Three Ranger Explorers Complete Canoe Race

Tired and weary after stroking for five days in over 100 degree temperature, three explorers from Post 10 completed the 100-mile Highland Lakes Canoe Race Friday afternoon.

Leroy Pearson, Johnny Comacho, and Larry Wilhelm crossed the finish line, threw their paddles in the air, and dived overboard into the cool depths of Town Lake in Austin. They had just completed a three mile sprint in which they had passed seven of the canoes in front of them. This, combined with the earlier ratings, gave them the rating of No. 23 out of 45 canoes.

135 boys from three states in 45 canoes finished the five day race. An experienced crew from McAllen won the champion's trophy. They also were awarded the canoe in which they had raced. All of the canoes were identical and were furnished by the Alumacraft Company of Michigan.

The 90 piece North American Air Defense Band from Colorado Springs, Colorado, played as 500 spectators waited for the canoes at the finish line. As the canoe race ended, it officially opened the nine day Aqua Festival in Austin.

The group was accompanied by Lee Ausburne and Douglas Browning. These boys helped with meals, sleeping facilities, and transportation. Offering advice and encouragement were Mr. L. R. Pearson and Mr. J. S. Wilhelm.

Friday night the boys stayed in the Commodore Perry Hotel.

They returned home Saturday evening.

Total amount of rough fish caught during the week of Aug. 5-11 was 57 pounds and 11 ounces.

Bulldog Grid Workouts Begin Monday; Prospects Look Good

Ranger High School football coach, Jack Duvall has announced that the football workouts will begin Monday morning, August 19, at 8:00.

The first two days will be devoted primarily to a lot of running and review.

Morning workouts will be from 8 to 10:30 and the evening workouts will be from 5:30 to 7:30.

Starting Wednesday, the boys, in full pads, will begin doing some hard contact and their workouts will be shorter. There will be two breaks a day when the boys will be given ice and salt pills.

Coach Duvall stated that the public's presence at these workouts is beneficial to both boys and coaches, since, if they see the boys in action, they will have some understanding of what is trying to be accomplished during these workout periods. Their presence also spurs the boys into putting into the practice the best that they have.

He also stated that neither he, nor any other football coach can promise parents that their sons will not be injured, but that he could promise that the boys will be in top mental and physical condition, thus greatly reducing the chances of injury. He said that the more conditioning and the less contact that is stressed during practice or workout sessions, the more contact the boys eventually will want. This is something different that is being tried this year and for this

reason, parents and fans are urged to attend the workouts so that they won't misunderstand the hard practices.

Forty-one boys are expected to report for workouts Monday morning with 11 of these boys being freshmen. Freshmen boys are badly needed.

Duvall observed that the strength of the team lies in the backfield depth and that although the team lacks speed the boys are quick. The main

weakness of the team seems to be in line depth and to try to remedy this, the younger boys are going to be played.

The boys who best pay the price, represent their school, and who, as a whole, their presence makes the team better off will be rewarded by being given the privilege of wearing a bulldog decal, two maroon stripes and a number on their helmet. It isn't necessary. (Continued on Page Four.)

New Store Ownership Announced

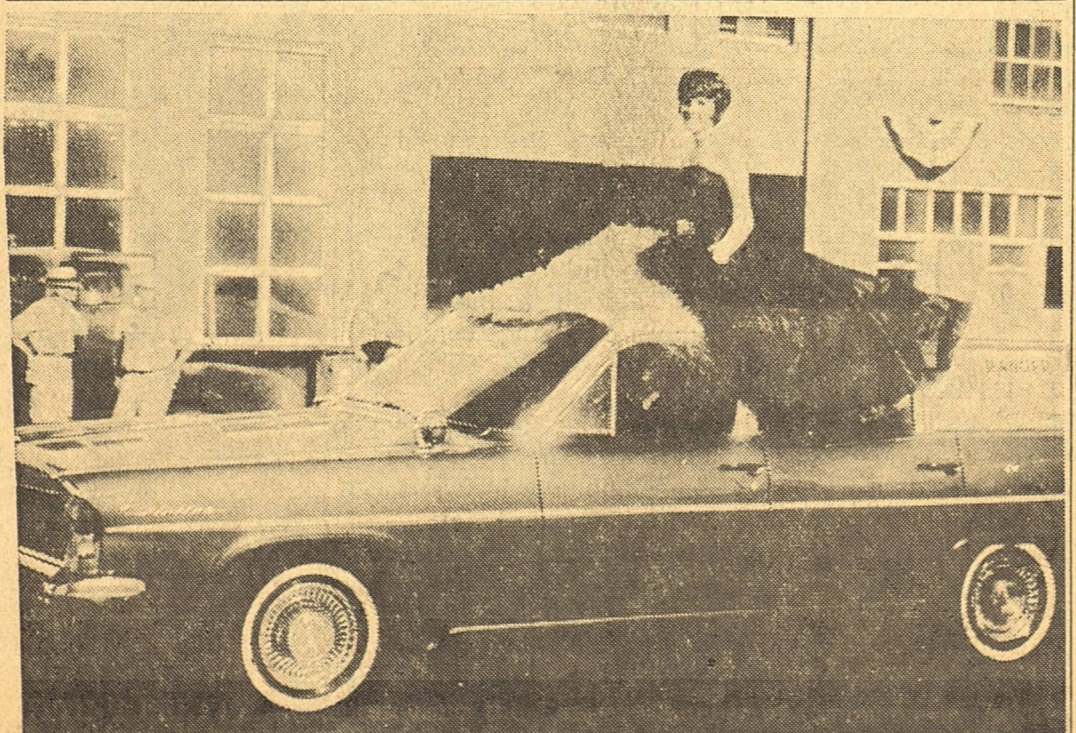
Betty and J. B. Craig have announced that they have recently purchased the C&R Grocery Store and are now sole owner of the business. The new name of the store will be Craig Grocery.

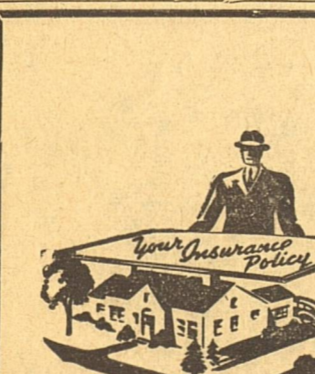
"You often hear where scholarships are more abundant than qualified students," said Hunt. "But this is not the case at Baylor. We have many more applicants, and need more scholarship endowment."

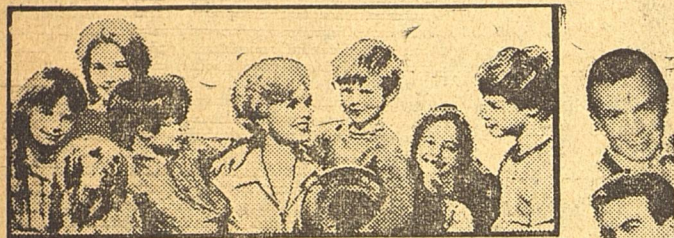
