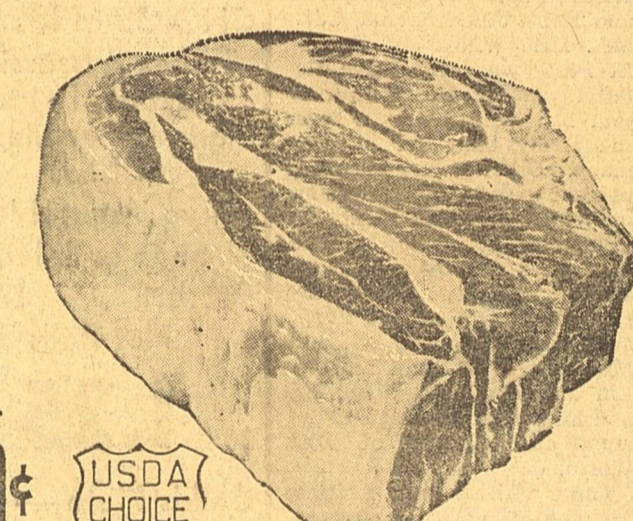

Livestock Spray Program To Be Discussed Friday

The possibility of a county wide livestock spray program will be discussed at a meeting for all area farmers and ranchers at the Chamber of Commerce office in Ranger Friday, August 16 at 8:00 p. m.

According to Beverly Dudley Jr., local vocational agriculture teacher; Oscar Schaefer, chairman of the County Animal Health Committee and Dr. J. B. Fauna, veterinarian with the U. S. Department of Agriculture will bring a discussion on the proposed program.

The discussion will deal with the possibility of a plan to spray as many livestock over the county as possible, in an attempt to aid in the control of the screw worm in conjunction with the stenide fly drop program.

The insecticide Co-Ral would be used. Co-Ral is a systemic insecticide and not only would be beneficial in control of the screw worm but would also control cattle grubs, lice, mites and ticks.

The stenide fly drop program has brought excellent results over the state this year. Week before last, not one single case of screw worms was reported south of the screw worm fly drop line. A few isolated cases of screw worms have been reported north of the regular drop line, Eastland County being in this area.

The possibility of obtaining power spray machines from the state and obtaining the insecticide will be discussed by Mr. Schaefer and Dr. Fauna.

All livestock owners of this area are urged to be present at this meeting.

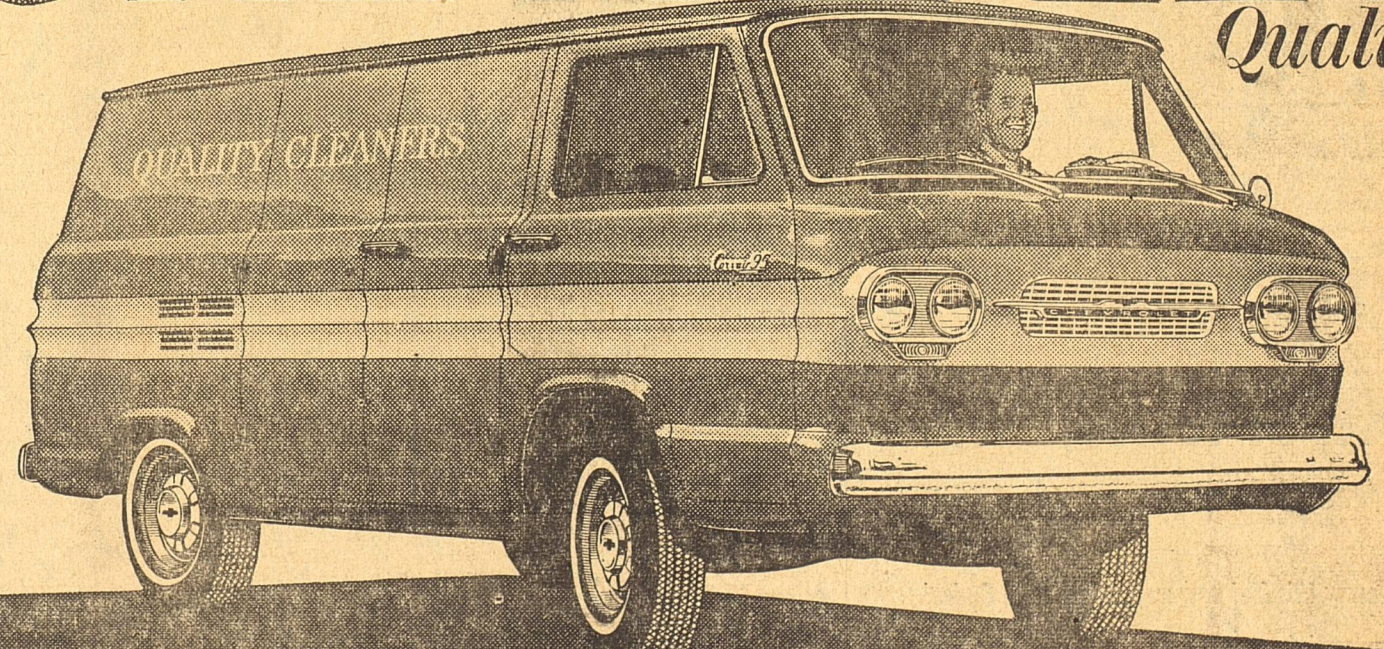
