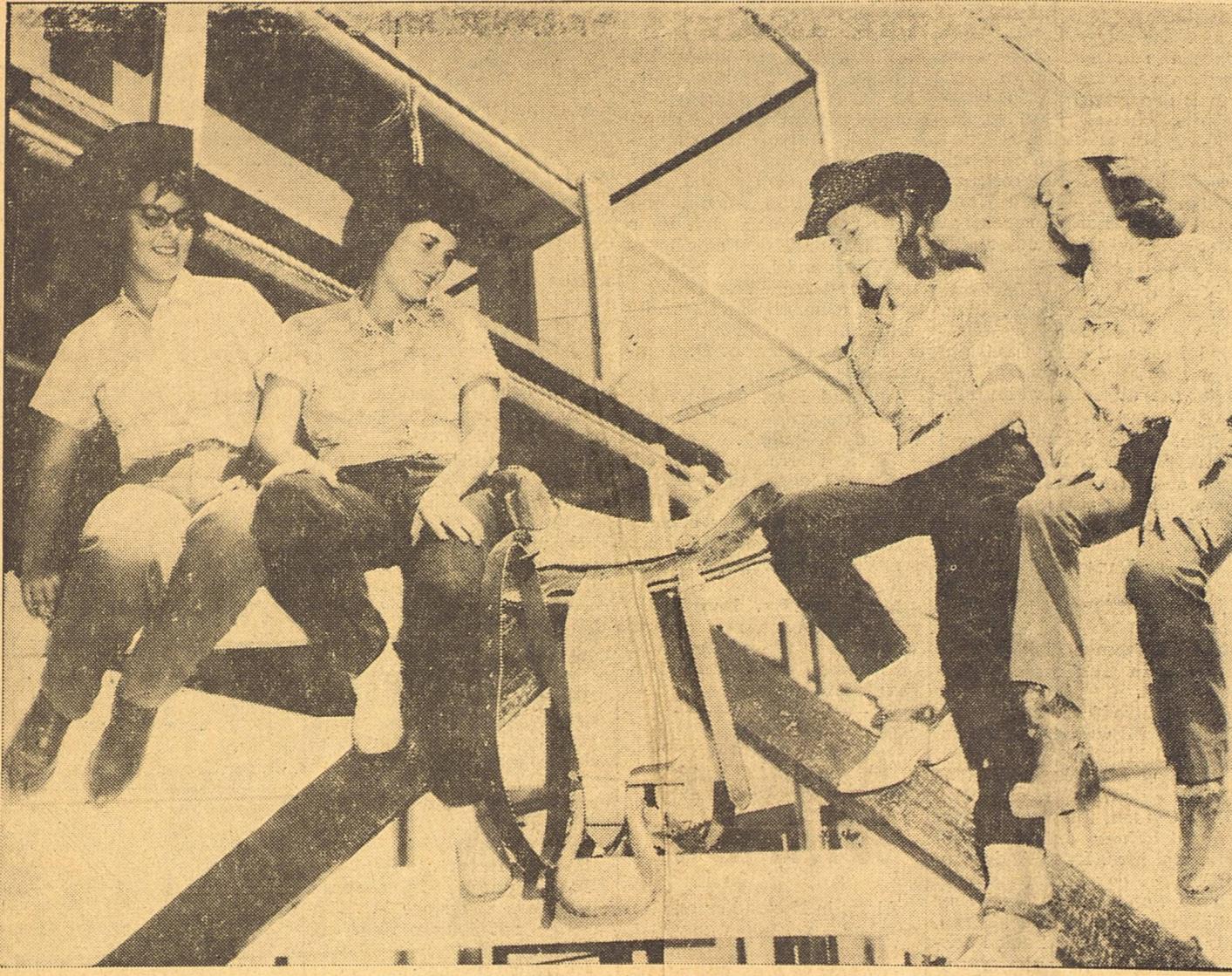
According to Dick Henderson, board president, bids will be opened in the college cafeteria at 3 p. m. September 19.

First Annual-All Womans Rodeo To Be Action Packed

The response to the Ranger Jaycee sponsored - all womans rodeo which will be staged this coming Saturday night at the rodeo arena has been good.

Entrants from as far away as Heneretta, Oklahoma, will be on hand to show the spectators just what the girls can do.

There will be entrants from Ranger, Breckenridge, Lubbock, Vinson Colorado City, Abilene, Heneretta Oklahoma, Baird, Stephenville, Gusting and Rising Star.

Riding clubs that will be represented are, South Bend, Shackelford County, Stephenville Trail Blazers, Tarrant County Sheriffs Posse.

The Tarrant County Sheriffs Posse will lead the grand entry and set the pivots.

The Stephenville Trail Blazers will perform as a drill team with precision riding. Those who witnessed the first held in July, will recall that this club put on a thrilling performance that will be well worth seeing again.

Rules that will govern the contest are as follows:

Flag race: The contestant must race, on a horse, on a small flag, to the other end of the arena where a bucket of sand will be sitting atop a barrel. The sand will hold a contrasting colored flag. The contestant will stick the flag she is carrying in the sand and pick up the contrasting flag and race back to the line. If she does not stick the flag upright, she will be disqualified.

Goat tie down: A goat will be staked in the arena. The contestant will race, on foot, from the starting line, throw

the oat and tie him. When cow milking: There will be four girls to each cow. The cow will be in the chute with a rope around her head. All the cows will be turned out of the chutes at the same time. The cow must cross the starting line and then three girls can hold the cow any way they please while the fourth girl milks the cow in a bote and race to the judge who will be standing in the middle of the arena.

Bael race: Clover leaf pattea. There will be a 5

second penalty if a barrel is knocked down.

Soda pop race: The contestant must race on a horse, from the starting line to the other end of arena where a case of pop bottles, filled with water will be sitting on top of a barrel. The contestant will dismount, and while holding her horse, drink all the water in the pop bottle that will be handed to her by a judge then remount and race back to the line.

Bull riding: The contestant may use both hands.

The members if the Ranger Jaycees will conduct the rodeo. The officials will be the only men in the arena during the rodeo performance.

Registration for high school students will be held Thursday, August 29. Seniors will report at 8 a. m., juniors 9 a. m., sophomores 10 a. m. and freshmen 11 a. m.

Junior High
Junior high school students will also register Thursday, August 29. It is very important that all students register at the proper time for those who register late may have trouble in getting the subjects they desire.

New High School Students
High school students enrolling for the first time in the Ranger school system will need a transcript before enrolling in Ranger High School. If a transcript from your former school has not been requested, you should have one sent to the school as soon as possible.

Elementary School
Registration for grades 4, 5 and 6 will be held at Young School on Thursday, August 29 at 8:30 a. m. All students

are to report to their proper classes at that time.

Primary School
Registration for only those pupils who are new in Ranger will be held at Hodges Oak Park School Thursday August 29, at 8:30 a. m. All pupils that will be in the first grade will also register at that time. It has been requested

that all first graders bring their birth certificate.

Friday, August 30, from 8:30 to 10:30 a. m. all first grade pupils who have not taken the Readiness Test are requested to report to Hodges for this purpose.

Browsing With Bev

Along in November and December I receive many calls from homemakers, wanting to know how to preserve pecans. Even though it will be a while before we have any pecans to store, I thought I would go ahead and give you the instructions for storing pecans, so you will have the information when you need it. But first, some information about measuring pecans that will come in handy when you use pecans in cookings.

Two and one-half pounds of native pecans in the shell yield a pound of meats (about four cups).

Two pounds of paper-shd pecans yield one pound of meats.

As you know, pecans become rancid after several months storage unless properly canned or frozen.

CANNING PECANS IN PRESSURE CANNER

Select well-cured nuts and sort according to size. Place in shallow pan and heat in 250 to 300 degree oven for 1 minutes. Pack hot into ht, dry jars or tin cans. Leave one-inch headspace in jar; fill cans to top. Close jars seal cans. Process in pressure canner at five pounds pressure for 10 minutes. Open ptcock; let steam out. Remove jars or cans from canner. Complete seal on jars if closures are not self-sealing type. Cool cans in cool water.

CANNING PECAN IN WATER BATH

Follow directions for preparing pecans for pressure canner. Place jars in water bath, with water one inch below the rim of the jar; water should cover cans. Press in boiling water for 15 minutes. Remove jars and caplets seal if closures are not self-

 Package freshly shelled pecans in moisture and vapor proof bags, freezer tin cans, freezer jars or plastic containers. Seal or close containers. Sharp freeze and store at six degrees.

STORAGE
 Shelled Pecans:
 Place pecans in covered containers and store in refrigerator not longer than six months.
 Unshelled Pecans:
 Store unshelled pecans at a temperature range of 38 degrees. They will keep fresh for about a year.

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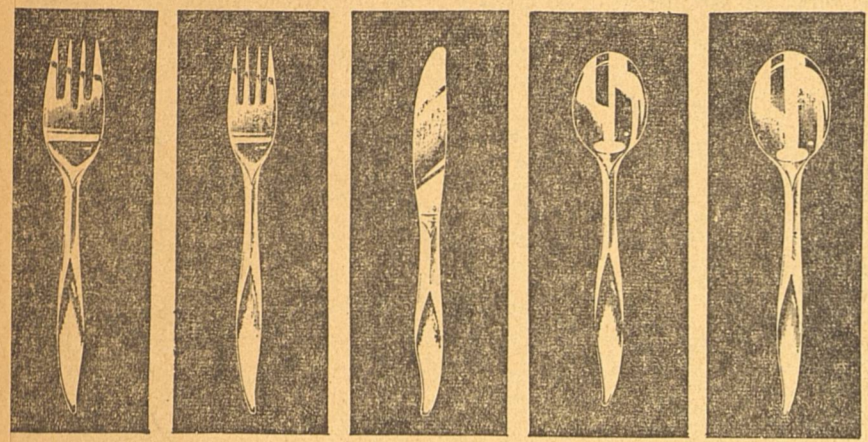

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — Does the VA recommend converting term insurance to permanent plan insurance?

A — Both have their advantages. It would depend on the individual circumstances. Term insurance supplied maximum insurance for minimum cost. Thus, it might be ideal for a veteran with a large cost of term insurance, however, increases as time goes on and becomes very expensive in late, middle or old age. It offers no loan value nor any permanent equity. Thus, after children are grown a veteran might wish to convert all or part of his term insurance to a lower cost policy with premiums that never change and the other advantages mentioned above.

Q — May the family — wife and children of a veteran — obtain medical care and hospital treatment at a VA hospital?

A — No. Only veterans themselves may be treated in the VA hospital system.

Q — When is the final date for any World War II veteran to get a GI loan?

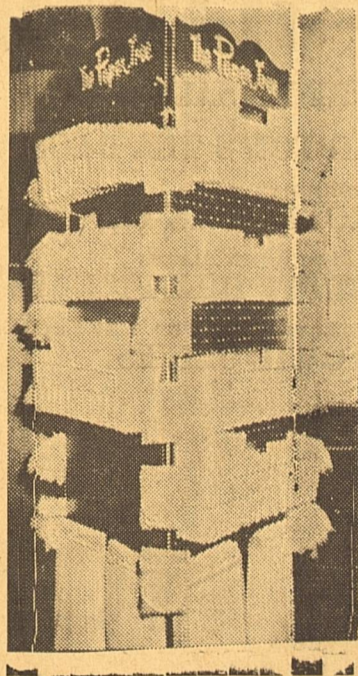
A — The GI loan program comes to an end for all World War II veterans on July 25, 1967. For the great majority of World War II veterans it will end sooner than that — the calendar date reached by adding ten years to their date of discharge from the last period of active service plus an additional year for each three months of active service.

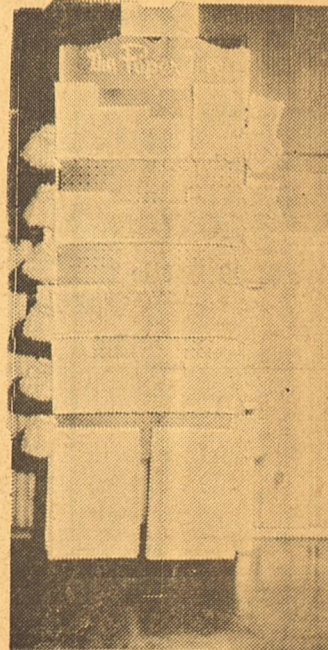

2nd Annual S & G Field Day To Feature Flock Selction

Selection of sheep and goats for the breeding flock, will be one of the features of the second annual sheep and goat field day, September 20, at the old Sinclair pump station building at Tiffin, three miles north of Ranger, courtesy of Ranger Junior College.

Jim Gray, San Angelo, and Jack Groff of Kerrville, A & M sheep and goat specialists, will conduct demonstrations.

A good goat should produce mohair at the rate of one inch per month. This will produce a six-inch clip for each of the two clips a year. Too many local animals do not produce this length of hair.

Gray will explain a flexible selection program for both species that can be adapted to any ranch, regardless of the size of the ranch. The program is being sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and County Agent J. M. Cooper.

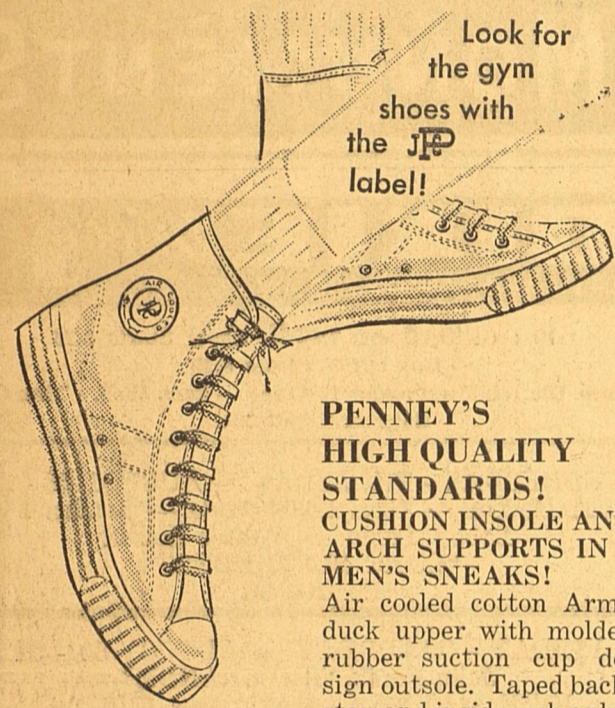

LICENSE PLATE COST LOW FOR MOTORISTS OF TEXAS

AUSTIN — License plates for Texas motor vehicles are produced at the lowest comparable cost of any state in the Union, the Texas Highway Department said today.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said a report compiled by the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators showed that Texas' delivered price on its 1962 license plates was only 14.2 cents a pair — lower than any other state making two plates per motor vehicle. ("Delivered price" includes both manufacturing and freight charges needed to get the plates to County Tax Assessor-Collector offices all over the state). The 1962 figures are the latest available.

The Highway Department supervises the production of license plates, which are

manufactured by prison labor at the Huntsville State Prison. Forty other states also use prison labor to make license plates.

The Highway Department derives a net profit for the highway fund of more than 97 per cent of the revenues it receives from license plates, Greer said. Only about 2 1/2 per cent is required for administrative cost.

Revenues derived from sale of license plates constitute about 22 cents of the total highway dollar. About three-fourths of the revenues from license plates goes into the state highway fund; the other one-fourth is returned to the counties and used to defray the cost of commissions and refunds.

Greer said the Highway Department built a new warehouse last year to stockpile

raw steel for license plates and has already saved enough money on the 1964 plates (now being manufactured) to pay for half the cost of the building. The warehouse storage space makes it possible to buy steel on a firm commitment for one year avoiding the possibility of a rise in steel prices or delay in delivery due to strikes.

Certain new developments in the manufacturing end have contributed to Texas' low-cost plates, Greer said. Paint chemists in the Highway Department have developed a way for the steel plates to be

dipped in paint without first having to go through an expensive acid bath.

The prison also bought a new baking oven last year which speeds up plate production. The Highway Department pays the prison system for making the plates, plus 25 per cent profit. Each prisoner in the tag plant is paid 15 cents an hour.

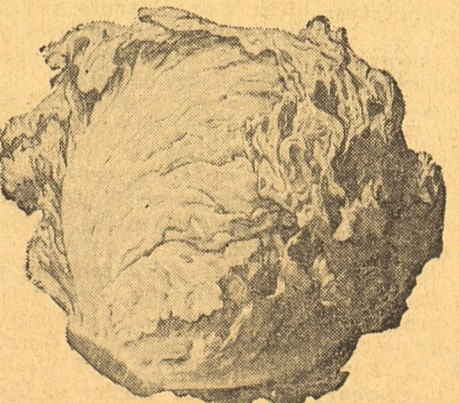

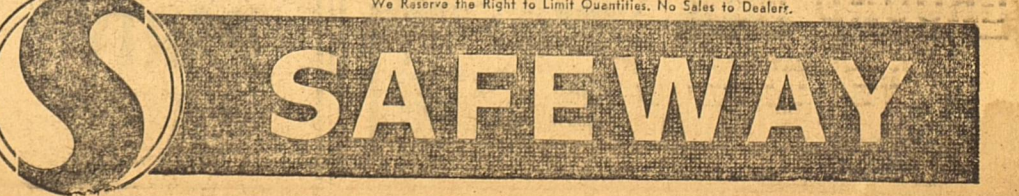

The Age of Private Transportation

"Get the farmer out of the mud" was the battle cry of the highway program in the 1920's and 1930's. In the early days of the automobile age, a paved road outside of the limits of a city or incorporated town was rare enough to be a curiosity.

Today, almost 70 percent of the 3,127,225 miles of rural roads in the United States have some kind of surfacing. A substantial amount of the remaining non-surfaced road mileage is so little traveled that paving is not justified; nevertheless, much remains to be done before we can claim a complete all-weather road system in the United States.

Nowadays, however, "getting the farmer out of the mud" is one among many objectives of the national highway program. The automobile and the truck have become such an integral part of American life that good highway transportation is essential to the success of almost every activity. Industries, schools, churches and shopping centers share the farmer's vital concern with the highway program. Commuters get stuck in urban traffic jams more often than farmers get stuck in the mud.

The essentiality of highway transportation to the national economy and the national defense is reflected in the Federal-

aid highway program, which has assisted the States in the improvement of their highway networks since 1916.

Federal-aid expenditures for highways, increasing in line with the increase in highway travel, now approximate \$3 billion per year, all of which is collected by means of special taxes on highway users, chiefly the 4-cent-per-gallon Federal tax on gasoline.

These special tax receipts are allocated by Congress to four categories of Federal-aid highway expenditures: (1) aid to the State primary, or trunk-line, highways, (2) aid to farm-to-market roads, (3) aid for the improvement of city arterial streets and expressways and (4) aid in the construction of the 41,000-mile National System of Interstate and Defense Highways, the new system of coast-to-coast interconnected expressways designed to meet our defense needs and to serve as the backbone for our total highway network. The Federal government pays 90% of the construction cost of the Interstate highways and 50% on other Federal-aid highways.

State, local and Federal officials are all working together to coordinate their highway construction activities, recognizing that the roads are economic and social lifelines which are the key to better living for all of us.

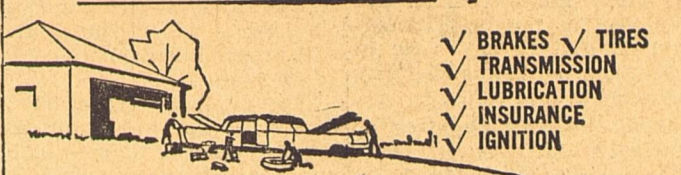
The Great Plains program was activated in Brown and Eastland Counties on Jan. 1, 1963.

SLOW DRIVERS ARE SUBJECT TO FINE UNDER NEW LAWS

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today the new speed law effective August 23 specifically makes it a violation to drive a vehicle so slow as to impede traffic.

He said that before enactment of the new law it was necessary for a police officer to warn a driver impeding traffic to speed up or get off the road before filing a charge.

"Under the new statute, as we interpret it, whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding the traffic, he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged in court," Garrison said.

The DPS Director also pointed out that under the new law violation of these two provisions over various kinds of highways are authorized to zone roads for minimum speeds whenever they determine that slower speeds consistently impede traffic. Failure to comply with such minimum speed limits will be regarded as a violation, he added.

"It will be the policy of the Texas Department of Public Safety to stop and take enforcement action against any driver observed to be committing clear-cut and substantial

violations of the law," he said. "Substantial compliance with these provisions should relieve congestion on highways and reduce considerably the differential between top speeds and lower speeds, thus reducing potential conflicts and increasing traffic safety."

Garrison reminded again in connection with the new maximum speed limits of 70 MPH in daytime and 65 MPH at night for passenger cars that these are dependent upon conditions existing on the roadway at the time. The Texas law requires a driver to operate his vehicle "reasonably and prudently" at all times, regardless of the posted limits, he said.

"We repeat that serious problems may develop with the new speed law unless the driving public accepts and applies them with a high degree of responsibility to themselves, their families and others."
