Lee Ballew and McKinley Speck were rushed to the Ranger hospital immediately after the explosion, where they were given medical attention. Ballew received burns about the face, arms and body. Speck has bad burns about the face and breast. Lonnie Ballew was not hurt bad enough to necessitate medical treatment.

When seen at the hospital this morning Lee Ballew gave the following description of the explosion:

GAS WAS OFF.

"Myself, my brother Lonnie and Speck had just perfected arrangements to open a branch of the Sherman steam laundry in a small building next to the Carter and Li lsey feed store. We had slept in the building two or three nights. Yesterday we ing two or three nights. Yesterday we had gas connection completed. We burned no gas Wednesday night because there was none in the pipe.

WAKES SUFFOCATED.

"The meter was next to my bed. I awoke much stupefied about 4 o'clock and was startled to hear a while ling of gas near my head from the meter. call for the Texarkana fire depart-I got up and turned the gas off, opened the front and rear doors to let the gas escape. After I thought everything was safe I struck a match to turn on the light, when the explosion occurred. I was thrown with a terrific force from the meter. Call for the Texarkana fire department was received this morning from Debalk, Texas, 40 miles west of here where it was reported fire threatens destruction of the town.






